

My Deal by David Aiken



Twenty-oh-nine has been a brutal year for the ACC, as we lost four key members who were instrumental in either the early days of the ACC or its current administration.

Joe Bernard and Bob Madsen died following extended illnesses earlier this year, and then in the space of little more than two weeks we lost two hard-working ACC stalwarts. On November 16, Bob McCabe (Milwaukee WI) died suddenly while driving home from a tournament in Reno NV. And on December 1, George Bickford (West Springfield MA) succumbed to the heart problems that had plagued him over the past year.

I can't begin to praise Bob McCabe highly enough for the many official ACC positions that he held: BOD member, executive vice president, MRP statistician, and treasurer. But it is memories of his unofficial duties that I will most cherish.

As soon as the qualifying round of a tournament was over, Bob would shuffle up to the registration table and start checking scorecards. With flawless accuracy, he would quickly check the math on each scorecard, sort them into three piles (qualifiers, dead zone, maybes), and look around for more cards. I never had to ask Bob to help, he just showed up.


It was nothing for Bob to jump in his car and drive many hours to play the game he loved. He played in all but one of my Michigan tournaments, and he occasionally left his home at two or three in the morning to drive to Grand Rapids for a

tournament. I still remember when, after he won the 2007 Michigan Tournament of Diamonds, he gave his trophy to the son of the player he had just beaten.

I last saw Bob at my Midwest Match Play tournament on Halloween weekend. Very uncharacteristically, he got knocked out in the first two rounds. After his second loss, he hitched up his pants, looked at me with his familiar scowl, and said, "I'm leaving." He definitely did not like sitting around twiddling his thumbs.

I don't remember where and when I first met George Bickford, but it was probably the 2005 National Open in Raleigh. I didn't, however, get to know him well until I became CW editor two years later. During the early months of my editorship, I had a single phone/fax line, which was frequently tied up when I was on the internet. George would dutifully try to fax tournament reports to me, but repeatedly got a busy signal.

When he eventually got through, George would gruffly chew me out for not having a separate fax line. And once he got me straightened out on this, we had many continued on page 8

28-Hands

I recommend that 28-hands composed of four 5s in the hand with a face card being cut be acknowledged but not awarded a certificate. There are too many chances to get a 28-hand this way because of all the face cards. The ACC should still recognize and award 28-hands that start with three 5s and a face card in the hand because the only way to get the 28-hand is to cut the outstanding case 5, similar to what happens when you get a 29-hand.

Leniency for First-Year Players

I agree with Dave Bowen's letter in the December CW. I would like to make a suggestion that is akin to a first-year jockey, who is given a weight advantage. For example, for the first year after becoming a Grass Roots member, a player

would not be penalized for overpegging; a player would be told the rule and would move their peg back. There may also be other rules that would be enforced but not penalized. First-year players should be told of other obvious mistakes or errors in judgement. Club play can be intimidating. Players who have been away from the game for several years may be reluctant to start again if cribbage rules are strictly enforced during what should be an evening of fun.

s a general rule, a single 9 is the worst lead in cribbage. For example, if you lead the 9 from 7-8-8-9, what do you do when your

opponent plays a 6 for 15-2? Leading a 9 from this hand drops you in the middle of the Battle of the Little Bighorn, and you're wearing a 7th Cavalry uniform:

Of course, as with all generalizations, the embargo on leading a 9 is true only some of the time. You must also consider (1) board position and (2) whether you are playing defense or offense

To avoid massacres like this, in which you just got outpegged 0–13, remember that it's generally not a good idea to lead a 9 when you have all middle cards (even if you have a pair of 9s), such as these hands:

6-6-6-9

6-6-9-9*

6-7-8-9

7-7-8-9

7-8-8-9 7-8-9-9

Similarly bad things can happen when you lead a 9 from a hand containing three small cards:

*Pegging guru Ras says 6-6-9-9 is a tough hand to play. He suggests leading a 9 to cut down on pegging potential for the dealer. If the 9 gets paired, you get six safe pegs, whereas leading the 6 leaves you vulnerable to a pair, a quad, and a go (a 6–15 pegging disadvantage). If your opponent makes 15-2 on your 9 lead, the second 9 is the safest response.

Suppose you are holding A-2-3-9 with first count from nine holes away (the dealer is in hole 109). The cut card gives you only two more points, and so the only way to win is to disguise your hand and keep A-2-3 intact for offensive pegging. In this scenario, you must lead the 9 and hope to pick up two points during pegging.

