My Deal by David Aiken



During the four years that I've served on the Board of Directors, the #1 time-consuming issue was the backward-pegging rule. This controversy—which devoured more of our discussion time and generated more emails than any other BOD concern—ultimately filled exactly two lines and eleven words in the rulebook.

Item #18 on the BOD's September agenda in Reno—which read as follows: "Proposal to change the All American Team Award"—has the very real chance of eclipsing backward pegging as the next big consumer of cribbage bandwidth.

After a long discussion in which opponents basically talked past each other, the BOD voted to replace the current All American team (top ten nationwide) with an All Star team composed of the top eight players from each region, effective retroactively to the beginning of the current cribbage season.

Before twenty-four hours had passed, I was verbally accosted several times about this vote, cussed out, and flipped off. And when I got home the emails started flying. Not just a couple—but dozens of emails from All Americans past and present, from All American wannabes, from people who

weren't even at the BOD meeting, from anyone who had an opinion on this decision and felt obligated to let everyone know that opinion.

Some letters were well reasoned, others were equally impassioned, and still others were merely rants. In order to provide a variety of viewpoints on this topic, this CW prints a representative selection of these emails. If you're interested, here are some talking points to help us think through this issue; but if you're not, then turn directly to page 16 to see what others had to say.

- There seems to be some confusion—even among BOD members—as to whether the All American award was *abolished* or *expanded*. That is, was this award summarily executed, or was it enlarged from ten to twenty-four honorees?
- The concept of "All American" affects very few ACC members. At the end of each season, only ten players of nearly seven thousand ACC members are All Americans. That's somewhere a little north of one-tenth of one percent. Not only are most ACC members not affected by this award, most don't care. Several writers argue that the ACC should give continued on page 20

Bob Joslin (Lakeville MN) Life Master #186





A selection of letters on the BOD decision about All American award.

We had 93 tournaments in the West and 91 in the East/Central combined. What's the problem? 98% of ACC members enjoy going to a few tournaments and could care less about these awards, but as one of those players commented, "Playing someone in the Top Ten and beating them is one of the biggest thrills to going to tournaments." The current definition of an All American is one who finishes in the Top Ten in the overall ACC standings. It's an award with a 31-year tradition. ACC legends Colvert, Toll, Hatcher, Heath, Ras, Julian, Steinmetz, Jarrell, Schmidt, Hall, Langley, and so on are on the lifetime All American list multiple times. The ACC can make awards on averages, regional top eight finishers, number of tournaments attended, and so on. Make new categories of awards. We should not eliminate some of our ACC history by abolishing or modifying the traditional All American award.

Dan Marsh (Eugene OR)

The discontinuance of the All American Team honors is certainly a negative solution to the underlying problem, which is regional imbalance. Don Brown and I offered a practical solution to that problem at the BOD meeting in Portland four years ago, which was soundly rejected by the cadre of the BOD. That solution still exists and could be implemented with a minimal revision of the handbook and the constitution.

Graeme Gossett (Prineville OR)

The news of no more All Americans sounds

like sour grapes to me. This is the first time all are from the West Region, and they do away with it.

Charles Dunn (South San Francisco CA)

Any way we go with this, there is always going to be opposition. The best idea I heard is maybe three to five All Americans from every region.

Erik Locke (Portland OR)

The following info is based on the 2010-2011 season. Distances include a corridor 100 miles wide for areas with a concentration of events. The number of members listed is from the states within the area described. Western Region (109 tournaments): California (1,182 members) had 34 tournaments from Crescent City to La Mesa (850 miles); Oregon/Washington (1.170 members) had 33 tournaments. from Medford OR to Port Orchard WA (450 miles). Central Region (44) had 40 tournaments from St. Cloud MN to Grand Rapids MI (1,321 members—650 miles). Eastern Region (49) had 30 tournaments from Yarmouth MA to Virginia Beach VA (916 members—620 miles); the Southeast had only 12 tournaments over a 600-mile stretch from Raleigh NC to Orlando FL (498 members). To have a good shot at the All American team, you need to travel outside your area. If you think you are on the short end of the stick, what about the 1,800 members in Canada, Alaska, Hawai'i, and other areas without a concentration of tournaments. The BOD needs to reinstate the All American team. It never should have been dropped.

