A couple weeks ago at club, I heard a new player say something very profound about the game of cribbage.

Nate Bozman is a new ACC member and new to our club. He joined the Grand Rapids Square Peggers in early March and earned points in two of his first three weeks, so he's no slouch at the cribbage board.

One night, Nate and I were in the middle of an intense pegging battle, with each of us playing offense during the pegging, yet wary of our opponent's every move. I was fortunate to get the better of him in both this particular pegging sequence and the game. At the conclusion of our skirmish, Nate shook my hand and said, "If it was easy, it wouldn't be fun!"

I'm sure that this sentiment is not original with Nate, but I've never heard another cribbage player—novice or expert—express it exactly like this. Sure, we play the game for fun, but sometimes our motives get twisted up in the hunt for points, cash, or trophies.

Anyway, Nate's comment got me thinking about what constitutes fun while playing cribbage.


Sure, it's great to reel off nine straight victories for a grand slam. But nothing gets your heart beating a little faster than to lose your first three games—and then "win out" to get GRPs for the night. This is crunch time: you've already caught your limit in the loss column, so with your back to the wall and your nose to the grindstone, you buckle down and win six

games in a row. Now that's fun! (For added pleasure, try losing your first four—even five—games at club and get points!)

In a crucial (read: must-win) game near the end of the qualifying round, your opponent starts with a 24-hand out of the gate, while you have only two points. Again, you discipline yourself to play board position, make smart plays, and through a little bit of luck and a lot of skill, you are able to claim a victory despite what at one time looked like an insurmountable lead. Now isn't that much more enjoyable than skunking your opponent?

So you managed to make the playoffs at a weekend tournament, but now face a formidable opponent. Drat! You lose the cut, then the first two games, and are facing early elimination. You hang in there and win game three, then steal game four, and somehow manage to win a squeaker in the fifth game. Few things get the adrenalin pumping faster than that. (Note: don't try this too often if you have a weak heart!)

Cribbage isn't always easy, but if it was easy, it wouldn't be fun! CW

Among other things, the St. Croix Casino is known for paying handsomely for 28-hands (see above list). Here is a tale of three "almost" 28-hands at the April tourney.

After the lunch break on Saturday, Steve Steinmetz (Caledonia WI) started with a \$250 bang. In his very first hand, he got a 28-hand and was on Cloud Nine. The game was voided, the 28-hand was a phantom, and the \$250 never hit Steve's pocket!

Some thirty years later, DeLynn scored his 35,000th MRP on March 27 in Tempe AZ—and earned the ACC's first Six Star rating. In that thirty-year period, DeLynn entered 822 sanctioned events—driving approximately 1,100,000 miles—throughout the United States, Mexico, and Can-

was a deckhand on a Great Lakes freighter, a paratrooper in the Korean War, the recipient of the first Master of Fine Arts degree awarded by the University of Montana, a cartographer (he printed 400,000 Missoula city maps), a portrait artist, a muralist (he created a 6' x 48' mosaic mural from raw clay, with 100,000 tesserae grouted in place), a semipro baseball

player for twenty years, cocaptain of the University of Montana baseball team, a technical illustrator with an engineering group, and a watercolorist (he spent three months in Mexico and eight months in Europe, painting hundreds of watercolors). He is also an avid golfer.

DeLynn was editor of *Cribbage World* for 202 issues from 1990 to 2006, served as ACC president for several years, and was elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame in 1989. He also wrote the definitive book on cribbage: *Play Winning Cribbage*—now in its fourth edition.

But for all the varied

experiences in DeLynn's life, he says that cribbage is far and away the most fascinating, because the numbers never cease to

titillate and entice players to see if they can master this simple, frustrating game. And after thirty years, he says that perhaps it is impossible! But that doesn't stop him—and some 7,000 ACC members—from giving it the good old college try week in

ada and won 72 of them: 47 mains and 25 consolations. He earned All American honors twenty-one times and won his first national championship in 1986 with a now-laughable 831 MRPs (now it takes 2,000+ to win that honor). He added national championships in 1991, 1997, and 1998.



