New ACC Rulebook

CC rules undergo changes periodically, mainly due to problems encountered by players and judges in Grass Roots clubs and tournaments. The list below contains changes made in the 2010 rulebook, due to take effect on August 1.

Judges learning these changes will make better judgments, and players learning the changes may avoid having to call for judges.

Here are the changes in the 2010 rulebook (page numbers refer to the *new* rulebook):

 Four items added to code of ethics (p. 5): (a) communicating about other people's games, (b) allowing backward pegging to continue, (c) us-

ing one's position as judge to purposely intimidate, and (d) engaging in forms of discriminatory behavior

- Minor addition to definition of "pegging" (p. 9)
- Deletion of "go" in scoring chart (p. 10)
- Addition to §2.2 clarifying pone's right to mix cards (p. 11)
- Addition to §4.4.d.(4) showing intersection of this rule with §6.1.a (p. 16)
- New §4.5.c and §4.5.d on incomplete decks (p. 18)

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My Deal



Michiganders take their sports seriously. At least our baseball and hockey fans do; football fans are still waiting for the Lions to win the Super Bowl.

The outcry was therefore both justifiable and understandable when Detroit Tigers' pitcher Armando Galarraga was robbed of a perfect game on June 1. First-base umpire Jim Joyce suffered a bout of temporary blindness and called the runner safe with two out in the ninth inning. Instead of being the final and 27th straight out—and making Galarraga the 21st major league pitcher to throw a perfect game—this became, in the words of the New York Times, "the worst call, ever."

Once Joyce saw the replay, he apologized to Galarraga, but by then the damage was done. The game entered the record books as a one-hit win, Galarraga got a new Corvette instead of a perfect game, and local talk-radio shows finally had a legitimate gripe to complain about.

Like the bumper sticker says, "Sh*t happens." In life, in baseball, in cribbage.

While cribbage doesn't have umpires who can blow a call as badly as Joyce blew this one, things do happen that are outside of our control.

You need only two points with first count, and you're dealt A-3-6-7-10-K; you throw the face cards into the dealer's crib and cut another King. By time the pegging is over, you've moved only one peg and have a blank hand.

In another game, you need sixteen points to win and hold double run 4-5-

5-6. Only problem is, the Jack cut puts the dealer out and you never get to count your hand.


You had a great morning and return from lunch needing just two wins to qualify—and you lose every game.

You finally qualify for the playoffs—after several near misses—only to find that your first-round opponent is **Duane Toll**, or **Wayne Steinmetz**, or **Larry Phifer**.

The lighting is too dim, the heat is too high, nearby players are too noisy, you have to wait five minutes to start each game—the list of things you can't control is endless.

But when bad things happen to good cribbage players, I hope we accept them with the grace and poise that Galarraga displayed. Instead of ranting and raving at the umpire (think Pete Rose and the 1983 pine-tar incident), Galarraga accepted the call with a Zen-like equanimity that is seldom found anywhere, let alone in high-pressure, big-money professional sports.

"Nobody's perfect," quipped Galarraga. And neither is anyone who plays this crazy game we call cribbage. CW

Pay Attention

Players should really be told they need to do the following in order: (1) Pay attention to announcements; when everyone else is quiet, then you should be also. (2) Look for the posted information. Perfect Hand

I've read at a couple places that the perfect hand is 29 (5-5-5-J, with the last point coming from the Jack for nobs). Why not have the Jack be the cut, giving 2 points for His Heels? Wouldn't that make the hand worth 30 points? I can't find why this doesn't work.

Editor's reply: When the dealer gets two points for cutting a Jack, this is considered part of the pegging—not part of the points in the hand. In the same way that other pegging points (15-2 or a run of three or a "go") are not considered to be part of the points in the hand, so also with a cut Jack. The biggest cribbage hand therefore remains a 29-hand.