Larry Hassett (Roseburg OR)

The 2010–2011 All American team is all from the Western Region, but yet those ten are made to feel undeserving, unappreciated, unworthy, unaccomplished, and downright unsupported from the BOD, whose majority vote eliminated the traditional Top Ten All American team at the September meeting in Reno. If you want to give out more awards, then great! But don't water down a 31-year history by saying that the All American team is simply an "attendance" award. Guess what? If All American is an attendance award, then every achievement award from Master to Life Master (6★) should be labeled as simply an attendance award too. It doesn't seem too meaningful or significant when labeled as such. Two possible solutions: (1) Create more awards, but don't take away established awards (like All American) nor take away their significance. (2) Grow up and accept the fact that not everybody gets a trophy!

Julie Mack-Felkins (Woodland CA)

With everybody complaining from the Central and East—whining about the West—maybe the West should just boycott all tournaments in the Central and East. The All American team award was voted on several years ago when the Central and East ruled. Now the West has taken over and outnumbered them they can't stand it.

Ratso Roderick Jr. (Woodburn OR)

I find the fairness issue in regards to the All American team absurd at best. I live in California, but I am very isolated. The closest interstate is 150 miles of mountainous roads away from my house. When I go to a tournament it is a major commitment in time, money, and driving distance. Last

year I attended 28 tournaments and had 1,158 MRPs. Tom Langford, Rick Shea and I, who all live 150 miles away from an interstate, would've all made the Central and Eastern All Star teams attending less than 30 tournaments each. If fairness is the criteria, the majority of the players in the West are really the members who are at a disadvantage. In the west, you have to attend a minimum of 40 tournaments to get the same recognition a player in the East or Central can get playing in 20–25 tournaments. *This isn't fair*. The BOD needs to reconsider this knee-jerk decision.

Tom Cookman (Eureka CA)

In my opinion, the BOD made two wrong decisions about the All American award. The first mistake was to do away with the All American award all together. The second mistake was to do away with it retroactively after being two months into the cribbage year. I think this decision is a plain lack of consideration for those who had already made a commitment to try to reach this personal goal for this year. There are more than several people (not just in the Western Region) who started this year having made a personal commitment to attain All American status and all the time, travel, and expenses that go with it! Now to address the overall issue at hand. Is the All American award fair? No. It is not fair. It never was fair. It never will be fair. So, what is the All American award? It is an award to honor and recognize the achievement of ten individuals who through skill, luck, perseverance, time, and energy to invest in playing in tournaments throughout the year and, in most cases, all over the country who attain the highest ten MRP totals. This decision by the BOD is taking

out more awards; if the All American award was expanded to twenty-four (see above point), then that's exactly what happened.

- The recent BOD decision was *not* a tug-of-war pitting the Western Region against the combined strength of the Eastern and Central Regions. While the item was placed on the BOD agenda by two Eastern Region representatives, the motion itself was both made and seconded by Western Region reps, and it passed by a 14-9 vote. In addition, at least one BOD member from both the Eastern and Central Regions voted against the proposal.
- The old All American system was perceived to be unfair to players in the Central and Eastern regions. But in reality it was also unfair to the vast majority of players in the Western Region. A more pertinent issue might be how to honor topnotch players who—because of family, financial, health, or other considerations—cannot play more than a half dozen tournaments each year.
- One email writer attempted to tally up the number of All Americans from each region to show that the old system was fair. Where this email goes astray is in counting only the different individuals who made All American—regardless of how many times they made the Top Ten (for example, DeLynn Colvert was counted only once instead of the twenty-two times he has been All American). Under this wrongheaded approach, the Central Region led the All American parade by 40.6% over the Western's 39.9% and the Eastern's 19.4%. A much more useful tally is the number of All Americans from each region. In the 31-year

history of this award, there have been 311 All Americans (in 1994 there was a tie for tenth place). Ignoring nine players who were later expelled, the regional distribution of the remaining All Americans looks like this:

Region	All Americans	percent

Central	108	35.76

For the record, a chart of all 302 All Americans, by region and year, is printed on the next page.

