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President's Column



Judge. Judge! Judge!!

Have you heard players calling for a judge?

Maybe at a tournament or at your Grass Roots club? When judges are called, chances are there was a card not played that should have been, or a player claimed the game but didn't have enough points to go out. Whatever the situation two judges will assess the situation, look the rule up and make a ruling, reading the rule to both players.

Sounds easy and fun, so you're thinking how can I become a judge? The first thing to do is get a rulebook. You can get one when you renew your membership, or order one any time from the membership secretary. The commissioners may have some with them. Rulebooks are \$2. All Grass Roots clubs were also sent a rulebook when the new books were printed.

Now that you have your rulebook and have read through it, send **Sally Henderson** an email at **accjudgetest@gmail.com**. She will send you open-book test you take right on your computer, and it is free. After you have passed your test, your name will be printed in *Cribbage World*.

I suggest that new judges, if you aren't making a call, try to watch and see if the ruling the judges made is what you would have also made. Don't be afraid to ask judges any questions you may have.

At Grass Roots clubs, many times there are no judges present, or maybe only one judge is available. Hopefully the club director has a rulebook handy to look up the rule. Even if you aren't a judge, but have read through the rulebook, it will make it easier to assist at your local club.

When a situation happens, you should know what the rulebook says. Picked up your front peg? Sorry. it now becomes your back peg. Underpegged and took your fingers off the peg? Oops, you can't correct that.

Mistakes happen and judges are needed to keep the games moving along, so think about becoming a judge, or at least familiarize yourself with the rulebook.

Did I mention you will get a red ink pen and can now correct players scorecards? The perks of becoming a judge just keep coming.

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

I know it's a cliché, but I'll say it anyway: cribbage players are family. Here is Exhibit A.

On November 10, I headed for Maryland on a combined pleasure/business trip, playing cribbage and buying books for my bookstore.

At the Baltimore Charm City Classic, directed by **Michael O'Brien** and **Bruce Sattler**, my cards were mediocre on Friday night and in the Saturday main (both times I was in the OMG group: one more game!), so on Sunday morning, I skipped the consolation and pulled out early.

I drove an hour southwest to Silver Spring MD, where I was going to pick up 1,700 books I was buying from a retired professor. If I could get everything loaded by two or three o'clock that afternoon, I could save the expense of an extra night in a hotel on the trip home.

While carrying empty boxes into the prof's house—and before I had packed a single book—I tripped and fell. The awkward angle of my left pinky immediately told me the universe had other plans for me that day.

The prof took me to a nearby emergency room, where we learned that it would be a couple hours before I'd be treated. So the prof went back to his house to pack up books.

Dithering over what to do, I decided to call a friend at the cribbage tournament and see if he could help. When I told **Chris Leishear** my predicament, he immediately said he'd help as soon as his buddy was finished with the playoffs.

As it turned out, his friend, **Jason Matheny**, wasn't finished with the playoffs until he won the whole thing, but then they drove to Silver Spring (where Chris grew up), came to the ER to get my car keys, then went to the prof's house.

Tournament director **Michael O'Brien** joined them shortly later, and the three of them packed up over 2,000 pounds of books and loaded my car and trailer to perfection.

In the meantime, I had seen a triage nurse, got X-rayed, and went back to the

before they started the real work!

examination room. But still no doctor in sight. Michael brought my car keys to me, and I figured he'd head home after a busy weekend of tournament directing.

Nope. He sat with me, gave me medical advice, and regaled me with stories about his life and career (he's a veterinarian by vocation, a woodworker and winemaker by avocation). After I finally got fixed up (the pinky was *only* dislocated, not

broken), splinted, re-X-rayed, CAT-scanned (apparently these scans are mandatory when old people fall!), and discharged—a *mere* eight and a half hours after my arrival at the ER—Michael took me to get my car and then insisted on housing me that night at his home in Mount Airy.

My drive home on Monday and Tuesday was thankfully uneventful, but it gave me lots of time to think about what had happened the previous day.

Quite simply, I was floored by the generosity of cribbage friends who gave up their free time on a Sunday afternoon to help out a fellow player in distress. Chris later told me that other players were on standby up at the tournament, waiting to hear how much work there was and willing to come down if needed.

A dozen cribbage friends also checked on me, and I texted with them (right hand only!) while waiting to see the doctor.

Chris, Jason, and Michael are three of the nicest guys in the entire ACC, and I cannot adequately express my gratitude for their help. I owe them big time.

The amazing thing is that they are not alone. Cribbage family is truly the best family.





Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

The photo of this carved whalebone cribbage board was sent to me by ACC member **Dee Davis** of Rochester NY. The first thing you might note is that it is short ten holes on each set of tracks. Collectors refer to this as a "mistake" board. My guess is that the carver was not a cribbage player. Dee obtained the board at a flea market on Cape Cod. It came from a Martha's Vineyard estate sale of a home owned by a family of fishermen. While it is not a very playable board, it is still a nice addition to a board collection.



Dee's family history of cribbage goes back to the logging camps of northern Pennsylvania, where the game was passed down from great-grandfather to grandfather to father to Dee. Dee still has her great-grandfather's handmade board from the mid-1800s.