Cribbage Board of the Month

mentioned last month that I went to Reno in February for the TOC and JPW/ACC Open. For those of you who haven't gone to Reno for these tournaments, don't pass up the chance to go. It is a lot of fun, and you will meet a bunch of fine ACC folks from all over the United States and Canada. I very much enjoyed talk-



ing with players about their favorite cribbage boards and some of their cribbage board discoveries.

I obtained this month's board from ACC member **S. J. "Bud" Ferrigno** (Canby OR). Bud and I met in Reno, and I was able to persuade him to part with this "Peg O'Matic" cribbage board.

Probably made in the 1960s, this board was distributed by the "Heines Publishing Co., Inc. of Minneapolis, Minnesota 55401." This date is based on several factors: (1) the Peg O'Matic Company was in business from the early 1960s through 1975; (2) the board and box both say "Patent Pending," which indicates it is an early version; and (3) the company address has a ZIP

code, and these codes were not used until 1963. This particular board was sold by L. W. Robinson Co. for \$8.95. If any ACC members know anything about L. W. Robinson, please let me know.

The Peg O'Matic is a style of board called a "hedgehog board." The permanent pegs are pushed down as you move

around the board. When you turn onto the next street, you push down both ends of the previous street to reset the pegs, and the springs return the street to its original position. This intricate and unique design was not, however, new in the 1960s. John Gill Mfg. of New York City sold a metal hedgehog board under U.S. Patent #40,999, issued 12/22/1863.

"There're only two types of people in this world," I've heard; "those who love cribbage, and those who don't know how to play."

Boy, isn't that the truth.

Earlier this year I decided to do something different with my free time, so I joined the ACC. Like many, I've played the game since I was a youngster, but knew little about organized cribbage. I received a copy of *Cribbage World* and a funny little card reading "MN-1694" next to my name. I met the Twin City Peggers, made the qualifying round in my first tournament, and decided on a whim to book a flight to Reno last February. But even the ACC, I learned, is just a small part of a much larger culture.

As a game and pastime, cribbage *endures*. Cribbage *survives*. I began asking myself—and others—just why that is. I decided to write an article about it. I've been down the rabbit hole ever since.

In the earliest months of this project, I've met or spoken to many of this magazine's contributors. I had the pleasure of losing—badly, I might add—to Herschel Mack on his way to the championship in Reno. I met the man behind the world's largest cribbage board, spoke to a neuropathologist about the links of cribbage and brain function, interviewed a submariner or two about cribbage in the briny deeps, and much more. I've found cribbage on mountaintops, inside Chinese classrooms, on the bus of professional sports teams, even swinging its hips on the Canadian Elvis Tribute Circuit. I've been asked to peg for charity, playing all night to give others a brighter day.

There is much to share. Cribbage offers much to celebrate. Stay tuned!

Top 100 Revisited

In regards to the skill/luck and number of tournaments attended, my good friend and cribbage idol is Frank Danielski, who is a very skilled player. When Bob Julian was in his prime and going to a lot of tournaments, he used to be high in the ratings. Meanwhile Frank would not go to as many as Bob but would end up right with him in points. Frank has been on the All Star Team several times, too.

Paul Barnes (Daytona Beach FL)

I found the article on the Top 100 to be truly educating, but was surprised that no mention was made as to how the number of opportunities affects one's chances to make the list. Many ACC players have never been in the Top 100, and yet they are just as good at playing this game as those who regularly make it. This is not meant to take anything away from those who regularly make the Top 100, but merely to point out that those competing for Top 100 honors are a relatively small percentage of the overall ACC membership. Since few players have the finances, time, or inclination to play in enough tournaments to actually compete for these honors, then it seems that a discrepancy exists as to the emphasis placed upon those making the Top 100 each year. So how do we level the playing field? How do we resolve this discrepancy? In baseball the best hitter each year is not the player who got the most hits, but the player who had the best batting average. And so it should be in cribbage. The Top 100 players would still compete for top honors each year,

but more new names would start to make regular appearances. If we want to truly honor the best cribbage players each year, we need a statistic that reflects a player's average. The BOD might want to address this issue.

