National Open

he 37th National Open Cribbage Tournament the "granddaddy" of all cribbage tournaments and the birthplace of the ACC—was held in late July in Raleigh NC. Directed by **Catherine and Russ Perkins**, this year's tourney was attended by 165 players.

The unusual format of the NOCT—double elimination match play, with muggins—is much loved by players in the Central and Eastern Regions, but drew only three players from elsewhere. North Carolina, of course, had the largest contingent (52 players). Other states with a large number of players were Florida (22), Virginia (18), and Massachusetts (17).

My Deal




Jeanne Hofbauer's "President's Column" on page 19—should youths be allowed to play in tournaments?—is especially timely.

It's no secret that the ACC has been treading water in recent years. For the past dozen years we've hovered around the 7,000-member mark (see nearby table). No one expects us to be at either extreme: growing faster than a speeding bullet or shrinking faster than a punctured balloon. Regardless, it still amazes me that we add 900 to 1,000 new members each year. But at this point a light bulb should come on above the head of each reader: for

this means that we also *lose* 900 to 1,000 members every year!


It is an unavoidable fact of life that some dear friends won't be with us at this time next year. Any organization with a lot of older members goes through the grieving process more frequently than, say, the Boy Scouts or Little League. But we're not dying off at the rate of 1,000 per year. Which means that many members simply fail to renew their membership. ACC membership secretary Larry Hassett identifies the problem: "Getting new members is not our problem; keeping the ones we have is the problem."

This failure to hang on to members should bother us—on multiple levels. Collectively as an organization, we should be concerned about the long-term future of the ACC. Will the ACC be around in



ten, twenty, fifty years? Will our children and grandchildren enjoy the same privilege of playing in the organization that has meant so much to us?

Individually, if you—or I—have turned someone off of the ACC, if we have not made their initial foray into organized cribbage as enjoyable as possible, if we have given them reason to think that all ACC members are obsessed with winning continued on page 12

MRPs Just for Showing Up?

In the Sunday consolation, I won six of nine games and did not qualify. I departed feeling low. Suggestion: reward all who enter a tournament 10 MRPs, with maybe 5 MRPs for satellite players. I believe this would help increase attendance.

Editor's note: At one time MRPs were awarded for several criteria that are no longer used: (1) simply participating in a tournament, (2) the number of years a tournament had been held, (3) the number of states represented, and (4) the payback percentage. The BOD abolished these practices in 1984

in an effort to achieve a more equitable system of allocating MRPs.

World's Longest Long Match

Last month, we reached another milestone as we eclipsed the 14,000-game mark. As of August 2, 2010, the tally was 7,072 losses for **Steven D. Shambeau** and 6,979 for **Stephen F. at any cost—are we willing to take responsibility for our actions and change our off-putting behavior?

Leadership at the local level—that is, club and tournament directors—should be worried when attendance at their clubs and tourneys continues to drop, when new players pop in once or twice and never again, when established players drop out of circulation.

And our national leadership—the Board of Directors—should be spending many hours working to solve this problem. It seems, however, that too much of the BOD's time is focused on matters that affect only a small number of players. Rather than try to figure out why members are not renewing, there is a tendency to pretend that we're at our optimum size.

Sure, it's important to revisit the rule-book every few years to make sure that the rules are written and applied fairly. It's vital that we iron out policy issues. And it's absolutely imperative that we examine the organization's finances in detail in order to insure our fiscal well-being.

But these things are not why any of us joined the ACC. We joined because we love this game and want to play it in an organized fashion with like-minded enthusiasts. The all-important issue of member retention should, therefore, be hauled onto center stage where it belongs, and our petty obsessions with peripheral matters should be shooed back into the wings where they belong.

So what can we do about our downward trend? First, we need to make every ACC cribbage venue—whether Grass Roots clubs, sanctioned tournaments, or internet rooms—the setting for the highest sportsmanship possible. All mem-

bers—not just BOD members and tournament directors—need to sound three notes: fair play, acceptance of all players, and a fun-fill atmosphere.

The BOD should give serious consideration to hiring a marketer/promoter. Here are just a few things that a marketer could do for us: issue press releases for every sanctioned tournament, help tournament directors prepare advertising material for their local market, place ads in national print publications, increase our online presence, work with service organizations to promote cribbage among their members, replicate around the nation cribbage promotions like those held yearly at the Washington State Fair—and the list goes on. Perhaps the most important thing a savvy marketer could do for us would be to think outside the box. We need to find new and creative ways to attract—and keep-members.

Until we take the momentous step of hiring a marketer, we should at least support the provisional efforts of people like Norm Nikodym to promote the ACC in southern California. Elsewhere, ACC members in the Orlando area can support the ACC's cribbage promotion at the AARP meeting in late September. (To help out, contact Cathy Perkins or Sue Rasmussen.) With just a little effort, local clubs can advertise online or in print. And all ACC members need to support the Youth Program and tourneys directed by Dan Zeisler—or start one of you own!

So this brings me back to Jeanne's presidential comments. I can't figure out why any director would refuse to let a young person play in their tournament or club.

If the legal requirements have been met (Jeanne's first two points), there are only continued next page

three things that a youth player needs to be able to do: (a) count their hands themselves; (b) play a game in fifteen minutes; and (c) have a long enough attention span to play the entire tournament.

