The Season in Review

he 2014–15 tournament season drew to a close on July 31, with 2,356 combined entrants (down 136 from last season's 2,492) competing in 37 sanctioned mains and consolations during the last month of the season. This year only two season-ending cluster events fell in the last weekend of July: Raleigh NC attracted 635 players (up from 559 last year), and Sunnyside WA saw 182 players in contention (up from 144).

When Grand Master **Betty Brumley** (Sunnyside WA) played the final card of the year to capture the Sunnyside Weekday Challenge consolation, it rang down the year on a terrific season of cribbage play. Here are some of the highlights from the 2015–16 season:

- Life Master (7★) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR) claimed his ninth national championship, with 2,604 MRPs.
- Grand Master Valerie Sumner (Sparks NV) had the highest main scorecard of the season: 43/20 +331 at the Veterans Day Classic in Reno on November 8 (story in January CW, page 13). Two players turned in 21-point consolation scorecards this past season: Richard Corbin (McKinney TX) at Open Opener (Raleigh NC) on July 24 and Grand Master Kerry O'Connell (Ventura CA) at Pacific Coast Championship (Monterey CA) on January 11.

An Idea for Grass Roots Play

We would like to advance the idea of earning Grass Roots points as a visitor at any club while remaining a member of your local Grass Roots club. This would allow a person to enjoy the feel of belonging to their local club and be eligible for local awards such as club champion. We all enjoy belonging to a group, but many people travel for various reasons: ACC tournaments, business, pleasure, etc. Doing so allows us to play Grass Roots events out of our area and meet new people. However, while away we lose the chance to earn GRPs. Grass Roots members would still be limited to playing only the number of tournaments allowed by the division in which their local club plays (i.e., 14, 24, or 36). It may be advisable to require a person to play a large percentage of their games at their home club in order to be club champion (perhaps 90%). The reporting by the local club director should be about the same as it is now with members of the Travelers Club. We think this would be a benefit for the ACC members. Blind Draw

The August *Cribbage World* (page 5) mentioned blind draws at tournaments. Most tournaments I have been to separate the seat numbers for each table; first you pick a table, then your seat number. I think that all seats should be mixed together in one pot to create a true blind draw. This will eliminate friends from avoiding playing each other. I have noticed that the top players are usually spread out to different tables so that they don't play each other and knock each other out of qualifying. Another thing I've noticed is that players see which table the notoriously slow players are on so they can avoid long waits between games. To level the playing field all players draw from the same pot and play at whatever table they draw regardless of who they have to play against.



¶ In a magical weekend, Life Master Frank Reddy (Winthrop MA) captured the National Open main and became only the second player to win this prestigious event twice. Frank won previously in 2003, and Jim Hartley (Wake Forest NC) won the NOCT in 1975 and 1988. Posting an enviable 29–11 record, Frank never lost a match and was, as he says, "blessed with good cards at the right time and a whole lotta luck."

¶ Master George Bryer (Stoneham MA) suffered his first loss in the second match on Saturday morning, but managed to win every match all the way through the fifteenth round on Monday morning, when he took third place. This is the longest run ever by a player in the once-defeated bracket in the history of the NOCT.

¶ Life Master **David Statz** (North Billerica MA), who won the 2014 NOCT main, is still on a roll. This year he won the NOCT consolation.

¶ In the high roller tourney on Monday afternoon, Grand Master Laurie Hardy (Topsham ME) had a 28-hand and came in first. On the other hand, Master John Morch (Raleigh NC) also had a 28-hand but came in last. To add insult to injury, John got skunked in the game in which he held the 28!



¶ We are fairly certain that this was *not* the first tournament for Joe Zimmitti (Cromwell CT), but he nonetheless had trouble filling out his consolation scorecard. In each of the first seven games, he wrote his winning scores in the minus column, and his losing scores in the plus column. Joe was in good company, for each of his first seven opponents signed his incorrect scorecard! To save eyestrain on all those enquiring minds who wanna know the names of these culprits, Joe's first seven opponents were **Ray Wanke** (Saint Cloud FL), **Lance Browne**

(Portland ME), **Peter Olson** (Nashua NH),

Bob Labossiere (Rotonda West FL), **Mike Kilmartin** (Cary NC), **Bruce Davis** (Netherlands Antilles), and former NOCT TD **Catherine Perkins** (Bear Creek NC). Kudos to Joe's final two opponents, **Janet Viands** (Ashburn VA) and **Rhonda Dhanpaul** (Homestead FL), for signing a correct scorecard!

