# My Deal by David Aiken



Peg envy cuts both ways. Most of us rejoice—perhaps not overtly, but at least inwardly—when we cut to a 24-hand or when a cut Jack gives us two points, but—truth be told—we are just a little resentful when our opponent does the same thing.

The same card that brings bliss in one deal can, just a few deals later, cause envy and simmering ire within the cribbage player's psyche. While psychologists are better suited to analyze this issue, I don't think it's too far out of line to state that selfishness plays a role in this emotion.


For many years, Central and Eastern Region players have complained that Western players have an unfair advantage because they have more opportunities to earn points. But this is a two-way street: Central and Eastern players also have an advantage, because it's easier to make the All Star teams in these regions than it is out west. Here are some numbers to back up this assertion:

Over the past twelve years, it has taken a minimum of 1,006 MRPs to make the Western Region All Star team—and an average of 1,248. In the Central Region, the minimum has been 675 MRPs, with an average of 837. And in the Eastern Region, the numbers are even lower: 615 minimum MRPs, with an average of 782.

In other words, if your goal is to play on the All Star team in Reno in February, it's much easier to do so if you don't live in the Western Region. Western players must earn at least 400 more MRPs than their counterparts in the Central or Eastern Regions. Even at a healthy pace of 40 MRPs per tourney, this means that Western players must play at least ten more tourneys each year in order to stay competitive, so it's no wonder there are more tourneys in continued on page 9

### Handicap for New Players?

We lose a lot of new members because they just can't compete with the good players. After racking my brain on how to handicap these new players, I may have a solution. A club could hold \$5 a week out of its prize fund to put into two pools for new members only (up to a maximum of \$25 per pool). For the first three months, if a new player finishes in the top 75% of all players present, they would win the first pool. After three months, they advance to a second pool, with the requirement that they have to finish in the top half of all players to cash. Make sure that new players know when their graduation date is. Once a pool is won by a new player, start building it up again at \$5 a week. I challenge others to come up with ways that we can retain the new members.





So instead of being jealous and envious of how green the grass is on the other side of the cribbage board, let's instead enjoy this game while we're still on the right side of the grass.



by Marek Budzynski (London, England) I learnt to play cribbage back in the late 1990s, and I have played sporadically since then. Most of the time I play with my friend Sean, and we play six-card cribbage. Side note: the first time I heard about five-card cribbage was when Scott Field mentioned it. A really small group of people in the UK play it, but they're not known outside their circle.

Because Sean is away for long periods shooting films, my sporadic playing was becoming super-sporadic. About a year ago I decided to look for a game in London. I didn't know anyone else, so I put an advert on the website Cribbage Corner. It went like this:

Hello, just found this site and posting my first topic. Been playing for around 10 years with a small group of friends and was looking for a Cribbage club/society in London but didn't find anything on the web. If there's anyone out there who would like to meet up for a game in Central London sometime please get in touch. Many thanks in advance.

I was convinced that I'd get a reply,

thinking there must be other players in London, but nothing materialized. After a month or two I gave up bothering to look at my ad, but an online search led to me to the ACC website, and I found that competitions were going on all the time all over the United States. One of them caught my eye: the ACC Open in Reno. I had been to Nevada a couple of times in the past whilst shooting art films in the desert. I never stopped in Reno, but thought what a great place to visit. It was like Las Vegas used to be, and I really liked old Vegas.

One night Sean was in his hotel looking for players in London, and the first hit was my message on Cribbage Corner. Someone had replied! I hadn't been back to look since August, so I hadn't seen the reply by TXpegger. Sean replied and passed on the details to me. I got in contact with TXpeg ger, who turned out to be Scott Field.

Sean and I always play in a pub on Beak Street in Soho, London, called the Old Coffee House. It is one of the last traditional pubs in central London (basically it hasn't been decorated for fifty years). It Marek's story continued on page 12

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#### by Scott Field (Pearland TX)

Last year I changed careers and started working for a company that requires travel to London occasionally. In preparation of my first trip I thought I would try to find some cribbage players in the land where cribbage began. I answered an ad on the Cribbage Corner website looking for cribbage players in central London. A fellow named Sean replied back with a plan to meet at a pub in central London, but due to his own travels, he would send his cribbage partner, Marek, instead.

Marek arranged to meet me after work near his office, at a pub called the Old Coffee House. I was running about an hour late so Marek asked me to phone when I arrived at the pub. I phoned as soon as I could see the sign, hoping to limit my tardiness. The pub was very compact and cozy, with several sitting areas, but only a handful of tables on the ground floor. I ordered a pint and told the barman that I'm there to play cribbage with the local champion. He asks: "what's cribbage?" to which I reply: "It's only the world's best card game. It uses a board and pegs for keeping score. It started right here in England about 400 years ago."

