Skillucky

ere's the challenge that I presented to CW readers in February: what percentage of this grand ol' game is determined by luck? During the past three months, I have had profitable email conversations with many ACC members on virtually every aspect of this topic, but only one of them pushed me to explain the question itself.

Life Master (**★**) Larry Samet (Wellesley MA) saw through the façade I erected and called my bluff: "What does the question mean?" he queried; "If you have no good answer, I will try to answer it in my response. I am not sure the question is meaningful as asked."

In my response to Larry (who is a member of the CW Advisory Board and therefore accustomed to calling me to account!), I had to come clean: "This question is mainly geared to generate feedback. While I will in fact add up the numerical responses and publish the average in CW, I am more interested in the peripheral responses that I receive." To keep my promise to Larry, here then are the hard numbers.

Of the twenty or so people who wrote to me about this topic, sixteen of them placed a numerical value on the skill-luck ratio. The skill values ranged from 10% to 80%, with the median being 25% and the average 29.6875%—which is very close to the most common answer submitted: 30% skill.

Cheating or Skill?

I witnessed this during Grass Roots play and I am curious to know what other players think. Is this cheating or skill? You need eight points to win. You have a 7-point hand and the lead. The dealer has played his second card to 23. You each have two cards left. You're holding 5-6 so you'll be left with one card after this play. You need the dealer to play out or say "go" after this play. For the dealer to play out, if you play your 6 (to 29) his two remaining cards must total two points, or if you play your 5 (to 28) the dealer's cards must total three or less-right? Perhaps not. Play the 6, announce 30 (not 29) and hope the dealer does not check the count and does not have a single ace, so he'll say "go." The rules say that you are not penalized for miscounting during pegging, and the worst that can happen is the dealer sees the miscount and corrects it. If that happens you'll lose, anyway, so why not take the chance?

Luck or Skill? Phooey!

I know there is often a debate as to which quality is better—skill or luck, but I think the "R" factor (reputation) is being overlooked. For the four-person team competition at the Mick Michaelis Classic in Marinette WI, Life Master (**) Wayne Steinmetz (Milwaukee WI) was solicited to join several teams due to the R factor. At the end of the 22-game qualifying round, it turns out that Wayne's was the low scorecard on the top two teams. It seems that neither skill nor luck was necessary for Wayne to take home his winnings along with a fair amount of teasing!

spondents could not bear to simply state a number and walk away, but had to either qualify it or equivocate after stating the bare fact. That didn't bother me, however, since I knew that the tangential responses represented the meat of the discussion. Here, then, are some things that I learned about cribbage in the past three months.

Cribbage vs. Chess

Larry Samet proposed a hypothetical situation to show the extent to which luck determines the outcome of a game. If you spend an hour teaching a reasonably intelligent person how to play cribbage and then play a game, there is perhaps a 25% chance you would lose, thus providing a luck factor of 25% for that game. If, however, you played that person twenty games, it would be virtually impossible for him or her to win. There is, Larry notes, "no luck in aggregate."

By analogy, guess what happens when a good chess player teaches chess to a new player? There is 0% chance of the greenhorn winning even one game in a hundred.

Larry then puts forward a case where two cribbage players of equal skill play one hundred games. If they finish, say, at 55-45, then ten games were decided by luck on one side, and the other ninety had even luck. Luck was therefore a factor in 10% of these games.

Cribbage vs. Poker

But chess is not the only game in town. Two cribbage players drew very different insights from poker. Former casino dealer **Bryan Gurden** (Las Vegas NV) says, "Even with poker being what I do for a living, I would still say that more skill is involved in cribbage." Conversely, poker aficionado **Scott Johnson** (Fairfield CT) is equally adamant that poker requires greater skill: "Show me one card player who plays both cribbage and poker well who would say there is more luck in poker than crib."

Since in both games the cards are distributed with equal amounts of luck, the

skill comes entirely in knowing how to play the cards. Scott thus contends that "skillful poker players can overcome and manipulate the luck component of the game to beat lesser players with a *far* greater degree of success than a masterful crib player can." To anchor this point, he asks: "How many people play crib professionally?" Scott does concede, however, that "a master cribbage player is often a *better and more skillful player* than his poker-playing counterparts; it's just that he will not succeed as often against lesser opponents as the very game of cribbage (and its accompanying luck) is stacked against him."

Taking the opposing view, Brian shrewdly points out that cribbage players must play every single hand that is dealt to them—good or bad—whereas poker players have the luxury of throwing bad hands away. Despite this, Brian thinks that

whether the old poker saying that "10% of the people will take 90% of the money 100% of the time" is probably also true of cribbage.

