
CURRENT SUSPENSIONS

Slow Play? No, Fast Play!

Are you a fast player? Do you get bored waiting two minutes for your next game? Here's a suggestion to help fill the time between games.

In a game that *Cribbage World* has named **The War of 1812**, the dealer sets her front peg at 18 points from the game hole, and the nondealer is 12 out. This is great endgame practice, and about a third of the time it goes two deals for a dramatic finish. (Note: if the nondealer has 12 or more after the starter card is cut, simply declare "game over" and start a new game.) You cannot practice this enough. And far better to do this than to grouse about slow play.

James Ravenscroft (Ambler PA) developed the basics of this game, and it came to *Cribbage World* via Grass Roots Commissioner Ivan Wells and Steve Jesseph (Doylestown PA).

I have been a member of ACC since the 1980s. My wife and I ran the Savannah Open for seven years, and I am a Master-ranked player and a judge in the ACC. Although I haven't played in a tournament in a few years now, I would like to play. The purpose of this letter is to express my disdain in the policy of only suspending cheaters rather than the original punishment of a lifetime expulsion from the ACC. Cribbage cheaters are *thieves*, no better than someone who would steal money from your wallet or purse. These are adults who choose to steal because they have no conscience. There is no room in the ACC for this activity, and to only suspend them for a few months encourages them to return and be more careful about getting caught in any future games. The ACC expelled, rightfully so, the #1 ranked player lifetime, as well as other thieves along the years. I contacted the Ethics Committee and told them how I felt about this current policy. They only said that the committee approved these suspensions. I don't want to play against players whom I have to watch like a hawk every time they have their hands near their cards or pegs.

As most of you know, it is almost impossible to be in two places at once, meaning that I could not play the GN main. I arrived back in Virginia Beach in midafternoon (thanks, Jack Howsare, who in addition to directing a wonderful Grand National with the expert help of his daughter Arlene Painter, \clubsuit also arranged a driver to pick me up at the airport)

and then attended the awards banquet on Saturday night, which is always the highlight of every GN, as we applaud and congratulate the accomplishments of our friends.





Sunday morning saw me in consolation action, when I managed to win six games—just enough to qualify, before losing in the first playoff round. So much for capitalizing on my shortened GN experience. All told, I won exactly half of my GN games (15–15).

So even though this GN was much different than previous GNs, I wouldn't change a thing, because it was filled with fun and friends.

I look forward to the next three GNs—Las Vegas NV in 2024, Deadwood SD in 2025, and Niagara Falls NY in 2026—for multiple reasons. First of all, because they are in some really cool locations. Second, because I will be codirecting all three of them. Third, because Grand National is always a wonderful opportunity to see cribbage friends from around the country.


lores's husband of sixty-six years recently passed away. When not playing cribbage, she enjoys playing bridge and sheepshead and watching the Badgers and Packers on TV.

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Is it a renege?

We just concluded the Grand National at Virginia Beach. Jack Howsare and his assistants all did an excellent job running this legacy event at an oceanfront venue that is hard to beat. I want to mention that each year there are at least two other ACC-sanctioned tournaments held at this same location. You don't get to play cribbage very often at a venue like this, so I would like to encourage all y'all to support those other Virginia Beach tournaments, and let's keep this venue alive and thriving.

During the Grand National an interesting situation occurred. A game had reached fourth street, and the dealer was about ten out while the pone needed just a few holes. During the course of pegging, the pone had reached the dead hole when the dealer said "go." The pone then pegged out and claimed the game. When the pone laid down his unplayed cards, the dealer noticed that he had a card that could have been played, so he called for a judge.

What do you think? Was it a false claim of game? Was it a renege? Was it anything?

Several judges conferred and decided it was not a false claim of game because when the dealer said "go" the pone had enough points to win the game. So the next question would be was it a renege? After reviewing the renege rule, the judges enforced the renege rule and awarded the dealer two points. When all was said and done the pone pegged out and won.

Unfortunately, the judges blew the call. They didn't read far enough in the renege rule to get to the correct ruling. Rule 7.3(e) states: If a player calls "go" and their opponent pegs out, the game is over. It is not a renege if that player had cards that could have been played.

If you are a judge, it would be a good idea to reread the rulebook and become familiar with it. If you are on a judge call, don't rush making the call just because you think you know the rule. Find where it is spelled out in the rulebook and make sure you are correct in your ruling. As judges we owe it to the players to get it right.

And remember, as always, let's have fun!

40 Years Ago

The cover contained a holiday greeting from *Cribbage World* editor **Bob Madsen**, although he didn't sign the note, nor does his name appear anywhere in the magazine. This was apparently a good time to invest in cribbage books, as elsewhere we see three cribbage books



offered for sale at low prices: **Joe Wergin**/*How to Win at Cribbage* reduced from \$14.95 to \$4.95; **DeLynn Colvert**/*Play Winning Cribbage* reduced from \$9.95 to \$7.95 for ACC members; and **John Chambers**/*Cribbage: A New Concept* reduced from \$4.95 to \$3.95.

25 Years Ago

The cover reported that **Jackie Doppelt** (Napa CA) was the best of 132 players at River City Open in Sacramento. **John Chambers** must have heeded the advice in his book (see the 1983 report above), for we read that John won the 130-player Dante Club Open in West Springfield MA. And on page 17 we see that **Ben Holder**—who earned his Gold Award just a few weeks ago (see page 13)—had *two* 28-hands in successive weeks at Club 43 in Fremont CA.

