Incoming Frog!

I would like to share some ideas we use for side pools at Oregon's Best Club 12. We have a free prize (financed by skunk bucket funds) that pays \$5 to the recipient of the last blank crib. In the eighth or ninth game, a little plush frog starts being tossed back and forth to the current blank crib holder, and it gets traded in at the end of play for the \$5 prize. Our players seem to be greatly entertained by bellowing "Frog!" and then ducking the incoming amphibian. We also have an optional \$1 pool for the first crib flush during the night's play. A player having miserable luck can still keep their hopes up for a chance to get this crib flush pool. But the best benefit has been the improvement in attendance when the pool goes three or four weeks without a winner. It costs only a dollar each week to compete, but some happy winners have collected upward of \$100 for their crib flush.

Fair, Friendly, Fun

Jeanne Hofbauer (November CW, page 22) touched on one of the big problems with seasoned cribbage players, and that is that they do not show good sportsmanship to new people, acting as if they should not be beaten by new players and even pouting if or when they are beaten. Our thirty-two-year-old grandson played with us this past summer about four times. He's a good player and knows the rules of play, yet was

thrown off his play by seasoned members throwing more rules at him and by members who would not speak to or smile at him. Many of the players were enjoyable for him to play, but those who weren't, who took the fun out of the game, also gave him good reason not to continue to go to the weekly club. If we want to keep new members, it needs to be fair, friendly, and fun with good sportsmanship.

Member Retention

Larry Hassett wrote a thoughtful and important opinion piece in the November CW (page 18) dealing with ACC membership over the last ten years. As Larry points out, recruiting new members has not been a problem for the ACC; holding on to the newly recruited members seems to be a major problem. To Hassett, the BOD has not addressed this situation: "Spending 90%-95% of its time on items that affect only the top 3% of the membership." This is not surprising to me since election to the BOD is chiefly influenced by candidates who achieve high MRP totals and tournament wins. These are aggressive and competitive people who have neither the desire nor the skill to de-

Of course, they would rather have gotten these big hands in sanctioned play—when they'd been worth \$100 from the ACC—but at least Scott won \$5 off Don Wanta (Toledo WA)!

Susanville Fall Classic Everyone makes mistakes, but you don't see Life Master (6*) Duane Toll (Sutherlin OR) do it very often. On fourth street in the third game of his playoff match against Master Paul Gregson (Antioch CA), Duane was the pone, and here's how pegging started:

termine what would benefit a new player. What the BOD needs to do is bring in a consultant who is experienced in social organizations and devising strategies to make newcomers feel comfortable. Perhaps special tables at each tournament could be designated where newcomers play each other for prizes that are generated by the newcomers' fees. I am not an expert in this area, but there are surely several out there. Some may even be ACC members who would be willing to volunteer their help. The BOD should expand their images of cribbage players to include people who want to play in a relaxed surrounding, sometimes winning, sometimes not. Playing cribbage in the ACC is too enjoyable to be limited to 6,000-7,000 people in the entire country.

We should be recruiting and retaining cribbage players—period. Labeling those of us in the ACC and placing us into various racial, gender, and cultural classes goes a long way in pointing out our differences, but does nothing to promote the game. Finding people who *enjoy* playing the game should be our number one priority. Tabulate the responses and make the necessary course corrections. I don't see the ACC

membership's lack of diversity as being a factor in the recruiting, retention, or longevity of the ACC.



Robert L. Julian died on November 24 at the age of 92. Born in Janesville WI on January 19, 1920, Bob proudly served his country in WWII as a member of the 42nd Infantry Division. He was later transferred to the 90th Infantry Division and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. He finished his tour of duty as a staffer on the *Stars and Stripes*. In his professional life, he worked in the graphic-arts industry for forty years. A four-time national champion (1994, 1996, 1999, and 2002), Bob also served on the BOD for eighteen years and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2008. Among his surviving grandchildren is ACC member Dean Julian (Simi Valley CA).

I started playing cribbage with Bob at a corner bar back in the mid-80s before he had 500 MRPs. He had an interesting life, and his memory served him well, telling many of his life adventures on our rides. He was frugal with himself but generous with others. He had a good life.





Baleen plates from bowhead whales are usually used for nets, lines, weaving baskets, and other artwork. When baleen is used for cribbage boards, it is normally as inlays, end caps, or other accents

When baleen is used f boards, it is normally as caps, or other accents on carved walrus ivory boards.
