

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

On June 10, 2013, my life came to screeching halt. Everything moved in slow motion as I listened to our family doctor diagnose my son, Kiefer Crosby, with osteosarcoma. My son had

never been sick a day in his life. He hurt his knee running up a flight of stairs, and his knee pain never ceased. My son had just turned 18 and had graduated from high school four days prior to this diagnosis. A time when my family should be rejoicing quickly was brushed aside, and immediate treatment plans were made.

Kiefer was referred to Stanford Medical Center in Palo Alto CA.

There he would meet a team of doctors at the Lucile Packard Bass Center for Childhood Cancer and Blood Disorders. As we listened and asked questions, we soon learned that osteosarcoma is very rare and very aggressive. It strikes children during major growth spurts in their bones. The news went from bad to worse. My son's cancer had metastasized into his lungs. His chances of beating the cancer fell to a miniscule level. Still he decided to fight.

My son had his left leg amputated to completely remove the primary tumor and hopefully stifle further strength to the metastasized site. When he went in for his lung surgery, many of the nodules were so tiny that it was impossible to see them even with a PET or MRI scan. The doctor could not remove them. So my son was changed to a different chemotherapy.

This chemotherapy is deadly. It takes a child down to a neutropenia level where there are no white cells to fight any infections. The body fights back with fevers, and he often has to

> have blood or platelet transfusions. This chemotherapy has a 30% chance of giving the recipient a secondary cancer of leukemia. My son has been air-flown out multiple times. I never understood what families qo through when cancer strikes, but the emotions alone are devastating. Today, we wait to hear whether this new chemotherapy is making any difference.

Statistically, 3.8% of all cancer funding is di-

rected toward children's cancer research. My son is worth more than 3.8%. I commend Brittany for planning this fundraising event for my son. The more awareness there is, the more likely that people like you who donated at this event will spread the word. Awareness brings funding, and funding will bring research that will lead to a cure.

I have no words that can express the thank you for your very kind donation at this cribbage event. Your generosity will make an immediate difference in Kiefer's life. The funds raised will go toward enhancing Kiefer's quality of life while battling cancer. You are making a difference! In the JPW consolation, Master Jay Sorensen (Stockton CA) and Life Master Robert Milk (Queen Creek AZ) turned in identical scorecards: 12/6 +36. This ended up being the low qualifying score, and so this meant that only one of these players would be in the playoffs. When scorecards are tied in game points (12, in this case), games won (6), and net spread (+36), the final tiebreaker becomes positive points, and so Jay qualified because he had 86 in the positive column versus Bob's 36.

Cribbage Board of the Month


As most of you are aware, many ACC members make cribbage boards. I have featured in this column many boards made by members, and those articles have generated quite a few emails asking about making boards. Our members who are woodworkers have their own methods and tools to do the job. However, some of us want to make only a board or two and do not want to invest in a lot of expensive tools.

The July 2010 CBOM column, reprinted here, put forward an inexpensive way to make boards that will look very professional. The only tool you might need to buy would be a Dremel tool for drilling. They can be purchased for as little as \$15 on amazon.com and are also available at any hardware store.


Many of my most beautiful and unique cribbage boards are handmade. Some are made by artists, woodworkers, or metal machinists and are near perfect. Some are very crude. But they are all beautiful in their own way.

which results in a nice board with very even holes. The following is a "how to" description with photos.

 Tools needed (fig. 2): painter's tape, pencil eraser, Sharpie pen,



Since I have made many boards (three are pictured in fig. 1), I have devised an easy way to make boards,




and a handheld high-speed drill (i.e., a Dremel drill) with

both a sharp pointed conical bit and a drill bit.

- Find a cribbage board that is the size and has the hole pattern that you want to use on the board you are making.
- Place painter's tape over the cribbage board holes and press on the tape with a rounded pencil



eraser until the tape is depressed into the holes (fig. 3).

 Mark the center of the holes with a Sharpie pen. This is easy because

the pen will tend to mark the low point of the depression.