The barman says he's seen a couple guys with cards but never knew what they were playing. The pub is about half filled so I moved to one side where I could keep an eye on the door. A few minutes later Marek walks in and the barman, who is drying off a mug, nods toward him while looking at me. Marek was carrying a small plastic grocery bag, but no cribbage board was evident. After brief introductions and ordering refreshments, we sat at a small round table near the bar. Marek produced a small "seasoned" cribbage board

and cards from the bag, along with some broken matchsticks as pegs. I realized cribbage players all over the world are either frugal, sentimental, or both.

We briefly discussed rules, and Marek insisted on playing ACC tournament rules. After two times around the 60-hole board I declared the first victory by skunk. Most of the other games were closer, but I was the clear winner that evening. Marek said they wanted to get to Reno the following February and use the opportunity to create a film about their experience, as both Marek and Sean make films for a living. I said they needed to practice with a real tournament board if they were honest about their intentions to get to Reno, and that I would bring them one on my next trip.

The following month I returned to London with a tournament long-board I made from cherry with in-laid skunk line and the words "Road to Reno" laser engraved. And, of course, a set of proper pegs. Marek showed better skills at our second meeting and easily won the first game on his new board. I still took the majority of games, but the competition was much more substantial. Marek asked how he compared to the players. I told him honestly that he was as good as most of the first-time tournament players I had met and would win more than a couple of games in Reno. With renewed confidence in becoming part of the Reno experience, Marek completed the forms to join the ACC for Sean and himself, becoming UK-1 and UK-2, respectively.

Once Marek arrived in Reno he was inducted into the Space City Skunkers and included in all of our activities.

could be described as a dive, but it's real as real can be.

I was working round the corner at the time so I arranged to meet Scott there one evening in September. The scene was like something out of a cowboy movie. I walked in the side door of the pub. The barman, who was cleaning a glass behind the bar, looked up at me and nodded over in Scott's direction. He knew what was going on, there was going to be a "shootout" with cards. I was playing for the reputation of the pub. As we sat down, the barman said, "Keep it clean lads, no holding in the clinches" (a boxing reference, but that's as close to the cowboy theme as we could get).

I pulled out my board—a classic English cribbage board, with 30 pegs up and 30 pegs down. A game goes twice round, and Sean and I always play "best of three" followed by a "friendly."

Scott was good—very good—too good in fact. He beat me easily. He kept coming up with flushes. Sean didn't play flushes but the rest of the game was exactly the same, well almost. The main cultural differences are the words. We don't call it a "crib," we call it a "box." So if you put good cards in your crib, we call it "sweetening my box." I'm sure you can work out the innuendo-based humor of UK cribbage.

Scott beat me but I wanted to play him again, so we arranged another match a few weeks later on his return to London. He beat me again but not as badly as before, but one amazing thing happened. Scott brought me a present he made—an American cribbage board, with an inscription on it: "Road to Reno." I was really moved by him going to all that trouble, as we had met only once before. It meant that what-

ever happened I was going to play in Reno. Scott even met my partner, **Katie**, after we'd finished playing, so I felt that I was becoming part of the American cribbage family, even if it was after only a couple of games.

I met up with Scott one last time before coming to Reno, and once again he beat me. I didn't mind though as I knew that when I got to Reno I'd have a friend to hang out with and that I would become a token member of his "crew" from Texas.

Reno was an amazing experience, just from the fact that I'd never played that many games in that space of time. On the day of the Open I felt as if my brain had fried. I may have lost but I met some amazing people. One that stands out was Mickey Griffin. He took me under his wing and gave me my second American cribbage board. It was one he made for Operation Desert Storm as a gift to servicemen in the first Gulf War. I felt honored and humbled at his generosity.

After the ACC Open, Scott and I drove to another competition in Lake Topaz. When we got there it was straight into the Early Bird. Amazingly enough I was playing better that I'd ever played before and won over 50% of my games.

Anyway, the story ends like this. That evening my first game was against DeLynn Colvert ("the guy who wrote the book" was how he was described to me). I just thought: enjoy the game, you're playing with the best so just enjoy it. Amazingly enough I skunked DeLynn. I couldn't believe it. At the end of the competition he gave me his book *Play Winning Cribbage*, in which he wrote the following dedication: "Marek, great skunk, keep on pegging!" and believe me, I will!

