Maine Governor Deals 19-Hand to Cribbage Players

as reported previously in CW, in November 2007 the Maine State Police busted the American Legion of Gardiner ME for hosting a weekly cribbage tournament without a license. As a result, all cribbage in the state—including the Topsham Grass Roots club—had to cease operations or fork over \$700 for the yearly fee.

Local Maine players were rightly upset about the unjust law that lumped cribbage with poker and other gambling activities. Led by ACC members Paul Rice (Wells ME) and Vicki Soule (Woolwich ME), they organized a letter-writing campaign and backed the efforts of Representative Stephen Hanley (Gardiner ME) to introduce legislation to exempt nonprofit and charitable organizations from paying the exorbitant licensing fees required to play cribbage and other card games in Maine.

Rep. Hanley's bill was opposed from the start by Governor John Baldacci, the head of the Maine State Police gaming division, and the chairman of the committee that heard and acted on the bill (who supported the governor's own bill, which continues to tax cribbage).

After committee hearings, the majority report of the joint House/Senate committee tagged Hanley's bill as "not to pass"—which in most instances is the kiss of death. But through intense lobbying and thousands of emails sent to every Maine State representative and senator, the continued on page 12

My Deal



There's a poignant (sappy?) moment in *The Bucket List*, when Morgan Freeman's character asks Jack Nicholson's character: "Did you experience joy in your lifetime? Did you bring joy to someone else in your lifetime?"

Since I've got this compulsion to filter everything through my cribbage lenses, I immediately rephrased these questions: "Do you enjoy playing cribbage? Do other people enjoy playing cribbage with you?"

I suspect that all of us enjoy playing cribbage. Why else would we show up in club every week, travel hundreds of miles to attend weekend tournaments, study the intricacies of end-game pegging, and read *Cribbage World* from cover to cover the minute it arrives in our mailboxes (please indulge my little fantasy).

No, the problem is not with the first question. The problem lies in the second: Do other people enjoy playing cribbage with you?

We've all played against the proverbial grump who woke up on the wrong side of a happy life. This person complains about everything: the weather, the coffee, the color of the pegs. He (or she) isn't happy with how you shuffle the cards or cut the deck or the pace of play. She (or he) doesn't like the room temperature or the tournament director or the glare from all those bald heads hunkered down under fluorescent tubes.

And to top it off, this person just doesn't like you. You haven't yet managed to do anything right. You can't get a pleasant

word or a smile out of Mr. or Ms. Grump. And when the game is finally over, you feel wrung out, listless, depressed from the experience.

So you start to think: Hey, cribbage should be fun. And you're absolutely right. If you agree with this statement, you can skip the rest of this column. (Or you might want to highlight some pertinent lines and mail it to your local grump.)

I'm not asking you to make me (or anyone else) happy. I'm simply asking that you don't create a toxic atmosphere that drives people away from this game.

Even if you are losing to mediocre opponents who get monster cuts on fourth street, even if you just flopped your third consecutive blank crib, even if you just became mathematically eliminated from qualifying—it doesn't matter: you, me, no one has the right to spin a corrosive web that makes it impossible for other people to enjoy the game.

Put another way, if you can't enjoy cribbage, then maybe you shouldn't be playing at all. Perhaps it's time to take a break.

In a nutshell, enjoy the game in whatever setting you happen to be playing—during a fast-paced tournament playoff, at Grass Roots club, around the kitchen table, or in a bar. And always keep in mind that cribbage is a *game* and that it is meant for *enjoyment*.

Tournament Tidbits

Kissimmee Open On Friday night, 74 players helped directors Ray and Nancy Wanke celebrate their 55th wedding anniversary. In the main qualifying round, Donna Judkins (Kissimmee FL) was well on her way to a string of pearls when she won her first game by beating husband Gary Judkins in game 17.

Montana Open Friday night saw three big hands: Lorna Klein (Kelowna BC) plunked down a 28-hand in the Early Bird—fifteen games too soon to collect the \$25 for a sanctioned 28. An hour later, in the High Roller, hubby Gerry Klein scored a rare 29-hand—again, alas, five games too soon to collect the \$400 for a sanctioned 29. Not to be outdone, Life Master John Furler (Tigard OR) scored his first-ever 29-hand, but alas (there's that word again!), three games too soon to collect his \$400. In sanctioned play two 28-hands were scored, but no 29s.

