National Open Cribbage Tournament

The 35th National Open was played the last weekend in July, and the granddaddy of them all—the tournament that gave birth to the ACC—was spectacular. With \$6,500 added to the prize fund, the main event drew 234 competitors from twenty-three states and was won by Life Master (\star) Joe Bernard (Antioch IL).

In the unique NOCT format, the final six competitors duke it out on Monday, and Joe has probably played on more Mondays in Raleigh than anyone else. He has

been runner-up twice and has been in the quarterfinals six previous times, but until now the elusive championship trophy had escaped his grasp.

Taking no chances this year, Joe stomped his Monday competition by getting two wins and then a skunk in both matches to claim his first-ever NOCT championship.



A lighter moment for one opponent came in the semifinal match against Life Master **Bruce Sattler** (Nottingham MD). After losing his first two games to Joe, Bruce asked for a new deck of cards. When the third and final game resulted in Bruce having first deal and still getting skunked, all Bruce could do was chuckle.

My Deal bv David Aiken

I joined the ACC in 1998 when I started playing in the Grand Rapids Square Peggers Cribbage Club. I was immediately hooked on not just the game but also by the concept of yearlong competition. Despite thinking that I knew how to play the game, in my first season I earned only 26 GRPs and struggled to bring my batting average above .500—but failed. One bright spot occurred on May 1, when I got my first-ever 29-hand while playing the GRNT.

For the next several years I played only Grass Roots cribbage, and then in 2001 friends convinced me to attend my first weekend tournament: **Jeff Shimp's** Potawatomi Peggers Pow-wow in Stevensville MI. I still remember losing both of my first two games by a single point to **Sharon Schaefer** (Jackson WI), and I ended the day with 26 GPs and did not qualify.

After winning two tournaments in early 2004, that fall I attended my first Grand National: GN 23 in Atlanta GA, where I was fortunate enough to qualify and make it to the round of 17–32. And from that moment on, I became obsessed with tournament cribbage—especially the big national tournaments: Grand National, ACC Open, and TOC.

So here we are less than a month away from the next big event. And even though I will play three other weekend tournaments before then, I am already focusing in on Portland. I've never been very good at predicting the future, so I can't tell you how well I'll do. But I can tell you this: there is nothing more enjoyable than spending the weekend playing the world's greatest card game with five hundred friends.

As always, Grand National will consist of a main and a consolation. And with eight satellite tourneys and GRTOC #3 on tap, you will have no excuse if you leave Portland without having played your fill of cribbage.

Even policy wonks can get their kicks by attending the Board of Directors meeting (on Friday) and the Grass Roots Board of Volunteers meeting (Saturday afternoon). The annual awards banquet on Saturday night will honor the ACC's best players from weekend tourneys, Grass Roots clubs, and internet cribbage.

So, if you haven't played a Grand National in a while—or at all—it's not too late to catch the fun at GN 27 in Portland OR later this month. Contact **Tim or Ken Julkowski** (503.382.9781 or (grand_national_xxvii@yahoo.com) if you have questions.

Strategy, Schmategy

The final hand had me dealing from ten out, with DeLynn needing only five to win the game. The pegging went as follows:

DeLynn's strategy was sound. With 3-10-10-J in his hand and a 4 cut, he still needed three pegs. When I played the K on his 10 lead, he played his 3, hoping he could lead his second 10 on the next sequence and catch a Q or J for the points he needed. But fickle fate gave the underdog the perfect cards to peg to victory! Ironically, if DeLynn had played his 10 or J for 30 and a go, I would have led from my pair of 3s, which he would have paired for the two points he needed, while I would have pegged eight points and been short!

As Life Master (****) DeLynn Colvert (Missoula MT) and Life Master ($\star \star \star$) Duane Toll (Sutherlin OR) approached the end of second street during a game in the Topaz consolation, they noticed two extra holes at the end of the board. The two highest rated players in the history of the ACC looked at each other, looked at the board, then discovered that they had started playing at the wrong end of the board! They decided to complete the game in the wrong direction, and Duane got skunked (but didn't he end up on the real fourth street?). Hmm-between them they have 9 stars, 107 tournament wins, and 55,852 MRPs-and they need a traffic cop?! Perhaps at their next tournament, the director could appoint someone to show them which way to move their pegs.

Portland Summer Open Astronomers had a field day watching the Portland OR area in July, for two new stars were born there near the end of the 2007–2008 cribbage season. Duane Toll (Sutherlin OR) became the ACC's second Life Master ($\star \star \star$), and Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen (Napavine WA) achieved his Life Master ($\star \star$) rating. The consolation saw Life Master (\star) and former underwear model Warren Sondericker (Milwaukee WI) qualify #1 with an 18/8 +159 scorecard. The finals in this 152-player event pitted father against son, and the old man won—which doesn't seem very fair since son Chris Wilkinson (Sneads Ferry NC) gave dad Johnie Wilkinson (Grantsboro NC) free entry into the NOCT as a Father's Day gift! Johnie then repaid Chris's largesse by beating him in the finals, but at least Chris gets his picture in *Cribbage World*!

