ifteen-for-two is the basis of our game. We see hundreds of 15-2s in the controlled environment of a cribbage tournament, but 15-2s also appear untamed and in the wild. Here's your assignment:

- Take a picture of the numbers 15-2 in their native environment. That is, look for the numbers 15 and 2 (in that sequence) in various natural settings. When you find them, snap a picture and send it to Cribbage World.
- The numbers cannot be part of a longer string of numbers (e.g., \$467,152.89), but must be a single whole number (152), two separate numbers (15 and 2), or set off by punctation of some kind (that is, 467-152-89 would be acceptable).
- The numbers 15-2 must be clearly visible in the picture; if necessary, submit both a close-up of the numbers and a second pix showing the larger setting. Adjust your camera to its highest pixel setting to ensure the best quality photo.
- Pictures cannot be created, touched up, or otherwise manipulated using PhotoShop or any similar photo-editing software.
- The ACC member who submits the most unusual 15-2 found in the wild will receive a sheet of twenty U.S. postage stamps honoring Sir John Suckling, the founder of Club 15-2.
- Be open to finding 15-2s in settings where you wouldn't continued on page 15

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# My Deal by David Aiken



One of my all-time favorite TV shows is *Studio 60 on the Sunset Strip*. It had great writing (primarily Aaron Sorkin), a superb creative team (Sorkin again, along with Thomas Schlamme), A-list actors (Amanda Peet, Matthew Perry, Bradley Whitford, Timothy Busfield—what's not to like?!), and a compelling story line.

Unfortunately, it was short lived, lasting only twenty-two episodes in 2006–7 before a writers' strike shut down all of Hollywood near the end of the season. When the strike was settled, NBC inexplicably chose to renew 30 Rock—another new show that year that also revolved around the off-camera goings-on at a sketch-comedy series. The problem is, 30 Rock isn't funny, its actors are hams, and its plot lines are stale. (You can tell that I'm not resentful or anything.)

Episode 4 of *Studio 60*, entitled "The West Coast Delay," chronicled the pitfalls and pratfalls of doing live television. The show within a show airs a joke that, shortly after the live East Coast broadcast, is discovered to have been plagiarized. In a series of attempts to own up to their mistake, they end up making more mistakes, and before the night is done they've had

to correct their corrections several times, with humorous effects. The episode ends with this line (spoiler alert): "This is not the comedy we intended to do when the week began."

I can say a similar thing about the March/April *Cribbage World:* it was definitely not the issue I intended to produce when the month began.

Learning curves can be steep—especially computer-related ones. They are made even steeper when you go eleven years between computer upgrades.

So in hindsight, getting a sleek new Mac laptop in February, timed so that I could use it to produce the double March/April CW, may not have been the wisest idea. I've owned Mac computers for over twenty years, but even so there were definitely some new things to pick up as I transitioned from a desktop to a laptop and learned a new operating system.

The new Mac wasn't the problem, however. My old software wouldn't work on the new computer, so I had to upgrade *all* my software, and there was the rub. I adapted fairly quickly to new versions of Word and Excel, and after only a week I had my new email figured out. But the continued on page 11

#### Pen Pointers

Please answer a question for my club. Some of our players are using the ink pen that is on the table to help them know which direction to move their pegs. When they go around the corner, they turn the ink pen so they will know which way to peg. In other words the ink pen helps them not to peg backward. We have a disagreement if this allowed by the rules. Can players use aids to help them know which way to move?

CW Responds—The ACC's rulebook states: "No aid from an individual or from the use of any material may be used to assist in determining scoring while pegging or counting the hands or crib" (rule 9.5). Since the use of a pointing device to indicate which way to move one's pegs—a common practice of many players—does not aid counting or determining score, there doesn't seem to be anything that prohibits it. On the other hand, overreliance on a mechanical aid

real problem was InDesign—the software that I use to typeset *Cribbage World*. Take my word for it that there were a lot of changes between version 2 and version 6 of this software!

In addition, I was just coming back from Reno and preparing for a three-week business trip. When I left for the trip, CW was still unfinished, and I was tied up every day either driving or selling books. That left very little time in the evenings to finish up this issue, and being away from my normal routine didn't lend itself to following all the normal procedures I employ in producing CW.

