

President's Column



Whither the Weather?

"70 degrees yesterday, snow today, sick tomorrow." So **Jennifer Johnson**, a BOD member from North Carolina, reported on Facebook.

What crazy weather we are having. I live in the desert of Washington State, where it did the opposite: 7° with 8″ of snow on Thursday, 40° with wind on Friday, back to 20° and sick on Monday. Ugh.

The snow reminded me of a trip to Susanville CA a few years ago. It started snowing as **Jack Moritzky** (Zillah WA) and I hit the road at 5:30a. With a full tank of gas, some water, and high performance tires on his brand new Nissan Maxima Platinum, snow is normally not a big deal. But of course, the snow got worse . . . and worse. As we pulled into Bend OR, just a few hours behind schedule, I called **Rick Baird** and told him: "We need a break and are stopping at your house!" His reply was: "Better keep going, I am stuck in my driveway!"

I thought about turning around, but a quick check in the rearview mirror didn't look any better than the windshield view. Jack helped by pointing out helpful things along the way: "This is a lot of snow!" and "Look, there's another car in the ditch!"

Finally, as we reached California, the snow stopped and the road was clear. Things were looking good—like getting a cut for 20, when you're 20 points out on fourth street.

Then, as we went around a big corner, the snow was back and deep. It was a white out and turned not good—like needing 21 on fourth street and unable to peg that one point with a 20-hand. We made it to Susanville in just over seventeen hours, only seven hours longer than the normal drive time. Two days later the road was clear and we were off to Reno.

The moral of this is: do whatever it takes to get to a tournament. I set a new record for most points and never lost a game through the playoffs in the main and consolation.

No? I didn't? Well, snow blindness can cause these type of dreams!

In reality I had used every bit of luck just getting to the tournament. I think I turned in a 10/4 card, and the main was worse than that.

Drive safe as you hit the Tournament Trail. What's life without several cribbage adventures?

Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

I am a cribbage voyeur. Not only do I enjoy playing cribbage, but I enjoy watching other people play.

One of the most enjoyable games I have ever watched occurred at the Loveland CO doubleheader in December. Tournament hosts **Kathy Pacocha** and **Troy Thorson** met in the semifinal playoffs of the Sunday consolation. As you can imagine, whenever these two play, the festive atmosphere in the playing room goes up to eleven.

After winning the first game, Troy is dealing from hole 83 in game two, with Kathy as pone in hole 94. Here's how the pegging went:

Kathy	3		2		A (for 7)		3 (for 6)	
Troy		5		4 (for 4)		6 (for 6)		5 (for 7)

With each card played, the boisterous spectators eagerly waited to see what would happen next. And if you know anything about Kathy and Troy, you know that there was no small amount of banter/ trash-talking going on between them—plus, house rules were on full display!

When the dust settled, Kathy had pegged 13 holes, and Troy had pegged 17. With a face card as the starter, Kathy's 12-hand takes her to hole 119. After counting his 16-hand and ending in hole 116, Troy turns over a 4-crib and lands in the dead hole.

On the next deal, Troy holds 3-3-3-K and obviously leads a 3. In rarity, Kathy is holding 3-6-7-K, so she promptly pairs Troy's 3 and pegs out! (The odds of Kathy holding the case 3 is less than three percent!)

Kathy handily won game three, and then also beat Larry McKinney (Lakewood CO) in the finals, who had been patiently waiting for the

Kathy-Troy joust to reach its conclusion.

If you ever need to scratch your cribbage itch, drop in on a tournament in Colorado—and be prepared to see some amazing cribbage! CW

Are Records Made to Be Broken? ◆ by Eric Jensen (Grand Rapids MI)

I know of several sports records that will never be broken. How about Cal Ripken Jr.'s streak of 2,632 consecutive games played? Pretty impressive. Then there's Will Chamberlain's 100 points scored in a basketball game. There are teams that don't even average 100 points per game. And one of my favorites: Jo DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak. Wow!

I have been part of a cribbage record that will stand a long time. Beer City Peggers Club 71 (Grand Rapids MI) has played seventeen Grass Roots weekly tournaments so far, and we have had seventeen different winners! I find that hard to believe. We are very fortunate to have more than thirty club members, while some clubs don't regularly have seventeen players in attendance. I have played in all seventeen tournament but, sad to say, I have not been a winner yet.

Editor's note: Club 71's different-winner-every-week streak came to an end in week nineteen when **Jerri Halicki** (Jenison MI) took first place, repeating her performance from week fourteen. Despite not taking first place in any weekly tournament (so far!), **Eric Jensen** is leading the race for club championship by 22 points.





