Scott's Peek at the Past

The founder and first president of the American Cribbage Congress was Joseph Petrus Wergin of Madison WI, and he deserves all the accolades and more for getting the ACC started.



Before writing the first three years of

Cribbage World, Wergin was the author of the Midwest Cribbage League newsletter. I still have a couple of these in my possession.*

Joe's most famous saying was "Think Big"—repeated throughout the early years of Cribbage World. Here is a gem he wrote in 1980 - about how one should address your cribbage opponents.

I would also like to recognize a few early pioneers for recruiting members and helping the ACC in the first couple of years.

John Chambers (RI) served on the first ACC Board of Directors, wrote multiple cribbage books, and directed the very successful Rhode Island Cribbage Association. In fact, John had all fifty-two RICA members joint the American Cribbage Congress in its first few months.

Richard Kurz (WI) was very instrumental in signing up members from Wisconsin and organizing transportation to area tournaments. Kurz was one of the first ACC judges and Cribadier Generals to support the youth program.

Richard Graham (CO) served on the first Board of Directors and later was executive vice-president and directed BOD meetings for much of the 1980s. Graham was an early ACC judge and ran tournaments in Colorado and Nevada, including the 1985 Grand National.




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President's Column

Built in 1935, it is 726 feet high and 600 yards wide at the base. You can stand in Nevada and Arizona if you walk to the middle of the dam; there are two clocks showing Nevada time and Arizona time. This project only took five years to complete at a cost of \$49 million.

Parking is only \$10, and if you wanted to take a tour of the inside of the dam you could pay to see that also.

After playing a little cribbage, **Bryan Gurden** became our tour guide, taking us up the main strip, where we saw the Globe, the Strat, Caesar's Palace, and even CVS.

People zip-line over the street, and the light show on the four-block barrel vault canopy keeps this non-stop action going. You can get a picture in Binion's Casino in front of \$1 million.

If this isn't enough to get you excited to head to Las Vegas, for as little as \$99 you can book a helicopter tour of the Grand Canyon. You can take in a show or even a sunrise hot air balloon ride.

→ No date on photo, but with a bicycle in the background and the clothing, I'm guessing that it could be anywhere from 1890s to early 1920s.



Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

Every month *Cribbage World* reports the players with the most points in tournament play (MRPs—see page 32 below), club play (GRPs—page 8), and internet play (IRPs—page 18). On these pages we see the best of the best, those players who through perseverance, luck, and skill have risen to the top ranks. We consistently applaud their efforts and acknowledge their wins and awards.

But I'm going to let you in on a little secret. These players are *not* the backbone of the ACC. The names on the pages listed above are good, even excellent, players. But they represent a small percentage of the ACC's membership.

The heart-and-soul of the ACC are its rank-and-file members. Players who play only a few or no tournaments a year. Players who've never played in Reno, who will never make All American, who will never reach the Master level and may never hit Bronze.

These players show up most weeks at club. They love cribbage and respect the game. They help out whenever possible. They frequently play cribbage outside of

ACC-sanctioned tournament and clubs. These rock-solid people with hearts of gold would do anything to get in another game of "crib." Many of them are very good players, but because they don't travel, they don't get much recognition. *These people* are the ACC's most valuable players.

One such member was **Rod Hovey**, who joined the ACC in 2003. Rod played in most of my Michigan tournaments, winning a few of them, but he was mainly a club player. *continued on page 7*

In his very first Grass Roots tourney on November 6, 2003, at Club 300 in Battle Creek MI, Rod took first place with 17/7 +169. After playing at Club 300 for two years, he started Club 321 in the fall of 2005 in his hometown and named it "15-2 in Kalamazoo."

Rod also earned 863 Master Rating Points in sixteen tournaments in three states (two in Nevada, one in North Carolina, and thirteen in Michigan). He won two mains and one consy, which is actually a pretty good average for the few tournaments he played.

Rod played his last club event on January 29 and—after an incredibly full life—passed away fifteen days later at age 77.

Four years in the US Army were followed by seventeen years delivering dairy products and a twenty-five-year spin as a USPS mail handler.

A strong Christian from the age of twelve, Rod was active in his local church all his life, leaving behind a legacy of hard work and service to both church and community. A Red Cross blood donor since high school, he donated more than 24 gallons.

He enjoyed playing basketball, softball, and golf—and he also organized leagues in all three sports for many decades.

A man with the gift of administration, he left behind detailed instructions for his funeral and the dinner for hundreds of friends who attended.

In short, Rod was a well-rounded human who leaves behind a large, loving family and many friends who are grateful for having just known him. RIP, Rod.

The ACC needs every player we have. I appreciate all of them. But I have a special fondness in my heart for the Rods in our organization. They are the unsung players who provide the ACC with its *raison d'être*, the reason for our existence. May their tribe increase.