As a result, the biggest issue I've ever produced (52 pages) was rushed, not carefully prepared, full of typos and mistakes, and—as near as I can tell—placed in storage at the post office for a couple more weeks—probably to determine if it met the minimum quality standard to allow it to pass through the US mails.

I hope you've gotten the March/April issue by time you read these words in the May CW, and if so, here is a list of the major mistakes (that I know about):

First and foremost, I must apologize to **Shari Wikstrom** (Tacoma WA) for omit-



ting her name on page 51 of the double March/ April issue. Shari wrote a wonderful story for CW Contest #11, and she was one of four winners announced in the December 2013 issue.

Those of you out west who know Shari

will have recognized her picture on page 51 (and again here), but it wasn't intended to be a guessing game for the rest of the country. My sincere apologies to Shari.

High qualifier at the Virginia Cribbage Championship (Glen Allen VA) on January 10–12 was Master **Ronald Reece** (Williamsburg VA), not his cousin **Bud Reese** (Springfield VA) as reported on page 7.

The bubble indicating that **Rod Mandler** (Minneapolis MN) got a grand slam was omitted from Tom Winter Memorial.

The story on page 18 about identical scorecards in the Reno consolation by Master Jay Sorensen (Stockton CA) and Life Master Robert Milk (Queen Creek AZ) in the JPW consolation should have ended with this sentence: "... and so Jay qualified because he had 86 in the positive column versus Bob's 49."

Cribbage Bowl attendance was 454—not 364, as reported on pages 5 and 11. The total Reno attendance was, therefore, 2,222—not 2,132. (Since I always work from the previous year's file when I report on Reno, anyone care to start a side pool giving odds as to whether I'll remember to correct this number when I list the 2015 attendance?)

The "25 Years Ago" stories on pages 30–31 used 1984 as the date of the events reported. The cover pages were correct, and the stories were correct; but the math was a little off, as  $2014 - 25 \neq 1984$ .

There are (undoubtedly) many minor errors and typos throughout, but I'll leave them for the proofreaders among us to report. I sure hope that that was the worst CW I ever produce. To borrow another episode title from *Studio 60*, maybe I should have entitled the March/April CW "the disaster issue"! CW

# The President's Column



Recently a salesperson came to our home to give us information about new countertops. This visit was the result of a call generated by a home-improvement company. The man measured, showed samples, and quoted us a price. Or I should say, a couple of different prices. One price was lower, but it was available to us only if we placed our order immediately. Now, I realize that the seasonal nature of some work makes companies offer enticements during their slow times, but this wasn't the case here. This was a form of high-pressure salesmanship. I guess it works for them, or they would not be doing it, but it does not work for me.

There are basically two different forms of encouraging people to act as desired: positive reinforcement and negative reinforcement. Reinforcement, in this case, is defined as "the strengthening of the probability of a response to given stimulus by giving or withholding a reward."

So, what is all this rhetoric getting at? *Late fees*! A check of the flyers on the ACC website shows that the majority of directors do not impose them. I personally think that they are punitive, and why

do we want to do that? Don't we want to encourage participation? This is a good example of negative reinforcement. I know why some directors use this method to get participants to register early enough so that the preliminary work of making scorecards, guaranteeing lunches, and so on can be accomplished; and it helps to eliminate long lines and late starts. But there has to be a better idea to encourage people to register early. And there is also the question of what happens to those late fees: where do they go?

Of course, you will never be subjected to late fees if you send in your entry by the prescribed time. But people do not always know about their ability to attend. Should we "fine" them for that?

The ACC is constantly trying to find ways to build our membership. We are not alone in this quest, as many other organizations have the same problems with building and retaining membership. But we must work from within our organization to make our members want to participate.

Master Henry Bergeron (Webster NH) has been appointed as the newest member of the ACC Board of Directors, as per ACC Policy: "When a vacancy occurs on the BOD, the President shall fill the vacancy with the next available candidate from results of the last election." Henry has directed several tournaments, including the Daniel Webster Open.

long love of the game for Brad.



# BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING • FEBRUARY 6, 2014 (presented in condensed form) SANDS REGENCY CASINO • RENO NV

President Jeanne Hofbauer called the meeting to order at 9a. Directors present Dave Aiken, Dave Campbell, Tom Cookman, Annett Eiffert, Willie Evans, Richard Frost, Roland Hall, Don Hannula, Jeanne Hofbauer, Roy Hofbauer, Ron Logan, Bob Milk, Dave O'Neil, Larry Phifer, Bruce Sattler, Phyllis Schmidt, Peggy Shea, Jeff Shimp, Wayne Steinmetz, Valerie Sumner, and Keith Widener. Approved absence for Pat Barrett, Charlie Finley, Bill Medeiros, and Todd Schaefer.

The agenda was approved, and the minutes of the September 20, 2013, BOD meeting were approved.

Syl Lulinski TOC Update: Hannula reported that 463 players preregistered for the TOC. Expenses were \$900, down from last year's \$1,400, due to reduced mail charges; 349 invitations mailed this year, compared to 890 in 2013. He asked that the TOC invitation be printed in CW

along with a list of invitees and that Grass Roots club directors review and update email address in the ACC database so he could use that forum for notification.

JPW/ACC Open Update: Shea reported that the Open has 719 entries, compared to 788 entries last year.; 200 are registered in the Cribbage Bowl. Shea reported that Scott Kooistra was not going to attend due to illness.

### The Big Book of Cribbage Discards

reviewed by David Aiken (Ada MI)

If you're like most players (i.e., both curious and eager to learn), there are probably dozens of times each tournament when you say, "I sure wish I knew how to hold this hand."

A resource that addresses this very question, first published in 2001, has now been released in a much expanded edition. Entitled *Complete Cribbage Discards*, this book—actually a four-volume set—gives the stats for each of 230,360 possible discard combinations in the 18,395 possible hands you can be dealt, from A-A-A-2-2 to Q-Q-K-K-K-K.

Michael Wortley Nolan (Troy MI) has devoted a lifetime to analyzing cribbage discards with computer programs, and this magnum opus provides detailed statistics for the dedicated cribbage player.

A reference work comprised of four large 8.5" x 11" volumes, each containing 400+ (unnumbered) densely printed pages, this is the definitive

resource on discarding. The first two volumes are subtitled "Your Crib," and the last two are "Opponent's Crib."

When you want to know how to maximize your points in a particular situation, it is simple to look up the hand you are dealt to see the net value of each possible discard (from three to thirty combinations, depending on the hand). The discards are listed in descending value according to "your net score," so it's easy to determine if what you were planning to toss in the crib is the statistically best discard.

Life Master (6\*) and eight-time national champion **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR) has used the 2001 edition of Nolan's

work for many years now, referring to it for advice on what discards to make for maximum scoring (into his crib) and maximum defense (into his opponent's crib). Duane also peruses the suggested discards of various hands to see patterns that help him make a decision when it becomes impossible to remember all the details for 18,000+ hands.

My quibbles with this work are twofold. First, it is massive, making it impossible (at over eleven



pounds!) to lug these books around to tournaments. Instead, you'll have to write down tricky hands and then look them up when you return home. I suspect that Nolan would see runaway sales if he were to develop an app based on this book, suitable for use on a laptop, tablet, or smart phone.

Second, a hairline rule or small space separating the various hands would have been a tremendous navigation aid. As it is, it is easy to lose your place on the page and look right past the info

you are searching for. A simple adjustment in Nolan's computer program can hopefully eliminate this difficulty in future printings of the book.

As you do when considering the purchase of any reference work, it is important to know what this book does and doesn't do. You should know that it does not take into account board position, nor does it consider whether you need to peg offensively or defensively. But if you want to know "the discard choice that statistically maximizes your average net score" (from the preface), then you must add these volumes to your cribbage library.

While maybe only the more dedicated players might spring for a \$79 set of books about cribbage, here's a suggestion to get this valuable resource into the hands of players who need it.

Grass Roots clubs could buy a set of Nolan's books and make them available

But after a game is over, this set could aid players in improving their game—and probably also serve as a springboard for arguments about the best way to play this game!



Welcome to the newest Grass Roots clubs: Lake Superior Shufflers (#399) in Duluth MN, Sin City Peggers (#400) in Las Vegas NV, and Brown Bag Cribbage Club (#401) in La Quinta CA. Good luck, and keep us informed of your progress.

It's that time of year again. The end of the Grass Roots season is the time to focus on membership. Not just new members, but all members. The upcoming unofficial season should be a time to make changes to club operations in order to attract new members and retain current members.