One of the most intriguing parts of the long match tournament format is the scoring method.

Most long matches follow a simple scoring system: 3 points for a win and 4 points for a skunk. Spread points don't matter—just wins and skunks. As discussed in last month's column, the 3/4 scoring system devalues the power of the skunk and allows the emphasis to shift to winning a match through regular wins instead of trying to accumulate extra game points by skunk. In an extended long match format of 18, 20, or more games, skunks plays less of a role in determining the outcome.

Although the 3/4 scoring system is the most popular, there are variations. Some long matches use the familiar tournament scoring system of 2 points for a win and 3 points for a skunk, while others offer a

simplified system with 1 point for a win, 0 points for a loss, and no extra points for a skunk. Another scoring option sometimes offered in both the 3/4 and 2/3 systems is the ability to earn 1 game point for a loss of 5 holes or less.

All scoring systems are at the determination of the tournament director. Before signing up for a long match, make sure you fully understand the scoring system used.

# **Cribbage Board of the Month**

The cribbage board featured this month is very rare and has an interesting story behind its creation. The story starts with the ACC.

In December 2012,

Danielle C. sent email to Dan Zeisler, director of the ACC Youth Program, inquiring about an old cribbage board that belonged to her grandfather. Dan forwarded the email to me. I had never seen a folding Crib-Derby board before and asked Danielle to send photos.



I knew that two of my friends in the Cribbage Board Collectors Society



would be interested in this board, so I sent the photos and email on to **Peter Leach** and **Terry Coons**. Peter lives in St. Paul MN, where Crib-Derby boards were made. Terry lives in Portland OR and was just completing a written history of Crib-Derby boards. She thought she was done, until she received the photos of this previously unknown board.

Peter was so impressed with this newly found board that he decided to reproduce

it for the fourteenth annual Cribbage Board Collectors

Society Convention, held last September in Bloomington MN.

Peter was unable to look at Danielle's actual board, so he

# Years Ago in the ACC

The cover of the December 1988 *Cribbage World* announced the details of the upcoming 1999 ACC Open, to be directed by **Syl Lulinski** (La Grange Park IL) and **Jeff Shimp** (then of Allegan MI, now of Grand Haven MI), and the TOC, directed by **Joan Rein** (Carver MN). At its September meeting in Atlanta, the BOD voted to permanently rename the TOC in Syl's honor.

Elsewhere in this issue we read that **Duane Toll** (then of Milwaukee WI, now of Sutherlin OR) won the West Bend Classic and that **Rex Paddock** won the Montana Championship in his hometown of Missoula MT.

worked exclusively from the photos. As he looked into reproducing this board, Peter quickly discovered why the Crib-Derby Co. most likely made only a limited number of these boards. The amount of work that would go into drilling the holes, routing out the storage and hinge areas, screwing on the hinges and clasp, stenciling on the graphics, and so on, was way beyond cost effective. The Crib-Derby boards found today are one-piece wood or molded plastic (see my article in the October 2010 CW, page 14).

After some research, Peter determined that a Computer Numerical Control machine would be needed for him to make thirty commemorative boards for the convention. He found a CNC machine at the Snogoer Co. in Minneapolis, and owner Cory Huseby did the computer de-



sign. The machine them drilled 399 holes, routed the hinge and storage pockets, marked the points for the rubber feet, and drilled the foot recesses. The finishing of the board was done by Finishing Touch Industries in Wyoming MN. Cory's friend Nate did the silk screening for the graphics. Snap catches were found at Constantine's Wood Center in Ft. Lauderdale FL.

Making this board was a complicated and difficult process. It just adds to my respect for all ACC members who make, drill, and finish the tournament boards that we play on. If any ACC members have an original folding Crib-Derby board, please let me know.

# The President's Column



The best thing about being in the ACC is meeting so many wonderful people who become dear friends. Well, the worst thing about being in the ACC is losing those friends when they pass on. This month I am dedicating this column to four dear friends who are now gone from us. It was an honor and privilege to know them.

I met Marion Buckley when she accompanied her husband, Harold, to a tournament in Oregon. She did not play tournaments at that time, but at a 1997 tournament, she was asked to fill in to make an even amount of players. She graciously did it, for which she received some criticism because she was not up to tournament speed. Instead of walking away with an attitude of "never wanting to do that again," she went on to become an accomplished player who earned her Master Award and Bronze Award and became a certified judge. Two of her favorite cribbage moments were winning the 1999 Mid-Summer Tourist Classic in Anchorage AK and holding a 29-hand at the Washington State Open on March 9, 2002. Marion and Harold traveled many miles to play in tournaments, as they lived in Edmonton AB. They promoted the ACC and started Grass Roots clubs and tournaments in Alberta. She had a knack of getting merchants to give prizes for fundraising raffles to support the tournaments. Marion was always friendly and generous, giving Canadian and RCMP flags and souvenirs to many people. Marion was a

member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for nineteen years and had been injured twice in the line of duty. Marion and Harold were living in her hometown of Baddeck NS, where she passed away on September 20, after a courageous battle with cancer, at age 62.

