2015 BOD ELECTION RESULTS

The results of the 2015 election for the ACC's Board of Directors have been announced by ACC President **Jeanne Hofbauer** after being certified by Vice President of Policy **Keith Widener**. Only 852 valid ballots were cast this year, representing 13.2% of the eligible voting membership. This number continues the downward trend in voter participation seen in recent elections.

Once again the Western Region captured ten of the twenty-five available slots. The Central Region seated eight candidates (up one from the 2013 election), with the Eastern Region filling out the remaining seven seats (down one from 2013).

With the retirement of two women (see next paragraph) and the election of six men, this BOD will be composed of twenty-two men and only three women.

Six current BOD members—**Tom Cookman** (Eureka CA), **Annett Eiffert** (Fair Oaks CA), **Bill Medeiros** (Winston Salem NC), **Robert Milk** (Essex Junction VT), **Larry Phifer** (Raleigh NC), and **Peggy Shea** (Eureka CA)—did not run for reelection. The remaining nineteen current BOD members were all reelected, and so six new directors will be installed on the BOD in September:

My Deal

Play smart, play fair, play fast.

A player wrote and reminded me how important it is for players to stay at the hotel where the tournament is held. I have preached about this topic before, but since it has been a few years since I last mentioned this subject, it is probably time for another visit to it.

This is actually a fairly straightforward transaction. The more players who stay at the host hotel, the more negotiating power the TD has and the better deal the hotel can give the tournament. The fewer expenses the tourney has to pay, the more money is left in the prize fund. With more money in the prize fund, payouts will be bigger—and who can argue with that?

Hotels are more willing to negotiate or lessen the rent for playing space if they know that they will make money elsewhere—on guest rooms, on bar tabs, and on restaurant sales. So patronizing the establishment where the tourney is held will give the TD negotiating clout.

Of course, this is a two-way street. TDs cannot expect players to stay at the host hotel if guest room rates are wildly out of line with those at other hotels in the area or with those paid at other tournaments.

This means that TDs need to negotiate

the best possible rate for hotel guests. Do not accept the first price that the hotel offers. Gently remind the hotel that players want to stay at the host hotel as a means of supporting the tournament and for convenience, but that if their rates are too high the players will go elsewhere. And also remind them that players who stay at the host hotel are more likely to spend money in the associated restaurant or bar—and the hotel will make money this way.

This can become a bit of a balancing act, but the bottom line is that the arrangement has to work for both the hotel and the tournament. If the benefits are slanted toward the hotel, players won't stay there—or worse, won't even play the tournament. And if all the benefits go to the players, then eventually the hotel will raise prices or refuse to book the tourney. And neither scenario is good for cribbage.

Sometimes your wallet may require you to economize, and you may have to go down the street to “Cheap Hotels R Us,” but if at all possible support the tournament hotel and restaurant. Doing so allows TDs to negotiate from a position of strength, and that is good for cribbage. **CW**

One Game Per Opponent

During the past twenty-three years I have been fortunate enough to play this wonderful, frustrating, goofy, and fickle game. I have traveled and played in twenty states, which has allowed me to experience tournaments in all parts of the country. The East Coast and West Coast play 20 or 22 games against 20 or 22 opponents—by far the fairest pairings you can have. The Central Region, for the most part, plays 22 games against 11 opponents. I ask why? Playing an opponent once might take a little longer, and cross-checking might take a little longer, but it is the fairest way. With tournaments getting smaller, it seems we are playing the same people at most tournaments, so it would be nice to play 22 opponents. If alternate deal can be worked out, fine; but if not, cutting for deal is not the end of the world. As long as I am expounding on an issue, I will add random seating as another problem. Spouses—and only spouses—should be placed on opposite tables. (Some people feel spouses should be not be excluded, and that is fine with me.) Once the tournament director starts the seating process, no one should be allowed to draw a seat for a friend, making sure they do not play each other. Once a seat is drawn, that is what you get. If your friend draws a seat that has him/her playing each other, touch luck. It is not fair to arrange seating, and I think this is a major problem that should be addressed by the

board. Now that I have had my say, Thank you. It is still a great game and a lot of fun.

James Morrow

James Morrow (Sunnyside WA) has directed Club 156 for fifteen years, the Washington State Open for fifteen years, and the Summer Classic for fourteen years. He also serves as head judge at the JWP/ACC Open in Reno.



Richard Shea

Richard Shea (Eureka CA) is codirector of the ACC Open, Humboldt Bay Classic, and several Sonoma tourneys.



Terry Weber

Terry Weber (Madison WI) directs four tournaments a year and developed the hybrid Q-pool that is used at many tournaments around the country, including the JPW/ACC Open in Reno.

The election team, headed up by **Keith Widener**, did a tremendous job in recording the results. In particular, **Megan Player** (Cary NC) was instrumental in ensuring that the votes were tabulated and properly counted. Here are some stats related to the election:

- 897 of 6,447 ballots were returned (13.9%)
- of the 897 returned ballots, 852 were counted (95%)
- 433 valid ballots were cast electronically
- 419 valid paper ballots were counted
- 45 paper ballots were tossed out, for these reasons:
 - ▶ 32 due to wrong code
 - ▶ 6 due to no code
 - ▶ 6 due to the wrong total
 - ▶ 1 due to having already voted online

Online voting has now been available for two election cycles. In 2013, 536 of the 1,001 ballots were cast online (53.5%). This year 433 ballots were cast electronically, or 50.8% of the votes.