In keeping the family tradition of cribbage, Dee taught her wife, **Suronda Gonzalez**, to play cribbage while they were dating. They are also cribbage board collectors.

A teacher friend of theirs thought cribbage would be a valuable learning tool. They joined with some other parents and started teaching eight-year-

old kids. After completing classes, each kid was given a board from their collection. They continue to teach all of their friends to play and give out boards. We should all be as dedicated to teaching cribbage as Dee and Suronda.

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros •••••• ••••••

We all realize no two cribbage games will ever be the same, but certain hands or pegging sequences seem to arise often. And garnering the optimum results from these situations can be the difference in getting ready for a playoff match or counting out thirty bucks for the consolation signup.

Let's examine one example. It's early in the game and you are dealer with either A-2-2-3 or A-2-3-3. When pone leads a picture card, what do you respond with? Let's eliminate the Ace play first. Making the count 11 with an Ace is often a good play but not here without a picture backing it up. If the pone has three pictures and a 5, it won't matter if we play the 2 or 3 from either hold; we will eventually get the 31 and win the pegging battle 3–0.

But what if pone is holding four pictures? What play maximizes our pegging value? Obviously after the pone's second play, the count will be over 21 so we will be the only one playing cards. Playing the 2 or 3 from our pair in either hand will enable us to score a three-card run with a go rather than just pairing a 2 or 3. So the pegging will either be 4–1 or 4–3 instead of 3–1 or 3–3. That extra peg could keep your title hopes alive. The little things make a huge difference in this game.

You are ahead 2–0 in the finals of the main playoffs in Deadwood and **Clay Collier** deals you this hand. What do you throw? Knowing how to handle tough decisions like this is what led **Scott Kooistra** to the MRP championship last season (see pages 20–21). Scott threw Ace of Clubs and 2 of Spades and won the tourney!

Scott Kooistra's

Record-Breaking National Championship

When he wasn't busy planning and directing Grand National 40, Life Master (\star) Scott Kooistra (Omaha NE) was racking up MRPs on his way to the 2021–22 national championship.

This was not just a run-of-the-mill championship, but a record-breaking championship. Here are some of the records Scott set last season:

- most MRPs ever by a Central Region player
- tenth best MRP total in ACC history
- first national champion outside the Western Region since 2002
- forty years between first and most recent All American appearances
- thirty-two years between first and most recent national championships

Scott set three personal goals prior to the 2021–22 cribbage season:

- 1. promote Grand National 40 in Omaha
- 2. visit new tourneys and states, make friends and renew old friendships, play golf, visit national parks
- 3. hopefully win a tournament and earn some MRPs along the way

From CW's perspective, this is **Mission Accomplished!** Here are more of Scott's stats for the year:



- won 3 mains (pictures below) and 5 consolations
- played 59 main tourneys, qualified in 27 (45.8%)
- played 35 consolations, qualified in 16 (45.7%)
- won the first playoff match in main (not counting byes) 21 times (77.8%)
- won the first playoff match in consy (not counting byes) 10 times (62.5%)
- made the final four 21 times in 43 qualifications (48.8%)
- played 112 playoff matches (main and consy) and won 74 of them (66.1%)
- played 1,908 sanctioned games (includes playoffs but not satellites or Grass Roots), with a record of 1,064 wins and 844 losses = 55.8%
- won 60.3% of games when he had first deal
- won 52.1% of games when he had second deal
- won the cut for deal only 43.4% in over 1,500 cut-for-deal games (most Central Region games are alternate deal)
- states where Scott won over 60% of his games: South Dakota, Wisconsin, Arizona
- states where Scott won less than 51% of his games: California, Michigan, Montana
- played 17 tournaments/cities that he had never been to or visited before
- drove almost 68K miles in his Chevy Cruze, averaging 43.5 MPG, and made seven roundtrips over the Rockies
- played golf in 32 states
- visited 34 national parks during the cribbage seasons

Scott writes: "Thanks to my traveling partners, mainly Jim Mahan and Don Thienel,



along with all the places I stayed and the meals we shared."

What a fantastic season Scott had. But it was also exhausting. No wonder he's taking some time off before hitting the trail again. Congrats to Scott. And may his success encourage future champions!

<u>New Cribbage Masters</u>

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- 1. Nominations must be submitted by email to the address below. If you cannot email, please call the number provided. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member and must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in

the Grass Roots program.

- d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the Board of Directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

Nominations must be submitted by January 15.

The HOF chair will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and provide



copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The ballots will be counted prior to the March BOD meeting.

Any nominee who receives 75% or more positive votes will be elected to the HOF. Any nominee who receives more than 50% positive votes but less than 75% will be voted on by the BOD; if the BOD approves by two-thirds majority, that candidate will be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at Grand National.







A cribbage board made from the USS *Constitution* recently sold at auction in London. ➡ Created from timber and brass from the famous navy vessel, an engraving on the board mentions Commander Isaac Hull and the year 1820, so the board was probably made in or shortly after that year. The board is 12.5 inches long. With an estimated value of £150–£250, it was hammered down at £1,500 (= US \$1,725).