CW asked Life Master (*) Martha Fingleton (Milwaukee WI) for her observations on the poker-cribbage question, and she immediately zeroed in on the different skill sets required in the two games. Perhaps the biggest difference is that cribbage presents very few opportunities to "play one's opponent." While one can, Martha wrote, "occasionally feign decision-making when leading from a pair or lay off taking a pair or trips when the opponent is visibly salivating, the cards overwhelmingly dictate play vis-à-vis board position. That's why it is sometimes difficult to beat a lessskilled opponent-one has no reasonable grounds for assessing probability."

So the debate continues: does poker or cribbage hold the better hand in skill-luck controversy?

Other Factors

I've always been a big believer in collective wisdom, and this has proven true on this topic as well. My letter writers pointed out several other factors—besides luck and

Conventional wisdom holds that the ability to play in many tournaments a year is the reason the same names are always atop the leader board, but Bryan Gurden challenges this view. We're looking at this issue from the wrong side, he says; rather, these players play in so many tournaments *because* they are good.

• lack of skill by your opponent

This is a big one. If you face someone who consistently makes bad discarding and pegging decisions, it's much easier to win. While you can't control the quality of your opponent's play, it's certainly legitimate to take advantage of poor decision-making on his or her part.

• confidence

This is even bigger. Success breeds confidence, and it is much easier to win if you have the confidence that you can win. (Note: this is not the same as the arrogant expectation that you deserve to win because you are "clearly the better player.")


And the Answer Is . . .

So where does this lead? After all this discussion, we're still left with an uneasy balancing act between luck and skill. While it is clear that both partners are on the dance floor, it is not always possible to tell which is leading.

But whether luck controls 90% of the game, or only a paltry 10%, it comes under the label "things over which you have no control." Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to go to work on the things that you can control—the skill elements that can be improved through practice and study of the world's greatest two-handed card game. CW





This cribbage board is a relatively rare Le Count #2. According to Peter Leach, an expert on Le Count cribbage boards, four versions of this model were manufactured by C. W. Le Count between 1885 and his death in 1893. The very earliest boards were the only ones with the metal plate mounted to the wood base with a single nail at each end. The base has a brass slider covering the peg and card storage area. The slider is stamped with the patent date of September 2, 1879. Most Le Count cribbage boards were sold through Sears and Wards catalogs.

In My Opinion

Since joining the ACC in 1995, I've been a highly active member, putting on twenty sanctioned tournaments and five youth tournaments and founding a Grass Roots club. I've played in more than three hundred sanctioned events, earned my Life Master rank and Grass Roots Bronze award, and served a term on the ACC Board of Directors. As a player, a tournament director, and a board member, I've witnessed the unresponsiveness of our core leadership to the interests and needs of ACC members.

Over a quarter-century ago, the ACC's founding members put together an excellent organization appropriately structured to regulate and promote our stimulating, fascinating game, and for decades the ACC has thrived and grown. But today there are signs that the ACC may be entering a period of stagnation and even decline. Membership has been stuck at around 7,000 for years. Long-established tournaments have been dwindling in attendance and are being canceled, and this trend started long before the current spike in gas prices. In the last election, only 854 members bothered to return their ballots, a 30% drop from the previous election. Some claim that this last fact means the membership is satisfied with the status quo. On the contrary, I think it means the membership has given up hope of change.

Most of us know, or know of, at least one well-qualified person who has been elected to the board and served one term, only to be so discouraged by the experience that they have chosen not to run again. A closed core group of directors who have been on the board since McKinley was in short pants dominate the dialog and dismiss fresh ideas out of hand, acknowledging the input of newer members only if they serve as a yes-chorus.

Like any pool in nature, the pool of talent that is our Board of Directors needs to be flushed out regularly with a stream of fresh energy and ideas if it is not to become stagnant and sedimentary. If a referendum on term limits were to appear on the ballot along with the director candidates at the next board election, I suspect we'd see a real surge in member voting.



MIND GAMES

Admittedly psychology does not play as large a part in cribbage as it does in poker, but it may be a bigger factor than is commonly acknowledged. While it is difficult to assess the impact of a player's mental attitude on the outcome of a game, here are some tips to help you avoid being distracted by your opponent.

Some players prattle incessantly—to their advantage. This talk may distract their opponents, as pegging runs are missed, inappropriate discard choices are made, and hands are miscounted. Good hands may be disguised by negative chatter or sour expressions. A good player will learn to tune out all distractions—especially their opponent's chatter.

Many players delay discarding and appear bewildered about their choices when holding good cards with a no-brainer discard. Don't be fooled by these tactics. Base your pegging decisions on the cards your opponent plays—not on what he or she tried to make you think they have.

Don't let disgruntled players get you down. Pessimism is contagious, and it is easy to slip into negative thinking. Forget games that have been lost and focus fully on winning *this* one!

If your opponent is superior, just pretend that you are the better player and have the confidence necessary to win the game. You'll be surprised how often this will work, plus it will reduce tension and cause the game to be more enjoyable.

Don't complain of your opponent's good fortune and your lousy luck. It is more important to both win and lose graciously. Since the friendships we develop while playing cribbage can become



endearing and long-lasting, it is worth suppressing negative behavior in order to maintain them.

