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President's Column



Here is the statement that the ACC issued on March 14 about Covid-19

The Executive Committee (David Campbell, James Morrow, Keith Widener, Terry Weber, David Aiken) of the American Cribbage Congress recommends to all our players that the safest personal decision for all of our players is to stay away from tournaments and Grass Roots gatherings until the virus has passed. The ACC lengthened the Grass Roots season by one month (to June 30 for club play and to May 31 for GRNT) in order to allow everyone across the country additional time to complete this season.

Regarding weekend tournaments, all three commissioners (David Campbell, Richard Shea, Patrick Barrett) recommend the same: that players avoid large gatherings in the near future. The commissioners and the Executive Committee have limited powers when it comes to canceling sanctioned tournaments. In many cases in the near future, federal and state government will likely make the decision for many of these tournaments. It is our opinion (based on the ACC's Policy Manual) that the ACC has the power to cancel only one tournament and that is the ACC Open, because it is an ACC event run by the ACC. If Reno was next week, we undoubtedly would have canceled it due to the severity of the situation in the world currently.

This is a very trying time for us all, and it is our hope that our 6,000+ members across the country all are lucky enough to not contract this horrible virus.

Paul Gregson (Brentwood CA) resigned from the Board of Directors on March 14. Per ACC policy, the next highest vote-getter in the most recent election takes his place on the BOD. This is an unusual year in which only twenty-six people ran for the BOD and the only unsuccessful candidate has already been named to fill a previous vacancy. In lieu of explicit instruction in the ACC's Policy Manual, the Executive Committee appointed Cy Madrone (Santa Barbara CA) to the BOD, who was the highest unsuccessful votegetter in the 2017 BOD election not currently serving on the board, thus replacing Paul with another director from the same region and state.

Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

I've written four editorials this month.

Since I recently returned from Reno, exhausted and worn out (too many late nights!), I first composed an homage about my annual pilgrimage to the cribbage capital of the world.

And then, at the front end of news about the novel Coronavirus scare, I wrote an editorial about the danger of both over-reacting and underreacting to this basically unknown disease.

As Coronavirus morphed first into Covid-19 and then into a pandemic, and as the ACC's Executive Committee (on which I serve as VP of Competition) developed a public statement (see page 4), I wrote about our response to the disease and how best to continue playing cribbage under the few constraints then in place.

Which brings me, finally, to this—my fourth—editorial about playing cribbage during quarantine—a quarantine of unknown length and indeterminate severity.

As of mid-March my cribbage club in Grand Rapids is canceled (we play in an American Legion, which along with all bars and restaurants in the state was shut down by the State of Michigan); our GRNT is postponed (our hosts were rightly concerned about several dozen players bringing germs into their house); and all cribbage tournaments in my immediate vicinity (and now nationwide) are canceled or delayed for months.

Despite these strictures, I'm not about to give up playing the world's best card game, so here are some tips to help us all in the coming weeks and months:

- First and foremost: don't do anything stupid (read: don't get yourself killed).
- Play with (or teach) members of your household who are isolated with you.
- Play online. Go to cribbage.org/inter net for help getting started.
- (Re)read DeLynn's *Play Winning Cribbage*.
- Join Daily Cribbage Hand (daily cribbagehand.org) and learn how to play difficult hands.
- Watch Ras's videos on cribbage strategy (go to youtube.com and type "ras cribbage" in the search box).

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





Sometimes in cribbage we have to do the most with the least amount to work with. For example, you are dealer to start the game, and you deal yourself the scintillating A-2-6-7 with Q-K to your crib. The cut is a King, and the pone leads a King. How do you proceed? Well, you could whine but let's skip that option.

It certainly looks like you are going to peg one and have a 2-hand/2-crib, but can you do better in the pegging? With the King lead, I'm surmising the pone has one of these combos: four pictures, three pictures and a 5, or two pictures and two 5s. None of these are exactly thrilling for our game outlook, but it gives us a chance to plot a pegging hand to improve upon the 1–1 pegging outcome that usually results from these particular holds.

If you play an Ace on the King lead, instead of the usual 6 or 7 response, you will get immediate information on the pone's hand. If she responds with a picture for 21, the pegging will result in a 1–1 outcome and it's likely she has a 16-point hand.

