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President's Column

Strategy and other stuff
I just returned from Sacramento CA. Bob
Bartosh and Alice Souza held the start-of-

the-year tripleheader. My cards were hot and cold all in the same tournaments: I played 66 games and won 33. I was .500 in every tournament, and we all know what that means! I qualified in 0% of the three mains and the two consolations I played. The consolations were ten and eight games so I could keep my average at 50%.

Bad beats—I had a few. In one of the more memorable games, **Kevin Harris** held 8-8-8-9 and we cut a 7, "just enough" but what a great hand. I also gave a few bad beats to others. **Ronnie Murakami** and I held identical hands, costing him ten pegging points and the game. The pegging went 4-4-9-9-2-2 go 6-6.

I tried to play the odds, and it seemed like I just wasn't meant to qualify. In one game, I'm dealing from 15 out and had what looked like a sure win. I deal myself A-A-4-4-5, so throw A-5 to my crib. I turn the starter card; it's an 8. I can almost see the look of disappointment on my face as I write this: no help for the hand but in the crib maybe? Before I turned the crib over, my opponent was quick to tell me they were glad to see the 4s in my hand and that he threw me 4-8. So with my A-5 and cut an 8, I proved that a 5 guarantees two points! I also lost that game.

I traveled with Rick Baird and Bob Brumley, and since I wasn't doing any-

thing during the playoffs, I took it upon myself to coach Rick, mainly because he was in the playoffs. I don't want to pat myself on the back, but *we* did make the main finals, and then when no one was looking **Darlene Stier** plopped down three 16-point hands in a row in game five to win the first main of the weekend. In the second main Rick did as well as I did (7 and 7), and in the consolation he won just one game.

As cribbage goes: 50% can get you in the playoffs. After a 1–7 consolation, all you have to do is average the next main back in. So in the third main, Rick had several of those great wins where on the other side of the board it's a bad beat. He was high qualifier, and as luck would have it he played Darlene in the second round. In game five it looked like Rick would get his payback, but Darlene left him in the dead hole to advance. Rick took it pretty well. I got a great picture of him giving her a congratulatory hug.

Happy pegging!

While this loss is still one of my more memorable ones, I know 350+ players that weekend who would have given anything to take second place in a prestigious tourney.

So rather than focusing on a single loss, it's better to remember that this was one of the most financially profitable tournaments I've ever had. Plus I earned lots of points. More importantly, I spent time playing a game I love with friends from all around the continent.

It may be a month too late to make an official New Year's resolution, but we can always resolve to remember good events, happy happenings, wonderful friends. Let's spend 2024 leaving bad things behind and focusing on good things.

Scott's Peek at the Past

s many of you are preparing to head to Reno NV for the ACC Open and TOC, I felt it would be appropriate to discuss the start of these prestigious events.

Master Rating Points (MRPs) were first awarded during the 1980–81 season. In 1982, the American Cribbage Congress Executive Committee and then the Board of Directors decided to put together an invitation-only event for the top 100 MRP earners from the 1980–81 and 1981–82 seasons. The event would be held at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas and be titled the "Master Point Challenge Invitational." The entry fee was \$100, and the invitation list totaled nearly 150 players.

Unfortunately with the high cost of transportation, lodging, entry, etc. only a few dozen players attended. **Dwight Van Cleve** (Denver CO) was the champion and pocketed \$1,200. The event was renamed the Tournament of Champions, and it was decided to hold the TOC again in November 1983. The second year would also feature an additional event, the Las Vegas Open, with an entry fee of \$31.

Again, the field was small but Leo Schwedrsky (Lyndon Station WI) had one of the greatest weekends ever in the forty-three years of the ACC! Leo qualified #1 in the TOC with 39 game points, then finished #1 in the TOC playoffs, then finished #1 in the Las Vegas Open. A totally dominating weekend!

The ACC's board said "let's try it again," and so the third annual TOC and second Las Vegas Open were held in December 1984. This time the state of Montana ruled the roost as **Gene Miller** (Florence) took the TOC title and Mr. Cribbage himself, **DeLynn Colvert** (Missoula), captured the Open. Still, the turnout was small so the Board of Directors moved the events to Karl's Silver Club in Sparks NV in the Reno area for the first weekend of February 1986. The invitational was still named the TOC, but the Open was renamed the ACC Western Open with an entry fee of \$43.

The tourneys boomed, with the TOC attracting 110 entries and the Western Open 202 players! The next year the TOC and Open were moved to the Sands Regency in Reno, and with the direction of **Syl Lulinski** and **Bob Madsen**, along with the terrific guidance of the wonderful **Barbara Woodward**, the events flourished and the rest is history!

Scott Kooistra has done just about everything in the ACC. He served on the BOD as member, VP, and president. He's been the national MRP champ twice and All American seven times. He's directed tournaments in seven states. And he was the youngest person elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame.

