ACC DUES

No one likes to pay more money for an item, but it is a basic fact of life that prices go up from time to time.

Over the past few years, the ACC has seen income decrease at the same time that expenses have increased. The Board of Directors addressed the organization's finances at its annual meeting in Yankton in September and took several steps to correct this widening budgetary gap.

Effective with the start of the calendar year, annual ACC membership dues were raised from \$15 to \$20 (joint memberships went up from \$18 to \$25). In addition, the BOD voted to stop selling life memberships because they run a deficit after the eighth year. Current life memberships will continue, but this member option will no longer be offered.

The BOD raised sanction fees for tournaments from \$2 to \$3 per person in each main tourney and instituted a \$1 fee for each consolation player (formerly at zero).

While the BOD discussed implementing only one of these steps, at the end of the day it decided to put all raises into effect now in order to correct the financial imbalance and not have to apply multiple increases over the next couple of years.

A revised membership form is printed on page 11 below. Please begin using this form immediately. The membership secretary requests that all old membership forms be discarded to avoid confusion. CW



My Deal by David Aiken



Play smart, play fair, play fast.

This past month, I received many letters—both pro and con—concerning an article in the December *Cribbage World* and two follow-up articles in the January issue.

Printing additional letters and comments on this topic is unlikely to change minds, but since many members asked about the propriety of printing an anonymous letter in *Cribbage World* (some of their letters are excerpted on the next page), this column will focus on anonymity in CW.

My initial response is that the anonymous letter in the January CW was not the only time this has happened under my editorship. By my count, it was the sixth such letter (see May, September, and October 2007; May 2008; and February 2012). So, while rare, it has precedence. If I am going to be criticized for the January 2016 letter, then I should have been reprimanded at least five times previously, yet no one commented on those earlier letters.

Second, I do not print letters of secret

origin. That is, if I get a letter with no name attached and if I am unable to determine who wrote it, I will not print it. I will not allow an unidentified/unknown person to snipe at someone or complain about an issue through the pages of *Cribbage World* without at least someone (me and/or the BOD) knowing who wrote the letter. I don't want to parse this issue too closely, but in my thinking there is a large gap between anonymous publication and unknown origin.

Third, the author of the January letter originally submitted the letter without thought of concealing their identity. The tagline "Author's name withheld by request" was added at my urging, and so the author should not be criticized for being unafraid to stand behind their forcefully expressed comments.

Lastly, while I do not intend to print anonymous letters frequently, I'm sure that future letters on a sensitive issue may well require this editorial convenience. CW

The Inside Track

Successful pegging requires a player to amass knowledge about their opponent's hands. For example, on the first hand of the game, you are the dealer holding A-2-3-Q, and the opponent leads a 10; what do you play?

When an opponent leads a picture card, they are likely holding a hand with four pictures, three pictures and a 5, or (to a lesser extent) a picture and three small cards.

If you play your Ace on their 10 lead, you buy yourself time to decipher their hand. If they respond with a picture, it's pretty obvious they started with four of them. If they play a 5, you can play your 2 and see if they make it 28 with another picture. If they play a little card, you have the option of getting into a pegging battle or playing off.

Always try to give yourself as many options as possible.

Ruling Points . . .

Some new wording for the ACC rulebook is going to be published, and some rules we have already discussed are slightly affected. One upcoming change greatly changes the game. What we recently called "unlucky rule 13" is probably going to change, and there is a much more lenient penalty (or none at all) for holding the wrong amount of cards, both for pone and dealer.



Recently we saw two players play an entire hand, one player with five cards, the other with four, and the crib with

four. They both were completely unaware. We hope that this falls in the "no harm no foul" category.

This is another reminder that judges need to be aware, keep up with changes, and often review the whole rulebook. Judges, talk often among yourselves about situations, and players as well. It helps keep the game fair and fun!

In addition, for your first week, we will assign an experienced player sitting next to you to be your "guide". Any questions you may have, **even** including advice on how to play a hand, will be allowed. Then, for the following three weeks you will be allowed to ask a player sitting next to you for that same advice!

very once in a while, I receive a board in the mail from a fellow ACC member or someone who has run across one of my articles in Cribbage World. Sometimes they


are boards that are gathering dust or maybe just need a good home. These two boards arrived in October, and I am thrilled to have them.

The first board is called a "hedge-

hog" board, so named for the permanent "pull up" pegs. The board was given to me by Don and Diane Worthen (Englewood FL). Don said it was given to him back in the 1960s by an old Dutchman, Fred Hoffmann. They didn't use the board and thought I would like it for my collection. I love it and in fact have been looking for a hedgehog for years. I believe this particular board was made in the late 1890s by the Specialty Game Co. (Cortland NY). The original hedgehog board was all metal and made by John Gill Mfg. under an 1863 patent. A photo of the John Gill board appeared in the article "Get on Board" by Ray Simon

in the October 2015 Cribbage World.