When bad cards seem to bombard you, don't get careless with your discards, don't shuffle hastily and incompletely, and above all don't take desperation gambles (save those for when things are going your way). Just treat yourself gently and understand that you'll get your time in the sunshine. This period will pass, and it will cause less damage if you accept it with a shrug of the shoulders.

If things really get to you, take a break. It might be a good time to go to the bathroom, check the weather outside, walk down the hall, or get a drink. But don't overdo this, as some players will not be very forgiving if you delay play on your table.

Cribbage should *not* be a source of stress or undue pressure. Enjoy it to the fullest by taking control. If you remain on target, make logical choices, and stay focused, you'll be able to keep chatter, psychological head games, or other devious behavior from influencing the outcome of games.



Rule of the Month— Imperfect Pack

If two cards or more of the same rank and suit appear during the play or the scoring of the hands, the play stops at the time of discovery. Any points pegged or scored are retracted and the hands and crib are dead. The same player redeals with a different deck. or better scorecard in the last nine weeks of play, which shot her over 200 GRPs, with eight weeks to go. She passed current champion **Don Phillips** and past champion **Dave Carey**, leaving them in the dust (for now). Don's 25 GPs at the GRNT moved him into second place on the year. **Lesley Donahue** and **Greg Helms** also received points at the GRNT. 

The cover of the May 1983 *Cribbage World* reproduced an 1883 print of an old man and a young girl, perhaps a grandfather and granddaughter, playing cribbage. ACC President **Joe Wergin**, who produced this issue of CW to give Editor **Jim Arblaster** a mini-vacation, was quite fond of this illustration, as he also printed it on the

July 1980 (#2.3) cover of the *Midwest Cribbage* League Newsletter—a precursor of the ACC and Cribbage World.

Elsewhere, this issue includes a letter from Jack Nicklaus (yes, that Jack Nicklaus), instructions on how to determine byes in playoffs, the MRP leader board (**Norman Wright** was no. 1), and a proclamation by Joe Wergin that all important tournaments begin with the singing of the national anthem.

About That Cool Illustration

Entitled "A Game at Cribbage," the print reproduced on the CW cover above was taken from the May 19, 1883, edition of *Harper's Bazar*, which **Ginny White**, Joe's daughter, gave to him for Father's Day. Engraved by F. Dadd, this sketch was first published earlier that year in the May 4 issue of the *Illustrated London News*. Both of these sources are rarely seen on the market today, but a handsome color reproduction is available from Wollman's Classics in San Diego CA (see ad on page 2)—and still makes a great Father's Day gift!

Cribbage Tips

You are the pone and have only one Jack. How should you play the hand?

Any card that could be potentially damaging if held to the end of the pegging sequence is best gotten rid of early. The Jack might be a good lead, depending on your other cards. Only the 5 is trapped more frequently than the Jack, but any small card (A, 2, 3, 4) can get you into trouble at the end of the pegging sequence. As the nondealer, you could either pitch these cards to your opponent's crib (and thus put them out of play) or play them early. The nondealer is at greater risk in the pegging, but the dealer can also be trapped.

Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

A recent CW issue offered a compelling and thoughtful review of ethical standards that should govern cribbage play. Sportsmanship is paramount, defined as willing adherence to rules; civil behavior toward opponents, judges, and organizers; and sincere effort to play to the best of one's ability. In sum: play to win, for love of the game and fun.

> Alas, I fear I may have violated the spirit of at least one of the above tenets in recent Grass Roots play or, maybe not.

> For most cribbage competitions, camaraderie and the act of competing are rewards in themselves. And winning, of course, is the icing we hope to savor. For most tourneys, that means finishing in the money. In the following tourney I finished in the money.

> Our Grass Roots club features a cash prize for the last player holding a designated hand at the finish of all games. This week, the last player to hold a spade flush would win \$10.

> I had not fared well. My scorecard showed mostly 0s in the win column. I was now in my last game, only a few holes from the end. Glancing around, I observed that my opponent and I were the only ones still playing. The game was hotly contested, with no more than four or

five holes separating us for most of the game. She, too, was out of contention, but continued to press my slim lead.

With first count in the final hand, I would need six holes, and my opponent eight. I looked at my cards, smiling, then frowning, tentatively rearranging them, hoping to solve the dilemma before me. I stared at four spades, none adding up to 15 and no runs. If I broke up my flush, I could hold 5-K-K for six points and the win. I opted to keep the flush, sacrificing a certain win for probable victory to garner the \$10 prize.

The cut card added no points to my hand, but I remained confident. Surely, I would pair a card or count 15-2 or 31-2 during play. When the final card was played, I stared glumly at the board. I had pegged exactly one hole, and my four points left me in the stink hole. My opponent easily had enough points to claim the win, while I claimed the \$10 prize.

So I lost—or, did I? After all, I finished in the money.
