It's not often that we mortals get to celebrate the 400th anniversary of anything, but June 2013 marks the 400th *Cribbage World* issued by the ACC since March 1980.

The first CW was a mere eight pages in length—with more than half of it taken up by a single article explaining the ACC's founding. This 4½-page apologia is unsigned, but it sounds much like the work of **Joseph P. Wergin**—the ACC's first president. You can read the entire first CW issue on pages 18–19 below (it's also online at cribbage.org/CribWorld/archives.asp).

The ACC's officers and directors are listed on page 7 of this inaugural CW issue, and ten of them are still ACC members:

Next time you see these players at a tour-


nament, thank them for their pivotal role in helping the ACC get started and stay afloat in those early days.

Cribbage World's first editor was James Arblaster (FL), who doubled (tripled?) as the ACC secretary-treasurer. Jim served as editor for the first 42 issues of CW, and then he handed the reins off to the indefatigable Robert Madsen (IL), who produced 29 issues in 1983–86.

The third CW editor was **Dale Munroe** (CT) who, after editing 49 CWs in 1986–90, passed his blue pencil to **De-Lynn Colvert** (MT)—who with the wisdom of Solomon and the tenacity of, well, DeLynn edited a whopping 202 issues of *Cribbage World* from 1990 to 2006.

With the retirement of DeLynn from editorial work, CW moved on to its fifth editor. I have had the privilege of now editing 78 CWs—and need to hang on only until November 2023 in order to beat DeLynn in something!

Regardless of whose name was on the masthead, one thing has remained constant over the years: CW reports cribbage news. Whether it's info about upcoming tournaments, tourney results, current standings, stories about Grass Roots clubs, continued on page 11

didja know?

The ACC's Board of Directors is made up of twenty-five members from all three regions of the American Cribbage Congress. The term of service of all directors expires on August 31 in odd-numbered years, and new terms begin on September 1 of that year. The distribution is designed so that no one region or state has an overabundant number of members. The breakdown is as follows: (1) no more than ten members can be from any one region; (2) no fewer than six members from any one region; and (3) no more than four members from any one state. If the above numbers are not met there is a formula in place to correct the excess or deficit. If a vacancy occurs on the BOD, it shall be filled by the individuals (in order of votes received) who were not elected in the last election. Any director who misses 50% of board meetings during their term (unless excused by the executive vice president) shall be removed and a replacement appointed by the president.

What's It Take to Qualify?

As more and more nontraditional tournaments (i.e., with other than 22 qualifying games) are sanctioned, there is always the question of how many game points (GPs) are probably going to be necessary to qualify for the playoffs. Toward that end, I have developed the nearby table of what it takes to qualify for the playoffs, based on an average of 1.25 GPs per qualifying game played (rounded as necessary). A bell curve will produce these results more than 90% of the time, but the user should be aware that, on occasion, the minimum may be more or less than indicated. Furthermore, for example, it is doubtful that all 15s in a 12-game qualifying round will qualify but it is a certainty that very rarely will anything under 15 qualify. The table should be used as a guide only: there are no guarantees.

Membership Secretary Larry Hassett reports that 10,714 new members joined the ACC in the ten-year period 2001–2010, but 4,943 did not renew after the first year. This means that 49% of our new members did not renew their ACC membership after the first year! This trend must be corrected if the ACC is going to be around for our children and grandchildren to enjoy.

Via the internet, newspapers, and word of mouth, the ACC is getting, on average, over 1,000 new members each year, and it's likely that another 1,000 players a year come to Grass Roots for a week or two and don't join the ACC.

What can we do to make these new players feel welcome and wanted? How can we get them to stick around for the second year and beyond?

First impressions are very important. Many new players who come to Grass Roots the first time probably don't know anybody there. They're nervous, afraid to make a mistake, and maybe can't play a game in fifteen minutes. We need to welcome new players and make them feel wanted—not like they are inconveniencing us.

If they are slow—we need to be tolerant and not complain, as their speed will increase the more they play and the more confident they become about making the

right discards and counting their hands correctly.

