


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President's Column

New ACC Record! Setting records is always fun. Sometimes records can happen in the blink of an eye: back-to-back 29-hands,

playing a nine-game consolation, or Grass Roots only takes a couple hours. Other times records are a war of attrition: a season of 36 weeks for Grass Roots, 52 weeks for weekend play, 150 tournaments for online play. For those record-setting seasons you must be committed, show up every week, spend some time, and score some qualifying points. Some records last for years, others are broken within weeks or a season later.

According to Guinness World Records, in order to be a world record it must fulfill all of the following criteria. They must be:

- Measurable—Can it be measured objectively? What is the unit of measurement? We do not accept applications based on subjective variables. For example, beauty, kindness, loyalty. (Dang, I applied for all of these and was rejected!)
- **Breakable**—Can the record be broken? Record titles must be open to being challenged.
- **Standardizable**—Can the record be repeated by someone else? Is it possible to create a set of parameters and conditions that all challengers can follow?
- **Verifiable**—Can the claim be proven? Will there be accurate evidence available to prove it occurred?
- **Based on one variable**—Is the record based on one superlative and measured in one unit of measurement?
- The best in the world—Has anyone else done better? If your record suggestion is new, then Guinness World Records will set a challenging minimum requirement for you to beat.

Sounds easy enough, right?

I don't think **David Aiken** was planning on setting a world record when he started as *Cribbage World* editor in January 2007. He has steadily been working toward a record of his own, seventeen years in the making. Dave has published a record 203 issues.

Dave's first *Cribbage World*, volume 28.1 (January 2007), was the start of several new columns: "My Deal," "a retrospective glance" (25 years ago), and the "Cribbage Quiz." He changed the font to give it a cleaner look and added pictures and graphics to give it a more personable feel. Volume 38.10 (October 2017) featured on the front page the 2017 Grand National champions in a color picture. And

with volume 39.1 (January 2018), the entire issue was in full color.


With the current magazine, volume 45.1 in January 2024, Dave has published 203 issues. Does David's reign as *Cribbage World* editor pass the Guinness test?

It looks like a certified new Guinness World Record to the president of the ACC! But if they don't recognize his achievements, then certainly Cribbage World Records acknowledges this great accomplishment. Congratulations, David, and here's to the next 203 issues!

My New Year wish to all the ACC members: May you break many records and set personal bests. Happy New Year to you all. What record will you set in 2024?








Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

The game of cribbage can be imposed on a two-dimensional grid, with the X axis representing how good our cards are, and the Y axis showing how well we play.



The blue equator separates good play from bad play, and the red prime meridian separates good cards from bad cards.

In an ideal world, we always inhabit the northwest quadrant of this grid, demonstrating good play and having good cards on every deal. Even if we don't have good cards, we still need to play well (northeast quadrant).

The problem comes when we sink south of the equator and begin playing

poorly. Even with good cards and bad play (southwest quadrant), we'll manage to win some games. But combining bad cards and bad play (southeast quadrant) is a recipe for disaster.

Although knowledge does not guarantee good play, ignorance is a virtual guarantee of bad play. In fact, bad play is so much easier when players know nothing (or nothing complicated) about cribbage. And at least one element of the unholy trinity of cribbage errors—bad discard, bad play, bad counting—will be evident on almost every deal when we don't bother to increase our knowledge of the game.

It is incumbent on everyone who shuffles a deck of cards to try to improve. I mean, why wouldn't you want to get better? Granted, there is a very thin edge of expert execution that only the elite players seems to achieve, but improving your game even just a little will lead to more enjoyment, as you start to recognize pro plays, count your hands with greater confidence, learn some of the probabilities, pick up on opponents' tendencies, and

No one lives in the "good play + good cards" quadrant all the time, so this column is mainly an encouragement to all of us to play smart at all times, regardless of how bad our cards are.

NIBS or NOBS?

Here's a hint from the sequence of play during a game on how to remember which is which. The first time in a deal that the Jack comes into play is when it is the cut card and the dealer takes two points (Nibs). The second time is when a player holds a Jack that matches the suit of the starter card and get one point (Nobs). The two terms appear in alphabetical order: I comes before O, so the cut Jack is Nibs, and holding a Jack that matches the suit of the starter card is Nibs.



Ruling Points by Keith Widener

"The cards read"

Last month I attended the Veteran's Day tournament at the J Resort in Reno. I've said it before and I'll say it again: Jacob's Entertainment has removed the Sands Regency from the building. While the cost of staying there has increased, so has the quality of the venue. You get what you pay for.