Oregon Championship The 84 players in Prineville OR consumed forty dozen of codirector Patti Gossett's homemade cookies—or about 5.7 cookies per player! The other half of the directing team, Graeme Gossett, reported the following oddity: the main qualifying round had seven 23-hands and five 22-hands out of roughly 22,176 hands (84 players x 22 games ÷ 2 players per game x 8 deals per game x 3 hands per deal [hand, hand, crib]). This does not seem to be consistent with the ease or difficulty of hitting a 23-hand versus a 22-hand. (The tournament pays \$20 for a 23-hand and \$5 for a 22-hand.)

Western New York Open George Lozy (Rochester NY) qualified fourth, won his

first two matches, and then faced high qualifier Holli Remington (Cumberland RI) in the semifinals. In the fifth game, George as dealer had more than enough points to win the match if he could keep Holli from finding ten points. Holli cut the cards, George turned over a King and then, in his words, "made the dumbest move I have ever made." He pegged two points for the King! Dumbfounded by his lack of concentration, George moved back and Holli took her two penalty points. To make things worse, Holli had an 8-hand, pegged only one point during the play, and would have been in the stink hole! Do you think the Rules Committee would consider making all face cards worth two points when they are the starter card!

Roadrunner Classic Yes, it has 52 cards in it, but this deck—discovered by Chuck Sladek (Livermore CA) at the 2008 Tempe





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minority report was supported, and the bill was passed by the Legislature and sent to the governor for his signature.

In Maine, if a governor does not sign a bill while the Legislature is in session, the bill automatically becomes law after ten days. But if the Legislature has adjourned for the year, the governor can simply ignore the bill (a "pocket veto") and it does not become law without an explicit veto.

Regretfully, Governor Baldacci continued to put forward the falsehood that the bill would expand gambling. And by waiting until the Legislature was out of session, he avoided having to actually veto the bill.

The bottom line is that, for the moment, ACC cribbage in Maine is dead. Is your state next? CW


NOCT Prize Fund

This cribbage board, a Horn/McCrillis No. C-235, was most likely manufactured around 1930 and still has the original pegs and brass slide cover. This board belonged to my wife's grandfather, Lodver Hage, who emigrated from Norway in 1905 and homesteaded near Lewistown MT. This was Lodver's first store-bought board.

Horn/McCrillis was the largest distributor/manufacturer of cribbage boards in North America. They produced over fifty models and variations of cribbage boards between 1915 and 1979. H/C boards are easy to identify because they are stamped (embossed) on the bottom with their name and model number.

Yes, It Can Be Topped!

Last month CW reported how **Donn DeBernardi** (Portland OR) pegged 20 points against his hapless opponent. Many players responded with similar feats of pegging prowess. Here are a few of them.

In one scenario, all of the 4s work to the dealer's advantage. The first two cards played have to equal 15 points (i.e., 7-8 or 6-9 or 5 plus any face card). The pone then plays a 4, and the dealer pairs it to bring the count to 23—at which time the pone says "go," and the dealer gleefully (but not gloatingly) lays down the third 4 for a trip and the fourth 4 for a quad and a 31-2! The final tally is 24-0 in the dealer's favor.

In the second scenario, involving the four 3s, the first two cards played must equal 19 (i.e., 9 plus any face card). The pone plays the first 3, and the same mayhem ensues to give the dealer a 22-0 pegging advantage.



Cheating or Skill?

A letter entitled "Cheating or Skill?" published in last month's Your Deal column generated many responses—all of them negative. Here's but one example: "The letter writer is . . . proposing 'why not cheat and see if you get caught.' . . . How could anyone ask if this is skill?"

These responders, however, overlooked (or misinterpreted) the key verb in the first sentence of the offending letter: "I witnessed this during Grass Roots play." That is, the writer of the letter published on page 4 of the May issue clearly states that he had *observed* this practice during a game, that he saw *someone else* do this.

In the remainder of his letter, the writer then placed himself in the mind of the player who cheated in an effort to show what the cheater must have been thinking while committing this infraction. The writer was not proposing a way to cheat but writing to expose a problem. Where the CW editor let the letter writer down was in not helping him make clear that everything after the first two sentences was his way of putting himself in the cheater's mind and trying to figure out what the cheater was thinking. It was this misunderstanding that allowed the hint of a suggestion that cheating was being condoned in these pages.

