The ACC's largest cribbage tournament will be held the second weekend in February at the Sands Regency Casino Hotel in Reno. With more than 1,000 players, this is also the most important national tournament sponsored by the ACC.

If you've attend the JPW/ACC Open and TOC before, I'm sure you'll be a repeat customer. But if you've never played in Reno, you're missing a weekend of non-stop cribbage.

The first item of business is, well, an item of business—the Board of Directors meeting on Thursday. Our twenty-five BOD members will put in a full day of discussion on various topics, both mundane and urgent, related to the governance of our organization. One topic sure to generate a lively exchange of viewpoints is the issue of whether to split the Western Region. Whether you're a policy wonk or just like to keep informed about societal goings-on, all ACC members are welcome to sit in and observe the BOD meeting.

The first cribbage event on tap is the All Star Competition, scheduled for Thursday evening. You know all those names of champions and perennial All Americans that you read in CW every month? Well, this is your chance to see them in action. Feel free to (silently) observe over the shoulders of our best players and see how they handle tricky end-of-game situations, how they play defense, how they accept defeat gracefully.

The fun really gets started on Friday morning with the Tournament of Cham-

pions. This event will see over 500 Masters, Bronze award winners, club champions, tournament champions—you name it—competing for one of the most coveted titles in all cribbagedom.

If you didn't qualify to play in the TOC—or if you failed to qualify *in* the TOC—you are welcome to play in the **Cribbage Bowl** on Friday afternoon. These twelve games are the perfect prelude to the ACC Open.

For many of us, playing in a local cribbage club is the highlight of our week. If you would like a better idea of how the Grass Roots organization operates, or if you would like to give something back to this group, you should attend the **Grass Roots Board of Volunteers** meeting on Friday evening at 8:00.

The main event is the JPW/ACC Open, named in honor of founding president Joseph Petrus Wergin. All serious and fun-loving cribbage players will gather on Saturday morning at 8:30 to start a quest that only one will win—\$10,000.

And finally, if the cards have deserted you all weekend, you still have one last chance at cribbage-mania during Sunday's consolation tournament.

Of course, many attendees will spend the weekend with "universal donor" tattooed on their forehead. But remember, a bad day playing cribbage is better than a good day doing almost anything else!

In November the Maine State Police busted the American Legion of Gardiner ME for hosting a weekly cribbage tournament without a license. Regretfully, this American Legion and others have stopped tournaments because they don't have the \$700 required for a yearly license. Many other social clubs in the state, including our own Grass Roots club, have been affected by the law. Through the efforts of many concerned Mainers, legislation will be introduced by Representative Stephen Hanley of Gardiner ME and others to remove cribbage as a game of chance and classify it a game of skill. 

Four Regions

by Larry Hassett

I've been reading the letters about the proposed fourth region and finally have to say something. First, I would support this proposal no matter what region had 50% of the membership. As **Syl Lulinski** pointed out in the September CW, I would like to think I represent all ACC members.

The proposed four regions would duplicate the four major Grass Roots regions developed a long time ago. The principle reason for two Grass Roots regions in the West was the workload. I have never heard a Grass Roots member whine about one region having more power over another, but worked together toward a common goal.

The BOD would still be made up of twenty-five members, and each region would have six members on the BOD. The West would not have a majority on the BOD, and, if we are all representing the ACC, what difference would it make anyway? The twenty-fifth board member could be an ACC member from outside the U.S. (in practical terms, someone from Canada). It is high time that we recognize these valuable members to our organization with a seat on the BOD.

What about costs? The regional tournament commissioners used to be volunteers, but now are compensated. Since the workload would be more equally distributed, to add one more regional commissioner would cost \$1,800/year. Equipment costs would be maybe \$2,000 every four or five years. Based upon the information received the last time this issue came up, the MRP software would not have to be changed, but some time

would be needed to make the changes.

Only about ten tournaments in northern California and southern Oregon would require coordination (and, then, only if they want to change dates). The regional commissioner could review the list of tournament dates and email the other regional commissioner about the proposed change. A quick check of the schedule should be all that is required.

In the past, the Central Region hosted the Grand National tournament every other year, and the Eastern and Western Regions hosted the tournament once every four years. The rotation has not always been strictly by region, so the rotation could stay the same, with the Northwest and the Southwest each hosting once in six years.