- Carefully peel off the tape and place it on the board you are making. This system works well on both flat and curved surfaces.
- Use the drill with a sharp conical bit to




drill starter holes on the dots marked on the tape (fig. 4). This is very important because it will help keep your drill bit from slipping out of position when you

start the drilling process.

 Select your drill bit size and mark it with tape for the depth you want to drill. At this point, you can drill with the Dremel tool or a small drill press (fig. 5). Be sure that your bit size works for the pegs you will be using.



• Peel off the tape and you are done (fig. 6).



Note: to keep the brush from moving while I worked on it, I placed it on four finishing nails driven into the underside of the board. Sometimes it is helpful to clamp the board while drilling.

Have fun making your own cribbage board, and feel free to email me if you have questions. cw

How to Be the Perfect Cribbage Spectator

We don't often think of cribbage as a spectator sport, but it many ways it is. At every tournament or Grass Roots session, we end up observing a lot of people playing cribbage, often in small doses throughout the day.

We watch the players to our left and to our right, we stop and linger behind a friend to see how they're doing, and we notice a close game to see the outcome. Those of us who are intent on improving our cribbage games also make a point of looking at games that involve players we respect or most want to emulate. By the end of the day, we end up playing a lot of cribbage and also watching a lot of cribbage.

There's a right way to watch and a wrong way. Cribbage is a game of order and etiquette, but some parts of that etiquette can be overlooked, especially when observing a cribbage game. The next time you're watching a game of cribbage, consider the following:

- Think of yourself as a guest in someone else's library where the two players are surrounded by an invisible force field that will trigger alarms if disturbed. You're there to observe—in silence and to not interact with the players or with the game.
- Stay a respectful distance away from the players and the game. Don't invade the personal space of the players. Don't touch the players, the board, the scorecards, the cards, or the pegs. If you want to sit or need to sit, don't sit next to ei-

ther of the players: position your chair well behind the player you're watching.

- If you know one of the two players much better than the other (by friendship or kinship), stand behind that player. Don't ever stand behind their opponent. You may be the perfect spectator, but you don't want to give your friend's opponent any reason to think that you're giving away information on their hand or play.
- Don't comment on a game while it's in progress. This is the heart of the "no kibitzing" rule. Even comments that you think are completely innocent could give one of the players a clue or an unfair advantage. If you have a question about a play or a decision, wait until the game is finished.
- Keep your facial expressions in check.
 Don't grimace, smile, or scowl after you
 see a deal, cut, or discard decision. If you
 have a terrible poker face, consider stepping away from the table or keeping a
 further distance away from the action.
- Don't comment on the game with another spectator within hearing distance of the game. If you think the players can't hear you, guess again. If you want to talk about something not related to the game with another spectator, move to another part of the room and out of earshot of any other games.
- If you're watching a game, don't walk away in the middle of a hand. In a close game, it's important that you don't walk away after you see the cards dealt or after the cut card is revealed. You could give

away a lot of information by walking away.

- If the opponent of the person you're watching requests that you not watch the game, honor their request and retreat to a further distance away or to another part of the room. This can be a difficult request to honor, especially if you're watching a family member in an important game or in a playoff match.
- If you're new to Grass Roots or tournament cribbage, or don't fully understand what's happening in a game, wait to ask questions until after the game or playoff match has concluded. Never interrupt players to ask them questions. If a question is urgent, find the club or tournament director.
- Never, ever call for a judge in a game that you're not playing in. It's entirely the privilege of the players as to whether they call a judge. If a player in a game you're watching asks your advice on

- whether to call a judge or not, tell them that it's their prerogative.
- If you notice something unusual or outof-the-ordinary in a game, do not interrupt or interfere with the game. Immediately notify the club director or head judge and tell them what you observed.
- If you're watching an important game or a playoff match, remember that there will be a winner and a loser. If you're supporting the winner, hold off congratulating them until you're out of earshot of the loser. Resist the urge to scream, shout, or yell. If you're supporting the loser, don't immediately tell them what you would have done differently that could have won the game or point out any errors that may have cost them the game. You may not think of this as bad sportsmanship, but it is.

And now for the Do's: do watch, do learn, do enjoy the game. Do keep watching cribbage games, but do so as the perfect spectator.