And while CW may also have done the letter writer a disservice by entitling this letter "Cheating or Skill?" (the original email to CW had the subject line "When is cheating not cheating?"), rest assured that the letter writer—and the *Cribbage World* editor—are both 100% against cheating of any kind in cribbage. Cheating is always, unequivocally, and unambiguously

wrong. If you can't play the game without cheating, then resign your ACC membership and never show up at a tournament or Grass Roots club again.

To show the depth of emotion on this subject, here are some excerpts from the letters sent to CW. In the same way that I protected the original letter writer's identity so that there would be no retaliation against him at his club, I will also protect the identity of the responders who questioned the intent of the May letter.

from Texas: "Cribbage World should not be publishing an idea on how to cheat. If CW feels the need to print anything that even suggests . . . cheating there should be an immediate response from the ethics committee included in the same issue."

from Washington: "There is no reason that the person submitting this letter was able to withhold his name. He/she must have something to hide or engages in this practice themselves. . . . I also feel that this article in actuality should not have even been published, it makes it appear that you are promoting a win-at-any-cost philosophy."

from Michigan: "This example is cheating. . . . Cribbage is not a cutthroat, win-or-go-home-empty game. It should be played with integrity."

from Washington: "The question posed in the last sentence of 'Cheating or Skill?' is appalling . . . dishonest and . . . contrary to the preamble to the ACC Code of Ethics. . . . What were you thinking when you decided to publish [it]?"

Years Ago in the ACC

from Washington: "The situation described seems to be close to false claim of game. . . . I am glad that the writer's name was withheld because I would not want to play a dishonest player. If I knew who it was I would really watch that person very closely and report them to the Board for disciplinary action."

From these excepts, it is obvious that even the slightest hint of improper play is frowned up, roundly condemned, verboten. CW is sorry for the misunderstanding the original letter caused and is glad to hear that so many members feel so strongly about the issue. And just in case you've missed the point: CW does not condone cheating.





BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING • FEBRUARY 7, 2008 SANDS REGENCY HOTEL/CASINO • RENO NV

Executive Vice-President Martha Fingleton called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

Martha read a short inspirational story, and then roll call was taken. Present were Pat Barrett, Joe Bernard, George Bickford, David Campbell, Martha Fingleton, Larry Hassett, Sharon Heitmanek, Jeanne Hofbauer, Roy Hofbauer, Bob Julian, Tom Lewis, Herschel Mack, Bill Medeiros, Bob Milk, Ron Morgan, Cathy Perkins, Joan Rein, Phylis Schmidt, Jeff Shimp, Valerie Sumner, Fred White, Keith Widener, Dan Zeisler. Not present: Dave Aiken and Al Lindner (excused absence).

Martha welcomed Keith Widener to the BOD, then announced two proposed changes to the minutes: Dave Aiken requested that item #12 (Swiss-style tournament) be withdrawn. Item #6 (Constitution and Bylaws Article IV change proposal by Valerie Sumner) was asked to be delayed until after the lunch break. Also, replace item #12 with 2011 Grand National proposal by Peggy Scalley. Phyllis made a motion to approve the changes, 2nd by Valerie. Motion approved.

Jeanne made a motion to approve the minutes of the September 2007 meeting in Portland ME, 2nd by Cathy. Motion approved.

Agenda item #5: Larry Hassett proposed changes to Article III of the Constitution and By-Laws. After much discussion, he asked that his proposed changes be split into two different motions, as they pertained to two different issues. The first was to facilitate the membership secretary's job, so he made a motion to change the wording to: "Any individual not officially barred from membership in the Congress may join or renew his or her membership upon submission of the appropriate forms/information and the appropriate fee," 2nd by Cathy. Motion approved. The second was to give the ACC the authority to bar/remove people convicted of "vile" acts, so he made a motion to change the wording to: "Any individual not officially barred from membership in the Congress and who has not been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude may join or renew his or her membership up submission of the appropriate forms/information and the appropriate fee." No second; motion died.

Dave Aiken arrived during the preceding discussion.

Agenda item #6: Larry Hassett proposed a change to Article VII of the Constitution and By-Laws, pertaining to the Ethics Committee. After much discussion, Larry withdrew the proposal.