A very interesting judging situation occurred when Carol Williams was playing Kathy Pacocha. During the pegging, Carol announced the count as 15 and took two pegs. Kathy looked and noticed that the count was 14 not 15—but, not only that, Carol had missed a run of three. Kathy corrected the count to 14 but wasn't sure what to do so she called for a judge. Carol admitted that she missed the run of three. Several judges got involved, including senior judges. A lot of opinions were expressed, but there is only one correct ruling. Can you figure it out?

Rule 7.4b states: If a player's incorrect count announcement is not corrected voluntarily but is challenged by the opponent before the opponent

plays the next card or calls "go," then the count shall be corrected. Also, if the offending player pegged points that would not have been earned with the correct count, the player is considered to have overpegged.

The correct count is 14 and there is a run of three to be taken by Carol, so she did earn points even though she didn't see them. What matters is what she actually did – not what she said. Since she pegged two points she gets to keep them but cannot correct the score to three points (see rule 8.3). There is no overpegging foul, therefore Kathy does not get to take any points. Since this was not a muggins tournament, Kathy cannot take the one point that Carol missed.

But wait! Carol didn't see the run of three! **Sally Henderson**, our ACC judge testing examiner, will quickly tell you "cards read." It doesn't matter in this case that Carol didn't see the run. Carol got lucky—or did she? She missed out on one point.

Remember, as always, let's have fun!


Does the ACC now condone cheating? In the 1980s when the ACC was young, there was a lot of this kind of cheating, which is why the Ethics Committee was founded. Doesn't the ACC owe its members protection from these people and consistent punishment for the offenders?

Why would you allow people that you clearly know cheat, come back and play at all? The impression it gives to the community as a whole is that cheaters are allowed to keep cheating, they will still take advantage of new players, steal money from rightful winners because they cheated their way to the playoffs, and in my opinion, dishonor the entire community. To keep new players and old players and to keep the game fair and respectable, I say we keep the cheaters from ever playing again.

Response to Ethics Letters

This is in response to a letter written to Cribbage World by Bill Cooper.

Bill has a very strong opinion about cheaters. To be fair, he is not alone. We have received a few other opinions similar to Bill's. And he is right . . . to an extent.

Back in the early days of the ACC there were some individuals who used different forms of cheating, and they got away with it because we didn't have a good process established to deal with it. Article X of the ACC Constitution and Bylaws established an Ethics Committee and gave the authority to that committee to suspend or expel individuals based on violations of ethical standards, including cheating. In order to expel an individual, sworn affidavits from at least two members have to be made. Copies of those affidavits have to be provided to the accused, and they are allowed thirty days to respond and present a defense. In order for a person to be expelled, the full Board of Directors has to vote in a closed session. Ultimately, some high profile individuals were expelled.

It has never been mandatory to expel someone for any violation. It is the job of the Ethics Committee to receive and investigate complaints and to assess warnings, suspensions, and expulsions based on the severity of the violations and the amount of evidence received. And if you are going to expel someone, you better have your ducks in a row, and you better have enough evidence. You are not only making a serious allegation against an individual, you are potentially putting the ACC at risk for a lawsuit.

Recently the BOD voted to amend the ACC Constitution to allow for the publication of the reason someone was suspended instead of just publishing the fact that they were suspended. For the individuals who were suspended for a form of cheating, we failed to use the word "alleged" in the description. For that we apologize. We will be correcting that in the future.

Nobody but the Ethics Committee is privy to all of the evidence or the entire situation. You cannot look at just one side and make a proper judgment. Regardless of the hardline espoused by some members, we have to have solid evidence. Even murders cannot be prosecuted without hard evidence. Using a suspension where there

isn't enough hard evidence for expulsion establishes a history that can be used in future situations.

Bill's letter reminds me of the Queen of Hearts in Alice's *Adventures in Wonderland*, who constantly said "off with their head" regardless of what anyone did wrong. I am really glad that the DMV doesn't automatically revoke your driver's license when you exceed the speed limit, else not too many of us would be able to legally ride our motorcycles.

19-Hands

iven all the ways there are to score points in cribbage—pairs, 15-2s, runs, flushes—it sometimes boggles the mind that you can pick up six cards and not see a single point.

But just how many blank hands are there? Ignoring suit, only 220 combinations of five cards yield a 19-hand. Given that there are 6,175 total numerical combinations of five cards (again ignoring suit), that's not bad: you will get a blank hand only 3.56% of the time—right?!

