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

Do you dream about cribbage?

They say that you don't truly know another language until you start dreaming in it. I don't know that I'm fluent in cribbage, but I do dream about it.

Sometimes it's a normal cribbage activity like playing a game with a friend or traveling to a tournament. But sometimes it involves struggle, like counting my hand or repeatedly counting the cards in the deck before a game starts to make sure there are fifty-two of them—and getting a different number each time!—or futilely cross-checking scorecards.

After I started directing tournaments in 2005, in the week preceding the tournament, I would frequently have a recurring dream, usually for several nights on end.

In my dream, I was late for playoffs on Sunday morning. This wasn't a simple case of not getting to the playing room in time to get the playoffs started. Rather, I was late for *my* playoff match!

Sometimes I would forfeit a game, sometimes I missed the entire match and lost the chance to play in the next round.

In my dream, I was always puzzled that no one—no one!—ever came and told me my match was starting. Need I remind you that I was the tournament director? What, they couldn't find me? Or didn't have the chutzpah to say, "Get your butt in the seat"? I've probably forfeited more playoff games in my dreams than I have actually played!

I'm happy that I seldom have this dream anymore. I'd like to think that this is because directing has become less stressful over the years and so I don't fret about it as much as I used to.

But maybe, just maybe, I don't have this dream because there is little likelihood that I will qualify for the playoffs. And why worry about something that isn't gonna happen?! CW

Cribbage Quiz Answer

Both players were dealt three pairs: they both held 2-2-4-4 and both threw 6-6 into the crib. The 3 cut gives each player 18 points, and the crib yields 24 points. The pegging goes like this (the 2s and 4s could be played in either sequence):

pone	4		4 (for 6)		2		2 (for 6)	
dealer		4 (for 2)		4 (for 12)		2 (for 2)		2 (for 13)

Note: this same scenario could also have played out if the crib held 3-3-3-9, but it is unlikely that either player—let alone both of them—threw 3s away from 2-2-4-4.

The Inside Track

A common debate I have with many of my cribbage friends is the merits of the 2-3 discard versus the 7-8 discard to your own crib. Obviously these are two of the most attractive throws to your crib.

Let's say it is the first hand of the game and you deal yourself 2-3-5-7-8-K; what do you discard? My instinct is to favor the 7-8 discard. The 2-3 might score more 6-point and 10-point hands, but the 7-8 yields more 12s and 16s, and the occasional 20 or 24. As dealer of the first hand I would rather go for the Big Bang rather than the steady consistency that the 2-3 discard brings.

Many of you will probably disagree. Please feel free to email me and let me know your rationale. You might even sway me over to the 2-3 camp! The relative pegging value of each hand is pretty close, although I think that 2-3-5-K pegs slightly better.

I'll be waiting for those responses!

Cribbage Solitaire

We all know that the more you practice playing cribbage, the easier it becomes to recognize 15s, runs, and flushes. This leads to quicker play and a deeper understanding of the intricate strategies of the game. Many young students of the game who are taught in a school or club setting do not have anyone at home to play with to improve their game. Providing them with a fun solitaire game gives them the outlet to practice as often as they wish. Here is the game I recommend.


Lay five cards face up in a row, and toss a sixth card face down into the crib. Then turn another card and place it with one of the up cards to begin to form a cribbage hand. Keep turning up one card at a time until each of the first five cards has a second card with it; you *cannot* put a third card in a hand until all the others have two. After you have completed the second



round of laying cards out, place another card face down into the crib. Continue doing this until you have five hands of four cards each and four cards in the crib. Then cut the deck and turn over the starter card to use as the fifth card in each of your hands. (The photo shows a sample deal.) Use a cribbage board to tally the points in each hand and the crib. Shuffle the deck and cycle through this procedure three times. If you reach hole 121 by the end of the third deal, you win!

If you find hole 121 to be too easy in three deals, for an additional challenge you can set the goal higher, 132 or 144 points.

The 19-Button

When fortune deals you a zero-point hand or crib, relieve your frustration with a press of the button on this fun little device.

Cribbage enjoys many charming traditions. One perhaps wee-bit less delightful is a nineteen-point hand. As we all know, no hand or crib can score 19. But without a peg to move, what's a player to do?

My weekly cribbage group thoroughly enjoys this little addition to each table—a small talking box. When the button is pressed, it makes a suitable sound for the deadly 19-hand. The whole group giggles when they hear the sound, knowing that an opponent as fallen into "the pit."

