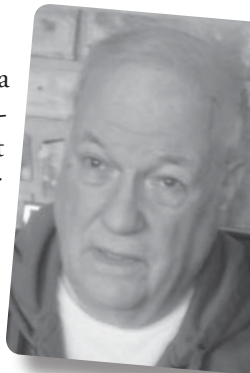
**M**y first official cribbage tournament took place over fifteen years ago, and I am still trying to get the egg off my face.

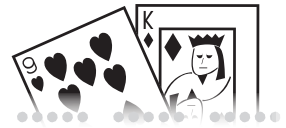

The checks started rolling in from clubs and individuals, far more than I expected or needed. Several callers wanted to cover any cost not covered by donations. Louise died suddenly as all this was taking place. Thanks to her many friends, who never forgot her in her time of need, a check was mailed for \$663 to the rescue mission. ## An Idea Whose Time Has Come

Retail stores have lots of menu items. Restaurants offer hundreds of products. Baskin-Robbins has 32 flavors. Heck, even Starbucks, which sells only one main thing—coffee—offers it in a hundred different ways. Why? Because they get more business that way.

The ACC wants to attract “customers” but when it comes to building this organization from the ground up we offer only one flavor: a nine-game Grass Roots format.

In the twenty-plus years I have been an ACC member, I have been a club director for fourteen years. We have hosted, easily, over 200 guests but we kept only twelve to fifteen players regularly. Why? I think it’s because we don’t offer enough variety.

The biggest complaint I have heard over all that time is, “I don’t have the time to devote three (or more) hours to play nine games of cribbage.” In our hectic world, what can or can’t be done is a matter of time.

In my opinion, if the ACC wants to attract and keep players coming back for Grass Roots play, they need to add a few more “flavors” to the mix. Perhaps a four-, five-, or seven-game format (or all three), where 6 or 8 game points could be earned as opposed to 12.

Players who would play in a mini-Grass Roots format like this would obviously not earn points as quickly but . . .

1. it would offer more flexibility for working people who may have only 90 to 120 minutes a week to play a shorter format, as opposed to three-plus

hours.

2. it would allow slower players who can’t play nine games in 150 minutes a chance to be part of the ACC without the fast-paced pressure that playing nine games can place on a player.
3. it would be a monetary boost for the ACC since it would take a player twice as long to earn the Bronze Award; this means twice as much revenue for the ACC per player.

I would be the first director to start a mini-Grass Roots format if it were available, and I would venture to bet that the ACC’s membership would grow 25% within two years if it were an available option.

Businesses thrive when they offer options, plain and simple. If the ACC wants to promote *cribbage*—and not just ACC-format cribbage—it will have to adapt and adjust to the needs of the cribbage-playing public.

My boss has a great saying: “Don’t tell me what we can’t do, tell me what we can do.” There is no reason that the ACC could not adopt this idea and make this organization bigger and better. **CW**

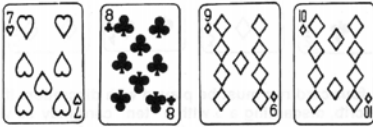

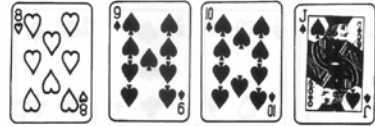

# CRIBBAGE LESSONS FROM THE PRO!

## The Percentage Play: the Four-Card Run (con't.)



The 7-8-9-10 run is played with discretion. The 10 is discarded in many cases (for example, it's Jake's crib and you hold 2-7-8-9-10-king. Discard the 10-king). Hold the basic 7-8-9 in combinations with the "Magic Eleven" (2-9).



The percentage play for these combinations (if they are helped with a 5-6) is to discard the high end of the run to Jake's crib, and the low end of the run to your crib. Try to hold a "Magic Eleven" combination. Of course, if the remaining two cards do not help your hand, then hold the four-card run (example: 6-8-10-jack-queen-king, discard the 6-8). And as usual, board position plays a key role in making discarding decisions. You may want to discard defensively (8-jack, for example).

Do I play "15-2" or pair for two?



Do I pair the queen or play "15-2"?



"Thirteen"

The percentage play is "15-2." Jake probably holds "tens" and a 5 or 5's. By playing "15-2," Jake will probably play another "ten" card for "25." This will be a "go" and Jake will be forced to play a 5 if he has one. You then respond by leading your percentage queen. An excellent chance exists of a trap for a run of three. If you pair the queen on your second play, you stand the chance of having your jack (and 2) trapped. Think ahead. Avoid traps and play the percentage play!

# didja know?

There was some confusion about the wording of two questions in the November column:

*Q. How many times can two people play in a local event? A. Two times.*

The intent of this question was to clarify what happens when a club has less than ten players at its weekly tournament. If this happens, it is obvious that some players will have to play each other more than once. Since six is the legal minimum to hold an official Grass Roots club, if six, seven, eight, or nine players are present, then some players will play each other again. But if only five or fewer players are present, then players would have to play each other three times, and this is not allowed under Grass Roots rules.

