President's Column



16,306 Games

That is a lot of cribbage games. Now imagine playing this many games but never playing a game in person.

Let me introduce you to **Susan Roughley**. She lives in Prestatyn, North Wales, in the United Kingdom, and has played 16,306 games on eCribbage, but has never played a game in person.

Susan played dominoes all her life. Seven years ago, during a fit of boredom, she decided to try out cribbage. No one explained the rules or strategy to her, she just started playing. After a few games she began to figure out how the game was played. A friend from dominoes who also played cribbage showed her how to use manual counting, and she learned to count her hands. Five months later, someone mentioned eCribbage. Susan looked up the site, and it was more structured—not just a free-for-all—and she also liked the tournament formats it offered. She played the eCribbage bot and lost constantly. However, she enjoyed the online players and five months later volunteered to be a tournament director. At the time she was not working and directed two tournaments a day.

She quit playing for three years, but luckily for eCribbage and the players, she returned. She contacted **Scott Milo**, the new site director, and was soon back to directing tournaments. Her original online name was katnisissue (from the *Hunger Games* movie) was updated to Altatraya.

In October, Susan started doing something new—directing ACC tournaments—and was a bit nervous at first. "You are all these professional players, playing for points, and I'm just a normal TD. I am used to playing for these imaginary cups." Normally the tournaments she would direct are smaller and slower paced. Now directing ACC tournaments, Susan is handling up to sixty players per tournament—and she is handling them very well. At first the pace of the tournament was overwhelming, but she likes the challenge of keeping a tournament going, and she loves that she can handle the situations.

Cribbage and dominoes aren't her only hobbies. When not directing tournaments, she now works for Airbus making airplane wings. She also enjoys crotchet, swimming, camping, cooking, and rugby league. Although she used to play in family rugby games, now she just watches the matches.

I asked when she thought she would play a game with a live person? Susan replied: "Someday I will teach my grandchildren." (She has four children and eight grandchildren.) Her husband isn't interested in playing but likes that Susan

Never Give Up • by Scott Kooistra (Yankton SD)

In the nine-game Sunday consolation at Pahrump NV, I was sitting at 3–3 with a large minus net spread after six games.

In game seven, I was eleven points out with first count, and the dealer was seventeen points out. My cards were 5-7-7-8-J-J. After some thought, I hold 5-7-7-8 in my left hand and J-J in my right hand, took a deep breath, and threw my discard to the opponent's crib. I cut a Queen and prepared to peg my eight-point hand.

Lo and behold, when I picked up my hand I had only 5-7-8. I stood up, thinking I might have dropped a card under the chair or table. Nothing there. My opponent then noticed five cards in the crib. *Yikes!* How did I end up throwing three cards?!

So the judges were called, and I played my short hand. Luckily, I pegged two points and counted my 5-7-8 with a Queen cut for four points.

The judges correctly drew out a card from the five-card crib, my opponent counted his hand and crib, and then we were both at hole 116. In the next deal I pegged exactly five points and won the game.

I then won the next two games and barely qualified with 12/6 and a negative spread. With good fortune, I won four matches and took first place in the consolation.

Despite my biggest bonehead play in my forty-two years of tournament cribbage, I ended up as the consolation champion.

Never give up!

Scott recently retired from his decades-long job in radio broadcasting and has hit the Tournament Trail again. He is the current Central Region leader and is playing tournaments from coast to coast. Scott is a six-time All American, the 1990 national champion, and at age thirty-two was the youngest ACC member ever elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame.

Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

About fifteen minutes before my home club (Beer City Peggers Club 71) starts on Tuesday, November 16, we discover that all of our playing supplies are in the trunk of a car about twenty-five minutes away from club.

It's a long story, but basically the supplies were moved from one car to another the previous weekend to make room for suitcases as several club members left for a weekend tourney. After that trip was over, everyone forgot to transfer the supplies back into the car of the player who always brings the supplies to club.

So now we have twenty-six players ready to play club—but no boards, no pegs, no playing cards, no pens. We can make a trip to get the regular supplies, but that means we'll start thirty minutes late.

