
# Who Will Be There?



Play smart, play fair, play fast-but mostly play nice

A good friend of mine, **Haig Kassouni**, passed away on April 18. Most of my readers won't know Haig, but he is Exhibit A in (1) why the ACC is thriving and (2) where we need to focus our energies.

Haig joined Club 91 and the ACC in February 2009. He played club fairly regularly and over the course of twelve years earned 974 GRPs, coming up just 26 points shy of his Bronze Award. An average of 82 points per season is certainly not a write-home-about stat, but—gasp!— Haig had a life outside cribbage.

With an extended family of brothers, sisters, cousins, in-laws, nieces, nephews; with multiple manufacturing facilities to run as president of the Kassouni Group (specializing in plastic injection molding); with trips every year to South Africa or Wyoming or northern Quebec in search of game—Haig never hesitated to skip club whenever family or work or vacation required his time. As an avid outdoorsman, Haig loved dogs (especially his three Brittanys♥), hunting, fishing, and skeet shooting. His indoor loves included yoga, cribbage, and collecting a variety of treasures through live and online auctions.

Despite the vast difference in our companies' bottom lines, Haig nevertheless took a strong interest in my bookselling business. He never saw me without asking how sales were, and his financial advice was invaluable. He and I looked at two properties together as potential joint ventures to house his collecting interests and my book inventory. When neither of those worked out, he introduced me to his banker, who ended up underwriting the loan that allowed me to buy a retired church building that is now my residence and business.

Haig chafed under Covid restrictions. He obviously followed state regulations at his manufacturing business, but he re-



ally didn't like the intrusion the disease made into his dining choices, his gym, and his cribbage club. So when club resumed in 2020, he chose not to play because of social-distancing requirements. And after a second shut-

down that lasted into early 2021, he didn't come back until April 13, which would be the last time he played club.

On that night, Haig and I played in game six. During his 30-point beatdown of me, we spent the entire time talking about his hunting camp in northern Michigan and my new house. When he found that that I now owned a church bell, he immediately offered to buy it. "Why?" I asked. He thought it would be cool to install at his hunting camp to call everyone in for meals.

Whatever Haig turned to, he jumped in wholeheartedly. He and I spent hours discussing the probability of various cribbage hands, and then he assigned a monetary value to each one. This became the basis for lunchtime games at Haig's office between him and his brother, Armen, and all of it was meticulously recorded on a white board. <sup>1</sup>

When I asked if he would provide scorecards for our club, he readily agreed, and over the years he probably made us more than 10,000 scorecards free of charge.

Haig was always on the lookout for all continued on page 8



things cribbage, so he passed on to me a batch of National Open–branded playing cards (from the era when the NOCT gave free cards to each participant). Haig found the cards in an auction lot and knew that I loved this tourney, so voilà, they were mine!

The last time I saw him, Haig gave me photocopies of four articles from the *Wall Street Journal* that mentioned cribbage. The most relevant one is featured in the nearby box, but the others also have intriguing titles and stories, if you care to look them up:

- "Chess Is a Netflix Star. How about Other Games?"
- "Surviving the Coronavirus without a Screen"
- "How the Coronavirus Killed Its First Female Victim in the U.S."

In pre-Covid days, Haig and I would play every month or so at his office or at a local deli. Regardless of where we played, I never played a game with Haig that was not thoroughly enjoyable—win or lose. When he beat me at club on April 13, I gave him a dollar after the game and said, "I want this back next week." Sadly, next week never came.

# **BOD ELECTION**

The results of the 2021 election for the ACC's Board of Directors were announced in early June by acting president **James Morrow**, after hav-

ing been certified by election supervisor **Megan Player** and vice president of policy **Keith Widener**.

The successful candidates include twenty-one incumbents and four new members: Lana Newhouse, Sandy Sands, Vicki Soule, and David Statz.

The number of ballots returned (644) was the second lowest total since 1989, but with the membership plunge precipitated by the pandemic, only 4,897 were mailed this year. As a result, 13.15% was a decided improvement on 9.2% from the last election cycle.

According to Widener and Player, 358 ballots were cast online, or 55.6% of the total ballots cast. All ballots were counted and none were tossed out. While a few of the paper ballots had irregular codes, disqualifying those ballots would not have affected the makeup of the BOD.

The best news about this election is that thirty-three candidates were on the slate, including twelve new candidates.

The biggest surprise was that the Western Region seated only nine directors. This is the first time since 1995 that the Western Region has not had ten directors. The Central Region now has nine members, and the Eastern Region has seven.

The new BOD term runs from September 1, 2021, until August 31, 2023. Their first official actions will take place at the ACC's annual meeting in Sacramento on September 24. At that time, the BOD will elect five officers from among the twenty-five directors: President, VP–Marketing, VP–Policy, VP–Operations, and VP–Competition. All ACC members are encouraged to attend this meeting to meet the new directors and to see how the sausage is made.

Four BOD members did not run for reelection: Jeff Shimp, Valerie Sumner, Diane Waite, and Henry Bergeron. The ACC thanks them for their years of dedicated service.

I take great pride in maintaining my composure throughout a game regardless of good or bad luck with cards and regardless of the behavior of my opponent. Keeping our minds free of extraneous things allows us to play our optimum cribbage and maximizes our chances of winning.

At a recent tournament, I encountered a situation that greatly tested my composure, and I freely admit that I failed. Whether or not I was justified in my actions, I can tell you it involved more yelling in three minutes than in my previous twenty-five years combined.