Print Your Own

Let's say it's May 1, and your weekend suddenly became free. You vaguely remember that a tournament is going to be held somewhere in Oregon this weekend, but because you were scheduled to work, you hadn't bothered to pick up a flyer at the last tournament. So how do you find out the tourney details at this late date? It's actually quite easy to locate tournament info online. Here are step-by-step instructions:

- · go to cribbage.org
- click on "Schedule/Results" in the left column
- scroll down to May 2–4 (or any date you're looking for—tourneys are listed in chronological order)
- click on the name of the tournament: in this case "Oregon Coast Classic"
- · click on "Tournament Flyer" in the middle column at the top of the page
- · you can now view, print, or download the flyer

There—it's that easy. Good luck this weekend. And next time you'll know exactly what to do when your boss says to take the weekend off!

Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

I want to share a wonderful and truly amazing cribbage experience of a fellow player: Bill Maciej, my husband.

Bill has belonged to the River City Peggers in Sacramento CA for the past fifteen years. He, like many of us, loves the game! Both he and our club are an inspiration to me. Bill has multiple sclerosis and for the past ten years has been a quadriplegic.

Our club has made it possible for Bill to play weekly, seeking for those elusive Grass Roots points. Club members shuffle, deal, set up the cards (in wooden holders made by Harold Sontag and Richard Munroe), and then play the cards for Bill as he directs. You might have played Bill in Reno or northern California tournaments.

This past December, Bill was rushed to the hospital and later diagnosed with sepsis. He was not expected to survive. The four days that he was in and out of consciousness, he continued to count cribbage hands . . . Five, Jack, Two, King, and so on. The doctors and nurses asked me if he was making sense, and I nodded in the affirmative: "Yes, he is playing cribbage."

When Bill was receiving the sacrament of healing, it concluded with the "Our Father," which Bill said with us. When the "Amen" was reached, Bill continued counting again . . . Seven, Four, Four, Two. The priest look up questioningly, and I said: "He is playing cribbage."

A few days later, when Bill was on the mend and his mind had cleared, I asked him about it. Bill said he was playing cribbage, but he didn't know who he was playing. He knew that if he won the game he would pass away. But whoever he was playing wouldn't let him win!

I and others who were there are still not sure what happened . . . but it gives me hope that there is one heck of a tournament going on in heaven!

I've received a lot of feedback about "cranky" players since my last column. If you have someone in your club who is driving people away from cribbage, please document their offenses and send a letter to the head of the Ethics Committee, Ron Logan (Ijlazmt@aol.com). The Ethics Committee will review your letter; give the offending player a chance to respond in writing; and then look at both sides of the story to make a ruling on what the next step should be. The first offense is generally a warning, which is usually all that is needed to straighten out someone who is excessively rude. If the Ethics Committee receives more complaints about the same member they may choose to suspend the player. Most people are unaware of how they are perceived, and writing a letter can be beneficial for everyone involved.

Youth Teaching Tip

Time and time again, I see kids attempt to take three points when they hit 31 in the pegging process. They are convinced it is two points for the 31 and another point for last card. When teaching kids (or adults) how to play cribbage, take the time to explain that you get one point for last card, plus a bonus point for hitting 31 exactly, which is why we count a 31 as two points.

In the past year, the ACC Ethics Committee received ten issues to deal with, and 60% of them had to do with complaints of rude and inconsiderate players, mostly in Grass Roots play. While member retention was the hot topic during the last year or so, this new hot topic has a direct correlation to the last.

ACC board member **Tom Cookman** did a wonderful job in his article on page 15 of the February *Cribbage World* in explaining the problem. My focus in this article is on how to deal with this situation.

Grass Roots players should not allow the actions of one person to determine their continued enjoyment of the game. This is easier said than done in small clubs. In a ten-player Grass Roots tournament (nine games), it is guaranteed that everyone plays each other. In a nineteen-player tournament, you will play only 50% of the field. Therefore, the more players there are, the lower the chance of having to play any certain individual. While not solving the problem, this scenario shows that clubs that are actively recruiting new members (while retaining current members) and increasing the average number of players per tournament are helping to dilute the problem. Clubs that do nothing to improve membership are only exacerbating the problem.

