The Inside Track

Successful pegging requires much planning, much pivoting, and eventually a good case of fortuitous card luck thrown in.

Let's say it's very early in the game, and you hold A-6-7-8 (with 4-K to the opponent's crib). What's your plan of action here? Many players like the 7 lead; if it's matched you have the A for 15-2; if the play goes 7-X-8-5 you have the Ace for 31-2.

But these plays can be fraught with much peril—much more than I feel comfortable with to peg the hand this way. So I prefer the A lead; if the dealer has middle cards we will draw first pegging blood. The only play that puts us in immediate danger is a match of our A-and in this situation that risk is mitigated by many players' reticence at matching the pone's lead card—much less the tricky Ace lead.

Note also that if you do decide to lead the 7 from this hold you risk the lone Ace over the count of 21 deathtrap—which we have all fallen into at some time in our cribbage career. *Don't* let it happen again!

Next time you have a tournament or Grass Roots session, take a mental note of how these hands peg out. Hopefully you can escape the pegging minefields.

Play smart, play fair, play fast—but mostly play nice

At a tournament some months ago, one player had an unavoidable conflict with the return flight home and wasn't going to be able to stay for the entire playoffs, should they should happen to qualify.

player qualified for the playoffs and received a first-round bye. The second-round opponent also had a bye, and so they agreed to play their second-round match early. The time-crunched player won the

match, picked up the money for a "loss" in the next round, and headed

"That's not how I want to win."

Whenever this happens, the player is, of course, welcome to play the qualifying round and as many playoff matches as possible before departing the tournament. Should they not be able to remain for the entire playoffs, they receive points and prize money for the appropriate round, and their next opponent gets a walkover victory.

(Note: this is totally unlike a player withdrawing from a qualifying round [see page 27], where such an action affects scores of their future opponents and potential qualifiers. In the playoff situation, they are hurting only themselves if they cannot continue throughout the playoffs, so it is allowed by the ACC.)

As luck would have it, the departing

Only later did the TD learn that the loser of the second-round match was angry about playing early, stating that they should have refused to play early, or should have claimed a bathroom emergency and couldn't play then. No amount of reasoning soothed this player's ire, and the conversation ended in a huff.

This interchange brought to mind a statement in the ACC'S rulebook (emphasis added): "Cribbage is a pastime that provides social opportunities to display true sportsmanship and respect for others, without rancor, animosity, or overwhelming self-interest during competition."

game, and someone was going to lose that match. Playing early had no bearing on its outcome, and it was the sporting thing to do. If the losing player had been in the opposite situation, needing to leave early, we might've heard a different tune.

This brings to mind a situation I observed at the 2016 Bickford Memorial. After flying from his home in North Carolina for this one-day tourney in West Springfield MA, Keith Widener qualified in the main. With skillful play and good luck he made it all the way to the finals, but his side of the bracket was much slower than the other half-bracket. By time Keith got to the finals, his opponent, the late great David Campbell, had been waiting over an hour, and the time for Keith's return flight was rapidly approaching.

Afraid he'd miss his flight if the match went the distance, Keith told David that he'd have to concede the match. David could've accepted Keith's resignation, but instead David graciously suggested they

play a single game for the championship instead of the standard best-of-five. Keith won this game and took first place.



When I later asked David why he did that, he said: "Because that's not how I want to win." What an example for all of us.

We are family, we help each other out, we don't play the selfish card—so let's not win the wrong way. And let's not complain when we do the right thing to help out a fellow player—and still lose. We don't do the right thing in expectation that karma will reward us; we do the right thing because it is, well, the right thing.





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


Chaska Tidbits

L STUFF ON THE WEB

An online article in *The Free Press Journal* (an English-language daily newspaper published in Mumbai, India) published an article entitled "International Cribbage Day: Know how to Play the Fun Card Game." Not everything in it, however, is "according to Hoyle"—let alone according to the ACC. Here is but one example:

The next step is to score your hand and the dealer's hand according to the point values listed below. After scoring, the player with the lowest score deals the next hand. Play then proceeds clockwise around the table.

- 1 point: For each Ace, 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6 in your hand
- 2 points: For each 7 in your hand
- 3 points: For each 8 in your hand
- 4 points: For each 9 in your hand
- 5 points: For each 10 in your hand
- 10 points: For each Jack, Queen or King in your hand
- 4 points: For having a flush (all four cards of the same suit)
- 5 points: For having fivecard (a five-card run in sequence)

While *Cribbage World* appreciates the gesture behind this article, we caution that you use these instructions at your peril!

Who doesn't like four of a kind? Starting with 12 points in your hand is a great way to win a lot of games. But not all quads are created equal.

Most times the cut doesn't help, sometimes you end up with 20 or 24 points, but 14 and 28 are also possible. And what's with that oddball 21?

Another inequality: all quads are 12 points before the cut—except for quad 5s, which is 20.

Finally—but you already knew this, right?—four Aces is the *only* quad that can't be improved by the cut. In fact, four Aces is also the only cribbage hand of *any* kind that is impossible to improve (but see Cribbage Quiz on page 21).

The chart on the next page shows all possible quad combinations plus cut card. For ease in picturing these hands in your mind, this article assumes that the four of a kind is in the hand or the crib, but there is no difference in value whether the fourth card is in your hand or is cut—with the exception of four 5s, which can yield 29 points if you hold three 5s and the right Jack.

Assuming you didn't discard one of the potential cut cards, the odds of getting a cut in *each* square of the chart that has a number in it is ~8% (if two squares give you help, then the odds are ~16%). If you discarded one or two of the cuts you need, then the odds drop to ~6% and ~4% respectively.

