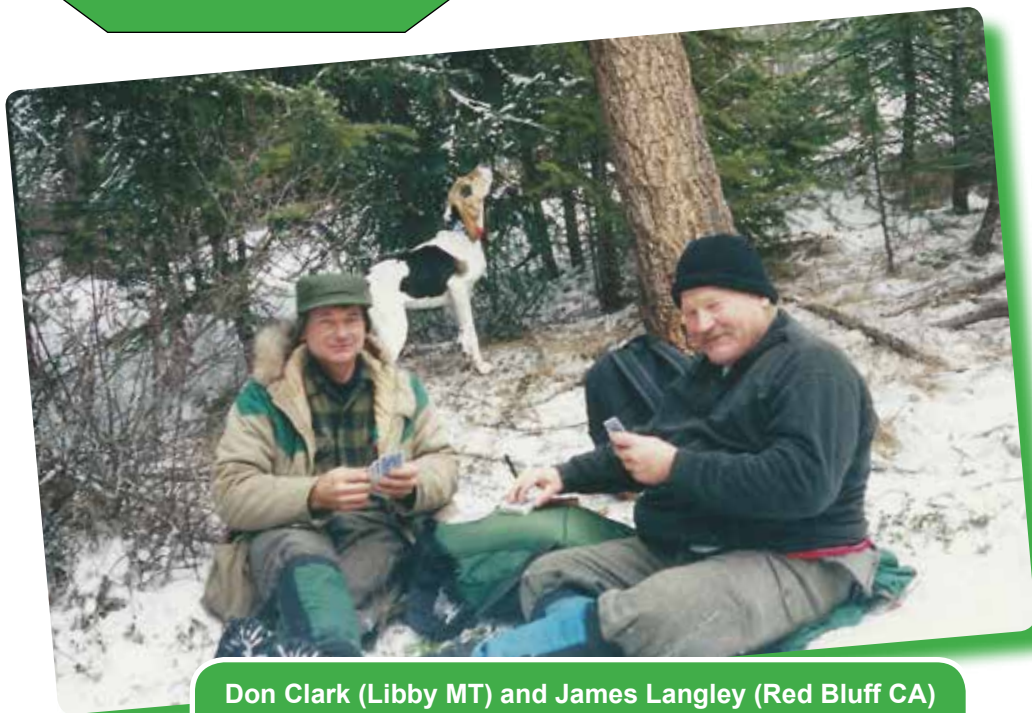

My Deal

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

The term *bucket list* entered common parlance in 2007 with the film *The Bucket List*, a movie about two terminally ill men (played by Jack Nicholson and Morgan Freeman) who set off on an adventure to fulfill their wish list before kicking the bucket.

What's on your list?

Many of us have created personal bucket lists of things we'd like to do, read, see, eat, or experience before we "shuffle off this immortal coil," to quote Shakespeare. (My list includes visiting Banff National Park in Alberta and the Galápagos Islands in the Pacific Ocean and reading the series of Lanny Budd novels that **Warren Sandericker** gave me before he died.)

Every cribbage player needs a "cribbage bucket list," and so here are the things that all of us can dream about.

Of course, the #1 item on any list—the *crème-de-la-crème* of cribbage—is this:

hold a 29-hand

My New Year's wish is that every player who has never had a 29-hand gets one in

2019. But what else can we find on the cribbage bucket list? How about these:

- hold a 28-hand
- score a grand slam at club
- win a weekend tourney
- play in the TOC in Reno
- win a playoff match after being down 0–2
- win your club championship
- earn your Bronze Award
- earn your Master rating

All of these are easily within the grasp of every ACC member. Items on an "advanced cribbage bucket list" may be more challenging—but doable nonetheless:

- play in the national All Star Tournament
- win Grand National
- win National Open
- win JPW/ACC Open
- win Tournament of Champions
- make the All American team
- win your regional championship

Regardless of how many items you've already checked off or how many are still a dream—we've gotta have dreams!—I hope that Christmas, New Year's, and birthday all roll into one and give you the best cribbage year ever! **CW**

CANADIAN DOUBLES RULES

With the growing popularity of Canadian Doubles, it is time to formulate a set of rules to govern this satellite event. Here are the rules created by David Aiken, Mary Burlington and David Statz, and Laurie and Ron Logan for the CD tourneys they direct.