Lucille Endicott and her husband, Ike, were married for sixty years before Ike passed away. Lucille lived on for six more years, but was just biding her time until she rejoined him on August 22 at the age of 87. They were fixtures at tournaments in the Pacific Northwest and played in the Bend OR club. Lucille earned her Master Award and Bronze Award. They lived in central Oregon and directed tournaments in Redmond for several years. Lucille was one of the best cooks I have ever met; my family enjoyed their hospitality on many occasions. She could knit and crochet beautifully and made afghans for relatives and friends. She created many of them with a cribbage theme with card symbols and cribbage boards for tournament fundraising raffles. There were no patterns or directions for these; she was talented enough to create them on her own. She was very artistic and painted many pictures, most of them with central Oregon high desert scenery theme. She loved games, with cribbage of course being her favorite. Lucille and Ike managed Elks Clubs and hunted and fished together. They were fun to be around and were the kind of friends you were so grateful to have.

One of my favorite ACC memories is the day Harvey Honeycutt won the 1989 Grand National in Prineville OR., while onlookers cheered "HAR-VEE, HAR-VEE." Harvey was a true gentlemen who treated everyone as though they were a dear friend. He loved to play all kinds of games; card, dice, and board games were always on tap when you spent time with him and his loving wife, Bev. He loved to sing, had a great voice, and knew the words to a zillion songs. He had a wonderful sense of humor and had so many original little sayings. Harvey spent most of his life living and working in construction in southern California. When he retired they moved to a rural area outside of Klamath Falls OR and joined the ACC early on (his ACC number is OR-4). Roy and I traveled to several Grand Nationals with them and had such good times. Harvey had earned his Life Master Award. Harvey was a true hero, serving in WWII as a captain in the US Army Air Corps, flying sixty-six successful missions in his P-38 over Europe. He earned many medals, including the Distinguished Flying Cross. Harvey was reunited with Bev on October 21, at the

age of 91. He had been diagnosed with several types of cancer in the spring and chose to forego chemotherapy. Harvey truly enjoyed life and was always grateful for the blessings he received.

One of the friendliest people I ever met on the cribbage trail was Jim Keeling from Spokane WA. Jim always had a smile and a joke to make you laugh. He loved to play cribbage and was always promoting the ACC. Jim and his wife, Joyce, played in many tournaments in the Northwest and especially enjoyed doubles, because they always played as partners. Joyce says that Jim was not only her husband but her best friend as well. Iim had earned his Master Award and Bronze Award and also served as a senior judge. Jim was a retired fireman and had lived his entire life in Washington State. He passed away on November 26, 2012. I know his sunny disposition is missed by all who knew him.

I am so grateful to be a member of this organization, which has given me the gift of meeting people like these four. They have





# Grass Roots

According to Grass Roots Commissioner Joan Rein, the idea of using a game timer was originally intended to be a temporary solution. At the end of 15 minutes, the leader is declared the winner and the points between the front pegs become the spread points. It was felt that this was a better solution to playing short games (3/4 or even half games), which alters board position strategy.

Instead of using the timer for the slowest players only, some club directors decided to apply the timer to all players. We've all had the occasional game with less than average hands and cribs, which results in a longer than average game. These rare and irregular games between normally fast and skilled players should not be determined by a timer. Game timers should also not be used to determine the outcome of games of players with physical disabilities.

In my experience, it is best to work directly with the slow player(s). Identify the problem (typically socializing) and implement a solution. If an inexperienced player is taking too long to set the hand, work with them and give them pointers on how to

utes before each tournament by dealing six cards face up and asking the player how they would hold the hand as dealer and pone. Communication and support are imperative to improving the situation.

If your club has developed successful methods for dealing with slow players, I'd appreciate hearing about them. If your club uses a game timer, I'd also like to hear if this is accomplishing your objective. All of this info will be used for a future column. Thank you!

