Picking up points in these two events are obviously a huge key in winning those club championships!

Jerry Rice (Upson WI; Club 390) and Barbara Chaplik (Grand Junction CO; Club 224) scored 29-hands—worth \$100 cash and a lifetime of bragging rights. In addition, there were twenty-seven 28-hands (worth \$25 each) and seven grand slams (\$25).

It is always fun to find interesting things that happen in a tournament. Here are a few GRNT tidbits:

- Walter Howell (Newport OR; Club 127) played unofficially and put up 36/16 +272, which would have been enough to unseat Dennis. Excellent card, Walter, but sorry for your timing.
- Duane Sink (Saint Joseph MI; Club 107) posted a fine 32 card that put him into fourth place overall. Both of his losses on the day were from Tim Smith (Benton Harbor MI), who ruined Duane's grand slam *twice*—in both halves of the GRNT!
- Joe Imholte (Saint Cloud MN; Club 94) picked up an 18-point grand slam in the second half of the GRNT, however he could muster only two wins in the front half to grind into a 22 card. Don't feel too bad, as Joe collected the \$25 bonus for his grand slam.

In total, I received submissions from 110 GRNT sites. I received 109 of them before May 10. Ninety-seven clubs entered their data online, so I only had to review their information and not key their data. It is imperative that as many clubs as possible complete this task online. The more eyes on the review that we get the better!

Players from 175 different Grass Roots club participated, and checks were mailed on June 9 to 141 clubs plus 24 members of Travelers Club 600.


The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros ••••••••







It never hurts to put more thoughts in your opponent's mind. You are nondealer leading from 2-3-3-Q; you lead the 3, and dealer plays a King. Instead of immediately playing your 2 for 15, wait a couple seconds and act like you have a decision to make. The dealer could be tricked into thinking you have a King, thus explaining your hesitation in playing your card. Once they have that thought in their head, they will plot their hand accordingly to potentially trap your imaginary King. Thus the hand could play out like this:



Put your opponent in a position to overthink, and you will often benefit.

Billy, who was really steamed after cutting nobs 120 times, pulled out his six-shooter and fired six shots.


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Years Ago in the ACC

Overwhelming Self-Interest

I have waited a few days to ensure that some of the emotion concerning a certain game recently played at the Las Vegas tournament would dissipate. The incident in question occurred as follows.

In the main, late in the afternoon I played a well-known southwestern judge, and we were down to the last hand on fourth street. I was dealing from four holes out, and my opponent was eleven holes out. I am not trying to sound whiny but the background information was that I had been fighting a pinched nerve in my back all weekend, and, while not pertinent, this was my first away-from-home tournament since my wife had recently passed away. To add further drama, I had just eaten lunch with this individual and several other mutual acquaintances, and a good time had been had by all.

After the pegging, my opponent counted her eight-point hand, and I showed my hand of twenty point. Here is where the question arises. She immediately engaged me in earnest conversation, bemoaning her loss as I started to enter the scorecard information. I accept the fact that I was not on my A-game. But while distracted, and not having my guard up, I threw my hand down on the deck. Immediately the opponent's hand shot up with a loud cry for a judge. Three judges were on the scene quickly and conversed at great length, but they had no choice but to follow the rulebook.

How does this action conform to Jeanne Hofbauer's many earnest pleas for all players to be nice and try very hard not to drive players away from cribbage? My whole point in writing this letter is to ask if the peg-out rule is a victim of unintended consequences? I know this is not how I would treat a fellow player.

As a judge myself, I know the rules, but I did not see this coming. I am interested in the collective opinion on this, and I assure all that I will always peg out.

Editor's note: I was called in as the third judge on this situation in Vegas. Even though all three judges knew that this was what the ever-blunt Martha Fingleton refreshingly labeled a "chicken-sh*t call," at the time the judges felt (and I concurred) that we could do nothing other than rule that the game continue. In hindsight, and after consulting with two senior judges, here is how I would rule. First of all, the opponent did not tell John to peg out as rule 8.11 requires: "If the player does not peg out, the opponent must remind him/her to do so." Since the opponent did not remind John to peg out, we should have ruled (a) that she was in violation of the rules and (b) that John could therefore count his hand. In addition, by calling for a judge in this situation, John's opponent exhibited "overwhelming self-interest"—a clearly violation of the ACC's code of ethics that does not "display true sportsmanship and respect for others" that the rulebook—to say nothing of common courtesy—calls for.

THE HISTORY OF CANADIAN TEN-CARD DOUBLES CRIBBAGE

Playing cribbage is common at workplaces all over North America, and for the BC Transit bus drivers working out of the bus depot in Surrey, British Columbia, in the mid-1970s, cribbage was their favourite pastime. As bus drivers, they often worked long days with various shifts.

Sometime in 1976 four drivers—Kevin Carroll, Stan Churchill, Roy Fonseca, and Don McArthur—experimented with a variation of doubles play where the dealer and the player in front of the dealer were each dealt ten cards. They then selected four-card hands for themselves and their partners before discarding to the crib.