Obviously, we should be working on bringing new members in all year long. With June, July, and August being unofficial play with no limits for guests, these summer months are the ideal time to attract new players and bring them up to speed before the start of the next Grass Roots season. 4th Street Terrorists (#54) in Antioch CA is trying something new by holding an unofficial, nonsanctioned cribbage tournament in June as an attempt to raise awareness of the club and the ACC. For more ideas, check out the Membership Drive link on the Grass Roots website (accgrassroots.org/memberdrive .asp).

Club directors should look at the final Grass Roots Club Standings report (4a) of the season and note the number of club tournaments played by each member. Those of us that play more than three-fourths of the season are just plain addicted. Ask those members who play less

based on participation?

members who play less than two-thirds or even half of the season what can be done to get them to show up more often. Are the payouts not meeting the recommended 1:4 players (see the Grass

Roots Manual on the Grass Roots website)?

Are the payouts excessively top-heavy? Is

the club offering incentives for the players

What incentives based on participation, you ask? For example, my club collects \$2/ player for each tournament. In addition to covering the typical overhead costs of operations (including an annual BBQ) and offering monetary awards for grand slams, 28-hands, and 29-hands, the club pays the Grass Roots fee for every club member who plays 50% or more of the season. New this season, the club will pay the ACC fee for one year for all club members who play 32 or more weekly tournaments (based on missing one tournament each quarter). Additionally, the club will reimburse the entry fee for the Grass Roots Tournament of Champions (GRTOC) to eligible club champion(s) who participate within their three-year window.

What does your club do to retain the current members? Some clubs offer a monetary award (or free entry into the next tournament) to the nonqualifier with the best score of the final three games of the tour-

nament. Are there affordable optional side pools that are strictly based on luck (high hand, high crib, combined hand and crib, etc.) that allow the lesser-skilled players to win something? 



member to review the changes being made in order to be clear that the new policy is what was approved and voted on. J. Hofbauer asked that new contact information begiven to Shea so she can send out an updated contact list of all BOD members with the minutes from the meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Marlene Lazachek discussed the income statement, comparative balance sheet, and cash balance sheet. Lazachek reported that the ACC spent \$2,200 for 60,000 scorecards and also purchased 32 laminated bracket boards for \$640. Lazachek reported the ACC had a profit of \$629 with the investment in bonds through January 2014. There was discussion around how to proceed with the \$50,000 investment once the term is up in April 2014. We discussed the possibility of investing in a CD, but with the large investment in the new software program we should not have our money tied up for a long period of time. J. Hofbauer made a motion to keep the money in the investment portfolio as it is now; second by Hannula; motion approved.

Membership Secretary Report: Larry Hassett provided a detailed report to the BOD showing the membership currently at 6,510 members as of January 2014. Hassett also provided a report with the MRP specifications and gave a demonstration of what problems arise when information provided by TDs or ACC members is inaccurate. Hassett also provided a detailed handbook (not yet completed) with duties performed by the membership secretary. There was discussion about the time that goes into Hassett's position and the need for a backup for his position. Also discussed was the need for the new software program and how to proceed. Hassett estimated that it will take 300-500 hours (approximately \$16,000) to convert the current system to the updated software. Milk brought some concerns that the current specification is missing some important information that needs to be covered. Marlene Lazachek also asked that, once we get this out to bid and it is awarded, it be written in the contract that she be given ample time to test the new system to confirm that it is working properly. Action: Aiken made a motion to form a committee with Campbell as chair and six members (Milk, O'Neil, Lazachek, Hassett, Paul Gregson, and Cookman) to finalize a proposal for the software conversion, send it out for bids, and have the bids in hand for the next BOD meeting in September 2014; motion approved.

**Grand National 33 Update:** Sumner reported that the GN entry form is completed. They are working on a better price for parking. Workshops will be held for new members. Evans purchased playing cards for the GN. Raffle tickets are being sold to help offset expenses. Valerie Goldgeier will be in charge of the social media for all events.

