## **Daily Cribbage Hand**

ost cribbage players want to improve their game. But unless you have a live-in cribbage mentor, it is unlikely that you are able to work on your game every day.

Enter the **Daily Cribbage Hand**, a helpful website that features a different cribbage hand every day. The website was created nearly a decade ago by **Matt Jennings** (Reno NV), who started it because he wanted to figure out why a friend beat him so consistently. (Matt admits, however, that he spent more time working on the site than on his game!)

One of the neat features of the DCH site is the ability to suggest hands that you encounter in live games so you can see if others agree with your decision.

With an average of 150 daily votes from registered users and guests, the site has a loyal following of diehard cribbage nerds. You don't have to register to vote, but only registered users can suggests hands.

When you go to **dailycribbagehand.org**, you first see your six cards. You are also given two other important pieces of information: who the dealer is and the positions of both players on the board.

Based on this info, you select two cards to discard to the crib. The next page shows the cut card, the choices made by other site users, and their comments on why continued on page 10



# My Deal by David Aiken



## Play smart, play fair, play fast.

I seldom attend a tourney where someone doesn't bring up the old canard about never getting a skunk in your first game.

Not everybody buys into this fairytale. Life Master (\*) Ross Njaa (Salinas CA), for example, is definitely *not* a believer; he once had a near-record 44/19 +302 scorecard after starting with a 35-point skunk in his favor (see the February 2009 CW).

But all it takes is for one player to show around his/her scorecard, with a skunk prominently displayed in game one—and a nonqualifying score at the bottom—and you start hearing it: "Never start with a skunk." "Didn't I warn you about getting a skunk in game one?" "Starting with a skunk is always bad luck." And on it goes.

Having never seen statistics that can put this myth to rest, I decided to check the scorecards from the three qualifying tournaments in Reno last February: TOC, ACC Open main, and ACC Open consolation—the ACC's three largest tournaments. Allen Karr (Green Bay WI) and


I examined all 1,644 scorecards, and the skunking stats are given in the table below.

Perhaps the easiest way to understand this data is to realize that the field of non-qualifiers is three times larger than the qualifiers (75% versus 25%). In order for the equation "start with a skunk = bad luck" to be true, the number of nonqualifiers with a skunk in game one should be at least three times larger than the number of qualifiers with a skunk in game one.

In other words, if a first-game skunk was truly bad luck, then the number of nonqualifiers with a skunk in the TOC should have been at least 27 (3 x 9), whereas it is only 13—giving lie to the claim that a game-one skunk is bad luck. The same holds true for the other events.

The numbers from a single year show that starting with a skunk gives you a greater chance of qualifying. I plan to continue checking skunks in Reno every year and report the numbers in *Cribbage World*. Stay tuned. CW

they held the hand the way they did. If you wish, you can play the remainder of the game against a computer opponent.

Like most online discussion groups, the comments are sometimes all over the map. It won't take you long to figure out that some of the most helpful and perceptive comments are those by *Ras2829* (the screen name of Life Master (2\*) Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen of Chehalis WA),

The biggest benefit of this website is seeing how other players approach the game and what they do with difficult hands at crucial moments during the game. You will also learn from DCH that the value of the four cards remaining in your hand after you discard to the crib is but a single consideration when deciding which cards to toss; it is just as important to evaluate the pegging potential of the four cards.



HalscribCLX (Grand Master Hal Mueller of Hamilton ON), Jazzselke (Master Dan Selke of Arlington Heights IL), and Coeurdelion (Richard Earnest Howlett of Fakenham, United Kingdom).

While you may not always agree with their choices, carefully reading their comments (and studying their numbers and percentages) will yield rewards as you apply their insights to your own game. In the nine years since the first hand was posted on February 1, 2007 (a beta version existed for a few months before that), *dec* (Daniel Crete of Hudson NH) has been most frequent voter. As of April 20, he had voted 3,127 times, missing only 240 days in more than nine years!

Ras (*Ras2829*) has suggested the most hands, and he uses the site as a great teaching tool. New and experienced players

This was Kate's first ACC victory of any kind! The word on the street is that Kate carried husband James to victory.