Bruce McGillivray (Lake Almanor CA)

The player who wrote about the quality of the top 100 players in a recent issue and CW's response may be clarified by analogy to three bowlers. Bowler A had a 240+ season average bowling in one league. Bowler B averages 210 in five leagues per week. Bowler C substituted only twice in league play and had an 800 series. If the Top 100 bowlers are determined using a system that rewards each 200+ game and each 600+ series, Bowler A may not make the list if there are one hundred players similar to Bowler B who did make it due to volume and adequate ability. Bowler C, with one great accomplishment, does not have enough attempts to clearly show his true ability. Under another set of criteria, Bowler A would have easily been at or near the top. In the ACC some players fall into the Top 100 due to quantity of tournaments played, but they still need at least adequate ability. And some with exceptional skills go unlisted in the top rankings due to significantly less tournaments played. Points per tournament would be an interesting comparison but difficult to track and more work for directors. The ACC's rating system isn't perfect, but it is the way we currently rank players. Don't let the statistics be the primary reason for play-continued on next page

The results of the March poll are in, and an overwhelming proportion of the voters favor allowing exceptions to random seating at tournaments: 108 respondents voted yes (82%) versus 24 who voted no (18%).

The "other" category included (1) distribution of judges evenly throughout the playing room, especially at big tournaments; (2) significant others in addition to spouses; and (3) logistical decisions by tournament directors to fill in gaps in the seating arrangement.

Youth Teaching Tip

Once you've taught a classroom of children how to play cribbage, try and find the time to teach them doubles cribbage as well. Doubles offers kids an opportunity to learn different strategies as well as practice small-group socialization skills. I recommend that you choose doubles partners ahead of time rather than having the students pick their own partners. By choosing their partners you will assure that nobody gets alienated and their feelings hurt, which is counterproductive to what you are trying to accomplish in your classroom. If the kids really take to doubles, hold a mini-tournament on a day when it is optional to be there, and then allow the kids to choose their own partners.

But look closer and you see that Ethan Guyaz is definitely *not* your average cribbage player.



Born in Vermont and now living in Maine, Ethan (41) has high-functioning autism. With the loving

support of his parents—Penny and Norman—and two siblings, Ethan has learned to cope in this fast-paced world.

This brings a new perspective to some



of his accomplishments. Ethan learned to play cribbage while living at a group home in Augusta ME and now lives independently in his own apartment. After getting his driver's license on his first try, he drives by himself to tournaments throughout the Northeast, but as far afield as Michigan

for Grand National 28. He camps out on his cribbage trips and collects empty cans and bottles to help pay for his gas. He has a good sense of humor and likes meteorology—a delight he acquired from his meteorologist father.

While Ethan is very clear that cribbage has given his life meaning, he also enjoys traveling, participates in the Special Olympics, and loves animals (he has a kitten).

His favorite tournament is Niagara Falls NY, but he also loves the New England Peer Tourney held in Pawtucket RI every August. He looks up to John Chambers (Smithfield RI), because John was the first director to allow him to play in a tournament, and to the late Nelson Wheaton (Hamburg NY), who welcomed Ethan to Niagara Falls twice yearly.

directors are given the names lar region. If the director does not know you personally, let him/her know that you are a certified judge and available for

judging. In any case, directors make the final selection of judges for any event. Here are a few basic recommendations and guidelines for the conduct of judges:

- 1. Two judges must be present at every call.
- 2. Only the originally called judges should interface with the players. Other judge(s) should be consulted away from the playing area, and the original judges return to deliver the decision.
- 3. Avoid making decisions on matters not relating directly to the playing rules (e.g., disqualification of late players and disruptive behavior). These matters should be referred to a tournament official.
- 4. Avoid acting as judge in decisions involving a relative or close friend.
- 5. Always take a rulebook with you when called to act as a judge, and always quote and show the applicable rule(s) when giving the decision.
- 6. When ruling on one of the following, always consult with the head judge or a senior judge: (a) situations not covered explicitly by the rules and calling for a judgment, (b) situations covered by the rules but involving an obvious deficiency in the rules, or (c) situations apparently covered by the rules with differing results.