Agenda item #8: Herschel Mack reported on the Rules Committee's work. He thinks we will need new rules books published sometime soon. Larry said we have about a 2½ year supply (based on previous demand). Herschel suggested we consider each item separately as we progress through the three pages of proposed rule changes, plus an addendum, that he had sent out to BOD members. He led the BOD through each proposed change/addition and got approval, feedback, and suggestions. He will bring an edited version of this report to the next BOD meeting.

Lunch break, resume at 1:10 p.m. Martha reminded the BOD members that the Sands would be hosting a reception for us after the meeting.

Meeting resumed, Martha added an item to agenda regarding a new archivist, which will be discussed right after the Ethics Committee report.

Item #9, Treasurer's Report: Bob McCabe stated that we had a \$2,971 loss for the six months ending 12/31/07, due to the fact that we incur almost all of our award expenses during this part of the year. He expects that the next half of the year will be significantly different, especially because many members took advantage of the opportunity to prepay their dues (before the dues increase) at the lower rate for 2–3 years. Dave Aiken said that in the Oct.—Dec. 2007 period, 728 additional years of membership had been paid, along with 123 life memberships. Bob said to keep in mind that this will be reflected as unusually high income for this period.

Agenda item #10: the CPA firm Hau & Associates was hired to do a compilation and review of the ACC finances (in response to the BOD's request of September 2007) for a cost of \$1,500. The firm found that the ACC was properly accounting for the membership funds and no modifications were necessary in order to conform to generally accepted accounting principles. There were no recommendations for change.

Agenda item #6: Valerie Sumner said she had been asked sponsor an item on the agenda regarding a change to the Constitution and By-Laws Article IV, which would change regionalization of the ACC. She requested that Graeme Gossett and Don Brown be allowed to present the rationale regarding this proposal. Both discussed reasons why they felt that the ACC should have four regions instead of three, some ideas of the changes that might be undertaken, and their suggestions for enacting such changes. The BOD then commented on their ideas, particularly on the two basic ones: whether and how the ACC regions could be divided; and if so, how the voting for the BOD would be changed. Dave Aiken made a motion that Jeff Shimp form a committee of representatives from all regions of the ACC with viewpoints on this proposal and report the committee's recommendations at the September meeting, 2nd by Valerie. Motion approved.

Agenda item #11, Hall of Fame Voting: Pat Barrett announced that there were nineteen nominations submitted for six nominees to the ACC HOF. He talked about this second year of using the 100 member voting panel, how it seems to represent the demographics of the ACC, and that he thinks it is a good system that we should be able to keep in place for years to come. Last year, however, voting had been 100%; this year it was 97%. Pat will investigate why three panelists (one from each region) missed voting, and determine if they should be replaced. There were also two other problems: (1) unsigned ballot envelopes, which made it difficult to determine who had voted; and (2) twopage nominations that are not supposed to be allowed but that fact had not been printed in CW, so they were allowed for this year only. Pat and Dave Aiken guestioned the BOD's policy of not printing the voting totals in CW. After brief discussion, the BOD decided to keep this policy in place, i.e., to print the elected name(s) and other nominees, but not the number of votes received. The nominees this year were Gene "Moose" Biegler, Larry Hassett, Rollie Heath, Jeanne Hofbauer, Bill Medeiros, and George "Ras" Rasmussen. Pat announced the vote totals. Results: one elected. Jeanne Hofbauer.

Peggy Scalley addressed the BOD with a bid for the 2011 Grand National Tournament in Redding CA, at the Win-River Casino. She distributed information packets to each continued on page 30 BOD member and answered some travel questions.

Agenda item #13: Ken and Tim Julkowski gave the BOD an update on GN XXVII, to be held this year in Portland OR. The tournament will be held at the Holiday Inn, near the Portland Airport. They said it is a first-class facility that has room for 750 players. The hotel provides an airport shuttle and a shuttle to Cascade Station, a new nearby mall, at which is a stop for MAX, Portland's mass transit train, which covers most of Portland metropolitan area. The hotel's room rate is \$94 plus tax. The Julkowskis discussed fundraising projects and talked about the logistics of the tournament.

Jeff Shimp made a brief comment about GN XXVIII (2009), to be held in Grand Rapids MI. He and co-director Dave Alken have asked for, and received, a waiver to run a midweek tournament at the same location with different directors

Agenda item #14, GN XXIX (2010) site award—Eastern Region: we have only one bid, by Jack Howsare, for Virginia Beach VA. Jack was not at the meeting, having been delayed in travel from the East Coast to Reno. He had, however, previously provided the BOD with a great deal of information. Jeff Shimp made a motion to award GN XXIX to Jack Howsare for Virginia Beach, 2nd by Phyllis Schmidt. Motion approved.

