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

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


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Play smart, play fair, play fast.

I rarely play doubles, as Central Region tournaments no longer include this format as a satellite tourney (doubles used to be a huge draw at Wisconsin tourneys—with as many as 300 teams competing). The only time I get to play doubles is when I visit the West Coast.

My Deal by David Aiken

To me, doubles is purely a social event. If I win my money back, great, but my primary reason for playing is to have a great time and meet people. One common complaint I hear from doubles players is this: How do I know that our opponents aren't cheating? We think they use signals.

So when I wanted to reintroduce doubles to the Midwest at my Joliet Jailbreak tourney last October, to solve this issue I and my codirectors created a doubles version, which we call rotation doubles.

In rotation doubles, each player keeps an individual scorecard and has a different partner for every game. The basic premise is simple: four people are assigned by random draw to a table. During the first game, players A and B partner up against C and D. For the second game, players A and C compete against B and D. In the third game, players A and D play B and C.

Following the first set of three games,


player A stays at the original table; player B moves one table down the line; player C moves two tables; and player D moves three tables.

The same procedure repeats: AB vs. CD in game four; AC vs. BD in game five; and AD vs. BC in game six.

After the second set of three games, the same players again move in the same fashion: player A stays at the original table, player B moves one table, player C moves two tables, and player D moves three tables. The same matchups are used one final time for games seven through nine.

Using this format, a two-person team cannot dominate a tournament by trading signals and knowing each other's playing quirks, because each player at a table is partnered with each of the other three players for only one game, and plays against each player for two games. This format makes it difficult for cheating to take place and should lead to a friendlier environment for doubles.

Rotation doubles was well received in Joliet, and I hope that it catches on at other tournaments. I would like to hear from TDs and players alike what they think of this format. **CW**

Sanction Fee Increase

I note that page 29 of the November Cribbage World states that, due to BOD action, the tournament sanction fee will increase from \$2 to \$3 and consolation fee will now be \$1. I have already received several entries for a tournament to be held on January 30, 2016. The entry fee of \$82 for the main was clearly intended to include the ACC fee. I'm not of a mind to go back to the players and ask for another dollar, nor do I intend to reduce the prize fund to \$79 per person. To me it is unjust to penalize me and my entrants just because the board made a late decision. Also, to learn of this action in the small print of the board business as reported in CW does not give much lead time to directors with tournaments in January. Why not make it effective with the new cribbage year?

LUCK & SUPERSTITION

I hear this all the time: "You're just lucky!"

Luck is a fundamental ingredient of card-playing. In cribbage, a beginner can beat a top player in any given game. The cribbage culture so overemphasizes the role of luck that it often overlooks the importance of skill. When people wonder about a player winning a lot, they are more likely to ask how she changed her luck rather than how she improved her skill.

Common superstitious tactics used by players to change their luck include scrambling the cards, changing decks and pegs, changing the chair they are sitting in, and even changing where they park their car.

If players changed the deck every time after losing ten games and then won the eleventh game, they would say to themselves that they were glad they changed the deck. It does not occur to them that they might have won some of those other games if they hadn't changed the decks.

Superstitions can lead to self-fulfilling negative prophecies. I see no reason to discourage my opponents from being superstitious. There are reasons why people who appear to be lucky continue to be lucky:

- They may be playing better than the players who appear to be unlucky.
- Their opponents often play worse when they are losing, which only adds to the apparent good luck of those who are winning.

A common saying among gamblers-"is it is unlucky to be superstitious"—is said in jest to poke fun at superstitious players. But the opposite is sometimes true. I do better at some tournaments; at others I have bad results. Call it superstition if you like.

This reminds me of an anecdote about a famous mathematician. Some colleagues visited him and saw a horseshoe over his door. When they asked what it was for, he told them it was for good luck. "But you are a great mathematician," said one of his colleagues; "you don't believe in things like that, do you?" "Of course not," he replied, "but that's the beauty of it. Whether you believe in it or not, it works!"

If superstition works for you, go for it. But keep in mind what English philosopher Sir Francis Bacon (1561-1626) said: "The root of all superstition is that men observe when a thing hits, but not when it misses." CW

Trapping an opponent's 5 is an underrated aspect of the game. Let's examine one hand and two ways to potentially achieve this goal.

You are the dealer holding A-6-7-8, and your opponent leads a Q. What do you play? If I am playing an inexperienced player, I will play the 8, hoping for a 10 response to play my Ace for a go. And then hopefully the opponent saves a 5 for the last play, enabling me to get the three-card run at the end.

Playing a better player, however, requires more finesse to trap a 5. In this case I would play my Ace on their Q lead, hoping for a 5 response. Then I would play my 7 and take the three-card run if they have two picture cards remaining.

Remember it is almost as important to play your opponent as it is to play your cards.