Tourney Tidbits

Two in a Row The August *Cribbage World* noted that Larry Leidenheimer (Duluth MN) won his first tourney—the Lake Superior Challenge consolation in Ishpeming MI on June 21. Just six days later Larry won his second tourney: the Steinmetz/Frosty Shuffle main in Slinger WI. In both tourneys he was the #12 qualifier, and in both he beat the #2 qualifier in the finals.

First Up, Then Down Betty Briggs (Charlotte MI) experienced two cribbage extremes at the Steinmetz/Frosty Shuffle main in Slinger WI. She won the Friday night event but then got a string of pearls in the Saturday night satellite.

One Lousy Point! Grand Master **Terry Weber** (Madison WI) lost his grand slam in the Frosty/Steinmetz Shuffle consolation by a single point. Witnesses report that a masked snowman was responsible for Terry's only loss.

"When I'm 64" On the day before his 64th birthday, at the 64-player Devil Mountain Caper in Antioch CA, Life Master $(2\star)$ Cy Madrone (Santa Barbara CA) turned in his best ever scorecard: a 42/18 +293! And on his 64th birthday, Cy went wire-to-wire to win his 35th tournament. Cy lost only eight games all weekend (four in the qualifying round and four in the playoffs), for an enviable

78.9% batting average (a 30–8 record). A search of ACC records reveals that this was the second-best tourney performance since 1997 (no electronic records exist prior to this year). Only one other coast-to-coast performance tops Cy's, and that was turned in by none other than Life Master (7 \star) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR), who scored a 43-point scorecard at the Northern California Open on January 29, 2012, and then won the tourney. (Interesting side note: there were no byes in either the main or consolation. The main had 64 players, and the con had 32.)

Cribbage Ho'olaulea The Hawai'ian word *ho'olaulea* means "celebration." And that's exactly what tournament director Life Master Fred White (Gloucester MA) did in capturing the championship!

Take Two In July 2011 **Terry Higgins** (Hayward CA) won the Vacaville Summer Open consolation for his first-ever tourney, on his way to earning Rookie of the Year honors that season. Four years on, he returned to the scene of the crime and captured his first-ever main by facing—and defeating—four highly rated players: Life Master (*) **Tom Langford** (McKinleyville CA), Life Master (3*) **James Langley** (Red Bluff CA), Master **Richard Hinrichs** (Redding CA), and Life Master **Annett Eiffert** (Fair Oaks CA).



Youth Teaching Tip

I've been asked many times what's the right age to teach children cribbage. My response is that when teaching a group of kids, fourth or fifth grade (ten- and eleven-year-olds) is on the mark. But when working one-on-one, a seven- or eightyear-old with a grasp of basic addition skills is a great starting place. This is generally true, but there are always exceptions to the rule (see below).





t the National Open in Raleigh in July, I had an interesting discussion about position play with a couple of good players from Texas. (Yes, they play cribbage in Texas!) While we agreed that the advantage of having the first deal is around 54–56%, we differed on how that played out over the course of a game.

Let's say I have first deal, and after the first hand I am ahead 29-17. I would consider that a pretty successful deal, but my Texas friend claimed that as pone he now had a better chance of winning than he did at the beginning of the game. While I recognize and understand the 26 Theory of **DeLynn Colvert**, I must admit that I don't play position at all in the first 45 pegs of the game. Every cribbage game is unique, and to attempt to fit a particular game into a box of 26 pegs every two deals, or playing to try to win a game in the crib of the ninth deal, is I believe counterproductive.

So my advice is to play good solid percentage cribbage the first third of the game. Incorporate your read of your opponent with your gut instincts, and then play accordingly after that depending on your position.

I would enjoy answering any questions about this or any other pegging topics in upcoming columns.

Ruling Points

The renege rule is arguably the most often enforced rule, but the mechanics of calling and pegging a go or other points is tricky. Here is scenario based on a player's question about rule 8.10, which states: "If a 'go' is pegged before the opponent has announced 'go,' the cards remaining in the opponent's hand determine if the 'go' is warranted."

Player A holds 4-6-7-8; player B has 3-5-J-J; and the pegging goes like this (running count in parentheses):

Α	8 (8)		6 (19)		4 (26)
в		5 (13)		3 (22)	

The question is this: if player A says "26 for 5" at this point and pegs five holes before player B says "go," is that an overpeg of one hole since player A has only a run of four? Or is player A entitled to that point even though he didn't know player B had no playable cards?

We concur that player A has overpegged since there was only a run of four and player B has not said "go." Player A goes back one point, and player B is awarded the one-point overpeg. This is a nitpicky point, yet warranted: player A *will* get a go, after the penalty is assessed.

On a related note, runs during the play of the cards are a bane to many players, and it is possible to play seven cards before a run is scored, for example:


