#### **BOD ELECTION RESULTS**

he results of the 2017 election for the ACC's Board of Directors were announced on June 13 by ACC President Jeanne Hofbauer. Following a challenge by one of the nonelected candidates, which was reviewed and resolved by the Executive Committee, the results were certified on June 21 by Election Supervisor Megan Player and the ACC's Vice President of Policy Valerie Sumner.

This year 994 valid ballots were submitted, representing 16% of the eligible voting membership (6,196). This percentage represents an up-tick in voter participation from both 2015 (13.2% of eligible voters) and 2013 (15%). (See page 4 for more details about voting trends.)

Continuing a pattern that has held since 1997, the Western Region once again captured ten of the twenty-five available slots on the BOD. The Central Region seated nine candidates (up one from the 2015 election), with the Eastern Region filling out the remaining six seats (down one from 2015).

Eighteen current BOD members were reelected, but with the retirement of six current members and the non-election of one sitting member, the 2017–19 BOD will have seven new members—the largest turnover of BOD members in at least a dozen years. Six candidates are totally new to the BOD, while one (Fred White) previously served four terms on the BOD.

# My Deal by David Aiken



#### Play smart, play fair, play fast.

With the 2017 BOD election now behind us, it is time to look at voting trends. The ACC doesn't do exit polling, but here is what we do know about membership voting.

The most important number is the percentage of participating members. This year, one in six (16%) eligible ACC members voted in the BOD election. While this comes nowhere close to the atmospheric percentages of 1999 (32.3%) and 1989 (34.4%), we can take comfort in the fact that 16% is an improvement over each of the last two elections and the second highest participation rate in the last dozen years (see table below).

Second, this is the third time that electronic (online) voting has been available for the BOD election. In today's (pick one)

wired/electronic/online/linked/networked society, it seems odds that the percentage of ballots cast is not much higher since it is so much easier and faster and cheaper to vote online. It was encouraging to see that this year 54% of the votes were done online, so at least we are heading in the right direction.



#### True Odds of 29-hand?

It's been fifty-five years since I graduated as a math major from Southern Illinois University, but I believe Professor Steve Lumetta missed something is his calculations. I saw no reference to the opponent's hand. The hand being considered is only getting every other card. Hence his probabilities are incorrect. We also have to consider the probability that the opponent was dealt the missing 5, leaving no chance of getting a 29-hand. Perhaps the professor could recompute using two players to show the real odds of getting a 29-hand.

Albert Sullivan (Puyallup WA)

CW asked Professor Lumetta to respond to this letter. Here is what he had to say:

The opponent's cards are not relevant to the probability, although knowing the opponent's cards would change the probability.

To understand why, analyze a much simpler game with three cards—say J, Q, and K. One is dealt to the opponent, then a second card is dealt to the player. Is the chance of the player getting the K exactly 1/3?

The correct analysis is: yes, 1 out of 3 to

get the King. The opponent's card doesn't matter. This is the easy way.

If you enjoy pain, you can instead compute all combinations for the opponent as well. The answer won't change. For this game, let's write AB to mean that the opponent gets A and the player gets B. There are, of course, six possible outcomes, all equally likely. Specifically, they are JQ, JK, QJ, QK, KJ, and KQ. Note that the player gets the King in two of six cases.

You may also want to note that the opponent's estimate of the probability after the deal is different than the probability without knowledge of the opponent's card, which is perhaps why the letter writer was concerned. If the opponent has the K, the player does not (i.e., no chance). If the opponent does not have the K, the player's chance rises to 50% in this simple game.

If you really enjoy pain, you can calculate all combinations of twelve cards. I don't enjoy pain that much, and will stick with the easier approach described here.

# The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros ••••••••







Playing at a fast pace—not lightning quick like the great Erik Locke—but a reasonably quick rate of play can be a decided advantage in cribbage. If you know what you are going to do before you even see the cut card, whether you will peg offensively or defensively, then you know what card you will lead—and how to counter your opponent's first play. You can then play your first card as soon as the cut card is revealed, thus putting your opponent into thinking mode immediately—even before they have processed how the cut has affected the game. Most players don't want to be accused of slow play, so they will naturally try to keep up with your pace, even if they haven't fully analyzed all the possibilities of your first play. In all sports or activities the advantage goes to the player who takes time away from his opponents. Realizing this and putting it into motion will improve your chances of playing winning cribbage.

The new BOD term runs from September 1, 2017, until August 31, 2019, and their first item of business will be the annual meeting held on September 8 in conjunction with Grand National 36 in Lincoln City OR. At that meeting the BOD will elect the five ACC officers from among the directors: president, executive vice president, vice president of policy, vice president of operations, and executive member at large. All ACC members are invited to attend this meeting, not only to meet the new BOD members but to see how the ACC operates.

That four of the new BOD members are women speaks well for the forward-looking nature of our organization—and all four were successful in their first run for BOD election (as was Mark Soule). With nineteen men and six women, this election redresses the imbalance of the 2015 election when only three women were elected and more closely matches the gender makeup of the organization overall. (Now the ACC needs to increase its female membership from 27% to match that of the general population, which for those of you bad at math is approximately 50%.)

In addition, newcomer Audrey Hatto represents the first ever BOD member

#### RECRUITMENT TIP OF THE MONTH

I play cribbage regularly at a local bar in my city. It isn't a Grass Roots club—it's a weekly bar tournament with its own format and traditions. In the last year, the group transformed itself from stagnant to now more than doubling its size.

How did they do this? Marketing. The organizer created a Facebook group, and someone in the group publishes who won each week's tournament. The conversation (often joshing) back and forth has created a sense of community. And by posting a reminder that the club is meeting that evening, it keeps the club top of mind for the more casual players.

The group organizer also spent a small amount of money on Facebook ads in the beginning, to reach potential new players. An investment as small as \$20 can reach dozens of players in your area who are interested in card games.

Finally, it's about creating a friendly, fun environment that people want to return to. We all go out of our way to embrace new players. I have never seen a new player sit by themselves while waiting for the tournament to start. During play, people take the time to point out if they've missed points, and they are not stringent about rules with the new players. At the end of the evening, we invite them to join the Facebook community.

How many of our ACC members and clubs do this? At the bar, none of us mind it, because we benefit in the end—more people means more competition and more fun.

As for the ACC, we benefit too. The ACC has gained four new members in the last year from this unofficial club.




#### Cribbage Board of the Month

Terry is the CBCS's "go-to person" to determine what some mystery are boards made of. She spent over




twenty years as a DNA scientist for the Oregon State Police. That certainly qualifies her in solving some of our CBCS members' mysteries.


storage. This cool game chest is only 1½" long!



#### Youth Teaching Tip

During your first few cribbage lessons with kids, stop often and ask if they understand the concept of whatever it is that you are teaching. If they say no, review it. If they say yes, the only way to know if they really understand is to ask them to repeat back the concept you want them to grasp. This way, you'll be sure to know the appropriate time to move forward to the next objective you wish to teach. The last thing you want to do is move to a new part of the game before there is a true comprehension of what was just taught. Overwhelming a child by moving through the curriculum too quickly can really hamper the teaching process.