As far as CW can tell, William H. Green's Key to Cribbage (1882) was the first book to enumerate all 220 blank hands. The original printing of this book is impossible to find, but it is available in a reprint edition. (The list was also included in its entirety as an appendix in ACC founder Joseph Petrus Wergin's How to Win at Cribbage).

Here's an interesting factoid: all blank hands contain at least one card with a value of 10. Therefore, if you hold four cards all lower than 10 and the starter is also lower than 10, you will have at least two points.

Which card appears most frequently in § these 220 blank hands? The King is king of the blank hand, with 129 appearances, followed by these lesser cards:

Since every cloud must by law have a silver lining, what can be the possible benefit in a 19-hand? During the pegging, your opponent will have absolutely no idea what cards you are holding!

Scott's Peek at the Past

y first cribbage tournament experience was playing in the 1979 National Open in Raleigh NC as a nineteen-year-old college sophomore, and then two months later I played the M&M Open in Marinette WI in September 1979. I remember meeting Joe Wergin and giving him my two one-dollar bills for an ACC membership. He scribbled me a note that said I was the 158th person to join the American Cribbage Congress.

The first ACC member was **Charles Messina** of Lynn MA.* Messina mailed in his two dollars to Wergin and was quoted in the first *Cribbage World* magazine suggesting that CW should include stories about unique cribbage boards, hands and situations during games, and playing tips from the experts. I would say Charles was right on!

Another quote sent to Wergin in ear-

ly 1980 that he published was from an eventual ACC Hall of Famer Ron Logan (Quincy CA), who said: "I like your style. Keep it up."

The first *Cribbage World* magazine was mailed out in March 1980. The first two CWs were mailed free of charge to members and interested readers.

A personal note: I have had some major health and financial challenges lately but am feeling a little better now. So I proposed an idea to Cribbage World editor David Aiken about a monthly column highlighting the early years of the American Cribbage Congress. He said yes, so here's my first column: "Scott's Peek at the Past."

This list yields some interesting factoids. First: no face cards or the Deuce are involved in any hand that makes 24 points, so if you hold or

cut one of these cards, you automatically know that you can't score 24 points. Second: the Ace makes 24 points only one way (with four 7s). Third: the 6 shows up in five of the nine 24-point hands, so it is a key card. Here is the frequency of every card:

Jerry skunked Jane by 35 to be the last qualifier by one spread point. Now to see if the replacement pegs work!

me why I didn't take them all, as I had missed a run of five. I countered: "If you don't need them, don't take them." So now Jim joins my growing list: 1 from Jim, 2 from Poole, 3 from Baird, and 5 from Kai.



¶ The inventor of the Hawaiian Stir Fry ♠ and our chauffer, Ronnie Murakami, was on top of his game in the consy. In the playoffs, he polished off his opponents

and faced **Margaret Fanucchi** in the finals. He was still cooking, as he swept her for the win. It was almost a clean sweep, dropping only one game in his first match.

- ¶ During the consy, I am playing Bill Eilers. I hold three 9s and the case 9 is cut. After playing two of my 9s, I play my 2 for a go. Bill leads a 6 at me and I fifteen it. I tease him: "You should of known I had the case 9!"
- ¶ The fastest game of my life happened against Cyclone Madrone. First hand, a 6-cut gives Cy a 24 (7-7-8-8) and me a 21 (4-5-6-6). After the first deal, Cy is at 35 to my 30. After the second deal, Cy is at 54 to my 52. The game continues at lightning speed, and after only seven deals, the game is over and I mark the win on my card.

Doubleheader in Topaz Lake NV

¶ I win the cut against **Don Thienel**, and he immediately gets a 24. I figured it's ear-

ly and I can come back. That was until he gets his second 24. He is in position to skunk me as I am 17 from getting over. He holds me to zero pegs and I count my 17 to leave the stinky behind me. Don tells me: "I feel like I lost the game." Poor Don.

- ¶ After I won the cut from Jim Langley, he states: "I lose the cut, I can't win. I win the cut, I still can't win." He was correct, I won! He was also correct when he warned some people to be careful what you say around Dale or it might end up in *Cribbage World!*
- ¶ While playing Roland Hall, Bob Brumley holds three 5s and a Queen and cuts the last 5 for a 28-hand on second street. On third street, Roland holds 4-4-6-6 and cuts a 5 for his 24-hand. At the end of the game, Roland shakes Bob's hand and says: "You got the pin but I got the win."