Skunk City Grand Master Jerry Newhouse (Appleton WI) and Life Master Marlene Lazachek (Franklin WI) played two games against each other in the Mick Michaelis main in Marinette WI, and each of them skunked the other. They later met in the playoffs, and all five playoff games were skunks. Seven games—seven skunks!

28 + 28 Willis Vowell (Baker City OR) got two 28-hands in one game. And to make it even more amazing, he was playing doubles! This kind of luck may help explain why he and partner Herb Petty (Baker City OR) got a grand slam!

**Crazy Aces** Ron James (Scottsdale AZ) and Jeremy Krieger (Salem OR) played in the Roadrunner consolation semifinals. Jeremy was dealing in hole 107 and held A-A-K-K, while Ron was in hole 100 holding A-A-7-8. The cut card was a 9, and the pegging went like this:



After pegging 15 holes, Ron counted his 7-point hand to win the match and go to the finals. It would be hard to find a crazier finish to a match.

CW asked Roland Hall—the ACC's fourth Four Star Life Master—to tell his story in his own words. Since 2009 Roland has recorded his winning percentage as both the first dealer and the first pone. His numbers are in the box at the bottom.

My dad taught me to play cribbage when I was four or five years old. I grew up in a small town with only two television channels, so we played a lot of cards. We played cribbage until I started driving and didn't have much time for cribbage; I probably didn't play for the next twenty-five years. I wish my dad were still alive so I could thank him for teaching me to play. My retirement years have been greatly enhanced by cribbage because it has given me a reason to travel and meet new people and form friendships with a lot of players.

In the fall of 1987 I saw an ad in the *Napa Register* for a cribbage tournament at the Napa fairgrounds. I didn't have any plans that weekend, and with all the cribbage knowledge I gained from my father, I was sure I could win

the tournament. When I showed up, I was welcomed by tournament director Jack Monroe, who made it a point to check on me throughout the day and see if there were any questions he could answer. I was nervous and really appreciated the effort Jack made. Most of my opponents were friendly folks, and I thoroughly enjoyed the day. I'm extremely thankful that I had a positive experience, because it's kept me coming back.

In 1999 I started playing more cribbage; my children had moved out of the house, and I had retired. I would watch high-ranking players, especially Jesse Jarrell, who was national champion that year. I've learned my cribbage strategy from reading books and/or articles by DeLynn Colvert, John Chambers, Dan Barlow, and George "Ras" Rasmussen. Playing cribbage against Hal Mueller's cribbage program and all the other cribbage players in the ACC has also been helpful.

I play Grass Roots at Century Peggers Club 100 (Napa CA). I have been club champion three times, including Division 1 national champion in the 2001–2002 season.

My first tournament win was in August 2000 at John Ryan's Shut Up and Deal in Castro Valley. I now have 47 tournament wins (26 mains, 21 consolations).

My favorite tournament is the JPW/ACC Open in Reno. I always enjoy seeing play-

ers from all over the United States and Canada. I was lucky to win that tournament in 2004.

Noncribbage interests include going to the beach with my wife, Becky, watching grandsons Avery and Carson play baseball, and watching granddaughter Ashley perform in plays and musicals.

## Ruling Points . . .

We see many instances where ethics and sportsmanship are an important part of fair play and keeping games going smoothly. Here's a recent game that was distressing to watch. The offending player had 2-3-6-6-6 and counted it as 14; the nonoffender said nothing and counted their hand and crib. That left both players exactly four points from going out. The offender pegged out on the next deal, but would not have won the game if they had been correctly sitting at six points out. Watching this was not easy to do



and stay quiet; had either player said anything about wanting to know the count, then judges could step in. The error was innocent, just a miscount, but it had a real effect on the game. Staying alert and taking a good look at the opponent's hands help solve problems like this, but do not overexamine each play and hand, thereby making games drag on too long.

You are the nondealer trailing 45-25. You are dealt 2-3-10-10-J-J. What should you discard?

