ife Master Charlie Finley traveled over 2,800 miles from Enfield CT to reach sunny, warm Reno NV in early October. And when he arrived, he didn't stop moving until he had mowed down every competitor

who stood in his way—including last year's GN champ, Life Master (5★) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR), in the semifinals.

Director Peggy Scalley announced that 526 ACC members from around the country converged on Reno in early October to play the prestigious Grand National. In addition, the Silver Dollar Open, held on September 28–29, attracted 232 players, and 214 players hung around for the Gold Rush Open, held on the Monday and Tuesday following GN 30.


Chris Parsons (Seattle WA) was high qualifier in the 22-game GN main, with an enviable 39/18 +190 scorecard.


I had fun playing

As I was reading the latest CW I noticed the article about the high qualifier twice question. Bob McCabe performed this rare feat about fifteen years ago at the Wisconsin Dells Classic. He posted a 38 score in the 100+ player main, lost in round 2, and then came back with a 17 to take top honors in the consolation, where he also lost in round 2.

My son, Zachary Widener, was top qualifier in both the main and consolation at the Atlanta Classic in April 2006, at age 13. He was top qualifier in the main with a 32 (in a 20-game qualifier). He lost Sunday morning early, got into the consolation, and was once again top qualifier with a 15 in 9 games. Then, to take this a step further, he went on to win the consolation, beating the late **Bobby Stuart** in the finals. Quite an accomplishment, even if I say so myself.

While thumbing through back issues of CW to find these stories, we stumbled upon yet another double HQ: Roger Wilson (Westminster CO) scored 38/17 in the main and 18/8 in the consolation at the 2000 Chinook Winds Open in Oregon—both of them tops in the qualifying round (see January 2000 CW, page 7).

Face Up or Face Down?

I just returned home from Reno, where I played dozens of games against a diverse group of opponents. Aside from their love for cribbage, nearly all of them had one thing in common. They set their scorecards face down. Seeing their scorecards won't change my strategy. I want to beat any opponent, no matter who they are or what their scorecard says. What difference would it make if I saw their scorecard before or during our match? In nearly twenty years of Grass Roots and Tournament Trail play, I could never figure out why people do this. It would be interesting to know how this custom got started and why it continues. As for myself, I simply accept my scorecard from my latest opponent and place it down at the next board to the right, usually face up and likely showing more losses than I'd like to admit to. Then I try to win the next match.



24-Hand and 24-Crib

I have been playing cribbage on the Tournament Trail for twenty-two years now. You would think I had seen just about everything. But the game of cribbage continues to mystify and baffle me. At the Grand National tournament in Reno last weekend, I had six 24-hands on Saturday and Sunday combined. I had never ever had a 24-hand and 24-crib in the same deal, but in one game, I held 4-5-5-6 and pitched 7-7 into my crib. A 6 was cut.

DeLynn also won the 2005 GN main, so this puts him in a very exclusive club of players who have won more than one GN event: Life Master **Bob Hanes** (Ankeny IA) won the main at both GN 5 (1986) and GN 13 (1994), and Life Master **Joseph Aird**

(Gladstone MI) won the GN 17 consolation in 1998, the GN 18 main the following year, and the GN 28 consolation in 2008.

The Silver Dollar Open main was won by Peter Stemler (Carson City NV), and Grand Master Bob Joslin (Lakeville MN) won the Gold Rush Open main. Life Master (3★) Jim Langley (Red Bluff CA) bookended the week by claiming top honors in both consolations.



Hall of Fame Nominations

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- 1. Nominations must be submitted in writing (maximum one side of a letter-size page) to the address below.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing of the ACC for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with the standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated a Bronze Award recipient or higher in the Grass Roots program.
 - d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for

- a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the board of directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- Any exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the board of directors.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by December 10.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and mail copies of each let-



ter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The voting panel will review the nominations and return their ballots to the HOF chairperson. The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National Tournament.



No detailed information is necessary at that time—a general plan is sufficient. The bid for GN 34 will be awarded at the BOD meeting on September 21, 2012.

Senior Judges

Senior judges are experienced ACC judges who have shown outstanding ability to analyze situations and come to a fair and reasonable solution. They are the highest ranking ACC representatives regarding rules at sanctioned tournaments and may advise other certified judges about acceptable options in cases not fully covered by current rules. With a maximum of eight in each region, senior judges serve three-year appointments and may be reappointed. At the BOD meeting in Reno, chief judge Jeff Shimp announced the following list of players currently serving as senior judges:

MRPs per Tournament

CW response: this proposal still involves extra work for tournament directors, because every player (not just the top 25%) would then have to be reported to the ACC statistician. In addition, what counts as a tournament? That is, do main and consolation count as two tournaments or one?