I ask around to see if players have boards in their cars, and we come up with a half dozen boards. Several players live within ten minutes of club, so off they go to retrieve long boards.

Three or four members carry caddies stuffed with pegs, so we easily come up with a couple dozen sets of pegs. Another player has two unopened decks of cards in his car, so now we are set with cards. And between purses and pockets we find enough pens to put at least one at each board.

When our board retrievers return, we actually end up with more than enough long boards for the tournament. Many of the boards \Rightarrow are wider than normal, and the colors don't match but, hey, they are official long boards and club is a go. Cool side effect: since many are trophy boards, we can pretend that *we* won the event named on the board or earned the award level the board celebrates.

So what could've been a fiasco turned out to be a fun


night of cribbage as players jumped in to help. Within the space of twenty-five minutes we are fully supplied and ready to play. *continued next page*

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The Magedanz Chronicles



HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- Nominations must be submitted by mail or preferably email (maximum of one side of a letter-size page) to the address below. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member and must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in the Grass Roots program.

- d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the Board of Directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by January 15.

The HOF chair will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and email copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel



(composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The ballots will be counted prior to the March BOD meeting.

Any nominee who receives 75% or more positive votes will be elected to the HOF. Any candidate who receives at least 51% positive votes but less than 75% will be voted on by the BOD; if the BOD approves by two-thirds majority, that candidate will be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National tournament.

TOC INVITATIONS

The Syl Lulinski/Tournament of Champions (TOC), held in Reno NV every March, is an invitation-only event. In order to play the TOC, you have to qualify via one of the following criteria (based on accomplishments as of August 31).

A. one-year invitation

- (1) top 16 finishers in the TOC the previous year
- (2) winner of a sanctioned event (main or consolation)
- (3) top 10% of rated members of all Grass Roots divisions
- (4) champion of Grass Roots club
- (5) winner of Grass Roots National Tournament
- (6) winner of Grass Roots Regional Tournament
- (7) anyone with as many Master Rating Points as the 50th player in a region

(8) top 10% of rated members in internet play

Note: members qualifying via A.4–6 receive a one-year invitation to be used in any of the following three years. If you also receive and use a one-year invitation via A.1–3, however, then your A.4–6 qualification would be considered used.

- **B. three-year invitation:** top 50 MRP players from each region.
- **C. ten-year invitation:** champion of Tournament of Champions
- D. automatic invitation
- (1) anyone reaching Master level (2,000 MRPs) before the end of the season
- (2) anyone reaching Bronze level (1,000 GRPs) before the end of the season
- (3) anyone reaching eMaster level (2,000 IRPs) before the end of the season



In any competition knowing the skill level of your opponent is an important factor. For instance, if you're guarding a basketball player who has excellent speed but a weak jump shot it would be prudent to play off them a bit. Conversely a slower player with a deadly jump shot should be covered tightly. If you can judge the skill level of your opponent in cribbage, your pegging game will likely flourish.

You are dealer early in the game holding 4-5-6-7. A strong opponent leads a picture, so I play my 7. He follows with another picture, and I play my 4 for 31. My opponent next leads another picture. With my hand showing 4-7, would a strong player lead a picture here if he had a 5 remaining with it? I highly doubt it so the 5 should be a safe play.

However after a weaker player plays two pictures into my 4-7 and then leads a 5, I have to ask: would they play a 5 with a picture left even though my hand shows 4-7? I highly doubt it, so I will play my 6 and then safety match their other 5 next.

Knowledge is power!


Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER







He especially looked forward to family vacations up at Lake Namakagon in Cable WI every July. He will surely be missed by his family and cribbage friends.

A note about Rudy from Club 6: The patriarch of Club 6 in Milwaukee WI, Rudy was the oldest active player in the region. His favorite saying after having enough points to win a game was "Mark it." In addition to this, he was known for getting 19-hands and calling them out as "Nineteen." If someone else had a 19-hand or 19-crib, he would say, "Be proud of it and call it out loud: Nineteen." As with all former cribbage players, he will be dearly missed.