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING • SEPTEMBER 20, 2013 WESTIN HOTEL PERIMETER NORTH • ATLANTA GA

(presented in condensed form)

President Jeanne Hofbauer called the meeting to order at 9a. Directors present were Dave Aiken, Pat Barrett, Dave Campbell, Tom Cookman, Annett Eiffert, Willie Evans, Richard Frost, Roland Hall, Don Hannula, Jeanne Hofbauer, Roy Hofbauer, Ron Logan, Bill Medeiros, Bob Milk, Dave O'Neil, Larry Phifer, Bruce Sattler, Todd Schaefer, Phyllis Schmidt, Peggy Shea, Jeff Shimp, Wayne Steinmetz, Valerie Sumner, Keith Widener. Approved absence for Charlie Finlev.

The agenda was approved, and the minutes of the February 7, 2013, BOD meeting were approved.

**Old business**: (1) Eiffert announced that the ACC trademark has been approved for ten years at a cost of \$275. (2) Eiffert reported on her tournament where the higher-seeded player dealt first in the playoffs, with opinions pretty evenly split.

Election of officers: President: J. Hofbauer unanimously reelected. Executive VP: Schaefer unanimously reelected. VP-Policy: three nominations: Widener, Sumner, and Milk; Widener elected. VP-Operations: Campbell unanimously reelected. Member-at-Large: two nominations: Shimp and Hall: Shimp reelected.

**Grand National 32 Update**: O'Neil reported 260 entries for GN 32, with 113 people attending the Awards Banquet.

**Grand National 33 Update:** Brion Neeley and codirectors Denise Fortin and Sumner said they will extend the tournament to three two-day tournaments in Phoenix AZ, with the GN being held on September 20–21, 2014. The Marriott will be the hosting hotel with a rate of \$99 per night.

**Grand National 34 Update**: Scott Kooistra shared information regarding GN 34 in Yankton SD. Kooistra has many sponsors for the tournament, so there will be 100% payback. Don Thienel will be hosting a weekday tournament prior to GN 34 in Omaha NE at the Comfort Inn. Thienel has secured a room rate of \$79, with free parking and a hot breakfast during the tournament.

Bids for Grand National 35: Schaefer said that we have two bids: one from Campbell to host GN 35 in Raleigh NC at the Hilton. The condition of this bid is that GN must use the same double-elimination match-play format as National Open; this bid had to be approved ASAP, as the hotel needs an answer. The second bid is only in the early stages of information gathering: Sattler has been in discussion with a hotel in Bethesda MD, but not have enough information is in hand yet. Discussion: many board members said that though they like the format of the National Open, they feel the GN should follow the traditional format. It was asked if Campbell and Catherine Perkins would reconsider hosting the GN without using the National Open format, but they were adamant that if they did it would take away from the legacy tournament that is held there in July. After much discussion, it was decided that we would not award a bid for GN 35 and will revisit this issue at the February BOD meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Marlene Lazachek discussed the income statement, comparative balance sheet, and cash balance sheet. Report approved. Lazachek reported that

an audit was done and it went well. The ACC had a profit for the year of \$4,129. Lazachek reported that members are coming back years after the fact and questioning their MRPs and wanting her to confirm that they received the points that they felt they had earned. This has proven to be very time consuming and in many cases she is not able to retrieve the info. There was discussion around how we could address members and their requests. A compromise was reached and Cookman made a motion that anyone wanting to question their MRPs has one year from the date the statistician enters the results; second by Barrett; motion approved.

**Membership Secretary Report**: Larry Hassett not in attendance and so no report given.

Hall of Fame: Barrett distributed a list of current panel members and asked that the five new BOD members select their three HOF panelists and that any BOD member who wanted to change their panelists have two weeks to submit changes. Barrett said that 98% of the ballets were returned in the last election. R. Hofbauer made clear that someone does not have to be on the BOD to be elected to the HOF.

Membership Survey: Campbell shared the results of his online survey and discussed ideas on how to increase membership and keep new members at the Grass Roots level. J. Hofbauer suggested that weekend TDs select a Cribbage Ambassador to welcome new players. Cookman volunteered to be "A Salesmen for the ACC"; he asked for the list of people who do not renew their membership, and he will contact them and see why they did not renew and then provide feedback to the BOD. After further discussion it was decided that Campbell put together a committee and bring a proposal to the BOD in February regarding a membership drive. Aiken reported that Tracy Yott is the new Grass Roots Corner editor and is doing a great job of reporting stories about local clubs. There was also discussion about a class at the Sands on the Thursday night before the TOC, providing tips to improve play. Shea and J. Hofbauer will contact George Rasmussen to see if he will teach the class, then follow up with Barbara Woodward to see if she could provide a location. Shea will communicate to the BOD members when this will take place so they can drop in, and also let Aiken know so he can put it in Cribbage World. Members asked about paying their ACC membership via PayPal, and so Campbell will address this with Larry Hassett and report back to the BOD in February. Campbell also brought up some concerns about how we select our "Rookie of the Year." It was decided that Widener would examine the ROY policy criteria and bring back suggestions to the BOD.