All American Team

After reading both My Deal and Jeanne Hofbauer's column about the All American Team and how it has become so Western Region dominated, I agree that a lot of players out west attend a lot of tournaments. But could that be because there are more tournaments in the Western Region? For the time period 10/3/11 to 8/19/12, the October 2011 CW lists 22 scheduled tournaments in the Eastern Region, 22 in the Central Region, and 66 in the West-

ern Region. More tournaments means more opportunities to gain MRPs. So if the other regions don't like the Western Region domination of the All American team, then maybe they should schedule more tournaments. Or is it that those of us out west enjoy cribbage more than they do? I definitely agree with Jeanne that players who spend the time and money to go to more tournaments and achieve the status of All American, regardless of which region they are from, deserve the honor. I get to only a couple tournaments each year and take great pleasure in beating the All American Team members and the various Masters when I play them, just from knowing they are the top players in ACC. And they are as gracious in a loss as they are when they win. Congratulations to those who were honored as All Americans! And be aware that the rest of us are gunning for you!

Director Valerie Nozick (Seattle WA) reports that this invitation-only tournament attracted eleven internet players in an over-the-board contest. The top scorecard was turned in by Master Sue Edwards (Denver CO), also known as CO434Sue.

- Four new BOD members were installed: Peggy Shea (Eureka CA), Paul Barnes (Daytona Beach FL), David O'Neil (Clarkston GA), and Donald Hannula (Lake Linden MI).
- The Executive Committee has two new members: **David Campbell** (Parsonsfield ME) is the new VP of Operations, and **Jeff Shimp** (Grand Haven MI) is the new Member at Large.
- Donald Hannula (Lake Linden MI) was announced as the director of the TOC, effective with the 2013 tournament.
- Grand National 33 was awarded to

- Phoenix AZ, to be directed by Brion Neeley, Denise Fortin, and Jon Ryder. Other candidates were Anchorage AK and Las Vegas NV.
- The Sands Regency was awarded a three-year contract for the TOC and JPW/ACC Open in 2013, 2014, and 2015.
- Effective immediately, the All American team (top ten nationwide) was replaced with an All Star team composed of the top eight players from each region [note: the December CW will print a selection of letters on this decision].



Rollie Heath (Keizer OR) was inducted into the ACC's Hall of Fame at the awards banquet held in conjunction with Grand National 30, on October 1, in Reno. An accomplished cribbage player, Rollie has earned some impressive statistics: Life Master (★) rating with 13,208 lifetime MRPs and seventeen tournament wins, including the 2007 JPW/ACC Open; Silver Award in Grass Roots play with 3,172 GRPs; ten internet tournament victories with 1,290 IRPs. In addition, he has served the ACC ably as director of many weekend tournaments since 1990, including Grand National 24 in Lincoln City OR; certified judge; past member of the BOD; and much more. Rollie was a high school teacher for thirty-one years.

Rollie Heath Wins GRTOC #6

The sixth annual Grass Roots Tournament of Champions was held in conjunction with Grand National 30 in Reno NV. This invitation-only tournament featured eighty-six Grass Roots club champions from twenty-five states and provinces.

The President's Column

I have mentioned several times about the forging of friendships that result from being a member of the ACC. This column is about such a friendship. Our friend **Rosemary Hendricks** passed away at her home in the early hours of October 7, surrounded by her loving family. Our final visit with her was just hours before.

We met Rosemary through playing cribbage at tournaments. She was much more than a "cribbage buddy." She actually became a member of our family. We took many trips with her,

and some were not even to cribbage tournaments! We enjoyed lots of holiday meals together at our home, and she spent many overnight stays in our guestroom.

When you log considerable hours sitting beside a person while traveling long distances in a car, you get to know them pretty well. Rosemary told us many tales about growing up in the wide open spaces of eastern Oregon. She grew up in a tiny dot of a town named Antelope and later moved to The Dalles, where she met her first husband. They then migrated to Salinas CA, where the family grew to include their five children. Rosemary worked at the Health Department, from which she retired and then returned to the Pacific Northwest with her second husband. After a stint in Alaska, they settled in Rochester WA and bought a small convenience store and car repair garage.

Rosemary worked

diligently, by herself, to build up her store. She told us that she knew she was going to be successful when she could finally afford to hire a person to come in for an hour a day, so she could make dinner at their home right behind the store. Her husband passed away, but her store prospered and she hired employees and finally got to enjoy the fruits of her labor. She played cribbage and loved the competition and the people. She traveled a lot, going on several cribbage cruises and Grand National trips, and then became a tournament director herself, for the Longest Beach Classic.