They laughed about it, Pat shuffled the cards, and they did it again: both drew a 6. They had another good laugh, and Howard shuffled. Pat again drew a 6—and so did Howard. Now it's getting crazy. Again Pat shuffled, again Howard cut a 6, as did Pat! They cut eight 6s in a row! On the fifth cut, Pat won the deal with no 6s. When Howard posted this on the club's Facebook page, club member Barbara Erysian (who teaches statistics) added the following comment:

Club 461 (Columbia SC)—Christopher Cook had a 28-hand on January 9. This is the first big hand at a brand new club, directed by Jennifer Curnow. Chris had a perfect card going until the last game, when Jennifer skunked him. Not to worry, he still went home the top winner of the night!



"You were right to be shocked! The probability of drawing two 6s is 3/51 = .059. (This would be the probability of drawing any two matching cards without replacing them. This is 5.9% or ~6%. It happens.) The probability of drawing matching 6s the next time would be 4/52 * 3/51 =.0045. Now, since all the draws are independent, we multiply the probabilities. So the probability of getting 6 & 6, 6 & 6, 6 & 6, 6 & 6 would be:

0.059 * 0.0045 * 0.0045 * 0.0045 =.000000005

The probability that this would happen is about 1/200,000,000! Absolutely astonishing!"



The Inside Track
by Rob Medeiros





One of the more fascinating aspects of cribbage is the fact you can be dealt the same six cards and—depending on board position—the hand can be played at least six different ways, with complete justification for each discard.

You are pone in the first hand of the game and are dealt A-A-2-2-4-5. What to discard? Well A-A-2-2 has the biggest potential score with a 3-cut, but keeping four points to throw a 4-5 to opponent's crib? A-A-4-5 improves with more cuts and should be a better pegging hand, and the 2-2 discard while obviously fraught with peril is not as scary as 4-5.

Let's move the game up a bit: you are pone again and the score is 78-78. What decision do you make with this hand now? In my opinion, A-A-2-2 becomes the optimal play. The dealer is already in good position, so any ultra-defense is likely to be unsuccessful (though with this hand, any discard is potentially dangerous). An eightpoint hand with pegging is still going to leave you shy of fourth street, so it's time to play for the "Hail Mary" 3-cut, which would catapult you to at least hole 94. Even a twelve-point crib with the 4-5 discard would be palatable if you hit your gamble here.

Other times during the game (for example, playing for a skunk) might require the all or nothing A-2 discard.

NIBS or NOBS

Here's a hint from the sequence of play during a game on how to remember which is which. The first time in a deal that the Jack comes into play is when it is the cut card and the dealer takes two points (**Nibs**). The second time is when a player holds a Jack that matches the suit of the starter card and get one point (**Nobs**). The two terms appear in alphabetical order: i comes before o, so the cut Jack is **Nibs**, and holding a Jack that matches the suit of the starter card is **Nobs**.



Ruling Points by Keith Widener

"Cross-checking"

Did you know there is a whole section in the rulebook on scorecards and cross-checking? It is Rule 12 on pages 51–52. There are two pages on properly recording scores on the scorecard and resolving scorecard discrepancies during cross-checking.

Rule 12.1 deals with recording scores on scorecards. One point of this section is that when recording a single-digit point spread there must be a preceding zero. This is to confirm that the spread was less than ten. Another point is that players must use only blue or black ink. That is because judges and cross-checkers use red ink and sometimes other colors are used when ranking the scorecards. You might want to make your scorecard pretty by using green or purple or orange, but please don't.

Rule 12.2 covers how to resolve discrepancies when cross-checking. The first sentence states: Do *not* consult the players to adjudicate scorecard errors.

After that there is a list of how to resolve the problems depending on what they are.

It is very important that you as the player verify that the scores recorded on your scorecard and your opponent's scorecard are correct. When you initial their scorecard, you are certifying that you have checked and that all is correct. When you sign your scorecard and turn it in, you are certifying that your scorecard is correct. Once the cross-checkers get your scorecard that is final. It is not their responsibility to hunt down you or your opponent in order to fix a problem, and they are not supposed to anyway. I have personally seen folks fall from first place due to a scorecard error, and also from qualifying to not qualifying for playoffs. This can be very frustrating, especially when prize money and side pools are involved.

So the moral of this story is to make absolutely sure that you properly certify your results. It doesn't take that much effort. And it will help us all have fun.

There could be many reasons causing you to boot. Here is the simplest, one-time fix that **Jen Curnow**/*JJx7Fan* recommends, which usually shows immediate results.

When you click on the desktop smart launcher to open it, but before actually going into the site, stop and look at your choices. You will see three options: Launch eCrib 1, Launch eCrib 2, and settings. Click on the settings box and change 512 to 1024, then click save. This increases the amount of memory on your computer available to eCribbage.

Many of you have figured out that there is a booting prevention possibility that can help by exiting the site and returning. It is okay to reset your computer this way only if your next opponent is still playing and not on fourth street yet. It gives you

the time to exit, come back quickly, and set a new table before they are ready to play. You are not put on a timer if there is no opponent for you to play, even if you told the TD you're resetting. Once a new table is set, the missing opponent goes on the timer. Many of you have also figured out that the likelihood of booting happens midway into the tournament.



