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

President's Column



Cribbage Fever As the 2022 season comes to an end, I looked back at the August 2002 *Cribbage World*.

A lot has changed in twenty years. We now have color, with pictures that aren't a mystery of who is in them. **DeLynn Colvert** was editor then, and **David Aiken** is now (sixteen years and counting). Game Colony was advertising their new online site; it wouldn't be until 2004 that the ACC had an internet division playing on the GC site, but now playing on both ecribbage and GC.

The tournament commissioners were **George Bickford**, **Joe Bernard**, and **Roy Hofbauer**. Average tournament attendance was around 85 players. On page 10, **David Campbell** was rookie of the year with over 1,000 MRPs.

A few things haven't changed. "Club 29" listed all players who held a 29-hand in sanctioned play for the year. In 2002, eighteen players were listed, including four future HOF members.*

The regional standings listed the top players in each region. In the Eastern Region, **Bruce Sattler** was #10, **David Statz** was #11, and **Larry Phifer** was #12. Today they are still ranked, but a little higher: Larry is #4, Bruce is #5, and David is #9.

The Central Region 2002 standings saw **Emilio Perez** at #7 and **Doug Page** at #8. In 2022, Doug is #3 and Emilio #6.

In the Western Region, **Bob Bartosh** was #69 (currently #3), and clear down at #87 was **Erik Locke**, who is currently first in the West.

The headline of a story on page 19 reads "ACC Has Record Year," with 153 sanctioned tournaments. This year, we had 144 sanctioned tournaments.

The 2002 CW also says: "Cribbage fever, catch it . . . and join the fun!" That hasn't changed. We need to help everyone we know catch cribbage fever. We need to make cribbage fun.

* Editor's note: the number of 29-hands in tournament play has fallen precipitously this year. With less than a month to go in the season, only one 29 has surfaced (see page 16).



Play smart, play fair, play fast-but mostly play nice

On the next page is my scorecard from the Rampart Casino Open main in Las Vegas NV on June 18. ➡ It's not particularly spectacular, but I'm kinda proud of it, for several reasons.

First of all, I was high qualifier (which I haven't done in a twenty-two-game tourney for a long while). Second, I overcame a skunk in my first game. And third, I went to lunch with *only six points* and scored 28 points after lunch!

This last statement—while technically true—is not quite as impressive as it sounds. Because of a scheduling conflict at the casino's buffet, we had to go to lunch at 11:00, after six games. At that point I was 3–3, so does that make me the only ACC member to become high qualifier after having only three wins before lunch?

Now about that skunk in game one, lethally administered by **Ron James** (Scottsdale AZ). After this shellacking, I said to Ron: "A lot of championship rounds of golf started with a bogey on the first hole." Little did I know how good my cards would get after my 3–3 start, as I lost only three more games the rest of the day. How come I can't do that every tourney?!


Many people swear by (or at least parrot) the adage: "Never skunk someone in game one." Well, this is Exhibit A for the opposite: it's okay to get beaten—or skunked—in game one. Just keep plugging away, as you never know what might happen.

All in all, this was a fun day for me (see also "Dispatches from the Left Coast" on page 16), and I'll remember it fondly. But just so you know that I don't do this all the time, I've also experienced the other end of the Bell Curve.

For example, I have played the Marv Lang Memorial in Rockford IL twice. Both times I was low qualifier, both times with 26 (26/13 -21 in 2018 and an even lower 26/12 +107 in 2021), and both times finishing fifth. This tourney is next up on my docket. Tune in next month to see if I can lower the bar once again!

Also: next month's *Cribbage World* will feature a HQ scorecard that is nearly 33% better than my Vegas card. CW



"Ever play cribbage?"


"That a board game?"

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros •••••• •••••• ••••••

I often advocate for players varying their games—especially their lead card as pone—so as not to fall into predictable patterns.

One of the better hands that qualifies for this variance is 2-3-4-9 as pone. Usually the 3 is a nice safe lead here: you have the 9 to cover a 3 match and a 2 for a picture response. A 9 lead also provides excellent disguise for this holding. If dealer has four pictures or three pictures and a 5, you will be able to score a run on both.

