Cribbage Odds

I'm writing in response to the article in the July issue about cutting for a 29-hand, by **Michael Rogers**. The odds of cutting the fourth 5 are simply 1-in-46. You've seen six cards in your own hand, leaving forty-six unseen. Four of those unseen cards are in your opponent's hand, two (from the opponent) are in the crib, and forty are left in the deck. So the odds of you "finding" the fourth 5 is simply 1 out of 46, the same answer the author eventually arrives at, after several complications of logic and math. What is confusing to

some people is that six of those unseen cards are unavailable for you to cut to, since they are still in the opponent's hand or were the opponent's discard to the crib, rather than in the deck to be cut. But that is actually irrelevant to the correct odds. On some occasions, when you're cutting for the fourth 5, it will be in the opponent's hand, sometimes it will be in the crib, and sometimes it will be in the deck. Of course, if you could look at the crib first, and see that your desired 5 was there, that would change the odds. Your chance of cutting it would then be 0 %, of course. But since you have no way of knowing if the 5 is in the deck or in the crib or in their hand, you have to assume it could be in any of the 46 "unseen locations." The author says that the odds are "about 1-in-46." Actually, the odds are exactly 1-in-46.

Never Give Up ◆ by Edwin Mielke (Port Charlotte FL)

A few years ago, I was playing **Jimmy Marshall** at Club 147 in Port Charlotte FL with **Bob Sheehan** as a witness. I am dealing in hole 77, while Jimmy needs only 12 points for the win (and skunk).

I deal him 4-6-J-J-Q-K, so he discards 4-6 to my crib. I deal myself 4-4-5-5-6, and I toss 5-5 to my crib. Jimmy cuts a 6. After the pegging, Jimmy counts and pegs his 8-hand and then says he is happy to see the cards in my hand. Of course, he was not happy with my 24-hand but knowing what he put in my crib, at least they were not there. When I turned over my crib, Jimmy almost came across the table. He went from a possible skunk to losing the game. *Never give up!*

It works both ways. I once was 4 holes away, with my opponent 28 holes out with first count. I dealt him 5-5-5-K and the case 5 was cut. I lost that game.

My Deal



Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

One of the most common complaints that we hear from experienced players is how long they have to wait for their next game because of slow play.

Before I admit that slow play is sometimes a problem, my first comment is this: when you finish a game in twelve minutes and have to wait three minutes for your next game—slow play is *not* the problem. Just because you are bored for three minutes does not mean that someone else is playing slow. So instead of carping about this situation—and possibly making someone feel bad over nothing at all—how about learning to manage your own expectations? In other words, before you complain about slow play, make sure that the problem is not actually fast play.

Okay, now I will admit that (actual) slow play is sometimes a problem. No one wants club to finish at ten o'clock, or a qualifying round to wrap up at 5:30. But I'll also be honest and admit that I'm not about to tell a ninety-year-old player that they can't come to club anymore if they don't speed up.

There are productive ways to deal with slow play (see the article by **Dan Selke** in the July 2020 *Cribbage World*, pages 23–24). But I'll let you in on a little secret:

waiting a couple minutes between games is probably not the biggest problem you'll face on most days. To be sure, waiting seemed to be the dominant characteristic of society in 2020, as we waited for doctor appointments, for schools and restaurants and gyms to reopen, for the vaccine to arrive at our doctor's office, for a live person to answer the customer service phone, for life to return to some sort of normalcy.

But waiting/down time does not have to have a negative connotation. It can be filled with positive actions. When you have some extra time at a tournament, grab a drink or a snack, read a book, make a potty stop, work a sudoku or crossword puzzle, or—gasp!—talk to friends.

We all need to shift our emotional energy toward understanding who benefits from waiting. (Hint: it's us.) If we invest in people around us, we'll soon discover that waiting is a good thing.

With the start of a new tournament season and a new Grass Roots season just around the corner, this is a great time to readjust your thinking about waiting. Don't look at a minor lull in play as bad thing but as a time to reorient yourself to life, to reacquaint yourself with friends, to change our attitude toward waiting.



Many of my columns grow out of discussions on Daily Cribbage Hand—an informative site that I have previously mentioned here. [*Editor's note:* go to **dailycribbagehand.org**.]

A recent discussion on DCH prompted much debate. You are the nondealer holding A-2-5-7 early in the game; what should you lead, and what is your plan heading into pegging? A few players suggested leading the 7 as an *offensive* play, hoping to parlay the A-2 combo for pegging later on in the sequence. In my opinion, a 2 lead is the offensive play, as it immediately puts the dealer on the defensive as to whether to risk a match or what card to play that would best limit my chance to parlay a 15-for-2 with my next card. A 5-6-7-8 response by dealer gives me two points if I so choose, albeit with risk of dealer tripping a card I match.

So what does a 7 lead provide? It immediately provides the dealer with a pretty safe play of any picture card to push the count to 17. If dealer takes 15-2 with an 8, you have no card to score on the next play. Keeping small cards as the nondealer to potentially score them later in the pegging sequence is a losing proposition much more often than a winning one. So keep that in mind when you are planning your pegging strategy.

Youth Teaching Tip

This question is often asked of me more by adults than youth: What is the best combination of cards to throw in my crib and into my pone's crib? The answer depends on game circumstances, such as what cards will be left in your hand after the discard, and board position plays an important factor as well. However, many years ago, the late Russ Adams, a gifted mathematician and an excellent pegger from Minneapolis, created a handout on discarding decisions for the nondealer after he analyzed a sample of 2,000 hands. From his data, he concluded that the safest cards to throw into the dealer's crib are 9-K, 10-K, 6-K, and 6-Q, with each play averaging 2.3 points in the crib. The most dangerous cards to toss into the crib are 2-3, 5-5, 7-7, and 7-8. These dangerous throws average a crib score of 8.1 points.

I recently received the following email from Bill Klem (Club 148 in Auburn WA): "When we taught cribbage in my wife's high school class I gave each student a copy of the ACC rulebook as a textbook for the class. I told them to read it and that there would be a test. I prepared a test that included rules, definitions, and hands and cribs to count. I gave the test to some of my Grass Roots friends. Some of the students scored higher."