Agenda item #15: Scott Kooistra said at this time there were 979 paid entries to the JPW/ACC Open. Joan Rein said the TOC had almost 550 paid entries. Joan also announced these future tournament dates:

2009—TOC Feb. 6, JPW/ACC Open Feb. 7–8 2010—TOC Feb. 12, JPW/ACC Open Feb. 13–14 2011—TOC Feb. 11, JPW/ACC Open Feb. 12–13

Agenda item #16: Dan Zeisler distributed a list with activity/updates regarding the Youth Cribbage Program. He sent out 71 teaching manuals in 2007, and 6 so far for 2008. There were at least four youth tournaments held last year. There are two new youth clubs being established in Springfield VA and Napa CA. The Cribbadier General fund has approximately \$9,000, and about \$600 has been requested for support from three different sources to help buy boards and offset tournament expenses. He recapped

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his procedure for allocating these funds. Dan also thanked the Sands for their support of his youth tournaments.

George Bickford distributed a paper with a definition of the "Rules for Random Seating." After brief discussion from the BOD, George made a motion to adopt these rules for random seating as ACC policy, 2nd by Cathy Perkins. Motion approved. George asked Dave Aiken to publish them in CW.

Agenda item #17: Tom Lewis named his Marketing & Publicity Committee: Dave Aiken, Dan Zeisler, Norm Nikodym, Larry Samet, George Rasmussen, and himself. Tom, Norm, and Dave talked about different methods they are looking into in order to publicize the ACC. Larry Hassett had new "Cribbage Anyone?" pamphlets printed and brought a case to the meeting for distribution.

Dave Aiken said that for an extra \$25 we could print an extra 100 copies of CW to be used as a marketing tool. He said he would co-ordinate the distribution of them. Jeff Shimp made a motion that we authorize extra copies of CW to be printed as requested, on a monthly basis and to be distributed under Dave Aiken's guidance, 2nd by Larry Hassett. Motion approved.

David Campbell reported that they are not able to play tournament cribbage in Maine because the state considers cribbage to be in the same category as poker and wants to charge fees for organized play. He asked that anyone wanting to help please write to government officials in Maine.

Agenda item #18: Peggy Scalley reported that since the February 2007 BOD meeting, at which she committed to collect donations for cribbage boards for troops overseas or in military hospitals, \$3,632 has been collected. Al Lindner and Jerome Tork made and sent her 193 boards, and Larry Hassett donated rule books. She paid \$1,500 to Roy Boyles for 100 boards, which he made (and then donated the money to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society). She and Valerie Sumner then went through an exhaustive search on how to get the boards to the troops, because of mailing restrictions imposed since 9/11. With the help of Family Readiness Assistance for Nevada, they are being sent to deployed troops or to bases with hospitals.

Agenda item #19: Sharon Hejtmanek reported that the Ethics Committee indefinitely suspended one member who had taken orders and payment for T-shirts at the Grand National tournament in Maine and not delivered them. She is sending him a letter telling that him that he is suspended until he delivers the shirts or refunds all payments.

Martha announced that a new ACC Archivist has been named: Fred White. The odds are long but the returns are huge for those who fight their way to the top of the Tournament of Champions and the JPW/ACC Open in Reno each year.

Those lucky and skillful enough to reach this level are rewarded hand-somely with piles of cash as well as great respect and admiration from their peers.

I was fortunate to have lived this dream once, rolling to the final four of the TOC in 1993, where I lost game five of the semifinals in the stink hole to a lucky Canadian gent who I had nightmares about for years after. Could I do it again—not the nightmares, but the final four?

Qualifying was here. Sixteen games on Friday against the best that cribbage has to offer. Game 1 – skunk, game 2 – skunk, game 3 – win, game 4 – win. This is easy! Right. I came down to reality after a couple of losses but was on track to qualify, which I did with a score of 22 GPs.

Three games straight again! My closest loss was twenty points.

I left the room thinking that once was bad enough, but twice in row? Zero for six when it was time to win was hard to believe, but it was over. I left Reno the same way I do most years, shaking my head but looking at the calendar in anticipation of next year's tournaments and thinking, "This could be *my* year." I can't wait until '09. See you there!