No one seems to remember the specific reason for this experiment, but they enjoyed the play and soon introduced it to their fellow drivers. The higher hand counts allowed them to get in more games during breaks, and everyone at the depot began play "ten-card crib."

Several drivers frequented a nearby social house called the California Club,

which already had an established group that played doubles on a weekly basis. Bartender Eddie Hustins noticed a group of bus drivers playing the ten-card game one



evening and mentioned it to the weekly club organizer, Margaret "Angel" Thorpe. By 1997 a new club was established ap-



plying the ten-card variation of the game.

The ten-card game grew in popularity, and tournament attendance continually increased. The group needed a larger facility to accommodate more players, and in 1999 Angel and Val Howard approached Keith Donnelly, the president of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 6, and asked permission to play at the legion on Wednesday evenings. Donnelly's response was, "The more the merrier," so they began play with about forty players at their first tournament. By the end of their first season, attendance tripled to one hundred twenty players for the final tournament.

Play has continued at what locals refer to as the "Cloverdale Legion" ever since. Today attendance is constantly a hundred players or more each week. In addition, a group meets on Monday evenings at Royal Canadian Legion Branch 8 in White Rock BC, and weekly tournaments on Friday afternoons alternate between four Senior Recreation Centres in Surrey. These tournaments routinely draw an average of a hundred players per session.

The four originators of the game continued play at the bus depot until they gradually retired. Two of them, Kevin Carroll and Stan Churchill, are still regular attendees at the weekly tournaments. Kevin also introduced the game at pubs in the United Kingdom during a vacation a few years ago.

Margaret Thorpe retired from managing the Cloverdale Club in 2009 and is now 89 years old. She now resides, with her husband Leslie, in an assisted living facility in Surrey. CW

Wayne and Egon are members of an ACC cribbage club, Cloverdale #340, in Surrey, British Columbia, Canada.

Ruling Points . . .

A friend called late one night to ask about a ruling. Player A played an Ace for 29, and Player B said "go." Player A took the go, then almost immediately noticed they had another Ace and said, "Oh, I have to play this," and played it and pegged a total of three points. Judges on the scene called it a renege and did all the corrections for the renege call. This may seem like it was not a renege because the second sentence of the renege rule says "a player may correct a 'go' call before either player plays a card or before the opponent pegs a point." According to a brief survey of the Rules



Committee and senior judges, the "correction period" window closes once that player takes *any* action. The rule is being currently reworked to include this specific aspect.

Crib-Derby Co. patented an oval 121-point three-player board.



His sale was almost complete and while following up on his computer, he happened to check his "Junk Mail" folder. There he found a much better offer for the website.

An interesting point in closing: Mike neither smokes nor plays cribbage! CW



Youth Teaching Tip

It's time to approach school teachers and principals to see if they would welcome volunteers into classrooms to teach cribbage to students in grades 4-12. When making your presentation, here are three important areas to focus on:

- Math/critical thinking skills—cribbage helps students count single and double digit numbers quickly in their heads. After a few weeks of play, they stop counting with their fingers. It also teaches kids to recognize number patterns and calculate odds.
- Interactive social skills—unlike most of today's video games, cribbage requires social interaction where friendships are built and good sportsmanship is developed. Cribbage also bridges the gap between generations as new young players can now challenge their parents and grandparents, or teach them cribbage if they don't know how to play.
- Teaching manual—my teaching manual outlines a five-day lesson plan along with handouts and quizzes, and it will give you credibility. Teachers and principals want to be assured that anyone presenting lessons to students are well prepared and have a structured plan for implementation. You can obtain a manual by request at danthefan@

By making these key points to educators, it will be difficult for educators to find reasons why cribbage would not greatly enhance their extracurricular offerings at their schools.

But even if you can't go to Grand National, there are plenty of great places to attend a tournament. One of my favorites was Edmonton, Alberta (what a

mall they have!). Roy really loved Alaska (fishing, friends, and scenery). We also enjoyed New Hampshire (beautiful fall color), Washington (my home state, so of course, a favorite), Montana (scenery), Oregon and Idaho (good friends). And if you love to eat good food, we ate the best fried chicken ever in Arizona, razor clams in Washington, Dungeness crab in Oregon, pasties in Upper Michigan, key lime ice cream bars in Florida, crab cakes in Maryland, and lobster in Maine and Massachusetts.

And then there are the sights: Mount Rushmore and Crazy Horse in South Dakota; Stone Mountain in Georgia; Grand Canyon and ancient Native American dwellings in Arizona; Redwoods and Lake Tahoe in California; bright lights of Reno and Las Vegas; Atlantic Ocean from Virginia, Massachusetts, Maine, and Florida; Pacific Ocean from California, Oregon, Washington, and Alaska; Great Lakes by Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan; Niagara Falls, Milwaukee, Chicago, Orlando, Atlanta, Raleigh, Boston, Washington DC—and so much more.

I could go on and on, and the editor probably thinks that I have! So I encourage you to get out if you can, as there is so much to see and do. And if you can squeeze in an ACC

cribbage tournament while you are out there, so much the better!
