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

My Deal



Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

It was so great to be back in Reno last month, seeing friends, playing cribbage, eating at fine restaurants, gambling too much, staying up too late.

The last time I was there—in March 2020—we were just starting to hear about a newfangled infection called Coronavirus Disease 2019, now simply called Covid. On my way home two years ago, I saw only a handful of people wearing masks on the plane and in the airport.

I played at club on the Tuesday after returning from Reno in 2020, and then the world shut down. Clubs, tournaments, society shuttered their doors, and we all stayed inside.

Now, two years later, after too many false starts and those damned Greek alphabet variants, life has returned—not to normal, but to the new normal.

Like it or not, we are going to have to live with Covid for the foreseeable future. That might mean restrictions on travel and other personal freedoms. We might have to wear masks more often than we like. And we might need to use hand-sanitizer after each game (actually, that's a good idea *all* the time). But the good news is that we can play cribbage again!

DeLynn Colvert All Star Tournament

After a pandemic-induced hiatus in 2021, the DeLynn Colvert All Star Tourney returned on March 3 with composite teams pulled from the All Stars in each region over the past two years.

The Eastern and Western Regions battled hard for first place, but in the end the Eastern All Stars pulled out a narrow victory, scoring 144/69 to 140/65 for the Westerners; the Central Region finished far back in third place at 124/58.

Laurie Logan (ID) posted the best score (23/11 +112) of the event, followed by Troy Thorson (CO), Keith Widener (NC), and Al Karr (WI).

With this win, the Eastern Region cuts into the Central Region's lead in this competition; the current scores are Central 13, Eastern 11, and Western 6.

This prestigious event is held annually in Reno on the Thursday evening before the TOC. It was started in 1991 by the grandest old man of this game—DeLynn Colvert—and was named in his honor in 2019.

But don't stop there. Clubmates John Hazlett and Bill Stacey (both Grand Rapids MI) were one spread point apart in the TOC: John had 20/9 +94, and Bill had 20/9 +93. The cutoff was 20/9 +94, so John was low qualifier and Bill was high nonqualifier. As a consolation prize, Bill earned a check for \$100 from the Syl Lulinski family, which they pay to the high nonqualifier at each TOC. Now I must mention a good luck story: my friend Dick May, a member of the Kenosha Club who has added hundreds of logo golf balls to my collection, won the Reno main over Bruce Sattler (Nottingham MD).

Monster Cut In the Reno consy, Rick Baird (Bend OR) received firsthand experience of what Ginny can do when she gets hot. Ginny Danielski (Little Chute WI) was sitting 20 out and counting first. Rick generously dealt her quad 8s. Ginny proceeds to cut one of only four cards that would help. The 7 cut gives her a monster 20, sending Rick to pack his bags. Ginny continued on for a fifth place finish. Rick: unless you fly out to Wisconsin, you may never have to play Ginny again; she flew by herself and upon returning said never again.

Favorite Number Rumor has it that Steve Steinmetz (Caledonia WI) has a new favorite number and it is 5. At the Reno main he qualified fifth and he took fifth place. During his qualifying run he held three 5s and the Queen of Hearts and cut the Jack

of Hearts. He counted his hand as 21! You gotta love that Queen of Nobs.

What Would You Do? You are dealt A-A-A-2-3-8 and it's your crib. Forget position, how would you toss it? Not sure I would have done it how John Syftestad did, but he held A-A-A-8 and tossed 2-3 to his crib. When a 5 was cut he moved thirty holes, with ten peg points, a 12-hand, and an 8-crib. But what do I know, as proven by John's #2 qualification in the Reno TOC (but I sure hate the one and done!).

I had an interesting end-game scenario in Reno. I had first count needing two, and my opponent needed four. I was dealt A-2-4-5-6-Q What to discard?