If they miss points or make a bad play—don't make them feel inferior; rather, let them know that you did this too when you were just starting out and occasionally even do it now. Let them know that there is a growing and learning process that they will go through, but to stick with it because there are a lot of good times and good friends to be enjoyed in the ACC.

If money is an issue—let them play for free or for the minimum cost of club expenses.

Here are nine procedures that our club (Century Peggers Club 100 in Napa CA) implemented as a way to make new players and existing members feel wanted and welcome:

- 1. After the new player arrives and before the start of play, the club director teams them up with a friendly experienced player who will talk about the club, explain how to fill out a scorecard, and play a few hands and explain some rules. They also receive several handouts welcoming them to our club (see nearby box) and about counting their hands.
- 2. For the first four weeks, a new player is not penalized for violating any tournament rules. They are told what the rule is and what the penalty would be.

- 3. For the first four weeks, a new player is not penalized for making a pegging or counting error. Their opponent explains and corrects any errors, and the new player is allowed to peg all the points they were entitled to if they had seen them.
- 4. In the first week a friendly experienced player is assigned to sit next to the new player, and the new player can ask for help on how to hold or play a hand. For the next three weeks the new player can ask for help from a neighboring player.
- If a new player is not certain if they want to join the ACC after two weeks, we give them an additional two weeks to decide.
- 6. A new player is allowed to play for free. Of course, that means they are not eligible for any prize money.
- 7. Existing club members are allowed to play any week for the minimum cost of club expenses. (They are not eligible for prize money unless they pay the appropriate entry fee.) This option allows newer, less experienced members to hone

- their skills without feeling like they are throwing money down the drain.
- 8. We allow shortened games, but only if both players agree, starting at 30-30 or sometimes 60-60.
- 9. As an incentive for club members to play weekly, the club will pay a member's next season's ACC and Grass Roots dues if they attend 27 or more weeks of the 36-week Grass Roots season.

The goal of this article is to highlight the problem of member retention and to present one possible solution. If some of these ideas sound good and you want to incorporate them in your club's procedures, please do. Let's take action. There are a lot of cribbage players out there. Let's welcome them and give them the opportunity to enjoy the ACC as much as we do.

Welcome to the Napa Cribbage Club!

Like many new players, this may be the first time you have played tournament Cribbage!

Not only do you have to worry about counting and playing the hand correctly, you are now entering the world of Tournament RULES!

In tournament play, there are rules and thus penalties for all sorts of things like over-pegging, for not laying down a playable card on a Go, etc., etc.

Don't sweat it.... For your first four tourneys, just RELAX:

You will not be penalized for violating any tournament rules. Rather, your opponent will correct the situation and let you know about the rule.

Also, we don't play Muggins (opponent scoring any points you miss.) In fact, you will not be allowed to miss any points. Your opponent will make sure you get all your points.

In addition, for your first week, we will assign an experienced player sitting next to you to be your "guide". Any questions you may have, @V@N including advice on how to play a hand, will be allowed. Then, for the following three weeks you will be allowed to ask a player sitting next to you for that same advice!

CALL THE JUDGE!

The Play

Jim is dealing and Pat is the pone. Jim puts three cards into his own crib. As Pat is placing her cards into the crib, Jim realizes his mistake and picks up his three cards. Pat has not let go of her two crib cards, so she returns them to her hand. However, she wonders if Jim is allowed to pick up his cards since he has already discarded to the crib. So she calls a judge.

The Call

Jim is in luck, he may retrieve his three cards and make a corrected two-card discard to the crib with no penalty (see rule 4.4a(1)). This case is actually one of only two instances when cards can be retrieved from the crib. In this case, it is essential that only Jim's cards are in the crib. If Pat had finished discarding, the five-card crib would be dead and Jim would have to play and count his hand with only three cards.

The other time a player may retrieve and change a discard into the crib is in the instance where he or she has placed the crib on the wrong side of the table (see rule 5.1c). Again, it is essential that only these two cards are on the wrong side and not mixed with the opponent's discards.