**Grand National 34 Update**: Scott Kooistra was not in attendance due to illness.

**Bid for Grand National 35**: Sattler reported a deal with the Marriott in Bethesda MD to hold GN 35 in 2016 with a hotel rate of \$99; with a guaranteed food purchase of \$50,000 for all events, the hotel agreed to waive all fees for room rental. Sattler and Jill from Experient presented information about the hotel and area attractions. Campbell and Steve Sattler will serve as codirectors. GN 35 will kick off with a Tuesday night tournament and a midweek tourney on Wednesday and Thursday. Action: Phifer made a motion to award GN 35 to Sattler to be held in Bethesda MD; second by Milk; motion approved.

**Bid for Grand National 36**: J. Hofbauer reminded everyone that the 2014 GN will be held in the West and that bids should be brought to the BOD.

Membership Survey/Contact of Nonrenewals: Campbell said that most people are reporting that they guit the ACC due to rude players. Logan agreed that many complaints to the Ethics Committee center around rude players (60% of the complaints were about Grass Roots players). Cookman said that the nonrenewals are due to rude treatment by Grass Roots members and/or complaining about their slow play; he urged each of us to take the complaining Grass Roots member aside and let them know that being rude is not acceptable and that we need to treat new members better if want the ACC to grow. Sumner announced that this topic was going to be discussed at the Grass Roots BOV meeting on Friday evening. Campbell said that he is still working on a membership drive to increase membership, which will require us to update the membership form. He will report back with more details and have a proposal at the next BOD meeting. Campbell brought up the fact that we need to update email addresses in the system, as he had more than 3,000 emails sent back as bad email addresses.

Cribbage Class at the Sands in February: J. Hofbauer reported that the cribbage class suggested for Thursday night before the TOC was canceled because the volunteer teacher could not travel to Reno this year. Shea said that the Sands could accommodate this class if we find someone to teach it. Sumner suggested Norm Nikodym and Brion Neeley, as they both do a great job of helping new members. There was discussion of ways to teach new members outside of the regular Grass Roots night. Shea said that she and Rick Shea hold a class one night a week to welcome new players to help bring their game up to speed for club; players are coached on the game and advised if they ready for the nine-game Grass Roots format.

Pay Pal Update: Campbell and Larry Hassett are working on a procedure that will allow members to pay ACC membership via PayPal. Action: Aiken made a motion to move forward with PayPal once it is setup; second by Sattler; motion approved.

Rookie of the Year: Campbell brought up concerns about how we select our Rookie of the Year. It was determined that ROY would be verified by a three-person committee to make sure we do not have any errors. Action: Widener made a motion add this wording: "To be eligible for Rookie of the Year, the member may not have earned MRPs prior to February 1 of the previous MRP season (regardless of date of membership). A member may be awarded Rookie of the Year only once"; second by Aiken; motion approved.

Random Seating: Campbell reported that while most everyone agrees that we should abide by random seating, there is no way to mandate one set way to do that. It is up to the tournament director to follow the policy of random seating. Any abuse of this should be taken to the tournament commissioner of the appropriate region.

**Q-Pools**: Campbell said that it Q-pools should not be mandatory. There was discussion about the February Reno tournaments, where Q-pools are mandatory but not everyone in the Q-pool gets money back. Hannula reported that in his Michigan tournaments Q-pools are mandatory. The discussion resulted in a decision to let tournament directors choose, but they must include on their flyer how the Q-pool is to be distributed.

Q-Pool vs. Side Pool: Campbell asked if someone would be interested in writing a *Cribbage World* article explaining the difference between Q-pool and side pool. Many people believe that if they are in a Q-pool they will receive money for qualifying; whereas in a side pool only the top

qualifiers would receive money. Rick Shea said that if it is mandatory for people to enter a Q-pool, each person should receive some portion of the money. Aiken reported that many Midwest TDs use a simple formula to pay back Q-pool money to all qualifiers. Sattler brought up that some tournament flyers still do not explain how Q-pools will be paid out. It was also asked that the sanctioning request form be changed to include the type of Q-pool the TD is requesting. Campbell said that the regional commissioners will discuss this and address this concern. J. Hofbauer asked Campbell to include in the *Cribbage World* article how Q-pools would be paid out.

**Tournament Guidelines:** J. Hofbauer asked each BOD member to discuss with a TD if we see something that needs to be done. She also asked each BOD member to email her if they see anything that needs to be reviewed or changed regarding tournament guidelines. R. Hofbauer reported that Rick Shea and Cookman are reviewing the current Tournament Director Handbook and bringing suggestions of needed additions and or corrections.

