Play smart, play fair, play fast.

The ACC lost a great—quite probably its greatest—leader in September, with the passing of **Syl Lulinski**.

While I recognize the risk in ranking the ACC's early leaders in order of importance, I'll venture that Syl was more vital to the ACC's existence today than was founder **Joseph Petrus Wergin**. Wergin founded the ACC and gave it vision in its early years, but Syl gave it the practical leadership necessary to carry it through some rough days in the 1980s and 1990s.

Without Syl's steady hand at the tiller, we wouldn't be the organization we are today. And we may not even exist at all, for Syl was instrumental in making sure BOD meetings ran smoothly; in naming directors of the ACC Open, the TOC, and Grand National; in serving as the ACC's first executive vice president; and in serving as the national tournament commissioner. In this later capacity, he would eventually be replaced by *three* tournament commissioners, which gives an idea of how much work he put in. And all of this work was voluntary: Syl never held a paid position within the ACC.

When I first became active in the ACC,

Syl voluntarily came alongside me and gave me practical leadership advice, especially about directing tournaments.

When I became *Cribbage World* editor in January 2007, Syl was the first person I asked to serve on the CW Advisory Board. He not only willingly gave advice when asked, but would also nudge me in the right direction when I was too obtuse to know that I needed guidance.

Syl was a topnotch cribbage player, and he attended most of my Michigan tournament, especially when he was chasing his One Star. I enjoyed seeing him at tourneys, for he always had a smile and kind word for anyone who encountered him.

I will miss Syl as a cribbage player, as a leader, but mostly as a friend.

On February 7, 2015, on what would have been Syl's eighty-fifth birthday—while hundreds are enjoying playing in the ACC Open at the Sands in Reno, and with four lucky players in the semifinals of the aptly named Syl Lulinski TOC on that very day—let's all raise a glass in honor of Syl and thank the cribbage gods for giving this organization a leader of such high caliber.

Syl Lulinski (1930–2014)

Life Master (⋆): 11,365 MRPs

Sylvester Romuald Chester Lulinski died at his home in La Grange Park IL, on September 19, after a long illness.

Syl was born in Chicago on February 7, 1930. After being raised in Chicago's Back of the Yards, he attended Loyola University, where he studied philosophy for three years. He volunteered and served for four years in the Korean War as a USAF Staff Sergeant.

In 1959 he graduated from the University of Illinois College of Pharmacy, where he met his future wife, Phyllis. They married that year and became owners of Lulinski Pharmacy in Chicago, which they operated until 1972. For the next several years, Syl held various pharmaceutical sales positions in Illinois, New York, and Maryland before returning to the Chicago area and becoming vice president of PE Systems. He retired in 1985 at age 55.

Syl began playing cribbage at an early age, taught by his boyhood friend and ACC member Dr. Homer Dejmek. He was an accomplished athlete, enthusiast, and competitor in many games and sports, as well as a diehard Chicago Cubs fan, even working in college as an usher at Wrigley Field.

After retirement, Syl was elected to serve on the ACC Board of Directors in 1984, receiving the second highest vote total (behind only Joe Wergin), and was one of the most decorat-

ed and longest serving volunteers in ACC history.

Starting in 1986 he was the national tournament commissioner for a fiveyear period. In 1987 he became the first executive vice president of the ACC and received his Life Master Award and the President's Award. He served on the BOD and as executive vice president until 2002 and continued serving as emeritus executive and on the Cribbage World advisory board until his death. He served as chairman of the rules committee and as judge for many years. He was inducted into the ACC's Hall of Fame in 1989. Syl earned a spot on the 1985, 1987, and 1994 All American teams, and in 2013 the annual Tournament of Champions was renamed the Sylvester Lulinski TOC due to his efforts in establishing and growing the tournament in Reno.

Syl fiercely loved and took care of his family and was proudly devoted to his wife Phyllis (they would have celebrated fifty-five years of marriage on October 10), daughter Darice Martha Grzybowski, and his only grandchild, Jeffrey Sylvester.

Syl Lulinski was a true friend to the American Cribbage Congress. He worked tirelessly for over twenty years on the Board of Directors for the betterment of the ACC. His service included planning and presiding over BOD meetings as executive vice president, organizing rule changes and publishing rulebooks as Rules Committee chairman,

and handling all sanctioned tournament communication and information as national tournament commissioner. When the tournaments became more numerous. he had the idea to make three regions and appointed three commissioners to oversee the work that he and his longtime helpmate and wife, Phyllis, had been doing. Syl also was a director of the JPW/ACC Open and TOC in Reno for the first two years (1987-1988). In fact, it was Syl who went to Reno in 1986 and worked with Barbara Woodward to establish these tournaments at the Sands. It is truly fitting that the TOC is now named in his honor. Syl's cribbage accomplishments were many. He had earned his Master, Grand Master, Life Master, and Life Master (★) awards. He had been All American three times and a President's Award recipient, and he was inducted into the ACC Hall of Fame in 1989. He was the first of only three recipients of the Award for Meritorious Service to the ACC. Syl was also a true friend to us personally. He was a mentor for our work for the ACC and a true role model of how to treat others. We could always call him for help and know we would get the best advice possible. He was one of the smartest and nicest people we have ever met.

Tn 1986 the Sands was already hosting ▲ Bill and Dorthalee Irons's popular Veterans Day Cribbage Classic. Syl came to meet with me about a new home for the ACC Open and Tournament of Champions, which had quickly outgrown Karl's Silver Club in Sparks. Syl was delighted to find out that I was a cribbage player, and we hit it off immediately. There was a great deal of planning to be done, and as the ACC Open grew from 386 players to over 1,000, Syl was always there, offering guidance and support. A devoted husband and father, Syl was bursting with pride when his daughter Darice presented him with a grandson, Jeffrey. My son Tom was born around the same time—in February 1989-and we often corresponded, sharing stories and photos of our two handsome, brilliant, and perfect boys. Syl took to calling me "My Darling Barbara," which raised more than a few eyebrows. It was our little inside joke, and we had great fun with it. Syl loved to bet the horses, and during one of the early Reno tournaments, he came to me all excited, saying that he had placed a bet on a long shot, all because of the horse's name. The horse won, of course, and paid out handsomely. The horse's name? My Darling Barbara.

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- Nominations must be submitted in writing (maximum one side of a letter-size page) to the address below. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member, and the nomination page must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing of the ACC for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in the Grass Roots program.

- d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the board of directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by

December 10.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with Deadline: Dec. 10

the nominating criteria and mail copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The voting panel will review the nominations and return their ballots to the HOF chairperson. The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National tournament.





Youth Teaching Tip

When starting a cribbage class, let your students concentrate on the basic concepts of the game, such as discarding, how to peg, and counting their hands. If you include details such as penalties for overpegging or picking up your front peg, looking at the bottom cut card when turning over the starter card, or failing to offer a cut, and so on, you will only overwhelm them. Here's what I do. After I'm convinced that the kids are solid in their fundamental understanding of the game, I spend a class period introducing them to tournament cribbage. This is when I expose them to the finer details of cribbage infractions. I then follow up that lesson by beginning a six-game tournament (one game each class period) and I become the judge. Not only is this a lot of fun for the kids, but it tends to elevate their level of play.

There has been a spike in requests from across the country for startup kits (teacher's manual and ten cribbage long boards). In the past two months alone, I have already filled four requests. At \$150 a request (for boards and shipping), the cost to promote youth cribbage is significant. 