The Rules

Rule 4.4. Incorrect Number of Cards in Hand or Crib

- a. Before both players have discarded to the crib:
 - If both players were dealt the correct number of cards and one player discarded the wrong amount to the crib (but before the other player dis-

carded), the player who discarded the wrong amount may retrieve the discard and then discard the correct number to the crib

Rule 5.1. Placement

c. Prior to the turn of the starter card, if only one player discards to the wrong side of the board, that player is permitted to retrieve the card(s) and reevaluate the selection.

arlier this year I corresponded with ACC member Lance Browne from Portland ME. In February I met Lance at the JPW/TOC in Reno, and Lance gave me this beautiful Bakelite board along with its history.

Ron Mackenzie, Lance's best friend and fishing buddy, gave him the board. Ron's dad, R. G. Mackenzie, was a general manager for General Electric. In 1944 R. G. designed and had his shop make this board. Bakelite was a commonly used material for electrical products

and has been used by several cribbage board manufacturers. Even the pegs are Bakelite and were turned on a minilathe.

Ron's dad passed away before teaching him to play cribbage, so



Ron gave the board to Lance. I spoke with Ron and he told me there was no way he would play cribbage with Lance, because Lance is a "professional player." He explained that in 2011 Lance won the National Open in Raleigh NC. Lance also plays with Casco Bay Cribbage Club 375. To celebrate Lance's National Open victory, Ron made a huge wooden board

that had "The King" engraved between the two peg tracks. He then attached it to the back of Lance's pickup truck, and Lance drove around town for awhile be-

fore discovering what Ron had done!

OUR STORY

It began at the National Open Cribbage Tournament last August in Raleigh, North Carolina. Here is how it happened.

Cribbage leaders and players from across the country, each of them competing in the National Open, were vocal in their concern about the game of Cribbage on a national basis. They were aware of the proliferation of local and regional associations everywhere & they agreed to a man that this was good for the venerable old game. But, they were concerned that there might be a fly in the cintment.

Among the many regional groups promoting the game was the International Cribbage Association based in Gardenia, California. The ICA is neaded up by John Mixer, undoubtedly one of the finest players anywhere in the world. John, in fact, won the National Open in 1978, breezing through the double elimination event without suffering a loss.

At the time of last year's National Open, the ICA was involved in a vigorous campaign to solicit members and sell stock. This, in a nutshell, was what was bothering the players in Raleigh. They were openly anxious about a cribage organization which was obviously structured for personal profit. They didn't like this approach & wanted to do something about it.

The result of their concern was a meeting in Raleigh of about 15 players from different regions of the country. When the dust had settled, following this meeting, the American Cribbage Congress had been formed. Its goal: To promote

the game of cribbage on a truly national basis, at a minimum cost to its members, and under the guidence of a national Board of Directors which in turn would be given direction by an Executive Committee made up of acknowledged cribbage leaders from not just one region but from a large geographic area.

Specifically, the Congress was to be an incorporated, nonprofit organization with a definite constitution and detailed set of by-laws. We are very pleased to inform you that each of these steps have been completed and we're off and running.

There have been some bumps along the way, but thanks to the generosity & diligence of those 15 people, and many others who first saw the need for a national organization, the bumps have been paved over. The original members of the Board contributed \$250 to get the Congress off the ground, and have made subsequent donations to cover formation expenses such as legal fees, mailing permits, bonding of our Secretary-Treasurer, printing costs for our new and beautiful stationery, and other sundry items that were felt to be beyond the realm of cost underwriting from membership dues.

There has been only one cloud on the horizen, one which the Congress has had no part in, and which we have steadfastly tried to ignore simply because it was felt that any type of comment or reference to it might lend it credence it does not deserve.

The problem is a campaign of vilification which has been waged for the past six months by the IGA through its newsletter and series of letters to individuals associated with the Congress. Our Executive Committee has discussed these smear tactics, and though the inclination has been strong to counterattack, we have refrained since we honestly believe that the

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best interest of Cribbage would not be served by such a step.

We intend to continue with this approach, but it was strongly felt that a brief explanation was in order, in this, our very first Congress edition of Gribbage World.

