BOD ELECTION

Every odd-numbered year the ACC holds elections for its 25-member Board of Directors. The next two-year term of office begins on September 1, 2015, and runs through August 31, 2017. All ACC members age 18 and above are eligible to vote. Joint members will receive two issues of the April *Cribbage World* this month so that each eligible voter has a separate ballot.

This election cycle we are again offering a choice of voting by mail or online at **cribbage.org**. To guard against duplicate voting, each eligible voter has been issued a random four-digit alphanumeric code that *must* be used when voting. Located to the right of your ACC number on the back of this issue of CW, this code will be used to gain access to the online ballot. It *must* also be written on all ballots sent by mail. **All ballots must be mailed separately; no group ballots will be accepted.**

This year thirty candidates are running for election to the BOD. Candidate biographies and photos (presented in random order) are printed on pages 26–34. Please read these paragraphs carefully, for they contain statements by the candidates about their qualifications, cribbage accomplishments, contributions to the ACC, and policies



Pay It Forward



Ethic Committee

On February 5 I gave my semiannual Ethics Committee report to the Board of Directors in Reno NV, noting that for the calendar year of 2014 there were twenty-four formal complaints sent to this committee. That is a record number for my term in office, and it shows people want to improve conditions and get rid of inappropriate conduct and behavior.

What really struck me though was that almost 50% of the complaints were about rude behavior and unacceptable language, which has the direct effect of pushing players away from our organization, the very thing we say we are trying to avoid.

This game we love to play is supposed to be competitive, but it should also be friendly and enjoyable for all. Think of all the great friendships we have made over the years through cribbage. What a shame it would be to miss out on a cribbage friend because someone was pushed away by another's rudeness.

The first sentence of the ACC Code of Ethics says: "Cribbage is a pastime that provides social opportunities to display true sportsmanship and respect for others, without rancor, animosity, or overwhelming self-interest during competition."

I am asking each of us to follow a simple idea that I believe we all know. I think it will go a long way toward solving the rudeness problem. The idea: *treat others the way you want to be treated.*



Life Master (★) **William Shoemaker** (CT) is the only player to beat Life Master (2★) **Erik Locke** (Wood Village OR) in the Syl Lulinski Invitational TOC in the past two years. In 2014, Erik rolled through the field to claim the TOC trophy. And he was well on his way to doing the same thing again—until he ran into Bill in the finals. Two previous players have won the TOC two times each—Master **Dale Kochenburg** (San Jose CA), now deceased, who won in 1996 and 2001, and Life Master (2★) **Larry Samet** (Wellesley Hills MA), now expired, who won in 1989 and 2002—but no one has done it twice in consecutive years. In addition to preventing Erik from repeating, Bill also prevented a master-student matchup in the finals between Erik and Life Master (7★) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR). Bill eliminated Duane in the semifinals.



Exciting Finish in ACC Open Main

The finals of the JPW/ACC Open main tourney in Reno provided an exciting climax to a fantastic weekend of cribbage. In the best-of-seven matchup, Life Master **Emilio Perez** (IL) roared out to a fast start by winning the first three games. But **John Kern** (La Mesa CA) scraped and clawed and fought his way back to a draw by winning games four, five, and six. Then, in what proved to be the last hand of the match, John needed 10 holes with first count, while Emilio was dealing from hole 116. The pegging went like this (the running count is in parentheses):





Cribbage in Afghanistan

When I first got to Afghanistan we had lots of playing cards but no cribbage boards (poker and spades are popular in the military), so **Bill O'Malley** (Salem OR) made a board for me and gave it to my wife, Rita, along with a dozen pairs of his handmade pegs. From September through November a few of us played cribbage in the office, and we always left the board out on our office table.

Since we have a lot of foot traffic, we saw interest from the base tenants, and we started teaching some US contractors how to play. Lots of folks had played a few times as kids but few were active players. I took time to mentor those who were interested, and I shared some cribbage books to help them. I began making "field tournament boards" out of scrap wood and using rivets for pegs so that players could practice in their down time.