28-Hands

In the June CW Sean Daniels Sr. and Nat Hammond disagree with my result in the May CW that scoring a 28-hand with 555T+5 is more common than with 5555+T (by a factor of about 2.603-72.24% versus 27.76%). They both made the same mistake; namely, comparing prospects for hands 555T and 5555 presumed already dealt instead of before any cards have been dealt. Sean, for example, says, "If by chance you hold the four 5s in your hand." But the point is that at the beginning of the deal, you don't hold any 5s in your hand. A huge factor in the calculation is that one is much less likely to be dealt the four 5s than to be dealt three 5s and a 10 card! It is for reasons of mathematical probabilities that poker hands are ranked four of a kind, full house, flush, straight, three of a kind, two of a kind. The lower the probability of a holding, the greater its value. My calculations continued on page 10

Al was the second high qualifier in the main, took second in the Q-pool and side pools, and was second overall in the main event. The last time that Life Master (****) **DeLynn Colvert** (Missoula MT) checked his rearview mirror, his closest competition was about 4,200 MRPs behind him and closing at a rate of "only" 637 MRPs each season. At that time, CW predicted

that Duane would catch and pass DeLynn in the 2015–2016 season, but given that Duane has outpaced DeLynn by an average of

1,070 MRPs in the last three years, he will likely need less than three years to accomplish this goal. So CW now boldly predicts that Duane will surpass DeLynn's MRP total at 3:15 p.m. on March 31, 2013, when he takes second place in the Mick Michaelis Classic consolation.

Duane Toll—the ACC's #2 MRP accumulator—has now added a fifth star to his impressive cribbage pedigree. He's won six tournaments this year (bringing him to 61 lifetime)

and is only 2,999 MRPs behind DeLynn. A five-time national champion and the MRP record holder (2,662 MRPs, in 2008–2009), Duane joined the ACC in 1986 and credits Hall of Fame honoree Mick Michaelis with being his cribbage mentor. Duane plays Grass Roots cribbage at Timber Capital Club 62 (Roseburg OR), where he has been club champion three times. Mike McDaniels still rates as Duane's toughest opponent. When not winning cribbage tourneys, Duane enjoys hiking, his grandchildren, and poker.

Darlene joined the ACC in the 1980s after her ex-husband taught her how to play ("I have thanked him," she says). A member of Club 215 in Chaska, Darlene has also earned her Bronze Award. She learned a lot over the years from Joe Bernard and Mick Mi-

chaelis. Favorite tourneys: those at Wisconsin Dells and Cannon Falls MN. First tournament win: against Bob Julian at the Dells in 1993. Toughest opponent: Jerry Gruber.

Dollar Bill Cribbage

Here are a few midcourse reminders for playerssending in dollars for "CW Contest #8: Dollar Bill Cribbage."

First, don't forget that you have to count all eight digits in the serial number (ignore the letters). This will, of course, give you a larger than normal cribbage hand.

Second, runs must be as long as possible. For example, serial number 3-4-4-5-5-6-7-9 is a double-double run of 5 (or 24 points plus all of the 15-2 combos). You cannot count this as separate runs (e.g.,

3-4-4-5-5 and 4-4-5-5-6 and 5-5-6-7).

Third, don't ignore the worst cribbage hand. So far all entries have been for the best cribbage hand, but whoever submits

the worst cribbage hand also wins a GN 28 baseball cap and a sheet of



zazzle.com stamps.

show that in cribbage you will be dealt 5555xx about 55.41 times out of a million. On the other hand, you will be dealt 555yyy about 2,211 times out of a million (where no y is a 5 and at least one y is a T—but not the "right Jack," which would have you pointed toward a 29-hand). This is about 40 times as often as 5555xx. Whether you end up scoring 28 depends in each case on the cut.




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Crib Pointers

ne reason I'm spending so much time preaching that you should toss the 5 into your own crib is because it's such an important concept.