We need to create an atmosphere in clubs and at tournaments so that when youths do attend, they aren't put off by a bunch of grumpy old men (and women) sitting around spouting off rules or enforc-

ing penalties. Let's not be so focused on winning ("über-focused," as today's teens might say) that we drive away a whole generation. Let's make sure we attract them to the world's greatest card game and not push them away to Texas Hold 'Em.

There's no single cure for what ails us. But I hope that these seminal thoughts will get all of us thinking—and acting—in the best interests of the ACC.



CW Contest #8 Results

Nearly 120 envelopes were received for CW Contest #8—Dollar Bill Cribbage—and in the process over \$250 was raised for the ACC Youth Program!

It was obvious that entrants found it hard, if not downright difficult, to count cribbage hands with eight numbers. (Aren't you glad that regular cribbage uses only five cards

The President's Column



I have been questioned numerous times about young people participating in tournament play, mostly about kids under eighteen years of age. The ACC's policy on this (for as long as I can remember) is a four-step elimination process, as follows:

- 1. It must be legal within the state.
- 2. It must be allowed by the venue (playing site).
- 3. It must be allowed by the tournament director.
- 4. It must be allowed by the parents or guardian.

As far as #1 goes, if it is legal for adults to play, it is usually okay for kids too.

As to #2, there are many tournaments being held in casinos now. Some casinos will not allow anyone under 21 to play, but many of them consider the playing areas as "convention settings" and allow kids in this area. Tournaments held in bars, taverns, or clubs will probably require that participants be over 21.

Item #4 should not need any explanation.

The most questioned condition is, of course, #3. I must state that a kid should be able to play a game within a fifteenminute time limit and should play a fairly good game, be knowledgeable of basic ACC rules, and have the attention span and endurance to play the amount of games required.

I have been asked why a tournament

director would not let a young person play in their tournament or Grass Roots club, when the BOD is trying to get them involved in playing cribbage, as is evident in its support of the Youth Program, various youth tournaments, and the Cribadier General Program. Also the ACC's aims and objectives, as listed in the rulebook, state that we are to promote the game and developing programs for the benefit of our members. The BOD has thus empowered tournament directors with the right to reject someone from their tournaments, with the understanding that they do not abuse that privilege. So, it is a matter of the tournament/club director's choice whether to allow a young person to play.

My personal experience with kids playing has been overwhelmingly great, and I have never seen a disruption caused by a younger player. Sadly, there is not a great groundswell of young players who want to participate. I personally think that we should welcome them with open arms and hope that there will be more following the few we have. These kids will help this organization to continue on in the future.

Cribbage Board of the Month

Rown as the Curtis Cribbage Counter, this cribbage board was patented in 1951 by the Curtis Products Company of North Woodstock NH.

which is considered the first leg. You then flip the leg counter (on the left of the board in this view) and resume counting the second leg from zero.

The sliding pegs are not removable. The first score for



each player is recorded by sliding the outer peg, and the second score is made with the inner peg. After that, it alternates and essentially mimics the leapfrog scoring we use today.

The count goes only to sixty,

The Curtis Counter was primarily a cribbage board, but it was also used for other counting games like whist, pinochle, and dominoes.

iligent readers of this column know how important it is for the dealer to put the 5 in the crib (see July CW, pages 12–13). On occasion, however, it is equally important to keep the 5 in your hand because it is the key card to holding your points.

Tip #8 Lead the 5

The 5 is also the most susceptible to being trapped and giving up costly pegging points to your opponent. To prevent this, you can do one of two things: put the 5 in the crib, or lead it.

If you must keep the 5, then it's time to learn a basic principle of pegging succinctly called "get rid of the danger card as soon as safely possible lest it cost you more points and you end up regretting ever holding the damn 5 in the first place!"

Leading the 5 in the first run-up to 31 had many advantages, and these are skillfully discussed by Life Master (**) Larry Samet (Wellesley Hills MA) in the January 2009 CW, pages 26–27. This column discusses leading the 5 in the second run-up to 31.

After the first pegging sequence, you are holding 5 plus another card, let's say a 9. The two cards played by your opponent so far are 2-8. Since your grandma taught

HOMEWORK

Before keeping a 5 as the last card in your hand, always check to see if your opponent has played a 5 or a face card. If they have not, then consider whether it's better to lead the 5 to keep it from being trapped.

you to never lead the 5 because it's likely to give up a 15-2, you decide to lead the 9, and here's what happens:

you:	9		5	
dealer:		6 (2 pts.)		7 (4 pts.)

This scenario could play out in several different ways:

dealer:		3		4 (4 pts.)
you:	9		5 (2 pts.)	
dealer:		5		5 (7 pts.)

What just happened in all of these situations is that you blindly walked into a minefield and allowed your 5 to be trapped in a run or a triple. Which is too bad, since this was entirely avoidable.

Leading the 5 would have reduced the dealer's pegging points to a single go in the first two situations and three points in the last. Instead of being outscored 0-6, 0-4, and 2-7, the pegging would have been much more balanced: 0-1 in the first two cases and 0-3 in the last.

So here's a rule of thumb to protect your 5: on the *second* pegging run-up to 31, lead the 5 (a) if your opponent hasn't played a face card or a 5 in her first two cards and (b) if the opponent looks likely to have held two cards that could trap your 5 (e.g., 3-4, 4-6, 6-7, or 5-5). Your opponent may occasionally score 15-2 when you do this, but it's cheaper to give up two points by leading the 5 than to lead your other card and give up a run of three or a trip. CW