1. The ACC rulebook is in effect throughout.
2. The playing boards should be oriented the same way throughout the room; when a new team comes to a board, they may **not** change the orientation of the playing board.
3. The first dealer of each game is determined by a four-way cut for deal. All four players **must** show the card they picked. The deal rotates to the left for each subsequent deal.
4. The player to the dealer's right cuts the cards *before* the deal, and the player to the dealer's left cuts the cards *after* the deal to determine the starter card.
5. Cards are dealt alternatively to the player to the dealer's left and to the dealer until both players have ten cards.
6. The hand-setter creates a hand of four cards for the hand-setter and a hand of four cards for his/her partner, with two cards left over to discard to the crib.
7. If the hand-setter accidentally throws the wrong hand to his/her partner, the hand-setter may retrieve and exchange the cards **only** if the partner has not looked them. The setter may **not** reconfigure the cards in the two hands at that time but simply exchange them.
8. The winning team of the first game sits at that board all night; the losing team of the first game moves all night. (Note: unless one player needs to remain stationary because of limited mobility.)

{Jeff's words} I've been playing cribbage since college and been playing ACC tournaments since 1982. My first tournament was the one that remains my favorite: National Open in Raleigh NC. I never really had a mentor; you could say Larry Phifer and I have co-mentored each other. I learned some from books, notably DeLynn's, and most of the rest I figured out on my own. I play in Club 58 in Raleigh, ably directed by Catherine Perkins. I have been club champion three times, with a couple runner-up finishes. This is a club with two golds, eight silvers, and five bronzes among the thirty-two members who have played this season, so it's not an easy club to win. Believe it or not, I don't remember my first win. I have won fifteen sanctioned tournaments,

most recently the Grand National midweek consy in Milwaukee. That was my first win in over three years, one of my two cribbage high points for the year. We Should Teach All Girls to Play Poker

What this article says about poker applies equally to cribbage. First, read the article for its own sake. Then reread it, but this time substitute the word “cribbage” for “poker.”

In a 1985 *Ms.* magazine article headlined “Deal Me In: Why Women Should Play Poker,” feminist psychologist Mary Parlee dissected the gender gap in the quintessential American card game of poker. “Risking valued property, bluffing, challenging, strategically retreating from no-win situations, winning at the expense of others—these are the heart of poker,” she wrote. “Is it any wonder most women don’t play poker?”

Parlee, who died in June, might be disappointed to learn that, 33 years after her article, women still aren’t flocking to poker tables. Just two months ago, the World Poker Tour, a preeminent organization promoting the game, hosted a summit of female players at the Bicycle Casino in Bell Gardens to discuss how to attract more women to card tables and tournaments.

Despite an explosion of interest in the game—due in large part to televised tournaments that allow viewers to see who is holding what cards—participation by

women is still low. Seedy, smoke-filled card clubs have been replaced by shiny, glamorous, smoke-free poker rooms, but it’s still a mostly male arena. Poker is littered with aggressive or masculine terms such as “firing at the pot,” “flopping the nuts,” “I fired a bullet,” “folded a pair of bitches (queens),” and others. At the end of tournaments, erotically dressed women carry out the cash and dump it on the table, bending over oh-so-slightly to suggest they could be part of the prize.

Personally, as a kid I learned to count from the numbers on playing cards, and by my teens joined in penny-ante poker games with my parents and their friends. But even I never stepped inside a real card club until I was in my 50s. Today, I rarely see more than a handful of women when I play. Clearly some women still find sitting at the poker table akin to socializing in a men’s locker room.

Men do not give up their dominance of poker easily. When I served on the City

Council in Long Beach, I learned there was a monthly poker game at which the mayor, president of the Chamber of Commerce, the publisher of a local paper and other men played. I asked if I could join. Ignored, I asked again and was told, "It's a man's game with cigars."

Although there are ladies-only professional poker tournaments, men have protested and crashed the tournaments, signing up to play themselves. At one popular women's tournament in 2010, a male player came in drag. Another man brought a tampon which he displayed at the table as a "card protector" during the tournament.

At the women's poker summit in Bell Gardens, a major question was how to introduce women to various card games in the first place. Poker players do not tolerate questions about the rules from newbies. Yes, card clubs could offer classes. Playing online at a free poker website

is another way to learn, though with a big shortcoming: you don't learn how to read the other players—which is probably the most important skill in the game.

Poker is a game of skill, not luck. Many winning hands are nothing but a bluff by a player who has learned how to read the other players and who has the confidence to mask the weakness of her own cards.

As Parlee reminded women in 1985, poker works a lot like life in general, especially when it comes to relationships. Recognizing a no-win situation in cards (or in a relationship) and getting out of it by folding a hand (or leaving) is also a critical skill.

With the caveat that poker can cause gambling problems, I think all girls should be taught to play poker—not because they need to enter high-cash tournaments, but because the game is a way to practice taking risks, size up your own strengths, manage money (chips) and know when to call out others on their bluffs.

