

A dismal 37.3%—barely more than a third of my games. Who am I kidding? What makes me think I know anything about playing this game!



All American

At the February board meeting, the issue of fairness in the All American selection went to a committee for study. That deals only with the tip of the iceberg and a few players. The bigger problem, affecting lifetime MRPs for everyone whether competing nationally or regionally, is that players from tournament-poor areas (e.g., Wyo-

ming, Oklahoma, Mississippi) have a hard time competing with players from tournament-rich areas (e.g., Oregon, Wisconsin, Massachusetts). I suggest leaving the All American system alone and annually giving certificates to the top MRP earner in each state and province and publishing the list in Cribbage World. Receiving a certificate would be in reverse difficulty to being an All American. That doesn't solve the whole problem but should encourage players and tournaments in tournamentpoor areas. Lastly, hats off to DeLynn Colvert for being an All American often, although he is not from a tournamentrich area.



Sir John drinks Mountain Dew? ast year, **Patrick Barrett** had an absolutely horrible time traveling from Wisconsin Rapids WI to Reno NV and then back home again—experiencing near-blizzard conditions, a flat tire, and a forced overnight stay in

the Chicago area. This year's trip was a bit easier, even though his suitcase was several pounds heavier on the return trip because he was lugging home the ACC Open championship trophy and the \$10,000 check for first place.

The field of 986—down just slightly from 1,016 players in 2008—saw Master **Bob Wikstrom** (Bainbridge Island WA) turn in the top scorecard of 43/19 +328. Bob lost only three games during the 22game qualifying round (for a really cool 86.4% batting average), but then—as the story so frequently seems to go—lost three out of five games in his first playoff match (following a first-round bye) against #128 **James Weires** (Faribault MN).

For only the second time in twentyfour years, Life Master (\star) Martha Fingleton (Milwaukee WI) qualified in the Open—and this time made a rather emphatic statement with an impressive 38/18 +185 scorecard, which was good enough for fifth place in the qualifying field. Of the top ten qualifiers, Martha was the only one to advance to the fourth round, aided, no doubt, by her pushover match in the third round against Life Master (******) **Warren Sondericker**.

Patrick qualified #130 with a 30/14 +69 scorecard and faced eight determined

opponents—including traveling companion **Elliott Havitz**—during his 25-7 playoff run for the roses.

The two semifinal matches saw Life Master Ginny Danielski (Little Chute WI) waging a futile battle

against Patrick, while newcomer **Joseph White** (Pompano Beach FL) dispatched Life Master **Rex Paddock** (Missoula MT) in three straight games.

Nearly 12,000 games were played in the main tourney, and only Patrick went home the ACC champion. But everyone who played in this cribbage extravaganza weekend went home a winner.


A record-setting 646 players entered the Cribbage Bowl on Friday afternoon in Reno, and three of them won eleven of their twelve games.



Western Region All Stars in a Squeaker

The Western Region, led by Captain **Erik Royland Locke**, captured the 19th annual All Star Competition, played in Reno on Thursday, February 5.

In what was, by all accounts, the closest All Star Tourney ever, the Western team squeaked out a single-point victory over the Central team, led by Master **Brad Behm** (WI): 137-136. The Central team actually won more games (65-64), but had only six skunks to the West's nine, which allowed the West to claim the victory.

The Eastern Region team, led by Life Master ($\star \star \star$) **Phyllis Schmidt** (MA), was also tantalizingly close, with a score of 134 GPs. Despite their disappointment at finishing in last place for the second consecutive year, the East still holds a 7-6-6 overall lead in the series.

Cribbage Board of the Month



Cribbage Lingo

OMG!—shorthand for "One More Game!" a phrase frequently muttered by cribbage players after the qualifying round at every tournament.

The President's Column



This column is devoted to the ACC's volunteer judges.

The job of a judge is to support the ACC rulebook. When summoned, judges make calls to determine how misplays are handled. But they are also teachers, who help players learn more about the game and the rules. Most of the time, they also make scorecard corrections. They sometimes have to make judgment calls on situations not covered in the rulebook. And because of the competitive nature of the game, they are sometimes needed as referees.

Competent judges will always make sure that a rulebook and two judges are at every call. They listen to both sides of the issue from the players involved. If discussion between the judges is necessary, they step away from the immediate area to talk about the call. If they are not in agreement, a third judge, normally the tournament's head judge, is summoned. After a decision is made, they return to the players and explain the ruling. They will read the pertinent rule out loud to the players from the rulebook, unless the situation is not covered there.

Judges do this job while also competing in the tournaments. So when they step up to a call, they are aware of time considerations not only where the call is, but on their own tables as well.

Of course, judges make mistakes, who doesn't? Sometimes it may even affect

the outcome of a game, but this happens rarely. Players dissatisfied with a call have the right to summon another judge, but then when this ruling is made, a player must accept it.

So let's see . . . when making a call, you need to do it reasonably fast, with complete accuracy, between sometimes antagonistic players and normally with critics standing by, trying to leave all parties satisfied with or at least accepting the outcome. Who could *not* want to sign up?

I salute the judges of the ACC. Thank you for volunteering your time, interrupting your games, and putting yourselves in position to receive criticism. You are very necessary to our organization. Without your unselfish willingness to volunteer, tournament play would undoubtedly suffer.

I recommend that members take the judge's test, even if they do not want to become a judge. It helps you to familiarize yourself with the rules and understand the task of judging. The exam is an openbook test that costs \$3 and is administered by **Albert N. Miller** (Nashua NH), who has been doing this for more years than I can remember. (Our continued thanks to Al!)

And remember, the ACC can always use more good judges.

Youth Teaching Tip

Okay, you've been working with the kids for a few sessions, and it's finally time to let them at it. You pass out boards and cards, and it's time to cut for deal. Wait a minute! Before they play, there's one more important thing to go over-respecting the playing cards. Kids are notorious for mistreating a fresh deck of cards. They fidget with them, bend them, pick their teeth with them, and in a very short while, you have a worthless deck of cards. Explain to students how bent cards tend to be cut more often and are more difficult to shuffle. Speaking of shuffling, a quick shuffling lesson is also a good idea. Give old decks of cards to students to take home, with this homework assignment-practice shuffling.



Only after both players discard to the crib shall the pack be cut by the pone to determine the starter card. If the starter card is turned up by the dealer before he or she discards to the crib, the starter card is returned to the pack, the dealer then discards to the crib and reshuffles the pack, and the pone cuts the starter card.

The cover of the March 1984 *Cribbage World* featured a story about the first 29-hand of the cribbage season, held by **Warren Klaus**er (then of Racine WI, now of Bettendorf IA).

Elsewhere in this issue, we learn that James Schneider (Menominee Falls WI) won the 342-player American Cribbage Championship. Bob McCabe (then living



in Brown Deer WI) won the consolation. **Bob Julian** won the World Cribbage Classic in Kissimmee FL. And **Dennis Moran** (Elko NV) won the Oregon State Championship.