If she responds with a 5, it's likely she has a big hand, but now you can gain a few extra points in the pegging. Play the 6 to make it 22 (obviously the pone doesn't have a 4 or she would have made it 15), so if dealer has another 5 you will outpeg her 2–0. If she has all pictures remaining you get the three-card run of 5-6-7 and the go, so you outpeg her 4–1. She still has a big hand to our 2-2 but at least you have cut into the lead by two or three points with this play.

Remember every little point helps—especially when you start out with a 2-2! When was the last time Rob had a 2-2? You can contact him at mrob2199@aol.com.

- Practice safe pegging: wash frequently, sanitize (or discard) shared playing equipment (pegs, boards, pens, cards), stay home if you are sick—you know, all the stuff your mother taught you.
- Above all: follow the law. If your state
 or municipality has banned gatherings
 of ten or more people or has put a moratorium on travel, by all means do what
 you are asked/required to do—if not
 for your sake, then for the sake of those

most at risk, which by the way comprise a large percentage of ACC members.

We—our organization, the country, the world—will survive this. But we just have to be smart in the meantime. While cribbage may be curtailed for the foreseeable future, there will come a time when we sit across the board from each other and thank our lucky stars that we can once again play the world's greatest card game.



and Jeff Raynes. A member of the tough Raleigh Club 58 (three Golds, seven Silvers, numerous Bronzes—competition that keeps him humble, he says), Fran has been club champion once. Fran's first tournament win was the 2003 Virginia Championships, and he's now won five tourneys. His first and still favorite tourney is the National

Open Cribbage Tournament in Raleigh. His favorite cribbage moment this year was qualifying ninth in the Reno consy. Fran has been very lucky when it comes to big hands. In 1985 he held the first ever 29-hand in North Carolina tournament play in Southern Pines. All told, he's held four 29s and fifteen 28s in Grass Roots and tournament play. The highlight was a single game in Grass Roots in 2015 when he had a 28-hand followed two deals later by

a 29-hand—against his original teacher Dave Lambeth! Fran says that "I know 'real' players are more interested in the skill-related numbers, but I must admit, I'm a great fan of luck too!" Non-cribbage interests include reading, walking, and traveling.

Cribbage Covid-19 Love in the Time of Cholera

In her April 2016 column, former ACC President Jeanne Hofbauer addressed the importance of staying home from club and tourneys when you are sick. Given the current concern about health and infection in America, now seems to be an appropriate time to review what Jeanne wrote four years ago.

There are some issues that I really don't want to talk about, but several people have asked me to address a couple of them so often, that I guess I will give it a try.

The first is people coming to a tournament when they are sick with something contagious. Sharing is a good thing, but that should not include germs! It is so easy to pass along colds and other infections because we normally play in close proximity to one another. Plus we handle cards and pegs that have passed through many hands. So if you are sneezing, coughing, or know that you are sick, pass up on going to a tournament. It will probably do you more good to stay home and rest anyway. And even if you don't get any thanks for doing it, it is the right thing to do. [snip]

In case you're wondering, the second issue that Jeanne addressed was personal hygiene—another important lesson to review. Read her entire column at cribbage.org/CribWorld.

On a related note, the ACC shares with likeminded organizations a concern about Covid-19. The (inter)national governing bodies for organized backgammon, bridge, and scrabble have all issued warnings about playing their game or notices of clubs and tournaments being canceled. Our four games—cribbage, bridge, backgammon, and scrabble—share many similarities:

- close personal interaction among players
- use of shared playing equipment
- playing in confined spaces
- players more typically in high-risk populations

The ACC's Executive Committee and the BOD will continue to monitor this situation and make sure that our response remains positive, in tune with local situations, and in compliance with governmental regulations.

From all indications there are three, maybe four, cribbage leagues in the country. That is quite surprising, especially to those who engage in league play. They know it to be real exciting more often than not.

There are a few ol die-hards who honestly believe many more cribbage leagues would spring up if we were to mention here how the different leagues are set-up. So here goes with our first short shot.

A team consists of two players. The schedule calls for each team to play two matches per evening. A match consists of five games where each player on a team playe sach player of the opposing team one game. The final game of the match is a doubles contest.

The winners of each match (three out of five) gains only one point in the wins column of the standings.

The league is split into two divisions with a play-off system leading to the big Super Bowl finale. At the end of the season, the player who has can the most individual games is then crowned "king" or "queen" of the league.