Random Seating: Hall and Campbell brought up their concerns about tournaments not following a true random seating plan. The East is the only region that uses true random seating. Other areas use preassigned seating or drawing for seats from separate buckets so that some players select a different table in order to avoid playing certain players. While most everyone agrees that handicapped players and relatives should be given exceptions for seating, it should not be allowed in any other situation. BOD members discussed their ideas and concerns about

how they do random seating. It was determined that this would be taken to the Executive Committee by Widener and Campbell with a recommendation to be brought back to the BOD in February.

**Q-Pools**: Campbell asked why some tournaments include the Q-pool in their entry fee while other tournaments list these fees separately. There was discussion about the pros and cons of making Q-pools mandatory and if we do when do we put this into place. Campbell made a motion that Q-pools/side pools be optional with the exception of the JPW Open and TOC; second by Cookman; no vote taken. Sattler asked for the definition of Q-pool and asked that "graduated Q-pools" that do not include all qualifiers (i.e., payback 1 of 6 or 1 of 8) be referred to as "graduated side pools." Sattler made a motion that "a Q-pool not be called a Q-pool unless all qualifiers receive equal or partial payout"; second by Campbell; motion not approved. Sattler asked that all tournament flyers state how the Q-pool will be paid out and that the sanctioning request form be changed to include the type of Q-pool the tournament director is requesting. Campbell said that the Regional Commissioners will address this concern.

Social Media Content Policy: Eiffert brought up concerns regarding personal endorsements or editorials on the ACC website and how they are being monitored. Eiffert would like to see a disclaimer saying that user-generated posts may be rejected or removed when the content of a post is off-subject or contains obscenity or other offensive terms. Milk said that he would be happy to incorporate the policy relating to advertising. This topic was tabled until February, when Eiffert, Milk, and Widener will bring it back to the BOD.

TOC: Hannula discussed ways to save time and cost for the TOC through reducing the numbers of invitations being sent to qualifiers. Hannula said the cost last year was \$1,400, primarily for sending out and printing the invites. Shimp made a motion to "reduce the TOC invite mailings by eliminating notices to second-year Master rating and above, second-year Bronze rating and above, and second-year eMaster and above"; second by Hall; motion approved. Hannula discussed the name of the TOC and thought it should not be named after anyone, but simply called the Tournament of Champions. Hannula made a motion that the "the American Cribbage Congress Tournament of Champions be known only as the TOC and have no other name"; second by Sattler; motion not approved (11-13). R. Hofbauer made a motion that the TOC be permanently named the "Syl Lulinski Tournament of Champions"; second by Sumner; motion approved (18 in favor). Hannula made an amendment that "no name be printed on the award for the TOC"; second by Sattler; amendment not approved.

Senior Judges Program: Shimp discussed the need for more senior judges and asked that we change policy to reflect the increase. Shimp said he would make the change within thirty days once he receives recommendations. Shimp made a motion to "expand the number of senior judges to ten in the Central Region, ten in the Eastern Region, and sixteen in the Western Region"; second by Milk; motion approved.

Judges Program: Widener and Aiken presented changes that need to be enforced as soon as possible. Widener made a motion to "pass the following rules and that they be given to all tournament directors to follow"; motion approved: (a) the head judge at a tournament should always be a senior judge, if one is present; (b) all senior judges

in attendance at a tournament should always be in active service; (c) two judges must always be present at every judge call, at both Grass Roots (if two are available) and tournaments; (d) after listening to both players' stories, judges must step aside to consult the rulebook and reach a decision; when they return to the players they should, if necessary, read the relevant rule from the rulebook to support their decision; (e) once judges are called to make a ruling, they may not deviate from the rulebook; (f) the ACC should provide special badges for senior judges; and (g) all judges must be recertified when a new rulebook is issued. J. Hofbauer made an amendment to remove provision (e) from the motion; second by Shea; amendment approved. Aiken asked that the ACC establish five levels of judges with specific requirements to be met at each level before a judge is promoted to the next level. There was some discussion about the requirements: a straw poll was taken and it was decided that Aiken and Widener would ask for some feedback and then come back to the BOD in February. Widener and Aiken propose that a Judge Commission be established for receiving complaints about judges, reviewing bad judging calls and judges' behavior, and removing, demoting, or requiring recertification for incompetent judges. J. Hofbauer asked Widener and Aiken to get with Al Miller and bring this back to the BOD.