- Election of officers—four officers were reelected unopposed: President James Morrow, Executive VP Rick Shea, VP-Policy Keith Widener, and VP-Competition David Aiken. The new VP-Operations is Mark Soule, who edged out incumbent Terry Weber.
- The DeLynn Colvert All Star Tournament will be played at Grand National beginning at the end of the 2023–24 season. Thus, there'll be two DCASTs in calendar year 2024: in Reno for 2022–23 and in Las Vegas for 2023–24.
- Grand National, National Open, and ACC Open were given legacy status, meaning that no sanctioned tournaments will be scheduled on their weekends anywhere in the country.
- The BOD will have one **virtual meeting** a year as a means to encourage new board members and help with traveling costs for board members.
- Grand National 2026 was awarded to Niagara Falls and will be directed by **David Aiken**, **Mark Soule**, and **Vicki Soule**.

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- Nominations must be submitted by email to the address below. If you cannot email, please call the number provided. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member and must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in

the Grass Roots program.

- d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the Board of Directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

Nominations must be submitted by January 15.

The HOF chair will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and provide



copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The ballots will be counted prior to the March BOD meeting.

Any nominee who receives 75% or more positive votes will be elected to the HOF. Any nominee who receives more than 50% positive votes but less than 75% will be voted on by the BOD; if the BOD approves by two-thirds majority, that candidate will be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at Grand National.


came in second. The consolation saw Arnold Ward victorious over Ethan Guyaz.


dy came out on top, over Rhode Islander Paul Petit. The consolation saw first-time winner Joyce Keay → beat out Carlyle Foss for top honors.







Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

'Tis the season! Most of us will be celebrating this holiday season one way or another. This month's cribbage board is a celebration of Christmas for ACC member **Chuck Shields** and his family. 
A Christmas Carol. The quotation at bottom

Elite Junior Cribbage Player Angelina Villalobos (Oroville CA, age 15)

Note: Shortly after learning to play cribbage, Angelina was diagnosed with chronic Crohn's disease. She currently has infusion treatments every five weeks, which last three to four hours. To pass the time, she and her mom play cribbage.

When did you learn to play cribbage?

I learned when I was nine years old. I wanted to know how to play because my mom was playing in tournaments on weekends, and I wanted to travel with her and understand what she was doing at these events.

Who taught you how to play?

My mom, Lori Boyer, and my grandma, Emma Schambach, taught me. I picked up the game really fast and played a month later in the Paradise Youth Tournament. That event didn't have enough players for two age groups, so I played with everyone and came in second place against Wyatt Hagen, who was fourteen at the time. I was nine.

Do you play in a Grass Roots club? Where?

In 2020 I started playing in the Paradise Club. Then, in 2022, after Covid was no longer a big issue, my mom restarted a Grass Roots club in Oroville, and I've been playing there ever since.

Adult/youth tournaments you've played in? Best finishes?

I've played a lot of youth tourneys, including multiple times in the Sierra Youth Tournament in Grass Valley, where I took first place in the 11u division in 2019 and 2020. I participated in the Memorial event in Sacramento. I also played the one year there was a youth tournament in Paradise. In addition, I've played Youth Grand Nationals 2, 3, and 4. In YGN2, I took third place in 11u; in YGN3, also playing in 11u, I came in second. In June of this year, I won YGN4 playing in the 12o division. I've also entered adult tournaments in Antioch (where I took first place

in the consolation), the Eureka/Paradise Fire Tribute, the consolation in Monterey, and in Reno at both the ACC Open and the Veteran's Day Classic.

What's your favorite part of playing cribbage?

I love all the math I have to do in my head when I play cribbage. Math is my favorite subject at school and has always come easy for me.

Do you have a favorite memory?


My favorite memory was when I skunked Terry Higgins in Monterey after he said he was going to get revenge from the Santa Slam consy when I beat him in the finals.

Hal Lamon

Our cribbage family lost one of its upstanding members when Hal Lamon, 90, passed on August 1. Hal was a wonderful volunteer for the ACC and especially for Grass Roots, where he was the long-time director of the Sea-Tac Peggers in Federal Way WA. A Grand Master, Hal was also the tournament director for the Mount Rainier Open in Tacoma for many years. He and his late wife of 58+ years, Joyce, traveled to many tournaments all over the Pacific Northwest, Reno, and at least one cribbage cruise. Hal served in the US Air Force, was the proprietor of two hardware stores, and later was manager of a Boeing Small Business Program, all while raising three children and later becoming a beloved grandfather. His willingness

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





End-game play sometimes requires some over-the-top Hollywood acting. If you have first count needing under five and you don't have enough points, discard fairly quickly and confidently. Especially if your opponent is not in range of pegging out. The dealer might easily surmise that your quick decision means you're out, so he could easily just try to garner as many pegs as possible, increasing your chances of scoring the pegs you might need.

Conversely if you need a big hand and the dealer is 5–9 pegs out, take your time discarding your hand, even if you have 4-5-5-6. The dealer will think you have a hand that needs help and he certainly won't provide you any with careless pegging.

And *do not* react positively or negatively to any cut. An astute player who might have poker skills in reading player tells could read you like a book. *Be an enigma!*

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
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