In summary, four regions will benefit the ACC by providing equal representation. We just have to want it to work and work together to solve any problems.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

At the upcoming winter Board of Directors meeting in Reno, the Board will be asked to consider a major revision to the regional composition of the ACC. A proposal will be made advocating the creation of a 4th Region by dividing the current West Region into two regions: a Southwest Region and a Northwest Region. The result would create four very nearly equal regions with respect to the number members in each region. This revision would require amendments to the bylaws of the ACC, as well as adjustments in several other areas, as follows:

- (1) One additional Tournament Commissioner will need to be appointed, equipped and compensated to serve the new region.
- (2) Revision to the composition of the Board of Directors to six directors per region, plus a 25th director chosen at large.
- (3) Revision of the makeup and conduct of the Allstar competition to four squads of five or six, playing either 15 or 18 games vs the current three squads of eight, playing 16 games.
- (4) Revision of the rotation for Grand National Tournaments to a six year cycle, possibly: SW, CENTRAL, EAST, NW, CENTRAL, EAST.

The All American Team would still be comprised of the top ten mrp scorers, regardless of Region.

If you have an opinion on this issue, and you should, take a minute or two to contact one or more of the Directors in your Region and let them know how you feel. A complete listing of directors telephone numbers and email addresses can be found on the ACC website under "Contacts".

Barbara Woodward

For over twenty years, Barbara Woodward has coordinated the ACC's national tournaments in Reno. If it weren't for her, one thousand cribbage players would show up the second weekend in February and have no place to play.

In honor of Barbara and to better acquaint you with this exceptional lady, CW presents a Q&A session conducted via email. And when you see Barbara in Reno next month, tell her thanks for all her work.

Where were you born and raised?

I'm a Southern California girl.

Where do you live now?

I've been in Reno since 1983. We moved here for my husband's business. I live south of town with my husband David, sons Tom (18) and Daniel (12), a horse named Beau, and a 21-year-old cat.

Do you play cribbage?

Yes, I started playing cards with my dad when I was about five years old—check



out that pic-First ture! gin rummy, then and he taught cribme bage when I was about seven. We played on a plastic board that was really

the top of the plastic box that held a deck of cards and poker chips. You had to go around twice, and there were no arrows. I could never remember which way I was going or how many times I'd been around. The long board is a *great* improvement! My dad played muggins, and I can still hear him saying, "Can I have the rest?" This was his way of giving me a chance to find missed points in my hand before he took them! Playing cards with my dad is one of my fondest memories.

Have you ever had a 29-hand?

No, but I had a 28-hand in Grass Roots on St. Patrick's Day in 1987. Hard to believe it was twenty years ago! I still have the note DeLynn Colvert sent with my certificate. It says, "Gee, you do peg a little!"

When did you join the ACC?

I think it was 1986 or '87. I have met so many wonderful people through the ACC who are very special to me, and I am very grateful. I'm not going to mention anyone by name, because I would leave someone

out, but you all know who you are!

Have you ever played in a sanctioned tournament?

A couple of times, but I'd rather play "kitchen table" cribbage—it's more fun for me. I love to play doubles with my husband, David, and Bill and Dorthalee Irons.

Do you play Grass Roots?

The way my schedule is right now, not very often. We have a great club here in Reno run by Les and Valerie Sumner. Maybe when I'm retired I'll have more time to play!

What is your title/duties at the Sands?

I'm a special events coordinator. My goal is to put on fun, well-organized events that make people happy. When people go home after attending a tournament in Reno and their friends and families ask them how their trip was, my hope is that they can honestly answer, "That was fun, I had a good time. You should come with me next time!"

How long have you worked at the Sands?

Since 1984. First for the Cladianos family, and now for the Herbst family. It's a great place to work!

How many years have you coordinated the Sands' hosting the TOC/ACC Open in February?

Bill and Dorthalee Irons deserve credit for bringing the TOC/ACC Open to Reno; it was held at the Silver Club in Sparks before moving to the Sands. I think it was in 1985 that Syl Lulinski came out to see me. I also went back to Chicago to see Bob and Elda Madsen. I can still remember them getting early issues of *Cribbage World* ready for mailing. Their basement



was "cribbage central"! I think we held the first ACC Open at the Sands in 1986. We had around 450 players; now attendance is more than double that. We have a great group of hard working volunteers who have helped this event become the world's largest cribbage tournament. We couldn't do it without them!