If the dealer plays A, 2, 3, 4, or 5 on your 9 lead, you win the game by either pairing their first card or making 15-2. Even if the dealer plays a 6 for 15-2, you can play your 3 in anticipation of the dealer's second play being a 10 card, with your Deuce and Ace then likely giving you a desperately needed 31-2. On the other hand, if you lead one of your small cards in this situation, the dealer will play off so as to avoid giving you any points, and you'll likely end up losing the game one or two holes short of victory.

The caveat against leading the 9 should thus be ignored when you hold three small

cards and you are playing offense. In this situation the 9 is the correct lead and maximizes your potential for peg points. If playing defense, however, the 9 is the worst lead.

HOMEWORK

Whenever you feel the urge to lead a 9, ask yourself two things: (1) Am I playing offense or defense? and (2) Will leading a 9 get me into trouble?

Cribbage Board of the Month



Awards Committee


An ad hoc committee chaired by **Keith Widener** (Clemmons NC) is examining the ACC's award program, particularly the All Regional awards and the All American awards.


Years Ago in the ACC



Youth Teaching Tip

Here's an activity I always do when I first start to teach a new group of kids. I make a three-by-three box grid (nine boxes) and challenge the kids to use one number between 1 and 9 in each box so that the total of all eight lines (vertical, horizontal, and diagonal) equals 15. Each number may be used only once. This is a fun way to start them thinking about number patterns, and it also emphasizes the different combinations of 15 they can look for in their hands.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING • SEPTEMBER 25, 2009 CROWN PLAZA HOTEL • GRAND RAPIDS, MICHIGAN

Executive Vice-President Martha Fingleton called the meeting to order at 9a. She welcomed the five new members of the board. She asked that anyone interested in volunteering for any projects or committees to let her know ASAP, as there was going to be an Executive Committee meeting immediately following the BOD meeting. Several committee appointments will be made at that time. She also thanked departing BOD members for their service.

The BOD recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Martha added two items to the agenda: volunteer recognition and the Grass Roots Committee report. Cathy Perkins moved to accept the amended agenda; 2nd by Val; motion approved.

Roll call was taken. Present were Dave Aiken, Pat Barrett, George Bickford, Don Brown, Dave Campbell, Annett Eiffert, Martha Fingleton, Roland Hall, Sharon Hejtmanek, Jeanne Hofbauer, Roy Hofbauer, Bob Julian, Ron Logan, Herschel Mack, Bob Milk, Cathy Perkins, Joan Rein, Larry Samet, Todd Schaefer, Phyllis Schmidt, Jeff Shimp, Wayne Steinmetz, Val Sumner, Keith Widener. Absent: Fred White.

Jeanne moved to accept the minutes of the last meeting; 2nd by Val; motion approved.

Election of Officers: Phyllis Schmidt, chair of the Nominating Committee, read the names of the candidates running for the Executive Committee and asked if there were any nominations from the floor. All positions were uncontested. Jeff Shimp moved that nominations be closed; 2nd by Bob Milk; motion approved. Jeff moved that the secretary cast one ballot for all positions; 2nd by George Bickford; motion approved. Elected were Jeanne Hofbauer, President; Martha Fingleton, Executive V-P; Catherine Perkins, V-P Policy; Bob Julian, V-P Operations; and David Campbell, Member-at-Large.

Bob McCabe presented the **Treasurer's Report**. We have a cash balance of \$139,003. The ACC had a profit of \$2,594 for the past twelve-month period, which was under budget, caused by the expense of unsold playing cards and unbudgeted printing of tournament scorecards. He noted that the Grass Roots income was high mainly because two years of Grass Roots National Tournament income was recorded in 2009. He also noted that since this report, he had received an internet check for \$8,900. George Bickford made a motion to accept next year's budget; 2nd by Phyllis Schmidt. Martha suggested that \$5,000 be added to the budget to cover the printing and mailing of new rulebooks; and the motion was approved.

A closed session (no spectators) was held for an appeal to an Ethics Committee–issued suspension. After hearing testimony by the persons suspended and the Ethics Committee, the BOD upheld the suspension.

