# **Grass Roots Regional Tournament**

The Grass Roots Regional Tournament for the 2009–2010 season is now complete. Many thanks to the four regional Grass Roots commissioners who conducted a GRRT in their region: Roger Wilson, Dave O'Neil, Erik Locke, and Marlene Lazachek.

A total of 1,992 official participants throughout the United States and Canada played this season (up from 1,929 last year), and the top players in each region—those with scorecards of 30 GPs and higher—are listed on page 25. The best scorecard in the entire ACC was turned in by Keith Forrest, who plays with Club 69 in Spokane Valley WA.

The 2010 St. Croix Cribbage Classic's will be held at the St. Croix Casino, Turtle Lake WI. The casino is located at 777 Highway 8 in Turtle Lake WI. (Phone# 1-800-U-GO-U-WIN)



This Tournament is sanctioned by the American Cribbage Congress. This is a non smoking Tournament. Because the tournament is held at the St. Croix Casino, you must be 21 years of age to enter. There will be no exceptions to this rule. All players will be asked to get a players club card to collect on your casino perks and for tracking purposes. Please use your players club card when gambling, this will help with future casino perks.

# My Deal



It's not everyday that you find out something important about your closest friends, but this happened to me last month.

I've known about my heart murmur for five or six years, and apart from a nasty bout with endocarditis in 2006, the heart valve has worked well enough. Until December, that is.

During my annual checkup, my cardiologist said that the mitral valve was now working less efficiently and that I'd need surgery in the next few months. After undergoing a battery of very enjoyable tests, surgery was scheduled for March 11.

With enough drugs coursing through my system to stun a horse, I didn't feel a thing, and I remember even less. They didn't, of course, tell me how much it would hurt the day after the surgery, and the day after that! But Vicodin came to the rescue, and I'm on the mend.

I didn't have a sky-is-bluer, grass-is-greener, air-smells-fresher experience. True, I was quite happy to wake up alive after the surgery, but given the skill of to-day's medical miracle-workers, I expected nothing less. I am, however, thankful for three things: that I needed this surgery in 2010 instead of in 1910, and that I had the surgery at age 53 instead of age 73.

But most of all, I'm thankful for my cribbage friends. I could hardly believe the outpouring of phone calls, email, getwell cards, and well wishes from around the ACC. From my fellow club members, from coast to coast, and from all points in between, I heard from dozens, perhaps

hundreds, of cribbage players who wished me a speedy recovery and/or regaled me with tales of their heart surgery. (I can hardly wait to compare chest zippers at the next tournament!)


I'm still under doctor's orders to take it easy, but the show must go on, and so here is the April Cribbage World—only a couple weeks late!



Everything You've Always Wanted to Know about Cribbage (But Were Afraid to Ask)

What's a division?

**James Klinger** (Hamburg NY) asks CW to explain what a "division" is in the ACC.

Divisions apply only to Grass Roots clubs, and they indicate the number of times that a club plays each year between September and May:

- Division 1 clubs play 25 to 36 tournaments (basically every week)
- Division 2 clubs play 14 to 24 tournaments (twice a month)

• **Division 3** clubs play less than 14 tournaments (once a month)

Clubs are assigned to one of these three divisions, without regard to geography. This allows club members to see where they stand in comparison to players

around the country who play the same number of tourna-

ments as they do. The latest standings for all three divisions are listed on page 20.

than one 15-2 is worth 20 or 24 points. For example, is 6-6-6-6 + 3 worth 20 or 24 points? What about 6-6-6-6 + 9?

Here is a list of all four-of-a-kind hands that include more than one 15-2. Do you automatically know if they are worth 20 or 24 points without counting them out?

2-2-2-2 plus 9	6-6-6-6 plus 9
3-3-3-3 plus 6	7-7-7-7 plus A
3-3-3-3 plus 9	7-7-7-7 plus 8
4-4-4 plus 3	8-8-8-8 plus 7
4-4-4-4 plus 7	9-9-9-9 plus 6
5-5-5-5 plus X	X-X-X-X plus 5
6-6-6 plus 3	

As with all cribbage hands, there are exactly three goals to keep in mind when

The key to counting these hands is to note how many cards it takes to make 15-2. If it takes three cards to make 15 (i.e., the singleton plus a pair), then the hand is worth 24 points. If it takes two cards or four cards to make

15-2, then the hand is worth 20 points. (Four 5s plus a face card is the one exception to this rule because in addition to

5-X each set of three 5s also makes another 15-2, for a total of 28 points.)

Thus, 6-6-6-6 + 3 is worth 24 points because three cards (e.g., 3-6-6) are needed to make 15-2. But 6-6-6-6 + 9 is worth 20 points because it takes only two cards (6-9) to make 15-2. CW

Youth Teaching Tip

Where do you put the deck of cards after you deal? On top of the board or on your side of the board? Most kids set the cards on the board unless otherwise instructed. I always teach students to put the cards on their side, butted up to the board, so their opponent can easily make a cut. This practice clearly denotes whose crib it is when a distraction causes a break in the action. When play resumes, there may be a question as to whose crib it is if the cards are on top of the board. If, however, they are always on the side of the dealer, it is clear who gets the crib. Also, not having the cards on the board gives both players an unobstructed view of the entire pegging area.

Signing up new members—club directors should advise new members to use the first name they wish to be called by when filling out their ACC and Grass Roots registration forms. Different names create a conflict when the two databanks are reconciled. Example: A member fills out the forms as William but likes to be called Bill or Skip or something else! He can be called anything he wants to as long as the same first name is used in all instances!

Helpful hints for club members—all the folks who work so hard each week to make your tournament a success are unpaid volunteers! If you observe things that need to be done, jump in and help without being asked! Tables and chairs often need to be set up or taken down. If you're among the first players finished playing your nine games, sit down and help verify score sheet totals. Club 110 (Oahu HI)—on December Roy Wong was playing Tsarkie and dealt himself 3-5-6-7-10-K of Diamonds. He discarded 3-10, and Tsarkie discarded 2-4 of Diamonds and then cut the Jack of Diamonds. What are the odds of holding two flushes in both hand and crib with both values at 12 points? *submitted by Fred White* 

Reply from RAS—the double flushes in our club have been of two different suits. Our club pays \$25 for this hand, and I have paid three of them. They occur once in 39,035 deals. They are five times as rare as 28-hands. The circumstances that Fred describes would certainly make the frequency at least ten times as rare. That would make the double flush in the same suit of 12 points each more than twice as rare as a 29-hand. I'll bet that somebody in the Hawai'i club has scored a 29-hand and that no one has scored the hand and crib scored by Roy Wong.



- Use of free listing in the weekly calendar of a local newspaper
- Word of mouth (i.e., talking cribbage with anyone who'll listen)

- TV interviews and stories
- Distribution around town of fliers, extra copies of CW, business cards, etc.
- Making membership a full effort by everyone in the club—not just the director