Social Media Content Policy: Eiffert proposed the following wording regarding personal endorsements or editorials on the ACC website: "The ACC maintains a variety of social media accounts, including Facebook, Twitter, and similar sites. On these sites, content may take the form of text and/or images. The content monitored on these accounts shall adhere to the goals and the Code of Ethics of the organization. User-generated posts may be rejected or removed when the content of a post is off-subject or contains obscenity or other offensive terms. Any personal endorsements or editorials from website administrators or editors shall be clearly labeled so as not to be perceived as originating from the ACC." Action: Eiffert made the motion to add this wording to the Policy Manual; second by J. Hofbauer; motion approved.

**TOC**: Hannula reported a savings of \$500 in expenses by reducing the number of TOC invitations mailed to qualifiers. Hannula would like to email invitations to Grass Roots directors for anyone in their club who qualifies for the TOC. Alken said that *Cribbage World* will again list TOC invitees next year. Sumner asked if Grass Roots directors could get a list so each director can provide an entry form for each person who qualifies. Hannula said that once he receives the list of qualifiers from Larry Hassett and Joan Rein, he would send it to the Grass Roots Directors who request it.

Judges Program Proposal Senior Program: Shimp reported that we amended the Policy Manual to increase the number of senior judges to ten in the Eastern and Central and sixteen in the Western. There are still have a couple of vacancies to fill, and so Shimp asked anyone wishing to submit someone for consideration to send him an email.

Judges Program: Widener announced that he had head judge badges made for each head judge at a cost of \$5.50 each (\$176 total). Widener announced that a committee has been formed to address complaints about judges, reviewing bad judging calls and judges' behavior, and removing, demoting, or requiring recertification for incompetent judges. Committee members are Widener, Shimp, Campbell, Al Miller, and Duane Toll. They will bring their recommendations to the BOD.

**CW Q&A**: Cookman passed out samples of emails that he has received from members based on the *Cribbage World* article. Many people feel that we spend too much time at BOD meetings discussing things (such as MRPs) that affect very few ACC members. Cookman said most people are happy that there is a forum where they can ac-

tually speak with a BOD member and express their ideas. This has been very well received by the membership. J. Hofbauer brought up the idea that Cookman could take over the 800 phone number. Larry Hassett reported we currently receive about twenty calls per month regarding new membership. Cookman volunteered to use his personal cell phone to take calls. J. Hofbauer asked Shea to work with Diane Waite to get the information out about Cookman's cell phone number being the number to call regarding general information.

Proposal for Technology Committee: Cookman reported that we should have a Technology Committee to address comments and concerns such as the ACC Grassroots website going down. J. Hofbauer said the Software Committee (see above) will address the technology issues.

Rescind Proposal for All Star Tourney: Campbell asked that the BOD rescind a previous motion regarding the expansion of the All Star Team, as it is not our place to tell DeLynn Colvert how to run his tournament. Colvert addressed the BOD, stating that this tournament has always had twenty-four players playing sixteen games and that it has always run smoothly. Colvert said he has asked several members their opinion, and he reported that many of them do not want this to change the previous format. There was great discussion around the pros and cons of rescinding this action. Cathy Perkins said that this is not an awarded event and that the new format would not allow everyone to play each other. Terry Weber reported that this tournament should represent the "best of the best" and that we should not change it. Widener said that the Central and Eastern Regions sometimes have problems filling an eight-person team due to travel issues, and if we change it to ten people it would create some concerns; he does not want to see if changed. Evans reported that he previously voted for the change, but out of respect for Colvert he would like to see the previous format restored. Shimp said that he too would like have this rescinded and once Colvert decides to give up the tournament, then we could revisit the expansion. Shea said that she did not understand how the previous BOD vote could have changed so much from what was regarded as a positive change and would give more members the chance to represent their region at AST. J. Hofbauer reported that this may be one of those times where the BOD members had a change of opinion after receiving negative feedback from ACC members. Frost said that this may result in a negative impact if ACC members feel we change our minds too often and not discuss things in detail. Hall said he has received positive comments about the expansion and that this would not dilute the talent pool. R. Hofbauer said that several players who may qualify this year would not play in this vear's tournament if we do not rescind the action. It was decided to not hold a secret ballet. Action: Shimp made a motion to rescind the previous board action to "expand the All Star Tournament from 24 players to 40 players . . . at the beginning of the 2013/2014 season"; second by R. Hofbauer; motion approved (13-6).