Herschel Mack presented the final rule changes before the printing of a new rulebook, which were discussed and amended by the BOD. Included was a new addition to the ethics section regarding discrimination. Phyllis Schmidt made a motion to approve the rule changes; 2nd by Val; motion approved. Bob Milk made a motion that the new rulebook go into effect on August 1, 2010; 2nd by George Bickford; motion approved. Herschel will make sure that the new document is proofread by himself, his wife (Ricki), and the Rules Committee. Dave Aiken will oversee the typesetting and printing of the books.

Martha told the BOD that Larry Hassett has volunteered to continue as Membership Secretary and that our policy does not require BOD membership for that job. However, under current policy, he would be required to attend all BOD meetings, unless excused. She suggested that we change this policy to the same requirement as the BOD, which is 50% attendance per term. Herschel made a motion to change Sec. 20.II.A-2.D, that membership secretary is required to attend at least 50% of the ACC BOD meetings; 2nd by Bob Milk; motion approved.

Keith Widener, chairman, reported that the ad hoc committee has been discussing reworking the All American Awards. He also wanted to add some new members to the committee. Martha suggested that he put an article in CW asking for feedback.

Peggy Scalley and Annett Eiffert gave an update on GN 30. After the back-out by two different playing venues in California, Peggy contacted the Sands Regency in Reno NV about holding the tournament there. The Sands accepted, and it was approved by Executive V-P Martha Fingleton. Western Region Tournament Commissioner Roy Hofbauer asked the BOD to approve possible additional tournaments on the days before and following the GN tournament, also to be held at the Sands, pending their approval. Details will be worked out at a future time. National Tournament Commissioner George Bickford granted a special waiver for these midweek tournaments to be held in the same venue.

Joan Rein made a presentation for a bid for GN 31 to be held at the Radisson Paper Valley Hotel in Appleton WI on September 20–23, 2012. There were no other competing bids. Jeff Shimp made a motion to award GN 31 to Joan Rein, director; 2nd by Pat Barrett; motion approved.

Hal Mueller made a presentation to the BOD regarding his proposal that alternate deal be required in tournament qualifying rounds, which resulted from his analysis of win percentages when having first deal. Discussion covered Hal's mathematical analysis, regional preferences, difficulty with logistics, requiring additional compliance by tournament directors, and how winning or losing the cut makes a difference in the way persons play their cards. Herschel Mack made a motion that it be left to tournament directors to decide upon using cut for deal or alternate deal; 2nd by Keith Widener; motion approved.

Roy Hofbauer presented an idea from Paul Barnes about ACC volunteer recognition. The Regional Tournament Commissioners will choose (at their discretion) up to two people from their regions for this award. The award will be called the "Outstanding Volunteer" award. Roy made a motion that up to two volunteers per region be recognized each year with a plaque awarded at the Grand National banquet; 2nd by Valerie Sumner; motion approved.

Roy also presented another idea from Paul Barnes, suggesting that muggins play in the TOC be eliminated. Paul's chief objection to playing muggins was that most judges do not know how to rule on muggins calls. After discussion, Roy made a motion to remove muggins from the TOC; 2nd by Sharon Hejtmanek; motion defeated.

Joy and Jeff Shimp presented an idea for publicizing and promoting the ACC. They distributed copies of business cards to each BOD member. The cards had the ACC logo, our website address, and toll-free phone number printed

on one side and a place where local information can be written on the other side. They suggested that they be printed on card stock and be inserted in CW for a one-time try, so that every ACC member could have the opportunity to distribute them. They said that the cost would be approximately \$1,025 to do this and there would be 12 business-card-size cards per insert. Ron Logan made a motion that these inserts be printed, perforated, and inserted in CW, with the cost to be charged to the publicity budget; 2nd by Larry Samet; motion approved.

Don Brown wanted to get the BOD's opinion on a regionalization change. He said he would like to take a straw poll and if the BOD is overwhelming opposed, he would withdraw any subsequent presentations for a time. He chose three possible votes: "categorically opposed," "willing to listen," and "in favor of." There were 23 members available for the vote; the outcome was 14-8-1.

Jeff Shimp reported on the progress of GN 28. He presented each BOD member with a quart of Michigan maple syrup as a gift of Michigan hospitality. In this "ten-day extravaganza," they had the Cereal City tournament last weekend (69 main entrants), a midweek tournament (124 main entrants), and preregistration of 336 for the main tournament of GN 28.