Beth Witter (Green Bay WI) won free entry into the NOCT by winning CW Contest #2. She acquitted herself quite well by finishing #13, but more importantly Beth picked enough MRPs in Raleigh to reserve her slot on the Central Region All Star team.

Throughout the weekend, five satellite tourneys were held, with a total of 450 contestants (see list of winners on page 9).

Two people deserve special recognition for their longevity. **Frank Carter** (Raleigh NC) has attended all thirty-

five National Opens—from 1974 to 2008. A longtime member of Raleigh Grass Roots Club 58, Frank has been a permanent fixture at NOCT since before the ACC was founded.

Leonard Peebles (Raleigh NC) has also attended all thirty-five NOCTs—but never played in any of them. In 1974, NOCT founder Nick Pond roped Leonard into helping out with the first tourney, and Leonard's been in charge of room set-up ever since. Hands down, Leonard is the best tournament manager in the country. The ACC's first and finest tournament could not function nearly so smoothly without his dedicated service. CW

With his runner-up finish in the 142-player Portland Summer Open in July, Duane Toll added a fourth star to his already illustrious cribbage career. The ACC's

#2 player in lifetime MRPs (25,137) and tournaments won (47 total: 28 mains and 19 consolations), Duane be-

comes only the second player to earn a Four Star rating. He joined the ACC in 1986 and credits the great Mick Michaelis (a Hall of Fame member) with being his cribbage mentor. Duane was the ACC national champion three consecutive years (2004–2006), holds the ACC record for most MRPs accumulated in one season (2,477 in 2006), and has been club champion three times.

The list of 2007–2008 Grass Roots club champions has been certified by Grass Roots statistician **Kristy Haught**. Each champion—representing the best players in 172 clubs across the continent—will be invited to the Grass Roots Tournament of Champions (GRTOC) in Portland OR in September and the Tournament of Champions (TOC) in Reno in February 2009.

Joseph Cornelissen (Rotonda West FL) repeated his reign as Grass Roots national champion, with 383 GRPs, earned in Club 29 in Englewood FL. The top ten Grass Roots members are listed nearby.

While we don't yet know the full effects of the new scoring system put in place last September, we do know that it yielded more GRPs among the club champions. In the 2006–2007 season, 171 champions earned 13,240 GRPs, while this year 172 champions earned 15,866 GRPs.


Cribbage Board of the Month

n contrast to the two *handcrafted* ivory cribbage boards in last month's column, the board featured this month is a *manufactured* ivory-and-scrimshaw board (sometimes called "fakeshaw").

This reproduction of a real ivory cribbage board in a museum was made by Artek Reproductions (Petersborough NH). It was part of a "Save the Whales" series of cribbage boards. In the detailed engraving, a whaleboat closes in on a whale.

Some reproductions are so well made that it takes an expert to determine that they are not real ivory. Most reproductions are beautiful pieces of work and are sold with no intent to pass them off as ivory. However, since they are often very authentic looking, a buyer should be careful when buying at antique stores and online.

It's Not Good Cribbage—and Involves Cruelty, Crookery, and Bad Credibility!

Backward-Pegging Opponents

No—it is not rule 9.3b, which allows the pone "to remove the pack, leaving the starter card in the approximate area where the pack was." If I could change one rule this would be it: to eliminate confusion and errors, I would allow no movement of the cards until all counting is completed.

Herschel Mack

No—it is not rule 6.1a, which says "only after both players discard to the crib shall the pack be cut by the pone to determine the starter card." Although a clear rule, it is often violated (I was once called the "F***ing Marquis of Queensbury" for enforcing it). There used to be a two-point penalty for violations here, and DeLynn Colvert has said we made a mistake in removing that penalty.

So what rule is it? This issue has generated a lot of controversy that the ACC Rules Committee is trying to resolve, yet it doesn't even involve a rule. Writing a firm rule on it has proven extremely difficult, bordering on impossible.

By now you have probably read Martha Fingleton's comments ("To Tell or Not to Tell? That Is the Question") in the August *Cribbage World* on what to do when you see that your opponent is pegging backward. While I agree with many of her statements, I do not agree with her conclusion that we should not include a statement in the ACC rule book concerning backward pegging. In fact, to not include a statement on this issue will in the long run prove harmful to the ACC, as it invites a continuance of bad practice.

My Opinion

It's cruel to allow your opponent to continue pegging backward. Pegging backward happens more often than we might wish, and in most cases the non-pegging backward (NPB) player tells the other person what they are doing. When someone allows the opponent to keep pegging backward, it often results in a humiliating outcome. I'd much rather learn after it is first noticed than when I have committed the same error several times. How embarrassing for the player when her opponent finally says, "I can't let you peg backward more than four times in a row."

If cribbage is a game to be enjoyed by everyone, are we not obligated (even in competition) to show compassion toward our opponents? (I'll admit some opponents strain my quality of mercy.) Do we want to lose new members (whether old or young) or longtime members due to this situation?

