rand Nationals are designed to bring players together from across the continent to play cribbage and celebrate our accomplishments. By this measure, Grand National 35 was a grand success indeed. Nearly 250 players showed up the first week of October in North Bethesda MD to play cribbage, meet old friends, and tour historical sites in and around our nation's capital.

Tournament director and delegator-in-chief Bruce Sattler (Nottingham MD) gathered a team of capable volunteers to direct thirteen separate events (four sanctioned, nine satellites). And when the last peg was put

in hole 121, there were *lots* of satisfied customers.

Life Master Fred White (Gloucester MA) was, of course, the most satisfied of everyone, as he pegged his way into exclusive company by winning the Grand National main, but there were many winners and near-winners during the six-day event.



The awards banquet on Saturday evening was splendid, with diners showing up bedecked in their red, white, and blue finery* and dozens of players receiving awards ranging from Bronze and Master all the way to All American. It was a pleasure to see Life Master (4*) Roland Hall (Napa CA) crowned national champion after many years of being so close. And it was a special honor to see Life Master Ronald Logan (Meridian ID) inducted as the thirty-fourth member of the Hall of Fame for his stellar play and meritorious service to the ACC.

The peripatetic Fred White qualified #53 (of 62 qualifiers) and beat these players on his way to the championship:

- #20 Life Master (3★) Doug Page (Oostburg WI)
- #61 Master Terry Cushman (Gray ME)

Fred made some brilliant plays throughout the playoffs, but of course the formula for winning a Grand National includes one uncontrollable element: getting good cards. Here is but one example: in game two of their semifinal match, David Aiken is dealing from 50 holes out, while Fred has first count from 28 holes out. Holding three 5s and the wrong Jack, Fred cuts the case 5 for a 28-hand and wins the game without having to peg a point!

Congratulations to all the Grand National winners, from A (June Fordham) to Z (Dean Bauman) and all those in between, especially Fred White and David Sniegowski. CW


GN Tidbits

Room 346 was the magic Marriott room number during Grand National. The singer of the national anthem at the start of the main (Marilyn Dyer), the main HQ (Cy Madrone), and the main winner (Fred White) were roommates in room 346.

Double Dutch (Deutsch?) Only two players double-dipped in the GN midweek tourney: Margaret Christensen-Deutsch and Ira Deutsch. Both halves of the husband-and-wife team from Smith River CA qualified in both halves of the midweek.

VA) had the worst day that any cribbage player can possibly imagine—he lost all twenty-two games in the GN midweek main! That's right, Paul turned in a decidedly imperfect 0/0 –394 scorecard. He averaged 17.9 points per loss, and only three of his losses were in the single digits (6, 2, 2). Paul, who joined the ACC in the late 1990s and has directed Cribbage Critters Club 89 in Springfield VA for four years, was a good sport about this streak of very *very* VERY bad luck.

In game seven, Life Master James Clark (Livermore CA) needed only five points to skunk Paul, held 3-3-6-J, cut the wrong 5, and didn't peg any—or Paul would have seen seven skunks in a row!



When you are the nondealer leading from a four-card run, remember to lead from the end of the run—not the middle. A 3 or 4 lead from 2-3-4-5 always seems to get you in a world of trouble. Leave yourself with options if your lead card gets paired—especially on fourth street when the dealer is likely to be extra aggressive. It is less harmful being paired than getting stuck in runs.

The following letter was published in the Panama City News Herald on April 19, 2016

"Cribbage as much nostalgia as it is a game"

Since I was a young boy, cribbage has been part of my upbringing. My father and grandfather played every Sunday while my mom and sisters prepared Sunday dinner. Being the youngest of seven, I didn't have many chores, which allowed me to sit and watch the cribbage games play out in our kitchen like a battle being fought on the frontlines.

A full-blown war would ensue when my grandfather would get a bad hand. He would throw his cards on the table and accuse my dad of "rigging the deck." My dad would always laugh and continue playing. Funny thing is, the games always came down to the wire; the winner rarely won by more than a few pegs.

As an adult, I was a member of the Emerald Coast Grass Roots Cribbage Club in Fort Walton Beach. Upon relocating to Panama City I realized they did not have a cribbage club. We will have a meet and greet-style game night. We will teach, learn, and play cribbage while we eat, laugh and become acquainted. Jimmy and Janice Bosch will provide heavy hors d'oeuvres and there is a cash bar on site. Hope to see you there.

