
## **Dollar Bill Cribbage**

# My Deal



Every month I have to write a 450-word essay in this space, and my goals are (a) to educate, (b) sometimes to entertain, but (c) always to be interesting. I leave it to my readers as to whether I ever hit any of these targets.

One of the challenges of writing a monthly column is settling on a topic. (Remember high school? "Write an essay on the subject of your choice.") Sometimes a theme jumps out at me from current events—both worldwide and within the ACC. Sometimes a friend or fellow BOD member suggests a subject to address. And sometimes weird circumstances fire the right synapses in my brain, which leads me down a rabbit hole to a connection that I would not have otherwise made.

But if none of these has happened in the previous month, I open my file labeled "CW\_ideas.doc" and start paging through it, waiting for inspiration to strike. What I find instead is random notes—about shuffling, spectator etiquette, the three laws of thermodynamics, good/bad play vs. good/bad cards, and much more.


Sometime I can grab one of these ideas and hammer out an editorial in twenty minutes. At other times I work on something for several hours and then trash the whole thing because it's just not coming together. But some topics need many weeks to percolate around in my mind until they make sense. (That's the problem with thermodynamics; it must have a connection with cribbage—I just need to find it!)

Even after I choose the topic, I'm still not done. I have to a pick an approach: does the topic call for straight prose, or would humor, cajoling, scolding, or preaching be better? What tone should I take to best get my point across? Have I provided the information necessary for readers to make up their minds?

Since I'm kind of a wordy guy, I generally have to trim the essay down to size. It will certainly need polishing after that, and I always have to remember to spell-chekc it, as it would never do for tpyos to appear in the premier cribbage publication in the world.

If the topic is controversial, I usually send the column to a friend or two for feedback, and then I set it aside to see how it reads later. If I'm still happy with it the next morning or after lunch, I hurry and print it before I change my mind.

Well, now I've gone and wasted my entire allotment of 450 words and still haven't settled on a topic for this month. But at least now I have another four weeks to come up with something educational, entertaining, and interesting.

#### Counting Four of a Kind

I'd like to share how I teach cribbage players how to count the four of a kind hands described in the April CW. Have the person lay out the four cards face up on the table (e.g., A-7-7-7-7). Now take the Ace and touch two 7s around all sides for 15-8 and then the two diagonals for 15-12. Now do the same thing with 3-3-3-3-6, but in this case you've already used the diagonals, so you get only 15-8. Once people see this they will actually see how to get the 15s. After doing it several times they will be able to visualize it in their mind without having to lay the cards down.

#### 28-Hand

I just read in the May CW that Bruce Bowman says it is easier to get a 28-hand holding 555T+5 than 5555+T. I disagree completely. If by chance you hold the four 5s in your hand and no T cards (faces or 10s) for the other two cards and your opponent does not hold any faces or 10s, that leaves forty cards to cut from, with sixteen T cards available—a 2/5 or 40% chance to cut a T card. On the other hand, holding 555T leaves the hopes of cutting the last 5 card out of 40 cards, which is 1/40 or 2.5% chance to get a 28-hand. These are the only legit math equations to use.

#### 28-Hand Redux

I'd like to offer my view of the chances of

getting a 28-hand. If you hold three 5s and a ten card, your chances of cutting the fourth 5 as starter to make a 28-hand are 1 in 46 (the number of cards in the deck that you don't hold). If you hold four 5s, the chances of cutting a ten card, if you didn't discard any, are 16 in 46, or approximately 1 in 3. So, I would say it is 16 times more likely to end up with a 28-hand if you hold all four 5s than if you need to cut the fourth 5.

#### **Old Habits**

They say old habits are hard to break, and this [putting the 5 in your own crib; see May CW, page 26] would be a good example. You are saying to break up a double run in order to put points in the crib. That is going to be hard for me to do after years of hearing "never break up a double run."

Capital City Robert Beckman (Cannon Falls MN) had both a 28-hand and 24-hand in a single game—and still lost by one point!

Houdini Challenge He's played a lot of cribbage in his ninety years, but Life Master (★★★) Bob Julian (Franklin WI) has never ever received a drubbing like that served up by Life Master (★) Richard "Frosty" Frost (Berlin WI) in the consolation—an 83-point loss! To add insult to injury, Bob was also skunked in his next game.