**Press Release**: Hall reported that he has a template for TDs to use for reporting purposes and that he will provide a copy of the template to print in *Cribbage World*.

**Promotional Cribbage Boards**: J. Hofbauer said that we have purchased one hundred more promotional cribbage boards for \$1,175.30. Anyone wanting to have more boards should contact J. Hofbauer.

MRPs for Eight-Game Consolation: Campbell said that MRPs are currently awarded starting at 11 GPs. Dan Selke

said that this minimum threshold seems too high in comparison to seven games and nine games, as 10 GPs will often qualify for playoffs. Campbell believes that the minimum threshold should probably be 10 GPs . There was discussion that this would apply to only eight-game consolations. Marlene Lazachek said that she believes that this is already being done, but it should be clarified. Action: Milk made a motion that the top 1-in-8 qualifiers receive at least the minimum MRPs allowed regardless of game points; second by Logan; motion approved.

Proposal to Award MRPs to All Qualifiers: Frost discussed the possibility of awarding MRPs to all qualifiers in ACC-sanctioned tournaments: 5 MRPs for qualifying in the main and 3 MRPs for qualifying in consolations. J. Hofbauer asked Frost to form a committee to get input from members and bring a proposal to the next BOD meeting with both sides of the argument.

New Satellite at Grand Nationals: Sumner would like to see a tournament for the average player who does not qualify for the All Star Tournament. J. Hofbauer asked Sumner to form a committee to discuss the tournament and bring ideas before the BOD in September.

**Six-Game Grass Roots Tournaments**: Evans would like to reduce the number of games in the Grass Roots to six games for clubs that have challenges with new players and older players and/or locations that require clubs to be completed within a time frame. J. Hofbauer said that this should be discussed at the Grass Roots BOV meeting and then brought back to the BOD.

### **Committee Reports**

Executive (J. Hofbauer): flowers were sent to Schaefer and the ACC purchased a new computer for Aiken. We ran an ad in American Legion magazine for a cost \$1,166.

Ethics (Logan): ten situations resulted in three suspensions and several warning letters. Sixty percent of the rulings are due to Grass Roots player rudeness.

*Grass Roots* (Joan Rein): the Grass Roots BOV meeting is set for 8p on Friday and everyone is encouraged to attend. Rein also asked that we help in our Grass Roots clubs to see that everyone is getting along.

Internet (Milk): nothing new with internet cribbage. Milk stated that there will not be any internet cribbage on the

weekend of the ACC Open and Grand National.

Judges (Shimp): nothing new to add.

PR/Publicity (Norm Nikodym): the PR and Marketing Committee (PRMC) has been active in getting the word out about ACC. In January 2014 we put an ad in the American Legion magazine and had dismal results. Cookman said he has received some calls generated by the ad and he is trying to connect them to clubs in their area. O'Neil passed out coasters with the ACC logo; he had 5,000 of them made for a cost of about 9¢ each. O'Neil said this is a great way to promote local clubs, and anyone wanting some for their club (limit of 100) should email him.

Rules (Steinmetz): we should put something in Cribbage World that explains that a renege cannot be assessed when the count is 21 or less.

Tournament Rules & Guidelines (R. Hofbauer): we should look into awarding more MRPs to consolation players, due to low attendance.

Youth Program (Dan Zeisler): J. Hofbauer presented Grumpy Howard with an award for his dedication to the Youth Program. Grumpy has donated much time, money, and energy to promoting potential future ACC members. Aiken passed out backpacks with the challenge that each BOD teach a young person the game of cribbage and then give the backpack to that youth in order to promote cribbage. The design on the backpack was created by a youth cribbage player and the Sands paid for the backpacks.

### Committee Reports

President (J. Hofbauer): Finley was given the President's Award. The ACC's liability coverage was renewed.

Executive VP (Schaefer): not in attendance.

VP of Policy (Widener): Fred White will remain as ACC archivist.

VP of Operations (Campbell): we need a backup for CW editor. We purchased new software for Aiken's computer.

Member at Large (Shimp): nothing new to report.

Widener made a motion to adjourn the meeting; second by Sumner. Meeting Adjourned 3:03p.