We have no beef with the ICA, in fact, several of our members have attempted to help ICA. The mailing list for the National Open for instance, which was evolved over the past seven years, was sent to the ICA to assist in a membership drive. Congress President Joseph P. Wergin of Madison, Wisconsin, one of the world's leading authorities on card games, has traveled to Gardenia and has carried on a long interchange of letters with ICA officials in an attempt to bring an end to the ICA's apparent purpose of sabotaging the

These steps however have so far made no difference to IGA officials, with one exception. The IGA has apparently changed its corporate structure following correspondence with Congress officials. They tell us they no longer are in business for profit, and if this is true, we are extremely happy about it. There is no room for self-aggrandizement in the promotion of our game. Nevertheless, the IGA which is basically a West Coast organization, continues its attack. So be it. The Congress will continue to disregard these attacks and apparent jealousies so far espoused by the IGA.

Following the organization meeting last August, a 26-member Board of Directors was named and a nine member Executive Committee was appointed. The Executive Committee met in closed session in Gincinnati in January and began the nuts and bolts steps involved in making the American Cribbage Congress the most viable association of its type in the country.

Under the expert guidence of President Joseph Petrus Wergin, committees were formed in the important areas of constitution and by-laws, tournament and league playing rules, awards program, tournament and league sanctioning, player ratings and several other areas where it was felt that input from the national head-quarters would be consequential.

The Executive Committee members, who met in Cincinnati at their own expense, shared their ideas and concepts in each of these areas, and agreed to personally chair each of the committees formed.

Such specific items as incorporation, membership, neweletter production, etc. were also discussed and acted on. It was decided to incorporate in North Carolina because the *ational Open is held there and Board meetings would be easy to organize during the big tournament e wry August. A prominent North Carolina law firm, one of whose members is nimmed? a nationally prominent Bridge and Cribbage player, agreed to undertake the process of incorporation, a process that has been completed. Nembership dues were to be kept to an absolute minimum, and the figure of \$2 was agreed upon. The production and distribution of our newsletter was delegated to Secretary-Treasurer Jim Arblaster of Kissimmee, Florida. In other words, the Congress was in business...

This is our story. But, it is only the first chapter. There is more, much more to be written, and that is where you can play a part. We hope you already belong to a Cribbage Association for there are many fine organizations in the states of Galifornia, Colorado, Florida, Hawaii, lowa, Massachusetts, Kichigan, Kinesota, New York, Rhode Island and Wisconsin. The Congress actively supports this organizations and has already begun dialogue with many of the officers af these fine groups to help in

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anyway possible. In turn, we ask you for your consideration in helping us to make the Congress the organization that our founding members first envisioned last August. Consider membership in the Congress, talk among friends and fellow players, and let us know your thoughts.

We also hope that many of you will be at the National Open this year and we invite you to talk with us at that time about any ideas or innovations that you might have in mind. Our Board will meet at that time and it will want as much input as possible fromplayers from every part of the country.

Remember, the only ax the Congress has to grind is a simple one: Bring national unity and a sense of direction to our game, to promote it, to make it truly THE game, the game that all of us already know is the best two-handed card game in the world

Hello everyone! As a member of the ACC Public Relations and Marketing Committee, my second priority is to use this forum to share information concerning member retention and attracting new members. With 186 clubs in North America, the Grass Roots program is the foundation for maintaining and building the ACC membership rolls. It is up to us to ensure that the ACC is still thriving when our grandchildren are ready to play cribbage competitively.

Please take note that I am not using a personal email for this column. Create a new contact in your email address book for ACCgrassrootscorner@gmail.com and name it "Grass Roots Corner" (not my name). If you've already created a contact using my name attached to this email address, please change the name to Grass Roots Corner. That way, no matter who edits this column in the future, you'll never have to change the email address again.

All Grass Roots clubs should consider creating a personalized email account for the

club. I recommend gmail (Google mail) because you'll also have

access to Google Drive (formerly Google Docs), where you can create and keep documents (word processing documents, spreadsheets, etc.) for your club. These documents can also be shared with other club members, with or without editing privileges. No matter who runs the club in the future, the contact list and all documents will be available in the same location. All that needs to be transferred is the password (which should then be changed).

When you create that club email account, be sure to create a signature that will automatically be attached to every new email you send. The signature should include club meeting time and location with contact information (email, phone, website, etc.) for anyone having questions. Show your internet prowess by creating a hyperlink to your club page in the ACC Local Club Directory.