Don was not a member of the ACC, but a friend of his is and gives him copies of Cribbage World. That is how Don got my name. I have

The next board was sent to me by ACC member Jim Barron (Stoughton MA). This board belonged to Jim's father Patrick. In the early 1930s, Patrick worked on a deep sea fishing boat out of Boston. This board was on the boat, but was a problem because it didn't fit on the small storage shelf. In rough

seas, it would slide off. One of the crew took it home, cut it in half, added hinges and card storage. That is why there is a

Cribbage Clothing and Business Cards

At cribbage tournaments you see jackets, shirts, and hats with cribbage information. Ideally, similar clothing would be worn for non-cribbage activities and would lead to conversations with strangers. It is best if you can give the stranger something in writing. Often, like in a checkout line at a store, it is not convenient to write. That can be solved if you carry a business card or a note with contact information about your club and the ACC.

I seldom make a trip to Reno without encountering someone who sees my shirt and asks about cribbage. I give them my card and if time and circumstances permit, talk about my club, the ACC, or the tournament I am going to or from. How often does it result in a new ACC member? I don't know. I am convinced that if most of the players in my club would do the same we would gain a new club mem-

ber or two each year. We normally lose a few club members each year and need to compensate some way.

This can be taken a step further. When doing noncribbage business, use your cribbage business card. Recently I took my lawnmower in for service. When the service man asked for my phone number, I said "Here is a card with my number," and handed him my cribbage business card. He said, "How often do you play cribbage?" My answer. "Almost every Monday night and sometimes on weekends." That was the start of a five-minute conversation about cribbage. I also gave him one of the old *Cribbage Worlds* that I carry in my car.

How long did you go not knowing there is a national cribbage organization? The ACC is a secret kept from many. Let the secret out.

The President's Column

What do you think is the most pressing issue that the Board of Directors of the American Cribbage Congress should deal with? Some things to think about would be finances, rules, awards, and membership.

The board bit the bullet at the last meeting and instituted some financial changes to insure a sustainable treasury for future endeavors. The elimination of life memberships, a small raise of membership fees, raising the tournament sanctioning fees from \$2 to \$3, and establishing a \$1 fee for consolation events were enacted. It might seem like these measures may exceed what is necessary. The board believes they are essential for the immediate future and perhaps the long-term support of the ACC. None of these are huge changes, and the decisions can always be reversed if deemed to be excessive.

Expenditures are also going to be addressed by the board. Several years ago stipends were awarded to a few volunteers who gave exceptional amounts of their time each month in fulfilling their duties for the ACC. Later, an ad hoc committee was formed to review these stipends and make recommendations. Now, a new ad hoc committee is being formed to once again review the original, increased, and new stipends. Volunteer expenses will also be evaluated.

Rules are another issue the board is constantly addressing. There is always an active Rules Committee, and it brings suggestions to almost every meeting. A new rulebook is in the not-too-distant future. Also, a Tournament Regulation and Guidelines Committee evaluates suggestions for tournament play.

Awards are not often reevaluated by the board, unless there is a suggestion brought to us for change. We do arrange for awards to be supplied and transported to the recipients. And a new MRP system is currently being constructed to bring the ACC into a new era.

One of the most important subjects we now need to address is our declining membership. We are not alone in this issue; many organizations are trying to deal with this problem. We have a program in place to mentor youth in learning the game of cribbage, but we need to do more to attract adult members. We have a Public Relations & Publicity Committee that brings ideas to the board, many of which have been implemented. We must define our target audience and implement ideas to attract them.

So you see, the board is not just sitting around doing same-old, same-old. We are genuinely trying to improve, innovate, and grow the ACC.

Youth Teaching Tip

Accidents happen all the time, they just tend to be more prevalent with our youth. In a classroom with many games of cribbage happening at once, careless play or students bumping into tables may lead to cribbage boards tumbling to the ground. If a board were to fall with plastic pegs in it, many times they will break off in a manner that appears to leave the tip of the pegs stuck permanently in the holes of a board. If this happens, there is a solution! With a lighter, heat the tip of a pushpin for about ten seconds. Then push the hot tip into the piece of plastic peg stuck in the hole. The heated point will penetrate the plastic, and as it cools, will mold around the metal pin. Give it 15-20 seconds and then pull straight up. No more peg stuck in hole!

Youth News

Recently I received an email from youth cribbage activists Bill and Bambi Klem (Tulalip WA) who annually introduce cribbage to a new group of students at Lakewood High School. They included some helpful advice: (1) Assign shuffling for homework. (2) Teachers who live near a casino should ask a manager for donations of used playing cards for their classes. Most are happy to give the cards away for a good cause. (3) Visit thrift stores to get cribbage boards. The Klems find short boards for a \$1 or less and even some fancier boards for a couple bucks. They use the short boards in class to teach the game and the fancier boards as trophy boards at their yearend tournament. They also give boards as gifts to graduating players. One such student took his trophy board to football camp and taught some of the other football players how to play cribbage. I'd like to thank Bill and Bambi for their dedicated efforts to promote youth cribbage. They are making a difference in the state of Washington.