BOD MeetingQuick Takes

- The BOD elected officers for the coming year. Three officers were reelected unopposed: Jeanne Hofbauer (Washougal WA) as ACC president; Todd Schaefer (Oakdale MN) as Executive VP; and David Campbell (Parsonsfield ME) as VP of Operations. Valerie Sumner (Sparks NV) and Keith Widener (Clemmons NC) ran for the position of VP of Policy, and Valerie was elected 12–11. Terry Weber (Madison WI) and Jeff Shimp (Grand Haven MI) ran for the Member-at-Large position, and Terry was reelected 12–11.
- Grand National 38 in 2019 was awarded to Orlando FL, to be directed by Paul & Joy Barnes.
- Two votes were taken on the TOC. First, a motion to remove muggins from the TOC was defeated (10–12). The TOC entry fee was reduced from \$100 to \$75 (passed 20–3).

New ACC Rulebook

by David Aiken

ACC rules undergo changes periodically, mainly due to new situations that arise during tournament and club play. In the first revision since 2010, a new rulebook was printed in September (the print run was 12,000), with first distribution taking place at Grand National in Maryland.

Here is a summary of the changes made to the 2016 rulebook:

- rule 2.1 (page 10): use of a mechanical card shuffler does not negate the mandate to mix the pack at least three times.
- rule 4.4.c Table of Actions (page 15): when the pone's hand or dealer's hand is discovered to have too many cards yet the other hand and the crib are correct, the deal is canceled, all pegging points are retracted, and the same dealer deals again. *Note:* see additional correction to this table on next page.
- rule 5.2.b (page 19): if one player looks at the crib before discarding to it, the nonoffending player gets to blindly select two cards from the offending player's hand, look at them and then place them in the crib as the offender's discard.
- rule 6.4 (page 21): after the starter card has been turned, the deck must be placed on the table on the dealer's side of the board.
- rule 7.1.e (page 21): formerly an un-

- playable card (i.e., one that causes the count to exceed 31) was simply picked up and any points were taken retracted without penalty; now this is considered an overpeg and the opponent gets any points pegged as a result.
- rule 7.3 (page 23): the commonsense dictum that you cannot call a renege when count is "21" or less is now included in the rulebook.
- rule 8.5.a (page 26): the rules committee clarified that "a peg is removed when it clears the top of the hole."
- rule 8.5.b (page 26): pegs accidentally dislodged due to a physical impairment are returned to their correct position and the score is not forfeited.
- rule 8.11 (page 28): players must peg out to claim the win (except match play).
- rule 10.3 (page 32): rule 10.3.e was removed.
- rule 10.4a (page 33): a sentence was added: "Muggins may not be pegged until both players agree."
- page 34–40: the material on these pages was rearranged to provide a more logical presentation, to bring similar topics together, and to clarify that the method of cross-checking of scorecards is a rule and not a guideline. *Note:* see additional correction to rule 12.2 on next page.

As first reported in the November 2015 *Cribbage World* (page 29) and featured in the February 2016 cover story, ACC dues were raised

Rulebook Revisions

Despite the care with which the Rules Committee prepared this revision, two adjustments to the rulebook are needed.

- Pen-and-ink correction: on page 15, change "1" in column B to "9." This occurs twice: in line 4 and line 10.
 See correction at right.
- Cut-and-paste correction: rule 12.2 on page 35 needs an additional paragraph, so replace it with the page to the right. Cut on the dotted line and tape or glue the new page over the existing page 35.

- d. If both cards record a win or if both cards record a loss, with one having points in the plus column and the other having points in the minus column, the one in the plus column gets the win.
- e. If both cards record a win or if both cards record a loss, with the spread points in the same column, it is a loss for both players, and the spread points are moved to the negative column (if necessary).
- f. If only one card records a win but both cards put the spread points in the same column (whether win or loss), the win stands and the spread points on the incorrect card are changed to the appropriate column.
- g. Make sure that game-point and spread-point totals are adjusted, if necessary.
- h. "No harm, no foul": if an apparent qualifier's discrepancy is already to his or her disadvantage, no change is necessary. For example, qualifier D claims a 15-point win; opponent claims a 20point loss; no change is necessary, and both cards stand as recorded.
- If scorecard errors result in a change in the fact or position of qualifying, the tournament director informs the affected player, with the relevant scorecards as evidence.