Behavior known as "crookery" occurs when you allow your opponent to continue pegging backward. While some may object to the word *crookery* as used here, I chose that over *criminality* because as yet we have no rule, law, or guideline that applies here. *Crookery* means crooked dealings or practices. In cross-checking scorecards over the years at many tournaments, I have been astonished to see 70point, 80-point, and even 90-point losses (wins). Losses/wins by over 100 points have even been reported. Never having beaten anyone by 80 points, I wondered how this was accomplished. A member of the ACC Hall of Fame said he thought most of these losses involved a player pegging backward. Hard work to achieve a skunk is one thing—allowing it to happen this way isn't right.

Of course, it need not be that dramatic to be significant. Allowing a person to continue pegging backward has significantly altered the outcome of tournaments. It turns losses into wins. It changes regular wins into skunks. It greatly changes the number of spread points that one has on a scorecard (regardless of win or loss). It affects who qualifies and who does not. I'm not willing to accept the proposition that (in most cases) the NPB player is unaware of what is happening. It's possible that the NPB player is not initially aware of backward pegging by an opponent, but usually soon sees what is happening (there could be exceptions and we should allow for that).

It hurts your credibility to allow your opponent to continue pegging backward. In two instances brought to my attention since becoming chair of the Rules Committee, the feeling toward players who allowed this to happen became much less positive. In one situation, a player bragged that his opponent pegged backward enough for him to gain a skunk in his last game, thus allowing him to qualify. In another recent situation, a prominent player allowed a less experienced player to peg backward for over one full street to enhance his scorecard. In fairness, since there is no rule about what to do when you see your opponent pegging backward, perhaps it was not right to judge these players negatively, but comments directed to me suggest that the perception of these players has suffered.

It's not good cribbage to allow an opponent to continue pegging backward (that's a value judgment). So while it may not be possible to write an enforceable rule on this situation, it is possible to write an ethical guideline that has a positive impact on behavior. We are not legislating what must be done. To say nothing about this issue smacks of condoning it. Allowing an opponent to continue pegging backward involves cruelty and crookery, and it harms credibility, so we need to say something about it in the ACC rule book.



Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

Eleven years have passed and some 1,500 cribbage tournaments have been played since Grand National 16 was held in Wisconsin Dells WI in September 1997. The weekend still seems like a blur, but the memories are real.

Whatever possessed me to undertake such an event is beyond me, as I had a whopping seven tournaments under my belt when I took on this mega-cribbage weekend. My wife Linda—the organized one in the family—was my behind-thescenes paper guru who kept everything in order—from entries to banquet menus to the \$40,000+ payouts.

The GN is not just a tournament, it is the ACC awards banquet, the annual meeting of the Board of Directors, multiple satellite tournaments, and a whole lot more. This traveling tournament is for those who want to take on the best players in a new setting each and every year. Twenty-six states were represented that weekend, and players came from far and wide—setting a new GN attendance record of 456.

The weekend arrived and we were ready. Registration was complete, the announcements were made, and the tournament was on. Qualifying is always the goal, and I did that with relative ease. The ever-present group of volunteers whizzed through the scorecards and the playoffs were set. My 31 GPs gave me a bye and a bit more time to get things ready for Sunday morning.

The Saturday night awards banquet went well and was highlighted by a stirring Hall of Fame acceptance speech by Martha Fingleton. After the banquet Linda and I strolled down to the lobby to gather up the trophies on display and discovered that someone awarded themselves (i.e., had stolen) the main tournament championship trophy! Of course, no one saw anything and there was nothing we could do. The GN curse had struck. We would have to make a new trophy for the winner if that one was not returned or found.

Sunday morning came early and the playoffs were on. I left Linda with a mountain of work, but what could I do? I had to play, leaving her to seek help with the onslaught of consolation entrants signing up, 294 to be exact. Joan Rein, brother Mike Barrett, and others jumped in and soothed Linda, but without her husband at her side the frenzy of entrants left her less than thrilled.

Linda became more hostile as I ad-

She glared at me and said: "The final what?" She was not as excited as I was as she left the room to keep the consolation tourney going as smooth as possible.

I was pitted against R. Roy Banducci of California. I knew nothing about Roy except that he must be one of those wily old players with plenty of skill. I won game 1, then game 2, then 3. I trailed in game 4 only to rally and win the title 4-0!

As the congrats rolled in, I gave Linda

a big hug, and she finally smiled. I looked for the person who taught me this great game, my mother Arlene. I found her in the consolation playoffs and with a tear in my eye told her the good news. The surrounding players cheered as I gave her a huge hug. I could not contain myself as the emotion rolled down my face.

As I look back on that weekend eleven years ago, I never dreamed that one could be subjected to a roller coaster of emotions by directing and winning a Grand National tournament. By the way, the trophy was returned anonymously and hangs in my office as a reminder of that once-ina-lifetime cribbage weekend.