The unit is a 3D printed shell, with a big 19 on top, made on my 3D printer. It encloses an inexpensive recordable talking box (normally used to add voice to a stuffed animal), available from amazon.

com (search for "bear mill recordable sound module").

3D printers are becoming commonplace with DIY hobbyists these days. You can likely find a friend who owns a 3D printer, and a growing number of UPS stores have 3D printers at minimal cost. The 3D printer files may be downloaded for free at

w6nbc.com/cribbage. There are two files: the shell and the number 19. Glue the two pieces together, and the voice box simply slips into the shell.

You can record any sound you like by playing a sound file on your computer and holding the talking unit in front of the computer's speaker. Or you can record your own voice saying something appropriate, but be kind! A quick internet search for free sound files found three that fit the occasion: a turkey gobbling, a police siren, and a fire alarm.

Cribbage is a wonderfully social activity. These little boxes have added pleasure to my cribbage playing, and I hope it will at your club as well.

Youth Teaching Tip



That is now a 1990 article in the New York Times begins. The article describes the mathematical proof for this statement, performed by David Bayer, professor of mathematics at Columbia University. Saying that the deck is completely mixed after seven shuffles means that any card is as likely to be in one place as in another. This has obvious implications for cribbage.

Written by Gina Kolata and published on January 9, 1990, the article is entitled "In Shuffling Cards, 7 Is Winning Number." With the advent of online archives in 1996, the article was digitized and is now available on the web. To read the complete article, go to **newyorktimes.com** and type "shuffling cards" in the search box.

For a complementary viewpoint, Persi Diaconis, Stanford Professor of Mathematics and Statistics, demonstrates that washing the deck for one minute is as effective in randomizing a deck as riffling seven times. vory cribbage boards, are they treasures or trouble? Both boards pictured here are ivory. The top is elephant ivory and the other is walrus ivory. Both are works of art. Owning these boards is legal; however, selling them may not be legal and is getting very difficult to do.



In 1973 the United States passed the Endan-

gered Species Act banning the import of most ivory. Walrus ivory was legal if it was carved and signed by a native Alaskan artist. Also ivory pieces acquired prior to 1973 are legal to own.

Selling ivory is another issue. Recently, some states have adopted more comprehensive laws that further restrict ivory sales. Those states are California, Hawaii, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, and Washington. If you plan on selling or buying ivory, you definitely need to check federal and state laws.

Selling ivory items on eBay has been banned since 2007. Some sellers try to get around that by listing their items as faux ivory or bone. Websites are currently clamping down on that practice. The largest English antique website, rubylane.com, has also stopped listing ivory items. Estate sales companies have to be very careful to comply with state and national laws.

So, how will I get rid of my ivory boards when the time comes? I hope my nephews will be interested in some of them. It is legal to donate them, but sometimes difficult to find takers.

Bottom line—they are both treasures and trouble. CW

Never Give Up!

2010 Medford OR consolation. I'm sitting on 11/5 with one game to go. An 11 seldom makes the playoffs, so I pretty much have to win the ninth game. Fourth street, and I'm dealing 26 out, and the pone (a woman I've never seen before or since) is four holes out. Hopeless, but I have to deal.

I deal myself 5-7-J-Q-K-K. Ordinarily, with this hand the 5-7 goes into my crib without much thought. However, I thought that keeping the nickel might give me a little more flexibility in the unlikely event that flexibility even came into play. After discarding, the pone cut a Jack, and I'm now 24 out.

I detected a little grimace at the cut and decided to play as carefully as possible. She led a Queen, if I hadn't kept the 5 I would have probably paired the Queen to stay out of a run. In that situation though if she had a 5 she was out with at least four points. I played the 5; now 22 out. She played another Queen and I said

"go"; she disgustedly laid down A-2 for one point. I played my J-Q-K for a run of three and a go for four; now 18 out. She took her pair, which put her in the dead hole. I counted my 16-point hand; now 2 out. I flopped the crib, her King plus my King = two points. I win the game, qualify, and win the tournament.

If she kept the King she would've cut into an eight-point double run but rather than playing it that way she opted to keep A-2-Q-Q and discarded the King, thinking that she could peg two points with that combination. I can't fault her logic because if I hadn't played the 5 and/or if I'd held a second card with a value of 5 or less she makes a minimum of two points. Fortunately for me the cards fell perfectly, allowing me to luck out and beat her. About 95% luck, but once every decade or so miracles happen.