Rule 13. Playoffs

13.1. Forfeitures during Playoffs

If a qualifier does not appear at the time scheduled to begin the playoffs, the tournament director will allow five minutes before forfeiting the first game to the opponent. Additional forfeitures will be made every fifteen minutes until a match is completed or until a qualifier appears. In any case, nonappearing qualifiers are still entitled to receive prize money and MRPs that would have been awarded to the losers in that round.

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- 1.Nominations must be submitted by mail or email (maximum of one side of a letter-size page) to the address below. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member, and the nomination page must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in the Grass Roots program.
 - d. served as a tournament director of

- an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the Board of Directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by December 10.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and mail copies of each



letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. If no one receives 75%, then the one person (or persons, if a tie) who receives as least 65% of the votes will be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National tournament.


Cribbage Board of the Month

Over the years I have had a lot of questions from fellow ACC members about my cribbage board collection. Here are some answers: My collection started in 1981 when I inherited my father's board.

fold out pages that hold six photos per side. So, 120 photos per ten pages. The album expands to hold more pages, so all my photos are in one album.

I use Microsoft Word to document



Boards were added slowly over the next twenty years. After becoming a member of the ACC and discovering the Cribbage Board Collectors Society (CBCS), I started collecting more seriously. My collection is up to 440 boards. Of those, I have donated or given away 63 boards. The value of the collection is between \$20,000 and \$25,000. That of course is in a world where everyone can never have too many cribbage boards.

I know some ACC members are also collectors, so I will go over the mechanics of how I track my collection. Some of this could apply to other collections too.

My boards are numbered 1–440 with a sticker as they are added to the collection. I photograph each board and number the photo. I use an album from Pioneer Photo Albums Inc. (#JPF-46). This album has

each board. I include the board's number, manufacturer (if known), model number, whether box and instructions are included, what material the board is made of, and the size of the board.


On another Word file, I track board manufacturers alphabetically with corresponding board numbers. In addition, the following types of boards are also tracked: horn and antler, leather, ivory, souvenir, English inlays, CBCS Convention boards, and those from unknown manufacturers.

About eighty boards in my collection are on display in my den/office/bar/TV

room. The other boards are in plastic totes in our storeroom, and I track which boards are in which box. Because of the tracking system,

I can find any board in my collection within a few minutes.

Tracking is a little work, but it sure makes your collection more fun. One piece of advice: don't procrastinate.

Here's
an interesting thought
that Life Master (2*) Elmer "Ras"
Rasmussen (Chehalis WA) posted on Cribbage Hand of the Day (dailycribbagehand.org):
"For those who have feelings about what will be cut, rest
assured I have none. Once I got past that and began playing the numbers, some cribbage success came my way.
Cribbage is a game of numbers. Admittedly if you play by
feelings, you don't need to study the numerical patterns,
don't need to memorize discard averages, don't need
to bother with all that positional theory, and don't
need to develop a pegging strategy. Just
do what feels right. What a way
to fly!"

Double Clubs

Recruiting is only half of membership. Retention is the other half. No matter what you do, some are going to decide that cribbage is not exciting enough to stay around. But what about the new player who likes cribbage but is overwhelmed by the speed of play, rules, and so on? Most clubs face that problem. Some clubs do better than others at managing the problem.

Some Grass Roots clubs that play nine

games are adding six-game clubs (aka Grass Roots Lite). At these clubs, you will see two groups playing—a nine-game group and a six-game group. This option provides a path for new players, slow players, and others who that are not ready for nine games. It also provides an answer for the experienced players concerned about keeping things moving and on time.

New ACC rulebooks are now available. The specific changes are detailed on pages 19–21 above, and we will deal with some of them in the coming months. A note to judges: thoroughly read and work on the new rules, as there are some significant changes. For example, the rules about incorrect number of cards dealt are different and are much more forgiving. Pay especial attention to two additional corrections listed on page 20 above that you will have to fix in your copy of the rulebook.



We have not had any questions sent to us lately, and we love hearing the quirky and sometimes difficult rulings judges run up against. Our purpose here is to make the game go smoothly, inform new players, and clarify sticky situations.

Teaching Tip

New cribbage players work so hard to identify 15s, runs, and flushes, and oftentimes they neglect to see the right Jack in their hand. To help with this, I incorporate the following rule: students who successfully identify nobs raise their hands and receive a raffle ticket. (Make sure they raise their hand after taking their points rather than when they first see it in their hand.) After the kids have played three or four games with the raffle ticket incentive, I pick a couple of names and award a cribbage board or a set of custom pegs to the winners. If you try this, you will be pleasantly surprised that nobs is now rarely missed.

before Grand National 36.