In an ideal situation I would lead from a small pair or a small card matched to a 15, such as 3-9 or 4-7, but none of those combinations pop up here. The best I could come up with is 5-Q, and that presumes the dealer would not keep a Q unless forced to.

My objective here is to cover as many bases as possible to win on the dealer's first play, so I kept A-2-5-Q, meaning I would win on any dealer response A through 5.

Unfortunately the dealer played a 9 on my Q lead. I played a 5, hoping dealer had a 6 so my Ace would peg the 31. No such luck, as the dealer plays a 7 for 31.

Now we are both two out with two cards left. What to play? Because the dealer played a 9 on my opening lead instead of the 7, I surmised that 2-9 was their "magic eleven" combo, so I led my Ace. The dealer quickly laid down a 2, which I paired to win the game. The dealer then showed me another 2, so she had 2-2-7-9.

The lesson to be learned is this: in end-game pegging the best laid plans of mice and men quickly bow down to the whims of Lady Luck!

Anatomy of a Hand

Anatomy

Adam Switzer (Waconia MN)
experienced a devasting loss in the last game of the ACC Open consy finals. He had first count from five holes out, and his opponent, Danny Mitchell (Crescent City CA), was eight holes out. Adam was dealt 2-3-3-4-5-9 (no flush possibility). There are five ways to hold this hand to ensure he has enough points:

2-3-3-4 2-3-4-5 2-3-4-9 3-3-4-5 3-4-5-9

As it turned out, a perfect storm of cards deprived Adam of the win, but before we get to that, take a minute to decide what *you* would hold, and how *you* would play this hand.

{Play Jeopardy! theme here.}

Okay, made your decision? Then, let's see how the last hand played out. Adam held 2-3-4-9; the dreaded Jack was the starter card; and here's how the pegging went:

Adam	3		9 (for 2)		4		2 (for 1)
Danny		3 (for 2)		9 (for 2)		go	

Game, set, match to Danny, who pegged out from eight away to steal the championship from Adam. Without the Jack cut, Danny pegs only seven points and ends in the dead hole.

Because this was a game-changing, nay, a championship-changing, decision, *Cribbage World* asked some well-known peggers how they would hold this hand. But before we see how our experts—all of whom have some impressive #2 finishes

on their résumés—would've played this last hand, let's first hear from Adam himself, what he thought as he held and played this hand.

Adam Switzer (Waconia MN)

My first goal is to hold enough points with an out card, so that means 2-3-4-9. I figured that if Danny paired my 3, then I'd take the safe 15-2 with my 9 and both of us would probably get a go. This would allow me to get to the count and win the game. Except for two problems: first I cut a Jack (who invented that rule anyway?!), and then after I played all my cards, Danny's last two cards gave him 15-for-3. Added note: at the end of game one, I needed eleven points with first count and held 4-4-K-K. I cut an Ace to steal that game; without that miraculous cut, I may never have gotten to game three. It was a tough way to lose the championship, but overall I'm pleased with how the weekend went.

Life Master (*) Bruce Sattler (MD)

Just a few hours before Adam took second
in the consy, Bruce took

second in the main.

Interesting hand. Of course, my first thought

is to make sure that I have at least five points in my hand, using the starter card if needed. Second thought is to play my hand the best way possible to make it as hard for my opponent to peg out on me before counting my hand. Here's where I get a little unconventional. My thought is to keep 3-4-5-9. As long as the starter card isn't a Jack, I would lead the 5 making it very hard for my opponent to peg eight points on me.

Life Master (9★) Duane Toll (OR)

Duane has taken second place
at tourneys in nine states.

I would hold 2-3-4-9. I need five points—and I have five points. Plus, I was always taught to hold an out card. I would lead the 3; my next play depends on what is played.

Life Master (3★) Robert Medeiros (MA)
Rob doesn't take second very often, but he
did at the 2003 Daniel Webster Open.