Pat Llewellyn (Bellingham MA) was the “high nonqualifier” in election. Should

25 Years Ago in the ACC

The cover of the July 1990 *Cribbage World* reported a new high for ACC attendance: 5,441. After peaking at around 7,400, attendance today is 6,380. In 1990 California led the way with 841 members; today it is still in the lead with 1,111. Oregon, Wisconsin, and Massachusetts were listed as the next three most populous states 1990; today these states are #3, #4, and #7 respectively.

Elsewhere we read that **Joe Bernard** (Libertyville IL) won the main and **Duane Toll** (then of Milwaukee IL) won the consolation at the Northern Illinois Open, and **Henry Carle** (Anchorage AK) won the Snake River Open consolation.

Ruling Points



Some judges seem to be iffy on what constitutes a renege. A player recently reported about one example where judges ruled incorrectly. The pone played a card for 27, the dealer said go, and the pone took the point. The pone then said, “Oh, I could have played my 4,” played it, and took the other point because they got to 31. The ruling judges said, “Well, the pone caught the mistake, so no foul, play on.”

The renege rule (#7.3 in the ACC rulebook) is simple; here is the first part: “A renege is a failure to play a card that could have been played. A player may correct a ‘go’ call before either player pegs a point or before the opponent plays a card. Thereafter, when a renege card is played, the opponent may claim a renege up to the time he or she plays the next card or announces the count of his or her hand.” It does not matter who catches the renege, the renege happens when a score is taken. The correct action in this situation would have been to enforce the renege rule. **CW**

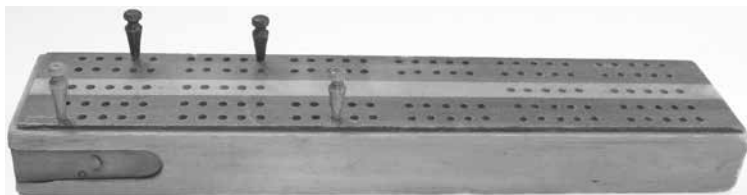
The most common question I get when I attend ACC tournaments is: “How many cribbage boards do you have?” The answer is 400+. My favorite boards are older American-manufactured boards that have an interesting history.

The May 2015 CBOM column featured three Horn/McCrillis boards

The second board is also model C-235. I purchased this board from **Tom and Marianne Geyer** (Warren MI). The board came from Tom’s parents’ estate. Tom and Marianne

are not cribbage players nor were his parents. That is why the board appears to be unused. It also came with origi-

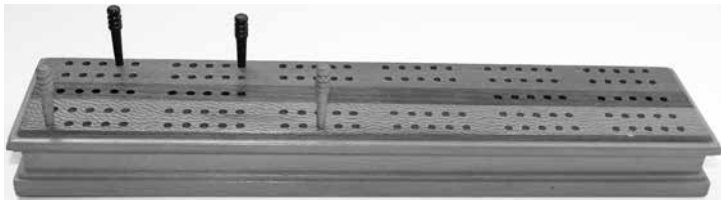


manufactured in the 1930s. In this column, I feature two boards made by the same company that predate the previous boards.

copyright date on instructions). My guess is that it probably had a very limited production. This is because around 1937 Horn/McCrillis started making the streamline version of the model C-5 (see May 2015 CW, page 14). The streamline C-5 was very popular and much less costly to produce.

I wrap this column up with a request: please contact me if you own or have seen the newer version of the C-235 board. Thanks to all of our ACC members who have helped add to my information on old cribbage boards.

The President's Column

Of all the volunteers in the ACC, some of the hardest working individuals are our Grass Roots directors. They must do their job weekly during the Grass Roots season, and some clubs even play every week, year around.

They are responsible for making sure the statistics are reported, that playing sites are kept available, that their members are informed of all pertinent info, and that playing paraphernalia is always available. Plus trying to keep all members happy to the best extent possible and attracting new members. That is a pretty full plate!

I think that most Grass Roots players really look forward to their playing night. But, once the last card has been played

and the scorecard handed in, they beat feet for the door to head home. I would like to offer some suggestions for giving these valuable volunteers some well-deserved help. After all, we don't want them to experience burnout and quit the job!

You could offer to be in charge of inventory, making sure everything is kept in a neat and organized manner. You can make sure there are plenty of scorecards, even offer to get new ones printed if needed. Keep the playing boards clean and make sure there are plenty of pegs, and order a new supply if necessary. Playing cards need to be replaced often, perhaps you could get them donated by a nearby casino. The ACC still has a supply available for reasonable cost (call Grass Roots Commissioner Joan Rein at 952.448.2459). Or you can ask weekend tournament directors for their leftover cards.

On the nights you play, if you finish before the director does, you can offer to check the cards, making sure they are added correctly. And putting the boards and pegs away and clearing the tables is always appreciated.

Most directors cannot make it to every weekly meet, so offer to learn how to run it, to give them a break for vacations, illness, or whatever.

And perhaps most important of all, let them know how much you appreciate what they do.

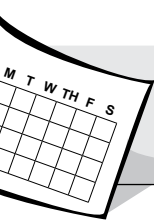