How much time do you spend each year preparing for the TOC/ACC Open?

I start in November and just keep going! Joan Rein and I work very closely to make sure everything goes smoothly. She puts in as much work (or more!) than I do, and she's a volunteer!

Is it true that the TOC/ACC Open is the largest gambling weekend at the Sands every year?

I'm not sure about exact figures, but the Sands loves cribbage players, and we have really worked hard over the years to keep them happy. (Although they are a pretty happy bunch to begin with!)

How many people attend the July and November tournaments at the Sands?

These events have leveled off to around continued on page 18

300 players over the past several years. The tournaments are fundraisers for the Veterans Family Relief Fund, a nonprofit organization founded by tournament organizers Bill and Dorthalee Irons. One hundred percent of the entry fees goes to the prize fund; the Sands pays all the expenses, adds money to the tournaments, and also donates \$10 per player, up to \$3,000, to the Veterans Fund. The money raised goes to providing services to families of veterans in need, as well providing a military color guard farewell at veterans' funerals. The Sands and I are very proud to be able to help support the Irons' in their efforts.

Who would you most like to beat in a game of cribbage?

This might sound corny, but I really don't want to beat anyone. To me it's all about the game, the cards, and the company. Who wins is irrelevant to me, good sportsmanship is everything. I abhor cheating. It always makes me sad to hear when someone has succumbed to this weakness.

Which cribbage player would you pick to be stranded on a deserted island with?

I think I'll have to hold auditions and get back to you on that one!

What could the ACC do to attract more members?

We need to support youth programs like Dan Zeisler's in California and others around the country. The Sands donates \$500 to Dan's program every year, but we need to do more to introduce kids to cribbage. We should also be more involved on military bases and in military hospitals, supporting our servicemen and servicewomen.

Do you have a cribbage wish?

That I could play with my dad again. He died seven games ahead!


Tom DeYoung

Tabulation Team TEERS

The sole purpose of the tabulation team is to make sure that the top 25% of the field really is the top 25%. This necessary task at every cribbage event can be accomplished by as few as two people or as many as forty, which is the number used at Reno. Generally, it is preferable to have too much *qualified* help than too little.

It is surprising how many cribbage players make errors that remain undetected until the tabulation and cross-checking process is under way. Many errors are to the detriment of the player making them!

This brings up an important point: when you initial your opponent's scorecard, you are saying that his/her score is correct—that it is identically opposite to the score on your scorecard. If each player would compare scores before signing, many of the errors could be corrected (by a judge) at once.

After counting the number of scorecards (to be sure that all have been turned in) and sorting them into three groups (qualifiers, nonqualifiers, and "maybes"), the tabulation team then checks the arithmetic on all the probable qualifying cards—and at least one extra.

A checker scans down the positive spread points column, adding 2 GPs for a win and 3 for a win by 31 or more spread points. The result is compared with the game points that the player wrote. If the numbers are identical, great. If they are different, the checker determines why—most often the spread points are written in the wrong column (a win with negative spread or a loss with positive spread). These errors

are corrected, subject to verification in the cross-checking process. Games won are also counted and checked against the number written by the player; apparent errors are corrected, again subject to later verification against the opponent's card. Plus and minus spread points are added, and any arithmetic errors are corrected, with an additional correction to the net spread points.

Once this process is complete, qualifiers and nonqualifiers are separately divided according to table. Qualifiers' scores are cross-checked against all of their opponents, being certain that all the scores are equal and opposite. When an error is found, it is always corrected to the detriment of the qualifier. If a qualifier says he/ she won by 17 and the opponent records a loss by 12, the qualifier's card is changed to reflect a win by 12. In many instances such errors could change the position or even the fact of qualifying—a tough penalty for not paying attention when signing an opponent's card! (For more details about cross-checking guidelines, see the 2004 rule book, pages 38-40.)

After all the cards have been crosschecked, they are again combined, qualifiers in one pile and nonqualifiers in the other pile. The nonqualifiers are triplechecked to be sure that no card with a qualifying score was accidentally included in this pile. Qualifiers are then ranked by score, and the names written on the playoff bracket.

With the top 25% of the field now established—and verified—the playoffs can begin!