*Q. How many times can two people play in a GRRT/GRNT? A. Three times.*

A similar thing happens in GRRT or GRNT if less than nineteen players are present. The minimum number required for these eighteen-game tourneys is eight players, so if eight through eighteen players are present, then players are allowed to play each other up to three times—but not four times (which would happen if seven or fewer players were present).

**Bottom line:** under no circumstance can Grass Roots players play each other three times in an official weekly meeting or four times in GRRT/GRNT. If players do have to play each other again, they are not allowed to play the same player twice in succession, but must continue in rotation (that is, play one game and rotate).

Because of the commitment required to play in a long match (a span of multiple months for those who advance to the later rounds), they tend to be smaller tournaments—usually numbering 16 to 32 players.

The knock-out format of a long match lends itself nicely to having a full bracket with the number of players equaling a power of 2 (ideally 8, 16, 32, or 64 participants). Many long matches set their maximum at 16 or 32. Some long matches are run as double-elimination, where 8, 16, or 32 players are most ideal. The downside of preselecting a maximum number of players is that many who want to participate may be left out once all of the slots are taken.

Realistically, a long match can accommodate any number of players over 8. If a long match has any number of players other than a power of 2, some players are randomly drawn to be given a bye to bypass the opening round. The lucky players who are drawn for a bye have a distinct advantage in that they've already avoided one round in which they could have been knocked out of the tournament.

One optional solution to deal with those unlucky players who weren't drawn for a bye is to treat them as if they each have half of an entry. For example, with 17 players, you'll have 15 players with byes and 2 players will compete in a play-in round. Those 2 players are essentially competing for one slot in a 16-player tournament. As such, half of their entry fees would be refunded to them, with total payouts adjusted accordingly. When combined, their two half entries become one entry fee.

The number of players in a long match and how any byes are handled is entirely up to the discretion of the tournament director.

# Cribbage Board of the Month

When I obtained this cribbage board in 1984, I became a cribbage board collector. Up to that point I had two boards. One was my father's board that we used when I learned to play. My second board was a basic three-around board, that my father gave me when I went to college.

Every board has a story. This board is no exception. The story is that my friends **Lee Pre-novost**, **Mike Cardwell**, and I played at least once a week on it at the Star Lake Tavern near Des Moines WA. We worked the scorer's bench for the Highline College men's and women's basketball teams. After the games we went for beer and cribbage on this board owned by the tavern. When we went on road trips we had to play on my old college board. It was not near as nice as the tavern board.

I guess you can say this board started my collection. Years later I discovered the Cribbage Board Collectors Society on the ACC website. In 2008 **Bette Bemis**, founder and president of CBCS, put me in touch with CW editor **David Aiken**. Since then, I have written seventy monthly articles. So, many thanks to the ACC, CBCS, and all the great people I have met over the years. I am having a ball.

## Youth Teaching Tip

**Bill and Bambi Klem** have a well-established cribbage program at Lakewood High School in Tulalip WA. They sent a this teaching tip: "We use short boards (61 holes) in the class for several reasons. (1) We can play more than one game during a class period. (2) Kids have short attention spans so after one short game they move to the next opponent, and the clock starts all over. (3) There is less chance of skunks. This is the most important reason. With the shorter game the point spread is smaller and the loser doesn't get beat so bad that they get discouraged. If they are close to winning they tend to try harder the next game and they don't lose their enthusiasm to play. Shorter games give us a chance to move students around more to interact with students they would normally not associate with (jocks vs. nerds, boys vs. girls, etc). The social interaction seems to improve the whole classroom experience and shows them that anyone can beat anyone else."

Grass Roots cribbage is intended to be the training ground for those players who are interested in playing in sanctioned ACC tournaments. Along with learning cribbage strategy and good sportsmanship, this is the level where the rules of the game are also learned. There is one rule that I see constantly getting ignored, both in club and on the tournament trail.

Rule 9.4.a clearly states that when a player mixes the hand with the crib or deck before it is counted and pegged *and* before the opponent confirms it, the count of the hand is forfeited. In what I believe is an effort to speed the game along, rule 9.4.b is being abused. Based on 9.4.a, rule 9.4.b states that if the crib is involved and the dealer mixes the crib with the pack, the dealer forfeits the crib count. I'm constantly seeing players count the crib, combine the crib with the deck, and hand it to the opponent prior to pegging the points.

Review rule 9.2 for the proper order of counting. By following rule 9.2, rule 9.4 will never be an issue. There are players who play by the rules and there are players who play the rules. Playing by the rules practically ensures a problem-free game without calls for a judge. Happy New Year!

All three of the above venues make the players welcome with discounted rooms and other promotions. And of course there are always those casinos for more fun!

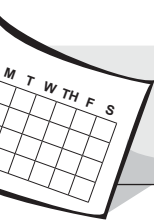