She was always up for going to a tournament. She traveled a lot with Roy to tournaments when I could not go, and likewise traveled with me when Roy could not go. When we were all together and Roy and I would be having a differing opinion on some point, she steadfastly refused to take sides. I know she liked me best, but Roy says she like him best! Such was her nature, that she could make you feel that you were so important to her.

Four years ago, Rosemary was diagnosed with lung cancer. She got the news in the afternoon, and the following morning we headed out to a tournament. She fought her cancer with every weapon she could. She went through many different treatments, with both conventional and natural medicines. She even spent four weeks in Mexico for treatment, and I was privileged to spend two of those weeks with her. Few players have burst upon the tournament scene as spectacularly as Jesse Jarrell. In May 1983 he joined some fellow members of a Concord card club on a trip up to Quincy CA, for the World Championship cribbage tournament . . . and won it. Mary Gladish was along on that trip (she and Jesse and Heidi Glashan went on to help found Grass Roots Club 54, the Fourth Street Terrorists), and she remembers that the Quincy club was so taken aback by this brash upstart winning their event that the headline in the local paper read "Quincy Man Takes Second." Jesse had never heard of the ACC, so he earned no MRPs for that outing-but he wasted no time signing up, catching up, and becoming a legendary figure in the ACC.



With his imposing presence, booming voice, and affable manner, Jesse was a natural spokesperson for the game he played and loved so well. He was always encouraging to new players, and he volunteered his services as MC to tournament directors throughout the Western Region for many years. Jack Shumate (then of North Lake Tahoe CA) reports that Jesse guided him

I've known Jesse for thirty years and played many a game with him. He was a unique player, full of fun, with a quick wit, and he played a good game of cribbage, scoring more than his share of MRPs. And Jesse's tender heart for his beloved little dogs Frosty and Rusty endeared him to fellow animal lovers everywhere.

In recent years, Jesse had increasing health problems, with multiple heart bypass operations and several strokes; he moved from the Bay Area to Modesto and could no longer go to many tournaments. Last July, longtime traveling companion Chris McComas of Kelso WA took Jesse to a round of ACC events that proved to be the last of his life. They spent a delightful week at the Sands Regency in Reno




The board featured this month is a handmade "box-style" tournament board. ACC member **Mark Van Dyke** (Grand Haven MI) makes and sells these unique boards.

While in the box configuration, the board can hold a deck of cards and pegs. The pieces are held together by magnets. When laid out end to end, the magnets hold the pieces together as a tournament long-board.

I've learned quite a bit about **Sir John Suckling** over the past year. Many of his traits are widely known among cribbage players, but Sir John, for all his merrymaking and chamber-prancing, was not all fun and games; real valor lay beneath those dandy locks.

In 1630, when he was twenty-one, he was knighted under Charles I and soon found himself under the command of King Gustavus Adolphus II of Sweden, "The Lion of the North." He served in Adolphus's volunteer forces and was posted in Germany. Though he would return to England as early as 1632, he took part in the Battle of Breitenfeld, the Protestants' first major victory in the Thirty Years' War. He would see many other skirmishes, but none as renowned or remembered as Breitenfeld. He returned to England, but his military career was far from over.

In 1639 the Scottish Covenanters—a group of Scots who bound themselves to uphold Presbyterian doctrine and polity as the sole religion of Scotland—were advancing south into the borders of King Charles I. "When the Expedition was into Scotland," writes his biographer, John Aubrey, "Sir John Suckling, at his own charge, raised a troop of 100 very handsome young proper men." This statement is a little misleading without the proper context; for the Covenanter's conflict, King Charles chose not to use Parliamentary powers (and money) to raise an army, but instead relied on the goodwill and de-

corum of his courtiers.

Nonetheless, Sir John rose to the occasion. According to Aubrey, Suckling's 100 men were "clad in white doublets and scarlet breeches, and scarlet Coats, hats, and feathers, well horsed and armed. They say 'twas one of the finest sights in those days." The courtiers jostled with one another for the honor of raising the finest army, and it is said that Suckling, at the cost of £12,000, raised the best, if not for fearsomeness, than certainly for fashion. Upon seeing his volunteer army, King Charles remarked, "the Scots would fight stoutly, if only for the Englishmen's fine clothes."

It would be wonderful to say that Sir John led a fearsome troop of scarlet-clad soldiers into glorious battle. But Charles' forces never met the Covenanters in battle. Fearful (and rightfully so) that he would suffer a defeat by the larger and battle-ready Scottish force, Charles made political amends otherwise and the conflict slowly abated. This was just as well for Suckling—he was more fit in the field of play than the field of war anyway.