¶ You can always tell when someone reads your column! I'm playing the pegging machine Jimmy McCarty in Grand Rapids. Jimmy waited for me to play my third 9 before he safely took the pair. I scolded him for using Art Loveland's and my favorite play against me.

Jingle Bell Open in Marinette WI

¶ The main saw a battle of two titans. Chris Zager, who once had two 29s in a weekend tourney, versus Mr. 28, who once had two 28s at Grass Roots on the same night. Our game was close, with me needing twelve to win. I toss two Diamonds into her crib and don't get my cut. Chris on the other hand is dealt six Diamonds. When a Diamond is cut, not only did she get a Diamond flush in her hand, but also in her crib.

What was I thinking! Diamonds are a girl's best friend—all nine of them.

¶ During my match a g a i n s t B o n n i e Anderson, aka "the mean wash





woman," she told of an unusual feat. She got a 28 in her first hand in the main against **Dan Lauer**; even with a 24 later in the game, she couldn't skunk him. That night, she again played Dan. Lightning strikes again, and she nails her second 28-hand of the day, also on the first hand, but this time she lost! During our match, she washed the cards twice but to no avail. I guess from now on, I will call her "the nice wash woman."

¶ My pen works both ways. It praises when you do something noteworthy and it blasts you when you make an oops. This is a major oops that **Smoothy Selke** made in the deciding playoff match against **Kristina Wright**. Dan trips her 8, 31-for-8, but only takes four, leaving him in the dead

hole. Kristina then wins and advances to the semifinals. I'm sure this oops will be on Dan's mind for a long time, and I'm sure Dan will have a few words for me writing it. Long live freedom of the press!

¶ I previously wrote how Ivan Wells had four 5s and took only 12 points. He is not alone! At the Madison GRRT it happened again. Another eight points left on the table! I also saw four 4s and a 7 counted as 20. Always remember: if you need three of a kind to make 15, the hand is 20; for example, 4-4-4-4 and 3 is 15-8+12=20. If you need only two of a kind to make 15, the hand is 24; for example, 4-4-4-4 and a 7 is 15-12+12=24.

The Inside Track

During end-game pegging scenarios, it's very important for the dealer to note how many points the pone needs to get to 121. If they need only 1–3 points, the pone has the luxury of keeping a nontraditional hand, which could be difficult to read. However, if the pone needs 6–12 points or even more, you can plan your pegging strategy accordingly, as the pone will have to hold a higher scoring hand to go out, which should make it easier for the dealer to read.

Let's say the dealer needs 3 points to peg out, while the pone needs 10 to go out. The dealer holds 2-3-4-K, and the cut is a King. If the pone leads a Q, what is the dealer's play? Remember that the pone needs 10; he has Q-K as two of his five cards to add up to 10 points. What types of hand could he have to get to 10? A double run of pictures or three pictures and a 5 are the two likeliest possibilities. So how do we peg three against those hands with our 2-3-4-K hold? We can play the K on the Q, and it's highly likely that the pone will make the count 30 for a go. Then we can lead our 3 and force either a 5 or picture response, which we have covered with either a 2 or 4. Always keep your thinking caps on until peg 121.

Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

People often ask about the first cribbage boards. No one really knows for sure. Englishman Sir **John Suckling** invented cribbage around 1640. The British Empire had begun to spread around the world at least sixty years earlier. Cribbage and making cribbage boards continued to spread with the growth of the British Empire. Early boards were handcrafted and followed the style of the first English boards. At that time the game was 61 points. So the boards were 30 points up and 30 back. The English style included a game winning hole at *each* end. That continued as more boards

were made around the world. A few tweaks appeared, such as holes to mark games won, starter holes, and so on.

When cribbage boards began to be manufactured, some makers got away from the traditional English style. However, those original style boards are still made today.

Photos 1–3 are totally early English-style boards. However, #2 is a brass board manufactured by MECO in England during the 1930s. Board #4 was made in New Zealand and lacks game winning holes. Board #5 is a wood-inlaid American Masonic Lodge board and is identical to the English style. Board #6 is an American manufactured brass board that added wheels for scoring the game of whist. Board #7 was made in Pakistan. Board #8 is from Japan.

New boards are being made constantly. Most of the new ones are 121-point boards. Take a look at the Etsy website, and you

will be amazed at the selection available. Old boards are being phased out, but our favorite game is still going strong!