Everything You've Always Wanted to Know about Cribbage (But Were Afraid to Ask)

A reader writes: "My dad, who is 85 years old, and I have been playing cribbage since I was a child. We now live in different states, and I'd like to be able to play cribbage with him over the internet. Can we do this from your site without being in tournaments? My dad played cribbage with his grandfather, and he passed it on to me. It is a special time for us, and we miss playing."

Lois Fosdal (Stoughton WI), the ACC's assistant internet statistician, provides a brief tutorial on how to play "kitchen table" cribbage on-line.

A number of websites allow you to play cribbage with your father without playing in a tournament:

- Game Colony: gamecolony.com
- Gamer Shack: thegamershack.com
- Nidink: nidink.com

In all of these instances, you and your father need to register and create a screen nickname, which is relatively easy to do. Once you have done that, then both of you can enter the website, go into the same room, and play.

If you are the pone holding A-4 or 2-3, should you lead the larger card or the smaller card? CW asked Life Master (*) Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen (Napavine WA) to answer this question. Do you agree with Ras?

Since there is a distinct chance that your opponent will be holding X-cards (i.e., 10, J, Q, K) with one or more 5s, play for the 15-2. Lead the larger card of the couplet. The dealer cannot risk dropping a 5 on a 4 or 3 lead and will play a X-card, giving you a 15-2. If you lead the smaller card,

an experienced player will drop the 5 and deprive you of the 15-2.

The exception to this is when you are holding A-4-5-X: lead the ace and retain the 4-5 in sequence, which might pick up a stray 6 or 3 for a run of three later in the play.

Cribbage Club Connects with Chamber of Commerce

The Chehalis-Centralia Cribbage Club has belonged to the Centralia-Chehalis Chamber of Commerce for the past three years. We encourage other cribbage clubs to join Chamber of Commerce organizations if they exist in your community or an adjacent city.

Most chambers offer a reduced annual membership fee for nonprofit organizations. Our annual dues are \$130, and this provides access to more than 750 business and organizational members. Our local chamber's user-friendly website (www.chamberway.com) offers many benefits to members. For example, the business directory lists our club name, contact info, and playing schedule and also links to cribbage.org.

Members may submit articles to the chamber's monthly newspaper, *Business Connections*, which is mailed to all chamber members and also included as a circular with the *Chronicle*, the largest circulating newspaper in Lewis County WA. Our club publishes articles in it about three times annually.

Another advantage to chamber membership is that our club can send flyers with the monthly mailing of *Business Connections* for 11.5¢ per copy. This is a huge savings over the current first-class rate of 41¢ (plus envelopes and labeling). In addition, we may purchase labels for all chamber members at a member cost of \$30 (versus a nonmember cost of \$230). We use these labels each year to solicit business support for the Washington State Cribbage Championships.

We also posted the Washington State Cribbage Championships for January 2008 on the chamber's calendar of events, which is printed in *Business Connections* and also featured and accessible on the chamber website.


Various get-acquainted sessions, ribbon-cutting ceremonies, and meals also provide networking, exposure, and recognition for our club. We believe that our chamber membership is a major reason that we have had over one hundred sponsors for the last two Washington State Cribbage Championships.

Grass Roots National Tournament—the GRNT 18-game tournament may be played anytime between January 1 and April 30. If a player intends to play in more than one GRNT they must declare which is official and which is unofficial *before* they play. Transfers—please note that transfers between Grass Roots clubs are allowed once per season and that the transfer *must* take place prior to February 1.

FAQs—"This tournament has been completed, so why isn't it posted?" "I scored 12 (or more points) in a tournament, but how come these points are not reflected in my year-to-date totals?" The answer 95% of the time is that a member or visitor who played in that tournament has not yet paid their ACC membership or Grass Roots fees. All members' and visitors' records must reflect that their fees are paid before the website will allow the regional statistician to post (finalize) a tournament.

Rule of the Month—instead of a rule review this month, column editor Tom Lewis presents an editorial:

It is obvious that ACC judges need to have a good understanding of the rules, but players who are not judges should periodically review the rules too. The object here is not "playing the rule book to win" but more to understand that we are all playing by the same guidelines. So many of us learned so many different rules so many years ago, and reviewing the rule book will clarify the difference between the standardized ACC rules and what we learned when we first started playing the game. Do you have some time before your Grass Roots tournament starts? Open the rule book and randomly pick a rule. If you don't understand it, ask a judge!