Cribbage and/in Pop Culture

One of America's best known founders, **Benjamin Franklin**, played cribbage. *Cribbage World* has from time to time received vague references to his cribbage playing, but nothing that could be tracked down. Now, thanks to **Tyler Brinker** (Fountain Valley CA), we have a definitive link between Franklin and cribbage. Walter Isaacson's *Benjamin Franklin: An American Life*, published by Simon & Schuster in 2004, contains this passage on page 439:



Franklin had reached an age when he no longer fretted about squandering his time. For hours on end, he would play cribbage or cards with friends, which caused him, he wrote Polly, to have brief twinges of guilt. "But another reflection comes to relieve me, whispering: 'You know the soul is immortal; why then should you be such a niggard of a little time, when you have a whole eternity before you?' So being easily convinced and, like other reasonable creatures, satisfied with a small reason when it is in favor of doing what I have a mind to, I shuffle the cards again, and begin another game."

The next step is to track down the multiple references to cribbage in Franklin's published letters, but we'll leave that for another day. Thanks, Tyler, for the headsup on this delightful book.

With the pandemic shutting down society, cribbage clubs had more pressing matters at hand. But it is now time to revive this practice and make a good impression on new players and welcome them into our cribbage family.

Cribbage Club Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses and Grass Roots/ACC dues.

After the trial period is up ...

• We pledge to continue to make all players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

Teaching Tip

If you are planning on teaching in a classroom setting, in preparation of your first visit, ask the teacher to set out name cards on the desks of each student. Pupils always respond more favorably when they are addressed by name, and this is an excellent way of developing personal relationships with each child right from the start. Furthermore, it will help you memorize their names much quicker so you will not need to rely on written cues to recall who is who. When I do an after-school enrichment class or teach at a rec center, and there is no one to prep with name identification, I bring index cards and a few Sharpies and ask the kids to fold the cards lengthwise and boldly write their names on them.



I was trailing in the match when I hit a run of cards and put together a twelve-game streak to win it. Rollie, ever the gentleman, silently placed some cash on the table, rose, and headed for the door.

Since we were both leaving for the Big Tournament in Reno the next day, I felt obliged to say something consoling and encouraging, so I told Rollie not to fret, his cards could only get better.

Back in the day, the ACC Open drew upward of a thousand players and filled every corner of the Sands. I did not run into Rollie until after the consolation qualifying round on Sunday, when I walked into the room where the main event playoffs were being held and found him sitting across the board from **Henry Douglass** in the final match. Moments later, Rollie rose the champion.

Winning streaks come and go, but I haven't seen a turnaround like that since . . . well, you fill in the blank!

Sometimes the cards completely determine the outcome of a particular game. But often pegging decisions in fairly standard hands greatly affect your chances of winning or losing. Let's examine one of those hands today.

The pone has A-4-J-J, and the dealer has 2-3-10-Q, with neutral position. The pone leads his Ace; what do you play? I would play the 2, reasoning that it's unlikely the pone would lead an Ace from a 2 or 3 cluster. However many players like to make the count 11 here, so just that one decision is likely to have a six-point swing. Players who played the 2 on the lead card will outpeg the pone 2-0, while players who played the Q will be outpegged 5-1 if they played their 10 to make the count 25.

This hand comes up rather frequently, so making the right decision could be worth six points—a huge difference in a close game.

Muggins at the TOC

With the TOC just around the corner, it is time to review **muggins**. Rule 10 in the ACC's rulebook covers muggins in detail; here are the highlights:

- Pegging out into the game hole (hole 121) is mandatory.
- Muggins applies to the *underpegging* of points during the play or the scoring of hand or crib.
- You cannot take muggins until both players agree on the amount of points.
- You cannot be mugged for omitting or underpegging a penalty.
- You cannot be mugged for omitting or underpegging a muggins score.
- You cannot be mugged for pegging backward.
- The dealer cannot be mugged for failing to peg two points for turning a Jack as a starter card. (Here's why: you can mug someone only *after* they miss the points and *before* you take a cribbage action, but since the dealer has up until the time she/he plays their first card, by this point the pone has already taken a cribbage action—played their first card—and so the missed Jack is "unmuggable.")
- When your opponent misses points (during pegging or scoring), you should say "muggins for X points" and identify the score not pegged or underpegged.
- You must call muggins before making your next cribbage move.
- You can mug someone only for the actual amount of points they could have taken; for example, if they are 10 holes away from winning and take only 8 points but actually have a 12-point hand, they can be mugged for only 2 points since that is the maximum points they could have taken; they cannot be mugged for 4 points, since they cannot have actually pegged all 12 points.


