Old Club Gets New Members

Cribbage in Western New York

After reading the article in the March *Cribbage World* about marketing tools, our club decided to do something about attracting new members.

Our club—Grass Roots Club 5 of Western New York—is one of the oldest in the ACC, and the number of members has been on the decline for the last ten years. Eleven members showed up most weeks, but during the winter, with people on vacation down south, it was tough to get enough players to play.

So we ordered the promotional pieces offered by *Cribbage World* and went to work.

We decided to have a "Cribbage Clinic" two nights during the summer. The clinic involved six games against six opponents and was intended to help people who played cribbage years ago to refresh their skills. We charged only \$2 per person and returned all of the prize money to the top 25% of the players. The clinic was promoted with articles in the local newspaper and in newsletters of the American Legion and Senior Citizens Centers. Posters were given to our members to place in public places.

At the clinics each person was given a current copy of *Cribbage World*, the trifold entitled "Cribbage Anyone?," and a fact sheet about our club.

We also made a significant change in what we charge each week. We used to charge \$12 to play and returned \$10 in prize money. Since many of our members are senior citizens, we were worried that some could not afford that much money twice a month. We now charge everyone \$2 club dues (to cover room rent, supplies, and Grass Roots membership) and have an optional \$10 Q-pool for those who want to join.

The program was a success. Seven new people attended our two clinics, and four of them attended the first session of the 2008–2009 season.

But we also see that growth is not a one-shot deal. There are many people out there who used to play, but got away from it and just need a gentle nudge to get back playing again. We are considering two ad-

Cribbage Board of the Month

Cribbage boards that were used for advertising products and businesses first began appearing in the late 1800s. This Lash's Bitters board dates to between 1888 and 1895, according to the leading expert on advertising boards, **Dave Zipkin** of the Cribbage Board Collector's Society.

The Lash's Bitters boards were manufactured by American Manufacturing Concern of Falconer NY. The federal government passed a law in 1906 that prohibited the use of the word *cures* in advertisements. After that, Lash's Bitters cribbage boards were still manufactured, but *cures* was replaced with *for*.

Some Lash's Bitters boards have the date 1883 stenciled in the center. Those boards were not made in 1883, but were manufactured in the 1900s to commemorate the date that Lash's Bitters were first produced. Another Lash's Bitters "mistake" board had all the printing reversed. It is not known how many of those boards were distributed. The Lash's Bitters company was in business from 1884 to 1966 and made other cures, tonics, and soft drinks.

Years Ago in the ACC

Astute readers will have noticed that this column did not appear in last month's CW. During the switch-over from Jim Arblaster (Kissimmee FL) to Bob Madsen (Niles IL), the new secretary was swamped with transition details, and so the September and October issues were combined into a single publication.

Elsewhere this issue reports that Norm

Wright was the 1983 national champion. Norm (now of Fitchburg WI) still plays cribbage and has achieved both his Master and Bronze awards.

Page 8 contained an announcement about the start of a little project that became the Grass Roots organization. The first club was organized in Madison WI, and to date 360 clubs have been chartered.

Random Seating at Grass Roots Clubs

In the past month, CW has received inquiries from opposite sides of the country about seating at Grass Roots clubs, and so we contacted **Joan Rein** (Carver MN), the Grass Roots Commissioner, for clarification.

Joan states that the official Grass Roots policy on seating is the same as the official ACC policy on this issue—that is, seating at Grass Roots clubs is to be made by random draw, with some allowable exceptions.

Allowable exceptions include assigning an anchor (captain, pivot) seat to someone with limited mobility. In addition, most weekend tournament directors allow spouses to sit at separate tables during the qualifying round, and so this unofficial policy is also acceptable (but not required) in Grass Roots clubs.

Violations of the random seating rule include choosing seats based on the strength of potential opponents, allowing a player to select a seat to avoid playing a specific player, allowing a player to look at numbers when drawing for seats, and having odd and even numbered containers when drawing for seats.

Further questions about the Grass Roots policy on random seating may be addressed to Joan Rein. The full statement of the ACC policy on random seating was printed in the March 2008 *Cribbage World*.

SPOTLIGHT

on

Stephen P. Hanley

Steve Hanley is not an ACC member—and rarely plays cribbage. He probably wouldn't see a "5-trap" coming at him even if you announced it ahead of time. And he's never had a 28-hand or 29-hand in his life.

So why is he being honored in a magazine called *Cribbage World*? Because he probably spent more time this year than anyone else trying to right a wrong, trying to fix the cribbage debacle in the State of Maine.