Tourney Tidbits

Toss the 5s Dale Magedanz (Milwaukee WI) was playing **Jeff Gardner** (Ada MI) in the Yooper Classic in Watersmeet MI when he was dealt 4-4-5-5-5-6. Not wanting to give Jeff 4-5, Dale tossed 4-6. Of course, the case 5 was cut, which gave Dale a 20-hand. Jeff also tossed 4-6 for a 24-crib. Luckily for Dale, he pegged five points to go out before Jeff counted hand and crib.

Ninety-Six-Years Young Master Hazel Weichseldorfer (Dupont WA) still knows how to count big hands. At the Daffodil Express Open in Puyallup WA, she held her seventh 28-hand since 1995 (she has also had three 29-hands). Hazel joined the ACC in 1985 and has been playing cribbage for seventy-one years!

Cribbage Fever, Catch It! Brittany Bryan (Spokane WA), a relative newcomer to ACC cribbage, zipped over to the Montana Championship in mid-October. In the main event she scored a 28-hand, but fell a little short of qualifying for the playoffs. Undismayed she earned top honors in the consolation with a 15-point scorecard. She then ran the table and took home the championship as well. Her last match was a knee-knocker against Life Master Ron Logan (Meridian ID). With the score 1-1, the deciding game was up for grabs. At the turn, the cribbage gods rewarded Brittany with four 4s in the pegging, followed by a 16-hand, and she waltzed to the championship!

Double Master **Gary Wirth** (Edmonton AB) won back-to-back mains on consecutive weekends: Canadian Thanksgiving in Edmonton AB on October 11 and Mon-

tana Open in Missoula on October 18. He was also the high qualifier in Edmonton.

Waupaca Oddities **#1** Apparently even good players have trouble counting to two. In the Waupaca main, which uses a two-against-one format, Master Alice Korn (Round Lake Park IL) and Dale Magedanz (Milwaukee WI) were having so much fun that they played three games and even recorded the scores of all three games on their scorecards! #2 As the consolation started, Delbert Anderst (Lake City MN) called across the room to his wife, Darlene, to see if she had any hearing aid batteries. His seatmates got a kick out of this, but Del got the last laugh. With a new battery installed, he won the consolation. #3 Life Master (*) Don Patrin (Saint Paul MN) had his worst weekend ever, winning only 11 of 40 games played. He did not, however, lose his sense of humor; he was overheard to say that it was a good thing that he was wore his lucky cap or it would have been even worse!

"Don't Look, Ethel!" Life Master (3*) **Roland Hall** (Napa CA) went streaking in southern California in mid-October. After losing his first game in the Gold Coast Classic consolation in Ventura, Roland won his next seven games to be high qualifier and also beat his two playoff opponents two straight games. The next day at the Fall US Open in West Covina, Roland won his first seven games in the main for a streak of eighteen straight wins! Giant-killer **Bruce Aveson** (West Covina CA) finally broke the streak—but only momentarily, as Roland won his next four games and went on to be high qualifier.

Scorecards of the Month—Two Near Records!

Life Master (7 *) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR) came within a hair's breadth of setting a new ACC record at the Yooper Classic in Watersmeet MI. He lost only three games and turned in a 45/19 +397 scorecard. (The record for a 22-game tourney is 46/20 +501, set at the 2004 MGM Open in Green Bay WI by the late Sharlene Medeiros of Thorndike MA.) The only players to beat Duane on September 26 were Life Master Daniel Pluff (Saint Paul MN), who squeaked by Duane by 5 points; Life Master (2*) Doug Page (Oostburg WI), who won by 10 points; and Mary Bearss (Wyoming MI), who trounced Duane by a whopping 25 points.

Nineteen measly points. That is all that stood between Master Dennis Koehler (Wisconsin Rapids WI) and cribbage immortality. At the Waupaca Fall Open main, Dennis lost only three games—by a total of only nineteen points.


BREAKING

Ruling Points ...

Keeping Track

One of the stickiest situations ACC judges have to rule on is when a player commits no infraction, yet by lack of attention or focus loses a point, a play, or even the game.

It can start with the deal; the pone is dealt seven cards, the dealer six, and both throw two cards to the crib, and the starter card is cut. According to the ACC rulebook, the play continues with only the dealer pegging, the pone's points do *not* count, the pone's hand is dead, and the dealer takes

all points in their hand and crib. We call this "the unlucky rule 13." As hard as it is to endure, it shows how important it is to check the amount of cards you have right away.

The announced count is another way to lose points. If you do not keep track of the cumulative count, and your opponent announces the wrong count, you can either get, or lose, points. Once an incorrect count is acted on by either player, that action stands. Some players speak indistinctly or softly; others have disabilities that may prevent them from speaking. Regardless of the situation, keeping track of the count at all times is the responsibility of *both* players, and someday will save you a loss.