Dads who know poker should engage their daughters and teach them the rules and strategies for winning. If done correctly, the Girl Scouts could offer senior scouts a badge in "life lessons from poker." Girls who complete the badge could be eligible to play (for fun) in a Girl Scout tournament. Who knows? They might even invite the boys.

No matter the venue, it's time to deal girls in.

Cribbage Board of the Month

Last September I attended the ACC's Grand National in Milwaukee. While there, *Cribbage World*

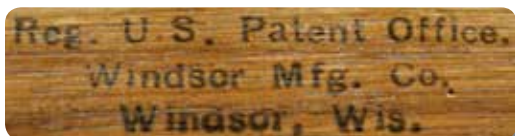
only after I assured him that I would document and preserve the board's history. This column is part of keeping my promise.

This rare board was made by the Windsor Manufacturing Co. of Windsor WI, which was in business only from 1945 to 1948. The story of this board appears on page 131 of Bette Bemis's book *Cribbage Boards, 1863–1998*. Bette was the founder of the Cribbage Board Collectors Society.

Ray Walker, and Earl Lindley. The men met while they were serving in the armed forces during WWII, and they formed the business after the war ended. The business closed in 1948, after 3 years of operation."

This board was known as a "fool-proof" hedgehog-style board. Bette had no photo of this board, and that is why I was very excited to acquire the board and add to the history of its short life among American manufactured

cribbage boards. Thanks, Dave and Don, for helping this happen. **CW**

Job Opening—Grass Roots Commissioner

The ACC has an important position to fill: Grass Roots Commissioner. The commissioner is in charge of the entire Grass Roots program—approximately 4,300 members and 200 clubs. The commissioner is basically running a small business as an arm of the ACC. She/he reports to the ACC's VP of Competition and works closely with many people in the ACC and Grass Roots organizations: BOD and ACC officers, statisticians, club directors, treasurer, membership secretary, and programmers.

The ideal candidate will have the following skill set:

- computer literacy (email, Word, Excel)
- financial literacy
- written and verbal communication skills
- people-handling skills (compassionate yet firm)

Among other tasks, the Grass Roots Commissioner will . . .

- report to the ACC on a monthly basis and at the BOD meetings twice a year
- receive Grass Roots dues from regional statisticians
- receive GRRT and GRNT entry fees from commissioners
- make weekly deposits
- help new clubs become established
- update and maintain the Grass Roots Policy Manual
- maintain a database of awards earned
- schedule two meetings for Grass Roots members each year in conjunction with Grand National and ACC Open
- deal with ethics violations

The amount of time for these tasks varies, depending on the time of the year, but an average of fifteen hours per week may be expected. A monthly stipend is available.

The official starting date is August 1, 2019, but the successful candidate will begin working with the current commissioner as soon as they are appointed.

Youth Teaching Tip

Here's a great tip for tournament players young and old. When you sit down in your seat, notice the player to the left of you. Is he or she using their own pegs or the generic pegs from the board? If they are using pegs from the board (and you are using your own custom pegs), be sure and put the generic pegs in the start holes of the board when your game is over. Then, please stack the deck of cards neatly on top of the board before you rotate to the next seat. These are common courtesies I teach my students as they prepare for tournament play. Wouldn't it be nice to see more veteran players do the same?

The Inside Track

by Rob Medeiros



Sometimes in cribbage—just like in real life—things that appear to be too easy or too good to be true often are not.

You are dealing from 10 out, while your opponent has first count needing 19. You are dealt 7-8-J-Q-K-K. Wow, what a no brainer—right? In this situation you are probably thinking, “How can I possibly lose this game?” If you keep the double run of face cards and discard 7-8, you are guaranteed to go out—if you can survive your opponent’s first count.

I would hold 7-8-K-K in this situation. When I weigh the odds of somehow losing this game, I feel getting caught in a crossfire of all picture cards is a more likely road to defeat than if I hold four points and discard Jack-Queen. I want the flexibility that 7-8 affords to get away from any potential pegging traps.

For instance, if your opponent has 2-2-3-4 and cuts a little card for the double-double run, holding the picture cards gives up four pegging points no matter what. The option to play off by holding 7-8-K-K outweighs the guaranteed points you would be keeping. Plus you would have to be pretty unlucky for the cut to not help at all or for you to not peg more than a couple. So always think twice at the end of games even if it looks like a no brainer.

ACC Cribbage Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses.

After the trial period is up . . .

- We pledge to continue to make all players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

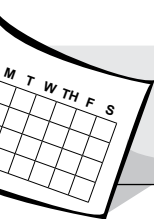

In addition, any of the thirteen combos with a Jack could be odd if nobs is present—including the biggie: 5-J with nobs for 29 points! All other combinations with 5-5-5 yield an even number of points.