Time Limit for Casting Ballots for BOD Elections: Aiken made a motion to "change the postmark date to May 31 for casting BOD ballots"; second by Shimp; motion approved.

Order of BOD Candidates Bios: Aiken made a motion that "names of BOD candidates be listed in random order on the BOD election ballot, with the candidate biographies appearing in the same order. Each election year, at the BOD meeting prior to the election, the President will appoint three BOD members to assign a random order to be used in the upcoming election"; second by Logan; motion approved.

**CW Q&A**: Cookman said he would like a page in *Cribbage World* where members could ask questions or make suggestions. Cookman said he would respond to the emails and would work with Logan on this project. Cookman made a motion that "*Cribbage World* have a new page that members use as a forum for questions and suggestions via email"; second by Milk; motion approved.

Technology Committee: Cookman feels that we need to bring the ACC up to date in the area of technology, and he would like to head a committee to review the future of the ACC in this regards. Cookman made a motion to put together a Technology Committee, with himself as chairman; second by J. Hofbauer; motion approved. J. Hofbauer said that Campbell from the Executive Committee will be in charge of this committee. Valerie Goldgeier said that set up a website where she is currently posting results in real time for all the tournaments at Grand National. Goldgeier offered her support to the committee, and Cookman said that he will have Paul Gregson on the committee. J. Hofbauer made it clear that this committee does not replace the current MRP Committee. J. Hofbauer asked Cookman to report back to the BOD in February.

ACC Policy and Procedures Manual: Catherine Perkins distributed the new policy pages and explained how to update the BOD manual. Perkins said that we need to decide where we should add the rule regarding the limits of week-day tournaments. Alken made a motion that we amend policy 6.D.4 to remove that line (#4) and insert "weekday tournaments held in the same venue the week before and/

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or after a weekend tournament are limited to the Legacy Tournaments" to 6.D.3 and move the current policy 6.D.3 to 6.D.4; second by Logan; motion approved.

Annual Regional Team Tourney and Additional Awards: Hall distributed detailed information regarding expanding the All Star team to ten people from each region with the West having two teams, one from the Northwest and one from the Southwest. J. Hofbauer said that this is the same proposal that we discussed at two previous meetings, but Logan said that Hall followed the criteria required to bring it before the board, so we should hear his proposal. Hall pointed out that some players who make the All American Team are not able to play on the All Star Team due to taking only the top eight players from each region. The new format would reduce the number of games and would allow the tournament to be shorted by about fifteen minutes. J. Hofbauer expressed her concern that this has been DeLynn Colvert's tournament and we are changing it without his support and also creating a bigger burden for the Sands. Shimp said that the West does not have equality with respect to the number of people making the team, given the number of ACC members in the West. The player increases from all regions, not just the Western, will give additional members a chance to make the team, which will increase excitement in the game. Hall made a motion to "expand the All Star team from twenty-four players to forty players (ten each from Eastern, Central, Northwest, and Southwest), starting August 1, 2014, as the beginning of the 2013/2014 season"; second by Sattler; motion approved (13-11). Shimp made a motion to amend the proposal to "make the increase to the All Star Team when DeLynn stops running the tournament"; second by J. Hofbauer; amendment not approved. Hall made a motion that "sixteen additional All Stars receive All Regional Award"; second by Sattler; motion approved.

#### **Committee Reports**

Executive (J. Hofbauer): Campbell suggested awarding Catherine Perkins a ring and it was approved by the Executive Committee. \$200 was spent for the Salem Fair and \$250 for a stipend for DeLynn Colvert's work on the awards

Ethics (Logan): the committee received seven letters of complaints and issued three suspensions. Logan is trying to find the best way to communicate the end of a player's suspension. If any BOD member has any suggestions, please email Logan.

Grass Roots (Joan Rein): 188 active Grass Roots clubs, with many requests about forming new clubs. Rein distributed reports recapping Grass Roots updates by Paul Gregson on the Grass Roots website. Gregson has put in 106 hours in the last six months. Rein reported that we are giving out more awards due to awarding points to the 12-GRP rule: 1,185 people have earned Bronze, 278 Silver, and 32 Gold.

Internet (Milk): 248 tournaments will be held this year, with an increase of 125 to 150 as the number of tourneys that players can count for points. Internet stats are online for players. Revenue increased by \$500 to \$6,300 for the year.