While I don't play positional cribbage this early on, I realize this hand could make or break the game. It is natural to panic when you are trailing by 20, but my goal is to keep myself alive as long as possible, so I discard the pair of 10s.

If you hold 10-10-J-J, eight cards (four 9s and four Qs) potentially give you a cut for sixteen and a quick way back into the game, but fourteen cards (four Aces, three Deuces, three 3s, and four 4s) will most likely leave you hopelessly behind if you go for the big cut. Play to keep yourself in the game until the cards swing to your favor.

## **Youth Rating Points**

At the February 11 meeting in Reno, the Board of Directors approved a proposal to allow youth tournaments to be sanctioned by the ACC.

BOD member Valerie Sumner (Sparks NV) first suggested this idea. Dan Zeisler (Grass Valley CA), the codirector of ACC youth cribbage, ran with it and created a draft proposal that was presented to the board in 2015. At that time, it was agreed that the concept was good, but the plan needed work to address some shortcomings. Youth program codirector Don "Grumpy" Howard (Orangevale CA) volunteered to rewrite the proposal. Thanks to his efforts and to Rick Allen (Richmond VA), who offered his services as statistician, we now have an official program.

Youths aged 5 through 18 and registered as ACC members will be eligible to receive youth rating points (YRPs) at sanctioned youth tournaments. YRPs will be transferable when the youth became adult players. There is no youth membership fee, but current youth members must submit a youth membership application

form before June 15, 2016.

As with regular annual memberships, youth members will be sent renewal notices and must renew each year (no cost) to remain current. At age 19, youth memberships will automatically be converted to regular annual memberships (with regular fees), and YRPs (to a maximum of 200 points) will be converted to MRPs.

The youth member application is available on the ACC website at cribbage.org/membership and also on page 21 below.

To view the proposal in its entirety, go to cribbage.org, click on "Youth Program" in the left column, and then click on "Youth Master Point Program" in the right column.

The 23rd annual Sierra Youth Cribbage Tournament, which took place on February 20 in Grass Valley CA, was the first event that used the YRP system. For results and YRPs awarded, see the report in the April *Cribbage World*, page 16.

## **Verneda Thomas**



## **Cribbage in the Counties**

## Cribbage Stories from around the ACC

I'm on a mission to play cribbage in the thirty-nine ancient counties of England by my thirty-ninth birthday, on June 10, 2016. I'm due to play in the final county on St. George's Day—April 23rd.

During my tour, I've played at a prison and a castle, in pubs, con clubs, lib clubs, serviceman's clubs, a canal barge, an Indian restaurant, and even a cribbage guesthouse in Cornwall. In asking people if I could visit them for a game, one of the most common answers was, "When you say cribbage, what type do you mean?" There's singles, doubles, five-card crib, and six-card crib; some games involve throwing one card to the box, and some games involve two cards to the box. Some people play to 61 holes, some to 121 holes, and there is even one city with a tradition of playing to 91 holes. Twice my opponents insisted that we must peg out exactly. Crib action in the United Kingdom exhibits some amount of diversity.

So, too, do notions of what a county is. Everyone on both sides of the Atlantic knows how many states are in the United States, but do you know how many counties there are in England? It depends how you define a county. There are county boroughs, postal counties, shires, ancient counties, historic counties and traditional counties. The differences boil down to historical shifts in the boundaries of

governance. For my challenge I used the ancient counties because, as the Association of British Counties asserts, "these are rooted in history, public understanding, and commonly held notions of community and identity."

Doing this tour allows me to make a survey of the state of the game in the nation. I've played in Reno NV and at Grass Roots clubs in California. I know what the ACC has achieved, so I'm interested to see how the game compares in the UK. Cribbage does not exist as a unified entity in the place of its birth. There is no national association. There are no real national tournaments to speak of. Even regional tournaments tend to cater to players in a specific club. There's some fantastic cribbage action happening in the UK in isolated pockets, but we aren't communicating with each other much, if at all. I'm determined to go and speak to as many players in as many clubs and leagues up and down the land as I can, and find out what is going on.