If dealer makes the count 19, I prefer a 4 response to a 3. If the 4 is matched to make the count 27, you are safe from major damage. But if you play the 3 on 19 and the dealer matches it to make the count 25, you are left with a 2 or 4, and both are obviously very unappealing choices.

Okay, Rob, that sounds great but what if the dealer plays a 6 on the opening 9 lead? Well you could play it safe and play a 2 to make the count 17, but I prefer to lay a little trap here. Play your 4 to make the count 19. The dealer could be enticed into playing a 5 for a three-card run. With the count at 24 you could play the 3 for the four-card run and pray for that go—enabling you to play your 2 for a five-card run and go for six—obviously a nice pegging bonanza!

But this play has other repercussions. The 5 is the most powerful pegging card a dealer can have, so if you put the thought in his head that it could also be a major detriment while playing you, it could force your opponent into overthinking and that might lead to poor decision making. In any sport or game the more things that your opponent has to worry about only enhances your chances of success.




thers ("Stop laughing, Jason!") For the record: The Hofbauers swept the Shumates.

Montana Slam When the Covid pandemic struck in 2020, the US–Canada border was closed for a year and a half to nonessential travel. ACC members living in Cana-

da were prohibited from crossing the border even for essential activities like cribbage! So with the border reopened, this spring **Rob Voysey** (Edmonton AB) traveled south for several events: the Newport OR cluster, Worley ID, and the Montana Spring Roundup. At the Montana Championship in Missoula on June 4, Rob struck gold. He was high qualifier with 33/15 +208 → and went on to win the tourney. ↓ His score set a new ACC record for an eighteen-game tourney, eclipsing the previous record of 33/15 +161, posted by **Tom Gannon** (Clancy MT) in 2018. Looks like the Canadians are back!

Teaching Tip

{PHOTO}A few weeks ago, I received this email from P. J. Madigan, an eighth-grade math teacher (edited for length): One of the coolest parts of my job is teaching cribbage to my 8th graders at Alder Creek Middle School in Truckee CA. I typically have a group of 15–20 students. I use Dan Zeisler's Teacher's Manual for the Youth Cribbage Program. The manual says: "The single most important learning tool is the enthusiasm of the instructor." I agree 100%, and I get pretty fired up about teaching students cribbage. Using this manual, students are playing the game by the end of the first week and improving their skills quickly after that. By the final week I introduce warmups from dailycribbagehand.org. I make it a point to play against every student at least once. Students who beat me get to sign the "I beat Mr. Madigan in Cribbage" poster, and I give them a candy bar of their choice-king size if they skunk me. A few of my cribbage teaching hacks:

- Those two-piece plastic travel soap containers are great for storing decks of cards.
- Buy 12-packs of playing cards and when you replace them, get the exact same kind. When a playing card gets lost or damaged, you have replacement.


Jackson Peggers Club 332 celebrated not one, but two, nonagenarian birthdays on

Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

ACC member **Charlie Martin** of Rhode Island sent this photo and family history of a unique handcrafted board. Charlie's grandmother played on this board when she was young. She taught Charlie to play on it when he was six years old. His dad also played on this board, and One final note on this board; Charlie experienced his most embarrassing loss on it when his seven-year-old son double skunked him!

Boards handcrafted by prisoners actually date back at least to the Napoleonic Wars in the early 1800s. I am aware of two historic Ameri-



to this day Charlie's kids play on it. That is five generations and a long family history of cribbage.

Charlie's family purchased the board from the Rhode Island State Prison in the mid-1880s. At that time inmates could make various craft projects to sell in the prison store to help them raise funds to buy personal items. The board is made of oak and walnut. The counter at both ends of the board could be used for games won, but was most likely for scoring the game of Whist. Charlie made the pegs many years ago. One set is stainless steel and the other is beryllium/copper. As far as the initials on the board, no one has a clue. can-made prison cribbage boards. Both were made by Dr. Samuel A. Mudd, who was imprisoned for treating John Wilkes Booth following President Lincoln's assassination. Dr. Mudd was assigned to the prison woodshop at Fort Jefferson in Florida. He made one board for a prison friend, Colonel John Waring, whose family later donated it to the American Civil War Museum in Richmond VA. The other board was

a birthday gift to his wife on July 27, 1867. This board is on display at the Dr. Samuel A. Mudd House Museum in Waldorf MD.