As reported in previous CW issues, in November 2007 the Maine State Police busted the American Legion of Gardiner ME for hosting a weekly cribbage tournament without a license. As a result, all cribbage in the state—including the Topsham Grass Roots club and several sanctioned tournaments—had to cease operations or fork over \$700 for the yearly fee.

Representative Steve Hanley (D-Gardiner) immediately sprang into action in an attempt to correct an unjust law that lumped cribbage with poker and other gambling and fund-raising activities.

Supported by ACC members Vicki Soule (Woolwich ME) and Paul Rice (Wells ME), who organized a letter-writing campaign to back his efforts—and especially by Representative Stacey Fitts (R-Pittsfield), who crossed party lines to assist in this endeavor—Steve drafted a bill to exempt nonprofit organizations

from obtaining a license and to allow their members to play leisure card games on club premises for small wagers.

As a member of the Criminal Justice and Public Safety committee in the Maine House of Representatives, Steve is respon-

sible for passing and upholding laws that protect Maine's citizens. But this doesn't prevent him from recognizing an unfair regulation. "This law doesn't



make sense," Steve said. "It punishes veterans and senior citizens who join these [nonprofit] organizations for social and charitable purposes, and if a few members want to play cribbage or penny poker or anything else on a Saturday afternoon, it shouldn't be any of the state's business."

When you talk to Steve, it is readily apparent that he is passionate about all of life. But this issue really galvanized him (perhaps "galled" would be a better term). He worked harder, he told CW, on this bill than on any other piece of legislation. But in the end, his efforts were thwarted by

the governor, who pocket-vetoed Steve's bill and pushed through a bill of his own, which continues to tax cribbage.

As of now, there are few options open to clubs who play cribbage in Maine: stop playing, pay a big licensing fee, go underground, play in private homes, or hold their tournaments across the border in New Hampshire.

Here are Steve's candid answers to questions that CW sent him this summer.

Tell us a little bit about yourself—where you grew up, your vocation, your public service, where you live now.

I was born and raised in Gardiner, Maine. I've worked in the construction trades as a pipe fitter and welder and also in law enforcement. I'm now retired. I served on the Gardiner City Council and for two terms as a State Representative. I'm seeking reelection. I currently live in Gardiner with Sheila, my wife of forty-four years. I have three children and three grandchildren.

Do you play cribbage?

I have attempted to play cribbage several times with one of my cousins, with mixed results! Anyone who pays cribbage will soon find it is not just another game of cards. It requires a great deal of skill!

How did you become aware of the cribbage crisis in Maine?

I received a request from the American Legion Post 4 (of which I am a member), here in Gardiner.

How does the legislative process work in Maine? What did you have to go through to bring this bill to the floor for a vote?

First the bill goes to committee, then to a floor debate. After that it went to the Senate for debate. This long, hard process was repeated twice. It was a battle from day one.

Did you receive outside support during the legislative process?

I received a huge amount of help from the cribbage clubs and players. Many nonprofits were very involved. Paul Rice was a great resource and help. State Rep. Stacey Fitts, Sen. Earle McCormick, and others were as well.

Is the best hope for overturning the current law really to wait around for Maine's term-limited governor to retire in two years?

I will not reintroduce another bill next session. After Governor [John] Baldacci got his bill passed, there is little or no hope until a new governor is elected in 2010.



Everything You've Always Wanted to Know about Cribbage (But Were Afraid to Ask)

hat's a Q-pool?

Dane Brooke (Seattle WA) asks CW to explain Q-pools. He writes: "Can you tell me where to learn what these are? I am planning to go to the Rainier Open and want to figure out if I should enter the Q-pools."

"Q-pool" is short for "qualifying pool"

and is basically a side pool that you can enter. Virtually every tournament has a Q-pool, but it is sometimes called "insurance pool" or by some other name. If you are confident enough of your game (i.e., if you plan to qualify!), you should enter the Q-pool; if you're a little uncertain about

your skill level right now, then you could hold off for a few tournaments until you feel more comfortable.

The payback for a Q-pool may differ from tournament to tournament, and so

you should find this out prior to entering it. Some tourna-

ments pay the Q-pool to the top 1/4 of the field (i.e., to all of the qualifiers), others to the top 1/8 (the top half of the qualifiers). Some tournaments pay a flat rate, others a graduated rate. In any case, the payback should be 100% because there are no expenses to running this pool.