Another reason is that in last month's column I totally omitted the most impor-

card pairings (without regard to suit) into five basic groups:

1. Since it averages 8.82 points in the crib, the 5-5 stands in a group by itself. Tossing 5-5 into your own crib is worth a

sacrifice of up to four points in the hand *if* you still have the potential to cut the hand back up to twelve points or more.

#7 Put the 5 in your crib (third time's a charm!)

tant toss (the 5-5) from the list of Ras's best tosses to your own crib. To do justice to both Life Master (**) Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen (Napavine WA) and to my readers, I am revisiting this idea for the last time. Or at least for a long time.

The general premise is this: the dealer wants to build a strong crib that will add to the points held in the hand. Thus, the dealer usually puts her two best cards into her own crib if she can do so without excessive sacrifice to the potential of her hand. One way to load the crib is to dump a 5—whether an actual 5 card or a "soft" 5 (that is, an A-4 or 2-3 combo).

After analyzing a quarter million cribs,* Ras compiled statistics for the best discards to your own crib (see nearby table). He has categorized the 91 potential dis-

*Over the course of a decade, Ras recorded empirical data from more than 250,000 cribs in live-action games (not computer or online games). In order to provide accurate numbers, Ras did not include results against markedly inferior players but only against average and above-average tournament and club players, nor did he include the final crib of a game unless it was actually scored on the board, because end-game bias influences what a player throws in the dealer's crib.

- 2. It is acceptable to sacrifice up to two points in the hand to discard any of the pairings in the second group of discards into your own crib. On average, these discards will yield between 6.57 and 7.17 points in the crib.
- 3. The cards in Ras's third group of discards, which yield on average 5.40 to 6.42 points in the crib, may be tossed into your own crib with a sacrifice of one point in the hand.
- 4. The fourth group of discards are reasonably good discards to your own crib, but you shouldn't sacrifice any points in the hand to make them.
- 5. The fifth group (not listed) consists of everything else—the other 61 discard pairings. Make these discards when logic dictates that you hold the points in your hand. Don't break up your hand in these situations just to avoid throwing bad cards (e.g., 6-Q) into your own crib.

Interestingly, it is not until we get to the ninth discard choice (the 7-8) that we find a discard without a 5 in it. This shows the



Cribbage Board of the Month

BY JAY FULWIDER

Many of my most beautiful and unique cribbage boards are handmade. Some are made by artists, woodworkers, or metal machinists and are near perfect. Some are very crude. But they are all beautiful in their own way.

Since I have made many boards (three are pictured in fig. 1), I have de-



vised an easy way to make boards, which results in a nice board with very even holes. The following is a "how to" description with photos.


- Tools needed (fig. 2): painter's tape, pencil eraser, Sharpie pen, and a handheld high-speed drill (i.e., a Dremel drill) with both a sharp pointed conical bit and a drill bit.
- Find a cribbage board that is the size and has the hole pattern that

you want to use on the board you are making.

 Place painter's tape over the cribbage board holes and press on the tape with a rounded pen-



cil eraser until the tape is depressed into the holes (fig. 3).

 Mark the center of the holes with a Sharpie

pen. This is easy because the pen will tend to mark the low point of the depression.

 Carefully peel off the tape and place it on the board you are making. This system works well on

both flat and curved surfaces.

• Use the drill with a sharp conical bit to drill starter holes on the dots marked on the tape (fig. 4). This is very important because it will help keep your drill bit from slipping out of position when



you start the drilling process.

• Select your drill bit size and mark


it with tape for the depth you want to drill. At this point, you can drill with the Dremel tool or a small drill press

(fig. 5). Be sure that your bit size works for the pegs you will be using.

 Peel off the tape and you are done (fig. 6).

Note: to keep the brush from

moving while I worked on it, I placed it on four finishing nails driven into



the underside of the board. Sometimes it is helpful to clamp the board while drilling.