PR/Publicity: Hall reported a request for a form that tournament directors can fill out to use as a press release, plus some talking points that TDs can use when screening a new player to see if they are ready for tournament play. J. Hofbauer asked that the boilerplate be uploaded to the website so directors have another resource to promote

their tournament and for info to be published in Cribbage

Tournament Rules & Guidelines (R. Hofbauer): we purchased 60,000 scorecards, and 30 bracket boards. Sanctioning request forms and reports forms will be available online soon.

#### Officer Reports

President (J. Hofbauer): we spent \$2,400 for GN awards, \$180 for BOD name badges, and \$1,160 for ACC promo boards. J. Hofbauer made a motion that the "ACC purchase 100 more ACC promotional cribbage boards for the West"; second by Shea; motion approved.

Executive VP (Schaefer): we need to look for additional locations for the next GN in the East in case the Sattler location does not come through. We are also are the look-out for locations for 2017 GN in the West, as many hotels need a three-year booking. Schaefer said we need additional people on the Ethics Committee because of vacancies; one from the Eastern Region and one from the Western Region are needed.

VP of Policy (Widener): Keith said he is looking forward to serving on the Executive Committee and thanked the BOD for electing him.

VP of Operations (Campbell): Alken is going to get a new computer (approximately \$2,000) once approved through the Executive Committee. We also have two possible candidates for a backup for Alken.

Member-at-Large (Shimp): nothing new to report.

Logan made a motion to adjourn the meeting; second by Shea. Meeting adjourned 5:15p.

Youth Teaching Tip

One important strategy that is rarely stressed by those teaching cribbage is the value of remembering which two cards you have thrown into the crib. When I am working with students, halfway through the pegging process, I ask them if they can recall the two cards they threw into the crib. The answer is generally, "I forgot." Not an acceptable reply! By remaining clear on the cards you have thrown from your hand, it may come into play as to how you decide your next move. For instance, I am much more apt to pair a 3 if I know that a third 3 was tossed into the crib. I tell kids that being creative is an excellent way to remember the cards they throw away. For example, if you throw 2-4 to the crib, think about Willie Mays who wore #24, or if you throw a K-8, imagine what the king ate (8) for dinner. How often do you recall what you've put in the crib?



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


## The Percentage Play: the Four-Card Run




As a general rule do not hold this four-card run. Hold the ace 2-3 with a lone 9, 10, jack, queen or king if you need a 14-point hand. However, a 2-3-4 combination will escape Jake's "31" play if you are the non-dealer and making the first lead (with a 3) and Jake is holding "ten's"-5's. Also hold the 2-3-4 with a lone 6 or 8. A favorable starter card can result in a 14-point hand. In addition, keeping a "Magic Eleven" and a "sleeper" will improve your pegging score. Your lead? The 3 is the percentage play.




This four-card run must be played with discretion. If it's your crib, discarding a 5 with a "ten" card may be your percentage play. Jake's lead? Keep the four-card run, especially if you're playing offense. Keep the 3-4-5 in combination with a 7 or 8, however, as this hand will score 14 points with the right starter. Check the board before making your discard decision.




The 3-4-5-6 run is usually held as it can score 16 points (with a 6 starter). And with a 3-4-5 starter the hand will score 14. You must consider your discards if it's Jake's crib. For example, a 3-4-5-6-10-10 hand, the proper discard would be a 3-10 (Jake's crib). And if Jake will be playing defense, keep the 4-5-6-"ten" and lead the "ten." Your pegging chances are much improved with the 4-5-6-"ten" rather than the 3-4-5-6 (a tough hand to lead from when you are the non-dealer).



The 4-5-6-7 run is usually held as It also can score 16 points (with a 4 starter). But board position and discarding to Jake's crib may force the four-card run to be abandoned.



If it's your crib, breakup this four-card run if you can discard the 5 with a "ten" card. The 6-7-8 held in combination with an ace or 2 is especially desirable. The 5 in your crib is the percentage play. Jake's crib? Hold the four-card run. Again, check the board and your discards.



The 6-7-8-9 is usually left intact. A helping starter card will score 16 points. Your lead? The 8 is the percentage play, keeping the 6-7 for a possible 5-trap. Also, if Jake pairs your 8 lead, you can escape with your 9. A 6 or 7 lead, if paired, puts you in a very bad position, with no "out" (or escape) card. And a 9 lead will likely draw a 6 for "15-2," leaving you with an untenable 7 or 8 response, or pairing the 6 for "21" (and an awkward, losing situation).

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