The ethics section of the Grass Roots policy manual (found online at accgrassroots.org/manual.asp) clearly states that "the ACC

Grass Roots program shall be governed by the cribbage rules of

play, and the Code of Ethics, as contained in the official rule book of the ACC" and "as is allowed with the ACC main tournaments, clubs have the authority to deny any player the right to play with them." It continues by categorizing violations of the Code of Ethics into "behavior/conduct" and "cheating." The section defining behavior and conduct is a must-read by all club directors (there are procedures to follow in the event the problem concerns the club director). While most club directors consider this a tough issue to deal with and often choose to ignore it, this is the wrong approach. No matter how personal it may be, you must think and act with the best interest of the club in mind. The most im-

Begin by having a private one-on-one conversation about the problem person (not in front of others). Do not resort to email or texting for this step. Be prepared to answer questions (other than directly naming complainants). Suggest the Golden Rule: treat others as you would like to be treated. Attempt to find solutions to the problem and set goals (with reasonable time limits) before concluding the conversation.

Grass Roots Corner—continued from page 37 next step should be a "notice of zero tolerance." This document, clearly stating the issues at hand and including the number of complaints over a given time period (and possibly the number of members who have left the club due to the actions of this individual), will make clear that the club will not tolerate any more negative behavior. It should also state that if there is a single reoccurrence of bad behavior, a vote will be held by the club members using the guidelines set forth in the Grass Roots policy manual concerning barring the member from that club only, either temporarily or permanently. In addition, "any action taken involving barring a member from that club only (for an extended period) shall be documented and submitted in writing to the Chairman

Do you choose to accept one bad apple in your club, which may result in the loss of many players, or are you willing to take action in order to improve moral in the club and enjoyment of the game of cribbage by all? Your regional Grass Roots commissioner (aka the GRRT director listed in the Grass Roots contacts at accgrassroots.org/contact.asp) and the Grass Roots program commissioner (Joan Rein) are available for guidance on these matters.



ot only did DeLynn Colvert deal me my first and only 29-hand in a sanctioned tournament, but he also played a big part in my memory of our first cribbage tournament, in October 1994.

Bob and I had been playing cribbage for many years and had a small table set up at our big picture window overlooking Sinclair Inlet in Port Orchard WA. A deck of cards and an old sixty-hole cribbage board with our win/loss record inked on the back were displayed, waiting for our daily games to start, usually late afternoon along about coffee time.

We were in the process of selling our home, and one afternoon some prospective buyers came to inspect the premises. A very nice older couple commented on the cribbage setup and asked if we go to tournaments or belong to the ACC. We had not been aware of either of those things. They said there was a big tournament coming up in Long Beach WA and that we would enjoy it. So we went.

What an exciting, yet intimidating experience it was, with all these people milling around who seemed to know each other, and no one that we knew. We had to be spoon-fed all the rules and regulations, like joining the ACC, pamphlets on rules, Grass Roots clubs, where to sit, and how to move! So much to think about, and then play began!

Bob was seated at another table, of course, so I was on my own. My mind is a blank about my win/loss record. I won some and lost more and didn't even know

what a qualifying card amounted to. I was just trying to keep up. Finally the last game of the afternoon came, and I was tired and anxious to get it over. I can visual-



ize to this day moving to a small table with just me and this other guy, who said his name was DeLynn. He seemed harmless, rather confident, but pleasant. We played and played. I think I kept up with him for the most part, and I remember that people started gathering around to watch us play. Then I realized we were the only game going. That really made me nervous!

I must have been doing pretty well, but when the final count came, he had zoomed ahead of me, won the game, and the oohs and ahs commenced! What was all the commotion? Little did I know that if DeLynn won that game, he would have the high scorecard. I was really in shock when I was informed just who I was playing against. Then again, think of his chagrin if I had won—a real newcomer!

Bob and I took our excitement and enthusiasm home with us, along with all the information we had gathered, and by the time we arrived back in Port Orchard, we had plans to form our own Grass Roots club, which we did, and we played our first game in January 1995 as Club 204.