Have fun making your own cribbage board, and feel free to email me if you have questions. CW

Youth Teaching Tip

Visuals are extremely important when teaching cribbage to a large group of kids. I use an oversize cribbage board and a jumbo deck of cards to teach my initial lessons about pegging and counting hands. Both are available online (e.g., 7" x 4" playing cards may be purchased from seriousgameplay.com). Using a big cribbage board and oversize cards for all to see is much more effective than giving boards and cards to students before they understand the basic concepts of the game. If you do, you'll find that they are more of a distraction than a teaching tool.

Helen Fields (Bennington VT) is a wonderful example of a school teacher dedicated to teaching cribbage at her school. Several months ago, she requested my teaching manual. Here is an update on her efforts. She consistently has about ten seventh-grade students a week in her cribbage club who now absolutely love the game of cribbage; four faculty members have also started to come to the club to learn (or relearn) how to play. In April, an Academic Expo took place, and her youth club set up four playing tables. Dozens of people came by and played the seventh graders. As the day progressed, some visiting students discovered that their adult chaperones were cribbage players and asked them if they could start a program at their school. So it appears Helen's efforts at the expo may have further expanded a youth movement in southwest Vermont. Way to go Helen!

If you have a youth movement going on in your area, please let me know about it. Or, if you'd like to start a movement, don't hesitate to ask for a copy of my teaching manual.

hirteen Grass Roots clubs (listed on page 29) responded to Tom Lewis's request for information about how they distribute the money collected in their skunk cans. Perhaps seeing the various methods used in other clubs will inspire your club to try out some new ideas.

Most clubs collect 25¢ or 50¢ from the player who is skunked, and a few clubs double the fee for a double skunk. This money accumulates in a skunk pot/jar/can (pick one), and there are three main ways to collect money from it:

- A 29-hand frequently collects everything in the skunk jar, but sometimes only half of it.
- A 28-hand usually gets half of what's in the skunk jar, but sometimes only 25%.
- A grand slam is normally worth a set amount (\$25 or \$35), but occasionally a percentage (50% or 100%), from either the skunk jar or the club treasury.

Here are some other items of interest culled from the emails submitted that your club may find useful:

 Some clubs allow visitors and guests to be eligible for the skunk pot payout,

while most clubs do not (in which case they do not pay into the skunk can).

- Several clubs treat all hands that are eligible for skunk jar money as if they occurred at the end of the evening. This avoids a situation where someone who is eligible to collect would get nothing or very little because the skunk pot was emptied just a few minutes earlier. The total in the skunk pot is then shared between eligible hands.
- Club 175 sets a minimum win of \$20 from the skunk can. If it contains less than \$20, the club pays the prize, and the can is allowed to continue to grow. Club 68 has a similar policy: whenever the skunk pot is emptied, \$30 is added to it from the club treasury.
- Club 306 also provides a pin for people who have a 29-hand, 28-hand, or grand slam.
- Clubs 91 and 306 pay \$10 to the person who stops a grand slam in the ninth game.

One of the neatest skunk pot stories comes from Club 295 in Rochester Hills MI. Each player pays a dollar each week into a "jackpot" pool as part of their entry fee. Grand slams, 28-hands, and 29-hands are paid out of this pool.

In addition, players pay 50¢ for every skunk (\$1 for a double skunk) into a separate skunk fund. At the end of the Grass Roots season, Club 295 donates this money—usually around \$180—to a local charity. But last year they did something different with the skunk money.



Tips for Tournament Directors

When using the standard round-robin format, make sure you place the captain (sometimes called the anchor or pivot) on the correct side of the table. Here's how to tell if you've got it right. When you stand facing the end of the table, the captain should be in the first chair on the right side (see diagram). Why is this important? Because of the potential for pegging backward when a player turns around the end of the table. If the captain is on the left side of the table, players moving down the table to their right will play the captain as soon as they turn the corner. Since players have a greater tendency to peg backward right after moving to the other side of the table, this gives an unfair advantage to the captain.