No hold is completely foolproof from running into major trouble—especially if we cut a Jack. I don't want to keep any hand with a 5 or any hand that has no out card. (Obviously it would be nice to have enough points to go out before we plan our defensive pegging.) My hold will be 2-3-4-9. With the dealer needing eight, the most dangerous card in my hand is the 2, which can potentially be tripped if I'm forced to play it later in the pegging. However, with this mixture of cards I don't want to lead it. I prefer to lead the 4 and hopefully dump the 2 on my second play.

Life Master (4★) Erik Locke (OR) Erik took second in the TOC—twice! and also at the 2019 Grand National. I'm holding 2-3-3-4 and leading the 3. If he matches me, game over right then and there. Yes, I could hold the 5, but it is the most easily trapped card. When leading the 3, I anticipate the count will either be 9 (if he plays a 6 to minimize my pegging) or 13 (because with a Jack cut, if I have a 2 I already have enough to go out). If he doesn't pair my 3, more than likely I would think he doesn't have one and so a 3 would probably be my next card played, unless the count was 11, in which case I would play my 4. If the count was 13 I

would make the count 16 with my second 3 because I don't need any pegs.

Life Master (★) David Aiken (MI)

David took second in the 2009

Grand National main.

I freely admit that I'm the imposter in this distinguished group of end-game peggers, but I would have won this game. I was standing behind Adam when he opened up this hand, and—while it is hard to fault him for holding an out card-my first thought was: look out! My weird brain immediately went to the exact worst-case scenario that unfolded: I will probably lose if I cut a Jack, lead the 3 and get paired, play the 9 and get paired! Danny knows he can't win unless he is aggressive, so in anticipation of Danny pairing the 3, I want both 3s in my hand. The 5 is too dangerous to hold, so that means I have to hold 2-3-3-4. Even if Danny doesn't/can't pair my 3 and tries to set up a running situation by playing A, 2, 4, or 5 on my 3 lead, I will be able to run it twice (or pair his second card) before he can run it twice, so I'll win anyway. That said, while I would've won this game, the fact that I wasn't sitting in Adam's seat indicates that I would have lost other games to prevent me from having gotten this far.

Cribbage World thanks Adam for letting us play Monday-morning quarterback on his very public loss. And we congratulate him for an excellent showing in Reno: Adam qualified in the TOC and went out the second round, he and Jimmy McCarty took second place in Canadian Doubles, and he was runner-up in the consy. Not a bad way to celebrate the return of the Big One to Reno!

She then continued to play the other two Aces to score a total of twenty-two points, including two for the 31 count. The bar has once again been raised for the pegging machine Jimmy McCarty.

Good for the Goose A risky play of mine is when my opponent plays a 9 on my 4 lead and I pair it to 22. Most times you can get away with it. That is what I did in the Green Bay main against **Brad Behm** (West Bloomfield WI). Unfortunately, Brad had the next 9 for 31 for 8. The very next hand, Brad is holding two 9s and leads a 4. I repeat his play and make it 13. Brad plays the odds and pairs my 9. Surprise: I repay

the favor making it 31 for 8!

Jimmy McCarty (Racine WI) does it again! → Within seconds of Dianna Larson (Wheeling IL) announcing her 28-hand at Go Green Bay consolation, Jimmy gets a 29-hand! Jimmy got his first 29-hand at age 18 at the Kenosha Grass Roots club. Dianna is also a member there, and it is a good place to get them, as I recorded my only 29 there against Don Urban. Now, at age 27, Jimmy has a second 29 under his belt. Troy Thorson (Loveland CO) and Steve Scadden (Verona WI) also had 28s during consy play. We had so many that Marlene Lazachek ran out of 28 pins!