- ¶ I was busy getting off to a fast start, dropping my first six. I even had a 24hand and still lost! After tossing Smoothy Selke under the bus for missing points, I must in fairness confess to also missing points—twice during my first game. And while playing the pegging machine, Jimmy McCarty, I called and took 16. Jimmy says: "How do you get 16?" I backed up 8 and he took 8. Not to fear, I still won by 9 and took home his \$1. While I'm busy screwing up, my proofreader, ghost writer, travel planner, and (most important) girlfriend, Jane Vander Loop, → was busy qualifying. Her 28-hand didn't hurt. Muggins at the TOC

With the TOC just around the corner, it is time to review **muggins**. Rule 10 in the ACC's rulebook covers muggins in detail; here are the highlights:

- Pegging out into the game hole (hole 121) is mandatory.
- Muggins applies to the *underpegging* of points during the play or the scoring of hand or crib.
- You cannot take muggins until both players agree on the amount of points.
- You cannot be mugged for omitting or underpegging a penalty.
- You cannot be mugged for omitting or underpegging a muggins score.
- · You cannot be mugged for pegging backward.
- The dealer cannot be mugged for failing to peg two points for turning a Jack as a starter card. (Here's why: you can mug someone only *after* they miss the points and *before* you take a cribbage action, but since the dealer has up until the time she/he plays their first card, by this point the pone has already taken a cribbage action—played their first card—and so the missed Jack is "unmuggable.")
- When your opponent misses points (during pegging or scoring), you should say "muggins for X points" and identify the score not pegged or underpegged.
- You must call muggins before making your next cribbage move.
- You can mug someone only for the actual amount of points they could have taken; for example, if they are 10 holes away from winning and take only 8 points but actually have a 12-point hand, they can be mugged for only 2 points since that is the maximum points they could have taken; they cannot be mugged for 4 points, since they cannot have actually pegged all 12 points.

Brothers David and Paul O'Brien, both of Schenectady NY, play cribbage at least once a week, and have been doing so for over sixty years. Neither of them has ever had a 29-hand, but here's a rarity. Paul recently dealt a six-card straight flush to David, who was so excited he showed it to Paul immediately! David discarded A-6 to Paul's crib. What would you discard?

My father taught me how to play cribbage years ago. I joined the ACC in the summer of 1996 after seeing an article about Richard "Rit"

Roger J. Bouchard (Glastonbury CT) Life Master (*) #130 Alkas being the ACC's player of the year. Rit later became my cribbage mentor. I've been club champion a couple times, and my first tournament win was in Hudson WI in Septem-

ber 2000. I've now won eighteen tourneys. My favorite tournament is the National Open in Raleigh NC. My toughest opponent lately is Paul Batterson. My favorite cribbage moment this year was getting a grand slam at Club 26 on January 8. I enjoy ocean cruising, reading, and cribbage. In 1999 John Chambers started an in-house cribbage club that lasted two years. After it ended, some of us liked the idea so

much that we formed our own group. Starting each September, fifteen players now gather every Thursday to play nine or ten games. Records are kept and a playoff-based system is held in June to determine a winner.



This board was made about fifteen years ago by ACC member George Hicks of Sparks NV. The board is made from Reno area casino dice. I featured this board last year and am using it again to encourage our members to attend the TOC and JPW Open in Reno on March 1-3. This is my favorite tournament and one of the few I have attended multiple times.



Because I don't attend many tournaments, I will never get my Master rating and see my cribbage history printed in Cribbage World. So I might as well do it myself! Here it is in my own words.

My father taught me to play cribbage in 1952 when I was seven. I have played ever since. My father passed in 1981 and I inherited his board. That started my cribbage board collection, which is now just short of five hundred boards. One of my friends signed me up with the ACC and I started getting Cribbage World. I joined Sea-Tac Peggers Club 148 around 2000. My cribbage mentor, the late Roger Lueschow, convinced me to attend a few tournaments. It took a while but I finally won one. I have two second place finishes that I am prouder of than my win. Those were to DeLynn and Ras. In 2008, Cribbage World editor David Aiken recruited me to write the monthly column "Cribbage Board of the Month." At this point there have been about 175 columns. My wife, Lois, and I have run a cribbage club

at the West Seattle Senior Center for the last ten years, with the help of ACC member Frankie Cline. Finally, my favorite cribbage memory of the past year was getting a grand slam last April with the Sea-Tac Peggers. That is my seventy-one

years of cribbage history.

Teaching Tip

When counting points, one of the most common oversights a new player experiences is missing nobs and nibs (heels). When I am teaching a new group of kids and on the first day they play independently, I put out a raffle jar. Whenever a student successfully identifies nobs or heels, they put a ticket in the jar. At the end of the class period, I raffle off prizes like decks of cards, custom pegs, or candy bars. This quickly establishes the habit of keeping an eye out for the Jack. On the last day, I raffle off prizes with the remaining tickets to end on a high note with the kids.