My outburst did nothing to improve my chances of winning and in fact emboldened my opponent with the power of getting under my skin. The actual game lasted only two hands after the incident, and the odds were very much against me no matter what I did.

But learn from me and never give your opponent the satisfaction. Try to suffer in silence, as you can always go back to your room and punch your pillow a thousand times! Stay focused and hopefully you will get that 121st peg and the ultimate laugh.

# Cutting a 29-Hand, Revisited

by Michael Rogers (Napa CA)

I first discussed this with Andrew Laurence a year or more ago. Andrew published the question in the May 2020 *Cribbage World* (pages 24–25), and Dan Selke replied in the June 2020 *Cribbage World* (page 8). Here's the problem, with all the correct probabilities worked out.

You need to cut the right (and only) 5 to make the hand, as you already hold three 5s and the right Jack. The starter deck has 32 eligible cards (top 4 and bottom 4 are not eligible). There are 6 other ineligible cards—4 in your opponent's hand plus the 2 they threw into the crib.

That means there are 46 cards where the magic 5-card could be (52 minus the 4 in your hand and the 2 you threw into the crib). What are the odds of cutting the magic 5?

Most say "1-in-40"—that's the size of the starter deck—which is a 2.5% chance of cutting the 5. Well, not true—only 32 cards are eligible—which would make it a 1-in-32 or 3.125% chance. But that is deceptive logic; the fewer cards you have to cut from, the higher the odds of finding the right 5?! The odds are a little more nuanced than that. Here's the complete answer.

There are 46 cards where the 5-card you are seeking could be—anything not in your hand or in the 2 cards you threw in the crib: 52 - 6 cards = 46 possible places.

Of these, 32 are eligible in the starter deck for cutting the magic 5—so that's a 32-in-46 chance of finding the 5—or a 69.57% chance. But, there is only a 1-in-32 chance of the hitting the 5 in the 32 you select—that's a 3.125% chance of you finding the right card in the 32 eligible cards.

So, we now have  $69.57\% \ge 3.125\% = 2.174\%$  chance of cutting the sought-after 5-card.

The simplistic 1-in-40 chance of cutting the necessary 5-card is 2.5%, but in real terms, it's a bit less—only 2.174%, or about 1-in-46. These same odds hold true if you have any three-of-a-kind and are looking to cut the remaining one.

Nevertheless, it's always a good bet to hold the three 5s and the right Jack—you never know your luck. CW



Do you ever wonder why tournament directors tell you to check the deck of cards before you start playing? Here's one reason why. This hand was dealt out in game 11 of the Rampart Open main, which means that ten and a half games were played with a defective deck before both 8s of Clubs showed up in the same deal. (The 9 of Clubs was missing.) Check the decks!

# Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

This classic "29" board is probably one of the most popular cribbage board designs ever. I featured this board in an early column (July 2008, page 22). Edward M. Hirst of Burnaby BC designed and registered his board in Canada. Edward had polio as a child and was confined to a wheelchair. From 1953 until his death in 1960 he handcrafted these boards in his

workshop. They were mostly for family and friends, so the original boards are very rare. I have never seen one.

Following his death, Hirst's family gave permission for two Vancouver BC companies to manufacture his boards. My board was made by Ryco Sales Ltd. Inside the card and peg storage area, Ryco included a history of Hirst and his board.

These boards are still manufactured today. They are mainly made in Taiwan out of a single piece of wood. They no longer have card storage or the history of the board. Because of how this board has evolved, the manufactured boards first made in Vancouver BC are also becoming rarer.

The "29" board is a 121-point cribbage board. It is actually just a "curvy" version

of our ACC longboards. That makes the newer, smaller boards perfect for travel. They will fit in a purse or briefcase easily. Happy pegging!

# HISTORY OF THE "29" CRIBBAGE BOARD

The first Number "29" Cribbage Board was originated by Mr. Edward M. Hirst of Burnaby, British Columbia, in 1953. At the age of 28 Mr. Hirst was overcome by pollo, which left him paralyzed from the hips down, and as a consequence confined to a wheel chair. It was under these conditions that Mr. Hirst turned to his woodworking ability to produce a livelihood for his young family. From a number of items which he was able to design and produce came the "29" Cribbage Board, which proved to be a most popular Item, not only with Cribbage players but with everyone who saw It. However, many people who wanted a "29" Board were unable to buy one, because of the very limited quantity which Mr. Hirst was able to manufacture personally. Following Mr. Hirst's death in 1960 no further supplies were available until early in 1962, at which time production of the new famous "29" Board was undertaken by another Vancouver manufacturer.

# Youth Teaching Tip

What is the most difficult cribbage concept to grasp as a beginning player? After years of teaching nearly 500 youngsters this wonderful card game, it is clear to me that the answer is pegging. There is so much to pegging: setting up your opponent, maximizing your opportunities to hit 15s and 31s, playing into runs and seeing them when you do. I cringe when students carelessly set up their opponent for a run while pegging, and then their counterpart plays into the run but doesn't see it and misses points. So how do you get your pupils to elevate their game with solid play during pegging? I dedicate the first part of my introductory lessons to just pegging. For the first ten minutes of class I emphasize pegging strategies by dealing four cards to each player, going through the pegging process, and then shuffling and doing it again. This can really help accelerate the learning curve of novice players.