Committee Reports

Executive Committee by Jeanne Hofbauer

- purchased floral arrangements for three funerals: Joe Bernard, Sharlene Medeiros, and Bob Madsen
- authorized fax machine purchase for Pat Barrett
- authorized purchase by Larry Hassett of \$112 for address update software
- authorized purchase by Larry Hassett of \$128.97 for 4in-1 copy/fax/scanner/printer
- authorized reimbursement to Mike McCammon of \$1,086 for twenty cases of playing cards for Western Region tournaments

Ethics Committee by Sharon Hejtmanek: Sharon will propose a policy change at the next BOD meeting to prohibit granting appeals for suspensions.

Hall of Fame Committee by Pat Barrett: Pat congratulated the newest member of the HOF, Catherine Perkins, who will be inducted at the banquet tomorrow night. There are several vacancies on the voting panel. Pat will give all members who need to choose or replace panel members, member application sheets for their electors to fill out. They need to be returned to him by November 15. He cautioned new members that their choices must be willing and able to fulfill their duties. Nomination criteria will be in the November CW. Voting packets will be sent out the first week of January and will include criteria, two envelopes, along with the other material.

Grass Roots Committee by Joan Rein: Joan proposed adding a "travelers club" to the Grass Roots point system. She explained that players would need to register with a regular GR club first, then when they become a traveler, they stay as such until they have completed thirty-six tournaments, then they become a "trav-visitor" and receive no more points. However, they can continue to play without receiving points. She needs approximately \$2,000 to change the programming to make these changes. Cathy Perkins moved that we authorize up to \$2,000 for the program change to create a travelers club under the format as presented by Joan; 2nd by Valerie; motion approved.

PR and Marketing Committee by Jeanne Hofbauer: Re-

ceived a request for \$400 (as budgeted) for the Puyallup fair promotion, which was sent to Cliff Brandsma, Received an email from Dave Aiken, who has been approached by Sue Rasmussen and Sandy Denmark to share exhibit space with the ACC at the September 2010 AARP meeting in Orlando FL. He did not have details, but wanted the BOD to be aware of this opportunity. If he has the info by the Reno meeting, we may be able to make a decision on our participation. If this info comes after February 11, the Executive Committee may have to decide about this. Norm Nikodym reported on his "double the ACC by 2016 Committee"; he listed the goals and objectives of this committee and suggestions on how to accomplish them. He asked who was going to replace Tom Lewis as chair of the PR/Marketing Committee, which will be addressed in the Executive Committee Meeting to be held after the BOD meeting.

Youth Program by Dan Zeisler: Jeanne read a report from Dan. He reported that the recycling of boards was very successful, as almost 300 boards have been given away to teachers. He's getting a lot or responses to his CW column and from his being the contact person on the website for questions about cribbage. He encourages members to consider teaching cribbage classes.

Internet Committee by Bob Milk: Bob reported that the internet has finished its fifth season. With 201 tournaments held this year, 21 players will receive TOC invitations. Six new e-masters will receive their awards at the banquet tomorrow night. Play is Monday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday on Game Colony. Ecribbage.com play is now on Wednesday, Referral fees from Game Colony were over \$16,000 last year. Expenses for the internet program last year were about \$1,000 because of catching up on certificates for previous years. This year's expenses should be around \$400. There are some problems: not enough tournament directors, complaints of no late tournaments for the West Coast, and two suspensions for profanity and defamatory slurs. Damian Blond of ecribbage.com wants to use the ACC logo and wants to know procedures for getting a reciprocal link from our website to ecribbage.com. There may be a question regarding permission from the Sands, who sponsors our website. Bob will investigate this.

Officer Reports

President by Jeanne Hofbauer: written monthly column and getting good feedback. Notified Larry Samet to fill remainder of Joe Bernard's term. Still working on getting ACC logo trademark, but did give one person permission to use it for Grass Roots club jackets. Chose Elda Madsen and Marlene Lazachek for this year's President's Awards. Looking into Motel 6 discounts with ACOR Hospitality, at no cost to ACC, with possibility of rebates.

Executive V-P Martha Fingleton: nothing to report.

VP-Policy Larry Hassett: no report.

VP-Operations Cathy Perkins: said her goal was to get the policy manual on the internet. Jeanne asked her to get a proofreading committee in place to check for accuracy. She reported that all operations are going well.

Member-at-Large George Bickford: appointed Pat Barrett to fill Joe Bernard's position as Central Region Tournament Commissioner. George has also sent out forms for ACC property reports.

Next BOD meeting in Reno, Thursday, February 11, at 9a. Cathy Perkins moved to adjourn; 2nd by Bob Julian; motion approved.