As we began to get more interest in cribbage we decided to do a base-wide tournament. I had one of the Afghan woodcraft vendors make some tournament boards modeled after the O'Malley board, and they did a great job using walnut and pine. They even made turquoise and jade pegs similar to Bill's pegs, but the big problem is that stone is more fragile than aluminum so the tips would break off in the board.

Since most everyone were beginners and we are an operational base with out-

side-the-wire missions, we decided to hold an eight-game tourney. Gambling is strictly prohibited here—we are not allowed to pay entry fees and no prize money can be awarded—we gave donated prizes: first place was an afghan board with pegs, second place a pair of Bill's pegs, and third place a set of Leupold playing cards.

We are now ready for our fourth tournament (two tourneys had to be canceled due to insurgent activity and operational requirements). We have t-shirts for those who compete, and we are well stocked on supplies to run the tournament.

The tournaments are truly international events, with US contractors, US military personnel, and Romanians playing. We have a mix of skills, from beginners who need help counting to experienced players who have been playing for years. I am fortunate to have played with some excellent masters in Capital Cribbage Club in Salem OR, who took the time to mentor my wife and me so that I could teach the game to folks here in Afghanistan. Hopefully when they return to the States the memories of playing fun but competitive cribbage in a combat zone will make them want to seek out other cribbage players and the ACC. **CW**


Cribbage Board of the Month



IN MEMORY OF OUR FRIENDS

Ervin C. Bentz

Ervin Bentz (San Leandro CA) passed away January 18. He retired from the San Francisco Chronicle after thirty years as a printer. He was a Grand Master and an avid Forty-Niner fan. Although deaf, he will always be remembered as a very tough opponent.

Youth Teaching Tip

By nature, kids tend to be hard on material things. This includes playing cards and cribbage boards. Before passing out decks of cards, remind your students that one bent card can ruin a deck. I notice that young players like to hold their cards at table level, sometimes bowing their cards against the furniture while contemplating a discard. Watch for this and break this habit early. I've also seen instances where a cribbage board has fallen on the floor and the plastic pegs have broken off in the board. If this happens, heat up the end of a push pin or paperclip. While it is glowing hot, push it into the hole with the broken bit of plastic peg. Let it set a moment, allowing the plastic to mold around the hot pin. Once it has cooled, pull straight up and the plastic piece should pop out of the hole on the end of the pin.

There should not be separate draw containers for separate tables. Players should not be seated and play started as they arrive. Club/tournament directors found to be seating players to gain an advantage for themselves or anyone else can be reported to the ACC Ethics Committee. If your club is not practicing random seating, volunteer to take the task over to do it right.

2014 GRRT

Drum roll please, the 2014 Grass Roots Regional Tournament (GRRT) results are in. Thanks to all local GRRT directors for their time and effort in this endeavor. And thanks to the 2,055 GRRT participants (official, unofficial, and junior). Without you, there would be nothing to report.

The GRRT is an annual fundraiser to support the ACC Grass Roots awards program (28-hands, 29-hands, grand slams, club champions, and Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, and Diamond awards). It is an eighteen-game format where participants' scores are ranked within each of the four Grass Roots regions. Official players who score 24 or more game points will earn them as official Grass Roots points (GRPs) for the season. Nine dollars of the official entry fee (\$15) is returned to the participants in the form of prizes for 24 or more GPs, 28-hands, 29-hands, and grand slams. For newer Grass Roots players considering playing in ACC-sanctioned tournaments, the GRRT is an excellent opportunity to get their feet wet.

The top scorer this season came from the Midwest (Region VI). **Mark Hauser** (Rochester Hills MI) of Cribbage Club 295 of Southeast Michigan finished with an awesome 36/17 +305. (*That's on fire, somebody hose him down.*) Having only one loss indicates Mark also qualified for a grand slam (that is, winning the first nine games or the second nine games). There were 504 participants in Region VI (475 official, 29 unofficial), comprising 24.5% of the total number of GRRT players. Congratulations to the Region VI players listed below with 30 or more GPs,