Cribbage Board of the Month

This board was made in 1990 by the Vandercraft Co. of Prineville OR. There is a great story behind this board and about 2,000 others like it. I will start the story with how I obtained the board.

My friend and ACC member **Rog**er Lueschow passed away earlier this year. Roger lived in Maple Valley boards. After picking this board and a few others, I asked Lana if she had any history on the "Operation Desert Shield" board. She told me that it belonged to Gene and that he had purchased it in 1990 as part of an ACC fundraiser to send boards to our troops in Kuwait and Iraq. She also remembered that ACC member



WA and played with Sea-Tac Peggers Club 148 in Federal Way WA. He was an ACC Grand Master and tournament judge. Over the years, Roger won many trophy boards, both on his own and playing doubles with his brother-in-law **Gene Sissel** (Baker City OR). When Gene passed away in 2003, Roger got his boards, so you can imagine how many he had.

A few months ago, Roger's wife, Lana, called to see if I would be interested in a few of Roger's boards. When Lana, also an ACC member, took me into their office/workroom I couldn't believe the number of **Mickey Griffin** had spearheaded the program.

The next issue was to find Mickey. After ACC President **Jeanne Hofbauer** gave me a few names to contact, I heard back from **Scott Kooistra**, director of the Yankton SD Cribbage Club. Scott had Mickey's phone number. I called and got the firsthand story on the board.

So, here is the rest of the sto-

ry. Mickey (NE-44) is now eighty-five and lives in Unadilla NE. He served in the Navy during the Korean War, and there

was always a shortage of cribbage boards on his ship. Mickey thought our troops deserved better and designed this tournament long board. After getting approval from the ACC, he worked with Vandercraft to produce over 2,000 boards. Mickey had a few high-level friends in the military who helped get the boards distributed. The ACC helped raise funds for the project, but Mickey funded a good portion himself.

I wish we had more room in this article, but I have to mention a few of the "thank you" letters sent to Mickey. He received a March 1991 letter from President George Bush. He also received an April 1991 Department of Defense "Certificate of Appreciation in support of Operations in the Persian Gulf." That certificate was made out to Mickey and the Vandercraft Co. and signed by Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney.

After twenty-five years, I know there are more of these boards around, and I hope some belong to current ACC members. Also, it is the time of year for giving gifts. If you have friends or relatives in the military, it's a good time to send off a few cribbage boards.

Here is one last thanks to Mickey, Vandercraft, and the ACC. (See the Game On column in this issue for a related story.) CW

It was with great interest that I read the President's Column in the November *Cribbage World*. I have a few comments that I would like to share.

On September 18, 2015, the BOD voted by a 15-10 margin to define and standardize the meaning of Q-pool: "If it's a Q-pool it means that everybody that qualifies gets paid as long as they are in the Q-pool, regardless of the method, graduated, hybrid, or equal distribution." Simply put: "If you are in the Q-pool and you qualify, you get paid."

The BOD felt that the definition of Q-pool had to be clarified, as there was confusion and lack of consistency among tournaments. Players traveled from region to region across the country, and many who qualified and were in Q-pools weren't getting paid. The BOD's intention was to improve the playing field by standardizing the definition of Q-pool. Now we have clearer waters, when before there were muddied waters.

One of the statements in the President's Column was inaccurate: "The graduated Q-pool must now be called a 'side pool."" The President appears to be confused, for the BOD voted that any time the word "Q-pool" is used all qualifiers must get paid. Graduated, hybrid, and equal-distribution Q-pools are not side pools—they are now treated the same throughout the country.

The President also claims the BOD action is "another step closer to micromanaging tournament directors." How can this be? The ACC Tournament Directors Manual is already approximately twenty-five pages long. Should that be considered micromanaging too?

The President's Column should not be used for the purpose of politicking one's views. It appears that in the column the BOD is being criticized for approving a change that will benefit all tournament players. The BOD is responsible to address, change, or redefine issues that are brought to our attention. The column would have been better served to point out some of the positives that came out of the meeting, such as:

- addressing the concern over ACC financials
- new MRP software, hopefully to be up and running for the 2016–17 season
- a report that the Youth Program is growing with four national events

The President should present her argument in a BOD meeting—not air it in the President's Column after the vote has taken place. CW



Six Games

Still a secret to many in the ACC, Grass Roots now has a Division 4. Division 4 clubs play six games per meeting instead of the nine games per meeting played by the other divisions. Division 4 requires only four players for a weekly tournament to qualify as an official tournament. Division 4 clubs could start playing in someone's kitchen or garage, delaying the question of where to play when the club grows.

Some advantages of a Division 4 club: it fits meeting places with less time for a meeting; the number of meetings per season is flexible; it more appropriate for very young, very old, new players, or others who cannot play nine games.