- Bob Milk created a useful map of where tournaments are held. I can't reproduce it here, but you can check it yourself: communitywalk.com/acc_tournament _20102011/map/1447945
- Players in sports that have an All American or All Star team—think baseball, football, or basketball—play an equal number of games (barring injury or getting benched by the coach) as they compete for these awards. And in an individual sport like golf—where the Fed-Ex Cup is worth millions of dollars to the best player of the year—the playing field is narrowed several times, with all points being reset to zero so that players who compete in more tournaments don't have an unfair advantage.
- Players in all three regions have their share of struggles in getting to tournaments (see, for example, Tom Cookman's letter on page 17). But I'm always amused when Central and Eastern players are told to host more tournaments if they want more players on the All American team. I'd be happy to have a player from sunny southern California or mild western Washington travel


eleven hours with me from Grand Rapids MI to Turtle Lake WI during January. Not only is there this little puddle called Lake Michigan that we have to go around, but try tackling Chicago traffic—on a Friday afternoon—during a blizzard! Travel plans are, at best, tenuous for five months of the year.

This issue will almost certainly be discussed at the next BOD meeting, which

will probably solicit another round of emails. As always, I'm open to having a *serious* discussion about this—or any—issue. In the meantime, let's play nice.

All American Controversy—continued from page 17 away a personal incentive from the entire membership of the ACC.

Jim Crawford (Mountain View CA)

All American honors could be determined this way. If a player finishes in the top four of a main tournament, points would be awarded on a 5-3-1-1 basis. A player finishing in the top two positions of a consolation would be awarded either 4 or 2 points. The number of points needed to earn All American honors would be 15. This benefits all players. For example: To earn All American honors without incur-

ring the cost of traveling down south or out west in order to earn the MRPs necessary under the current system, people in the Northeast could earn that honor by playing in only the New England tournaments. The same could be said for peggers everywhere. At the beginning of the season, every ACC member could aspire to earn All American honors, not just those who travel the country playing in 30–35 tournaments. To restrict All American honors to a select few (as is the case presently) cheapens the prestige of the award.

Youth Teaching Tip

Once you have established a core group of students who attend your classes on a regular basis and truly understand the concepts of cribbage, it's time to conduct a youth cribbage tournament. This will generate a new level of enthusiasm for the game. My teaching manual (available by request at the email address below) has a section on how to set up and conduct a youth event. Here are some keys to make the tournament successful. For ages 11 and under, do a six-game event with a thirty-minute time limit per game. For ages 12-18, make it a nine-game tourney with a twenty-minute time limit. Give a raffle ticket to anyone who scores a 16-hand or higher and conduct a raffle after the preliminary rounds. Make all playoffs the best two of three, with the final match three of five if the players aren't too tired. Provide beautiful trophy boards for the top players in your event. (You can obtain these by requesting them at the email address below.) Finally, send me the results so I can list the winners in Cribbage World.

Years Ago in the ACC



MA) proposed that "a true national championship, based on *significant* head-to-head play among the top 16, 32, or 64 players, could also be exciting and of media and publicity value."







A few weeks ago I sent an open letter to the Cribbage Board Collectors Society annual meeting requesting anyone and everyone to contact me if they wanted to chat about their cribbage boards, and I wasn't disappointed. A week or two after the meeting, I opened my email to a message titled "I Know More About Cribbage Boards Than You Do" and soon thereafter found myself sharing a sub and a beer with Peter Leach, a fellow St. Paulite with a penchant for pegging.

In the late '90s, board collecting became a hobby and obsession for Peter. Over the years, he's amassed more than 700 items in his collection, although through board swapping, sales, and a few giveaways he never has more than a few hundred in his collection at any time. The best are displayed in a special place; he leads me down a hallway of his St. Paul home to a door barely cracked open, the light from within spilling around its frame. Lit thus, a heavenly glow surrounds the door, while a brass plaque upon it invites passersby to the "Board Room." He turns the handle, and we enter the most cribbage-filled room I've ever seen.

A bathroom, as a matter of fact.

Boards on the walls. Boards above the sink. Boards above the door. Brass boards and wood boards and marble boards, a hedgehog board and a button board, boards from the U.P., from L.A., from NYC. A board that proclaims "Use England's Glory Matches" and another—"Lash's

Bitters"—for "dyspepsia, indigestion, and biliousness." An iron board shaped like a conch shell and a wooden board like a boat. A board carved with a jackknife. The board he learned on, a fraternity board

from the University of Wisconsin, with the Greek letters "Sigma, Alpha, Epsilon" painted across the face. So many boards.

"When I started, I never NEVER could have envisioned the variety. There's no end to them, simply no end. When I first started out, any 2x4 with holes




A small sampling of Peter's collection