Bobby Stuart Atlanta Classic Don Lukas (Marietta GA) was skunked in his first two games on Saturday morning, but the cards changed and the next day he was playing Life Master Henry Douglass (Reidsville NC) for the championship. While the smart money might have been on Henry and his 7,500+ lifetime MRPs, Donwith only 78 MRPs prior to this event-managed to capture the title, trophy, and Henry's side pool in five games. Those first two skunks were long forgotten! Meanwhile, Grand Master David O'Neil (Clarkston GA) cut a swath through 34 players on Friday night and through 26 players on Saturday night to take first place in both satellites. ## Tips for Tournament Players

## Pay attention to the announced time for playoffs

If you are uncertain of the time (or were talking when the announcement was made!), ask the tournament director after the qualifying round. Do not rely on a buddy or another player or something you read on twitter to give you accurate information. Showing up at the wrong time can cost you a lot of grief and money.

Here's how it works. If you are not present at the start of your playoff match, you forfeit the first game after five minutes. Subsequent games are forfeited every fifteen minutes, until the match is over. This means that you will lose a best-of-five match after 35 minutes. And a best-of-three match goes down the tubes in a mere 20 minutes.

While forfeiters are still eligible to receive prize money and MRPs, wouldn't you rather play the match and have a chance to move on to the next round—and maybe even win the tournament?

## Crib\_Pointers

any people were taught to never break up a double run when it is their crib. While generally sound advice, this is not an unbreakable rule. One obvious example is an end-game situation where you need only four points. If the dealer is close enough

ing more than four points in the hand. In hands with big scoring potential (more than eight points), ask two questions: (1) Did I stay within the sacrifice limits? (2) Do I still have a potential of 12 or more points in my hand? If the answer to both

## Tip #6 Put the 5 in your crib—again!

to peg out, you'll want to break up, say, 2-3-3-4 and instead hold an "out" card; for example, holding 2-3-4-Q or 2-3-Q-K is much safer because it gives you some flexibility in pegging that you would not have if you held the intact double run.

Another example involves double runs that have a 5, as discussed in last month's column. CW asked pegging guru, HOF member, and Life Master (\*\*) Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen (Napavine WA) for some additional support of this idea. Here are some excepts from Ras's email:

"Tossing the 5 to your own crib is a good thing if you are not giving up more than two points in the hand. As a rule, dump 5-5 to your crib when not sacrific-

- Use only American dollar bills.
- All eight numbers must be used (ignore any letters in the serial numbers).
- Count only 15-2 combinations, runs (straights), and two or more of a kind, using standard scoring (rule 1.7 of the ACC rulebook). There are no flushes or nobs. For the record, a quintuple (i.e., five of a kind) is worth 20 points (apart from any 15-2 combos and straights), but you'll have to determine the value of six, seven, or eight of a kind.
- Straights must be made as long as possible. For example, serial number 2-3-4-5-5-6-7-9 would be counted as two six-card runs and a pair of 5s for 14 (plus the 15-2 combinations). The same rule applies to triple runs, double-double

- runs, and so on.
- Zero (0) counts as 10, with a value of 10. It can be combined with 8-9 to make a run, but not with 1-2. That is, 8-9-0 is a legitimate run, but 0-1-2 is not.
- One (1) counts as an Ace, with a value of 1. It can be combined with 2-3 to make a run.
- If you overcount your bill, you will receive credit only for its actual value. For example, if your bill has 56 points and you submit an answer of 60, you will be credited with 56.
- If you undercount your bill, you will receive credit only for as many points as you claim. For example, if your bill has 56 points and you submit an answer of 50, you will be credited with 50.

The results of the April CW Opinion Poll are in—and a filibuster-proof majority of ACC members want flexibility: 56 of 92 respondents (60.9%) want to read *Cribbage World* both online and in hard copy. Only 14.1% (13 respondents) wanted to access CW only online, and 25% (23 respondents) want to read CW only in hard copy.

If these numbers hold across the entire ACC, this means that 969 members prefer not to get a paper copy of CW in their mailbox each month, which means we could save 116,280 sheets of paper—or 232 reams or 1,250 pounds—each year.

## Youth Teaching Tip

Over the last few months, I have received four emails from players saying that they got the impossible—an actual 19-point hand! In each instance they described the same hand: 5-5-5-J plus cutting a face card that yields nobs. In responding to each party, the same thing held true: they forgot to count the three 5s for an additional two points. Sometimes kids think they are experts at cribbage well before they truly know the game. My teaching manual provides two excellent quizzes to test those that may think they have mastered the game.