As judges, let's do our part in providing fair and impartial decisions. CW


Years Ago in the ACC



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BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING • SEPTEMBER 17, 2010 SANDS REGENCY CASINO HOTEL • RENO NV

(presented in condensed form)

President Jeanne Hofbauer called the meeting to order at 9a. Directors present were Dave Aiken, Pat Barrett, Don Brown, Dave Campbell, Dave Clemmey, Annett Eiffert, Charlie Finley, Roland Hall, Sharon Hejtmanek, Jeanne Hofbauer, Roy Hofbauer, Bob Julian, Ron Logan, Herschel Mack, Bob Milk, Catherine Perkins, Larry Phifer, Joan Rein, Todd Schaefer, Phyllis Schmidt, Jeff Shimp, Wayne Steinmetz, Valerie Summer, Fred White, Keith Widener.

Parliamentary procedures were discussed. J. Hofbauer was approached after the September 2010 meeting concerning an issue with an amendment to an agenda item. Roberts Rules of Order" and "Sturgis's Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure" were discussed. The BOD has combined procedures from both into a looser version. We do not have the resources to run by strict procedures. There is nothing in the bylaws stating that we must use any parliamentary procedures. It was decided we keep to the method we have been using.

Hall of Fame voting (Barrett). One nominee—Rollie Heath—obtained enough votes to be elected to the Hall of Fame. Discussion about allowing the BOD to vote on nominees who almost made it; it was decided that it was inappropriate for the BOD to revote after the HOF panelists voted.

MRP Committee (Larry Hassett via Milk). A contract with the software developer is needed prior to moving on this project; the developer requested 80% when the software is delivered, 10% when it's loaded, and 10% after a month of tasking. Denny Moore and Hassett need to review all the information prior to a decision being made and then discuss it with the Executive Committee. A contract should not be signed until the BOD hears more details.

Internet Cribbage (Milk). Nine new members were gained through online inquiries. Last year the ACC received \$17,000 in internet revenue (with expenses of only \$500 for awards). The cost of advertising for the last six months on ecribbage.com was \$180. Milk requested \$180 for the next six months of advertising, Motion approved.

Mike Burns's cribbage video was reviewed by several BOD and other ACC members. The BOD decided not to give its approval to the video until technical mistakes and teaching methodology are fixed.

Archives (White). White is trying to figure out what to do with seven boxes of material, ranging from receipts to scorecards. Some items should be kept at the Sands to put out during the larger tournaments. He has spent \$123 of the \$3,000 budget. TDs and other members are not sending information to White, so he will come up with a list of things we should continue to keep and update. Rein will provide Grass Roots historical documents for the archives. The ACC's constitution and charter should be part of the archive.

GRTOC (Brown). The GRTOC frequently conflicts with the BOD meeting at GN, which could cause problems with the BOD reaching a quorum or voting on important issues. BOD business takes precedence over the GRTOC; therefore it is recommended to delay the GRTOC until Friday evening to allow BOD members who may be part of GRTOC to attend it also. Motion approved, effective immediately.

Online forms. A committee consisting of the three regional commissioners (R. Hofbauer, Barrett, and Campbell) plus one other from each region (Norm Nikodym, Aiken, and Perkins) and webmaster Diane Waite was formed to oversee putting on the ACC website various forms related to directing tournaments.

Treasurer's report (Marlene Lazachek). Grand National advance was paid. Rulebook sales doing okay (we paid \$4,588 and have received \$4,521, with 5,479 rulebooks still to sell). Treasurer's report approved.

Audit (Marlene Lazachek). The last audit cost \$1,700 in 2007, and it will cost approximately \$2,000 the next time. Perkins said that limited audit is appropriate for a smaller group. A proposal for a limited audit was approved.