The cover of the March 1995 *Crib-bage World* announced the results of the 492-player MGM in Green Bay WI. A record 624 peggers played doubles on Friday night!

Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

ost ACC members have special cribbage boards. They may be the board you first learned to play on, your first trophy board, or a first-place trophy board from a special tournament. In past columns I have suggested using a Sharpie pen to document the history and dates on the underside of these boards. Hopefully, you can pass your boards on to members of your family or friends who will appreciate and preserve them.

The three boards I feature this month are all "family history" boards. I hope my nieces and nephews will want them. In fact, a cribbage tournament would be appropriate to see



who gets first choice. Here are the boards' stories.

Board 1—this board belonged to my wife's grandfather. ↑ He emigrated from Norway in 1906 and homesteaded near Lewistown MT. He played on handcrafted boards until he could afford to buy this Horn/McCrillis no. C-235. He bought it in the mid-1920s, and it still has its original pegs.



Board 2—this board was purchased in 1938 by my father when he moved from South Dakota to attend UCLA. It is a Horn/McCrillis no. C-5. This board also has original pegs. It also has a

brass peg storage cover. All Horn boards switched to wood slide covers when the brass was needed for the WWII war effort. My father taught me to play cribbage on this board in 1952.

Board 3—this board is a Kingsbridge #1016. → My father bought it for me when I left home to attend the University of Washington. He wanted me to have a three-player board so



he could play with my roommate and me when he visited.

Since I am a cribbage board collector, I have many other special boards, but I hope these three special boards will stay in our family.



When the pegging was all over on Sunday afternoon, Bryan Gurden had added another win—his most impressive


to date—to his lifetime total of seventeen tourney wins.

Bad Beat As a reminder of how difficult it can be sometimes to win a game, here's one of the worst hard-luck stories CW has heard in a long time.


All is well. Life Master Gordy Wise



DELYNN COLVERT ALL STAR TOURNEY

The Central Region won a fiercely battled contest in Reno. The DeLynn Colvert All Star Tourney is held annually in Reno on the Thursday evening before the TOC. This prestigious tourney was started in 1991 by the grandest old man of this game—DeLynn Colvert—and was named in his honor last year.

Andy Stireman (Lake Ann MI) missed making the Central Region All Star team by a single MRP last season, but he jumped at the chance to fill in when one of the top eight players couldn't play. And good thing he did. He turned in the #1 scorecard (25/12 +101) and led the Central Region to victory, as they posted a combined score of 154 points versus 151 for the Western Region and 100 for the Eastern Region.

But the outcome was not decided un-

til the last play of virtually the last game still going in the room, which pitted **Troy Thorson** (Western Region) against **Don Flesch** (Central Region). Both players were in the dead hole, with Troy leading to Don. Both players escaped danger with their first card, but Don paired Troy's second card to win the game and clinch the championship. If victory in this game swings to Troy, then the Western Region would've have won 153–152 over the Central Region.

Jim Crawford (Western Region) took second place with 24/11 +104, with two Central Region players, **Don Flesch** and **Steve Steinmetz**, in third and fourth.

With this win, the Central Region extends their series lead to 13 wins versus 11 wins for the Eastern Region and 6 wins for the Western Region.

How to Win When Dealing from 59 Holes Out*

*or: How to go from thinking "I might skunk Jeff Raynes" to losing the game—in two easy steps!

At the Orlando doubleheader in early February, Life Master (*) Jeff Raynes (Cary NC) is the dealer in hole 62, and Life Master Terry Weber (Madison WI) is the pone in hole 87. With that kind of lead, the thought flits through Terry's mind that he just might skunk Jeff—his nemesis over the years—or certainly beat him. Terry holds J-J-Q-K, Jeff holds 6-6-6-9, the crib has A-A-A-2, the cut card is a 3, and here's how the pegging goes:

Terry	J		K (for 1)		Q			J (for 1)
Jeff		6		9		6	6 (for 4)	

The pegging goes 2–4 in Jeff's favor; Terry has an 8-hand; while Jeff has an 18-hand and a 15-crib. This leaves Jeff needing 22 points with first count. Terry deals 5-5-K-K to Jeff and 5-6-7-7 to himself. The cut card is a K, and the pegging goes this way:

Game, set, and match to Jeff.