Raise the Bar I find it gratifying that people who read my articles on pegging are now sending me stories of even higher totals. This one might be the highest possible. At Club 11 in Reno, both **Brad Archer** and **A. J. Tasker** held identical A-A-4-4 hands. A.J. came out way ahead in pegging with two pairs and two quads and last card for an amazing 29 holes to Brad's

19-Hand At the Go Green Bay tournament on February 18, **Jane Vander Loop** (Sun Prairie WI) witnessed a 19-hand. After all these years of hearing that a 19 isn't possible, she was shocked when her opponent got a cut for 24 but pegged only 19. Sad end to the game: the opponent missed/underpegged 13 points, and Jane lost by *only* 27!

Triple 18s An 18-hand is not easy to get—or is it? John Syftestad (Mount Horeb WI) might disagree. During the Go Green Bay main, he had three of them in back-to-back games. What is memorable is that the first one occurred when he was sixteen out. The problem was his opponent pegged out before he could count it. The next game he had two of them. The last one came when he was eighteen out, but luckily, this time he got to count it.

I try to keep this column positive, but the negative behaviors in tournaments have been piling up. The last thing we need are TDs who volunteer their time to become fed up enough to quit! None of the TDs are eager to DQ anyone for boots or any other reason. We all want the players to be able to play on, within the rules. However, once any TD decision is made, players must respect and accept the situation. Hopefully, you have seen a new rule added: Respect the TDs by staying silent in the lobby & PMs when they are trying to resolve an issue, unless it's you they are trying to help. It interferes with the process and slows things down even more.

Players can't see all that TDs do in the background to fix an issue/problem. TDs



try to keep out of the lobby as much as possible and use PMs with players who need directions. Players not involved in the situation who add comments because they think it is "helping" actually cause things to be worse! It is frustrating to both the TD and the player we're helping to be bombarded with extra PMs. Talking also clogs up the lobby when we're trying to get something fixed because of extra, unnecessary posts. Flooding the lobby makes TD directions move out of sight by the time the person we're trying to help reads it. In short, if the issue doesn't involve you directly, you are doing more harm than good by adding your comments. It is not a player's place

to tell the TD what to do, such as starting a timer. If they are busy with something major, timing is a lower priority. Usually, the missing player is back quickly anyway, and who really wants to win a game due to a glitch? Please assume that TDs are doing their job, even if you don't see what is actually happening in the background. TDs—not players—give directions. Please stay quiet and let them do their job efficiently and quickly.

Players cannot treat online TDs any differently than they would a Grass Roots director or the director of a weekend tourney. Online negative behavior is just as unacceptable and could be subject to ACC Ethics Committee scrutiny. Bear in mind that a suspended player is not allowed to play in *any* ACC format. This is why the ethics rules link is run before each online event. Please respect the online TD just as you would in live play. Many of us would rather be playing to earn IRPs, so a simple post of thanks to a TD goes a very long way!

I am very appreciative of the awesome TD team for pulling together to help each other out during the sudden passing of three wonderful TDs within eight months, Covid issues, Reno, and my three-month absence while in Germany. Kudos to **Ross Newmann** (*PegWhisperer*) for arranging the TD schedule and ensuring that no tournament had to be canceled so that the players weren't impacted.

Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

The featured cribbage board this month is a commemorative board from last September's twenty-first annual convention of the Cribbage Board Collectors Society (CBCS). The board also honors CBCS founder Bette

Bemis and thirty years of the society. The convention was held in Grand Haven MI and hosted by Cec and Betz Bradshaw.

The board itself is a collaboration between the Bradshaws and their friends Jim and Susan Cook. Jim, who has made other boards for the CBCS, wanted a "live edge" board cut from a log found in one of Michigan's national forests. After finding the perfect log, one inch "cookies" were cut. Jim then applied five coats of epoxy and

sanded each coat. The boards were now ready for drilling and laser engraving.

You probably know that Michigan is divided by Lake Michigan into two parts, the Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula. That made the design of a two-sided board a perfect solution.

Normally, only twenty or so CBCS commemorative cribbage boards are made. If you should run across one of these in the future, you will have a rare and beautiful find.