Can't (or don't want to) remember the values in the chart? Then apply this rule of thumb in order to know if a quad can cut to 20 or 24: if it takes three of the quad cards plus the cut card to make 15-2, then the hand is worth 20 points; but if it takes only two cards plus the cut card to make 15-2, then the hand is a 24.

For example, quad 3s plus 6 as the starter card results in 20 points because 3 + 3 + 3 + 6 = 15 and there are only four ways to make this 15-2 combination. On

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Whose Crib?

Recently I attended the Emerald Coast Open in Fort Walton Beach FL. It was a fantastic tournament directed by Jim

and Paul Hearon with lots of help from Pensacola Peggers Club 396. This tournament drew seventy-three players from numerous states—a very strong showing.

During this tournament I had a judge call that you don't see very often: the dealer had tossed two cards to the crib, but he placed them on the pone's side of the board. The pone glanced down, picked two good cards to discard—thinking he was going to get the crib—then reached across to cut the starter card. However, before the card was cut, the dealer asked about the crib being on the wrong side. "Judge!"

When I went over, the pone wanted to retrieve the cards he threw in the crib and change them if it wasn't going to be his crib. The dealer wanted the crib moved over to his side of the board. What would you do?

The ACC rulebook covers this situation but you have to use two rules to resolve it. First of all, rule 5.1(d) states: "If all four cards are discovered to be on the pone's side, they shall be moved to the dealer's side." Since the starter card had not been turned, this is cut and dried. The dealer gets the crib.

But wait! The pone threw good cards thinking it was going to be his crib! Can he get

them back and change them? Well, rule 5.1(c) allows that action "if only one player discards to the wrong side of the board," but rule 5.3(a) says "no cards may be retrieved from the crib by either dealer or pone once both players have discarded to the crib." All four cards were in the crib on the same side of the board, so the crib is formed and cannot be undone.

Rule 5.1(c)

Prior to the turn of the starter card, if only one player discards to the wrong side of the board, that player is permitted to retrieve the card(s) and reevaluate the selection.

Rule 5.1(d)

If all four cards are discovered to be on the pone's side, they shall be moved to the dealer's side, without exposure, unless the starter card has been turned and each player has played at least one card. In that event, the crib becomes the property of the player on whose side it lies and the other player becomes the pone and next dealer in that game.

Rule 5.3(a)

No cards may be retrieved from the crib by either dealer or pone once both players have discarded to the crib.

BOD

This year is the biannual election for the ACC's Board of Directors. BOD members will be elected for a two-year term beginning September 1, 2023, and ending August 31, 2025. The BOD meets twice yearly—on the day before both the rotating Grand National tournament and the TOC in Reno NV—to handle the administrative and financial business of the organization.

Any current ACC member in good standing at least eighteen years of age can submit the paperwork to run for the board. (If you think another member should run for the BOD, please contact them directly and encourage them to file the paperwork.)

Candidates must submit an email containing a statement that they wish to run for the BOD, how you want your name printed on the ballot, ACC number, address, phone number, and a biography (200 words max). Letters and biographies must

be sent via email by April 1 to the chair of the nominating committee, **Megan Play**er, at megan@monkeyplayground.net.

In addition, all candidates must submit a high-resolution digital picture for publication in *Cribbage World* by sending it via email to **cwed152@gmail.com** (do *not* send photos to Megan). Photos (head shot only) should be in sharp focus with no distractions in the background.

Biographies and the ballot will be printed in the May *Cribbage World*. To be eligible to vote, members must be at least eighteen years old, have current membership when the ballot is mailed, and have a valid mailing address. Joint members who normally get only one CW will get two in May. And members who normally read *Cribbage World* online will receive a paper copy in May.

Online voting will be available, or paper ballots may be mailed with a postmark no later than May 31. Candidates will be notified by the ACC's president after the results have been certified by the VP of Policy. The election results will be published in the July *Cribbage World*. CW

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Cribbage Ethics 101: Don't Leave!

One of the most frequent issues that the ACC's Ethics Committee deals with is when a player quits a tournament or Grass Roots session before all the games have been played. For whatever reason—they are getting bad cards and losing, or someone made them mad—they get up and leave without finishing out the remaining games in the session.

When this happens the Ethics Committee's hands are tied. The ACC Policy Manual chapter 9 §V.A states:

A member who fails to complete the qualifying round of a sanctioned ACC tournament or a Grass Roots session shall be suspended for a period of six months, plus refused entry into the next Grand National Tournament, Tournament of Champions, and the JPW/ACC Open. The only exception to this policy will be documented emergencies.

This is a pretty tough pill to swallow, so don't quit before you are done. If something comes up and you must leave, talk with the tournament director and see if something can be worked out. Don't just run out the door. Or else you will be watching cribbage on TV for the next six months.

Teaching Tip

Here is an excellent teaching tip for parents/grandparents shared by Suzi and Chuck Muller (Paradise CA):

When Lyla was much too little to do any math (about 4 years old), she wanted to "play." Knowing that new players of any age can struggle with the concept of never touching the front peg, Lyla and I "played" cribbage by simply taking turns taking the top card off the deck and pegging the points. She loved that game and delighted in beating me when she reached the last hole before I did. Lyla learned the point value of each card, taking turns pegging, shuffling, and never touching the front peg.

Not only is this a great way of introducing a small part of cribbage to a preschooler, the developmental skills in the area of mathematics are invaluable for a child this age, to say nothing of fine motor skills honed through shuffling cards and moving pegs.

Coming soon to this column will be a series of interviews with youth players who play in Grass Roots or have participated in youth and/or adult tournaments.