ACC Policy & Procedures Manual (Perkins). (1) As nothing is currently in the manual concerning the website or webmaster, the webmaster will submit a summary of her duties to Perkins. (2) From September 1 until the BOD meeting in mid-September, the ACC is without an Executive Committee; a motion to allow the Executive Committee to serve until their replacements are elected during the mid-September BOD meeting was approved. (3) A motion was approved to change Hall of Fame voting to mail out during the first week in January and return by January 24. (4) Discussion of which non-BOD positions (Grass Roots commissioner, Cribbage World editor, internet commissioner, treasurer, etc.) should attend the BOD meetings reasurer should attend 100% of the meetings, while the others should attend a minimum of 50% of the meetings.

TOC and JPW/ACC Open (Rein, Hofbauers, Scott Kooistra). Attendance figures were announced for these tourneys. Rein announced that this was her next-to-last year to direct the TOC. The Hofbauers will also step down after next year, with Rick and Peggy Shea to replace them.

Updates were presented for GN 30 (Peggy Scalley), GN 31 (Rein), and GN 32 (Perkins). Arlene Carle expressed interest in hosting GN 32 in Anchorage AK in 2014, and J. Hofbauer said there is also a potential bid from Cheyenne WY. The BOD will award the GN 32 bid at the September 2011 meeting.

Executive Committee Report (J. Hofbauer). Topics discussed: (1) policy on equipment purchased by the ACC. (2) Puyallup fair asked for a raise from \$400 to \$500 to promote cribbage in Washington State; motion approved.

Ethics Committee Report (Hejtmanek). Topics discussed: (1) Two members inquired why they haven't heard anything after sending letters to the committee. (2) What should be discussed within the Executive Committee and what should stay with the Ethics Committee.

Grass Roots Committee Report (Rein). Topics discussed: (1) Approximately 4,000 members. (2) Deceased members are removed from the website, but Rein was asked to leave them on the website if they received an award. (3) Currently 50 players in the Travelers' Club. (4) A business card template and a scorecard template are on the Grass Roots website.

Internet Committee Report (Milk). Topics discussed: (1) An internet Tournament of Champions is being planned for the next Grand National. (2) A motion was approved for in-

ternet volunteer of the year award. (3) Promoting cribbage through the internet, especially social networking (Facebook, Twitter, Youtube).

PR/Publicity Committee Report (Norm Nikodym). Some potential ideas: (1) clubs on naval ships or military bases; (2) celebrity contacts.

Youth Program Committee Report (Dan Zeisler). Topics discussed: (1) Five official youth tournaments in 2010. (2) Zeisler has received around 300 boards and sent out around 200 of them to young cribbage players.

Judges Program Committee Report (Shimp). Nothing to report.

Tournament Commissioners Committee Report (R. Hofbauer). In 2009 there were 14,489 players at tournaments with an average of 82.8 per tournament. In 2010 there were 15,427 players at tournaments with an average of 78 players per tournament.

President's Report (J. Hofbauer). Topics discussed: (1)

ACC logo sent to the Atlanta Westin for the 2013 GN. (2) Funding approved for GN 30.

Executive VP Report (Schaefer). Will put a notice in *Cribbage World* asking for bids for GN in 2014. Looking at changes within the constitution and bylaws.

VP of Policy Report (Perkins). Working on creating "how to" for putting on a Grand National.

VP of Operations Report (Julian). Topics discussed: (1) Backup positions: Marlene Lazachek has Dan Selke for statistics and Dennis Ulberg for treasurer; Rein has Bob Joslin for Grass Roots commissioner; Kristy Haught has Don Hannula for Grass Roots statistics; Larry Hassett looking for a back-up for membership secretary. (2) National statistician and treasurer positions used to be two positions and now are one; should they be separated again?

Member-at-large Report (Campbell). Nothing to report. Next BOD meeting: Friday, September 30, at 9a at the Sands in Reno NV.

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