At the upcoming Grand National in Las Vegas NV in November, the BOD will award the Western Region's next Grand National, scheduled for 2027. ACC members interested in hosting this event must inform Executive VP Rick Shea (31for14@gmail.com) of their interest by August 31. Detailed information is not necessary at this time; a general plan is sufficient to consider the bid.



Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Check the Cards!

If you play a lot of cribbage you will likely have encountered problems with the playing cards. Most of the time we are using less than new decks. They could have stray markings, bent corners, or any type of defect that could allow a player to know that card without seeing it. Rule 4.5, entitled "Imperfect Pack," deals with this situation and describes when to correct the deck and how to do it.

Years ago while playing in a tournament in Altamonte Springs FL (hello **David Fournier!**), I was called to a situation where the pone and the dealer had counted their hands and mucked the cards, and the dealer was then counting her crib. She had a crib flush (all five cards the same

suit) with a double run. Holy crap! What do we do?

You can't really invoke rule 4.5.b (play stops at time of discovery . . . points pegged or scored are retracted and the hands and crib

are dead) because both hands had been played, counted, and mucked. And if you just call the crib dead you have severely and unfairly penalized the dealer. So here is a situation where we have to use some judgement (OMG!) and invoke rule 14.1: In the event of a situation that is not resolved by these rules, the head judge's decision shall be final for that tournament. We handled this particular incident by removing the duplicate card and allowing the player to count their four-card crib. We allowed the flush under these circumstances, along with a run. There were no 15s. Now before all of you decide to hit me with multiple emails, yes, there could have been other solutions. But this is what we decided on that given day.

At Grand National 28 in Grand Rapids MI in 2009, judges were called when **Jerome Tork** was holding four 6s and promptly cut the fifth 6! Jerome argued with me that he should be able to count and peg his hand. I said: "Jerome, you don't know how to count five of a kind anyway." To which he replied: "Isn't it 48?"* We then invoked rule 4.5.b, got a new deck, and redealt the hand.

Such fun!

*Editor's note: five of a kind (which appears when playing a cribbage variant using wild cards) is 20 points (that is, it has ten pairs). And five 5s—which has ten 15-2s—is worth 40 points!



The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





Does the old proverb "a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush" apply in cribbage? Let's examine a pegging scenario and ruminate on it.

You are pone early in the game with A-A-4-9, discarding the innocuous 3-8. You lead the Ace and the dealer responds with a K. Yessss, you can score an immediate 15-2 with your 4, but is that the correct percentage play in the long run? If you take the 15, what is the most likely dealer response? I'm guessing a picture for 25, and then you must play your ace for 26. It's probably at least a 50% chance (if not higher) that dealer has a 5 for 31-2, thus negating your early 15-2. The net pegging will be 3–2 in favor of the dealer.

But what if you played your 9 on that K, making the count 20? Again, the dealer's likely response is a picture card to make the count 30, enabling your other Ace to come into play for 31-2. The net pegging in this scenario is 2–1 in *your* favor.

Obviously these situations will not always play out these exact ways, but it never hurts to have alternate courses of action for any pegging play.



These boards were made by **Bennett Christman** who lives in Arlington VA. While researching cribbage boards he came across our ACC website. After going through the website, he contacted me to discuss boards. We had a long phone conversation, and I discovered that he has actually played on the board that I consider to be the most famous cribbage board in the world—the O'Kane submarine board that dates to WWII and submarine patrols in the Yellow Sea. I will not go into that story here, but please check it out in the December 2018 *Cribbage World* (pages 12–13) on the ACC website: cribbage.org (click Cribbage World > Archives > 2018).

Bennett has served on many submarines. That is why he decided to make these Pocket Cribbage boards. They are 3D-printed plastic, can



be personalized, and can ordered in many different colors. The boards in the photo have two different style tracks but are both 121-point boards. Check them out at pocketcribbage.com.

Teaching Tip

I am often asked what is the youngest group for cribbage in a classroom setting. A lot depends on the teacher's demeanor and comfort level with a particular age group. That said, I know instructors who successfully taught third graders how to play cribbage. In order to be successful with kids this young, the game has to be introduced slowly over time, and should be taught no less than three times a week until the students have a grasp of the game. With older kids, the pace and frequency of class time is not as critical. Personally, my favorite ages to teach are fifth grade through high school. Most kids are enthusiastically able to understand the nuances of the game and can play a game at a foundational level after four or five lessons. If you are interested in giving it a go, my teaching manual will guide you through the process with an adaptable five-day lesson plan. You may request it by sending email to danthefan@yahoo.com.



Le Cribbage Tube by David Aiken

I have in my collection a cribbage board called "The Cribbage Tube," or "Le Cribbage Tube" in French. This "board" is actually a flexible mat that rolls up and stores in a tube, hence the name.

The Game of Cribbage:

Cribbage was invented by Sir John Suckling (1609-1642), a 17th century English poet. He developed the game from Noddy, a game in which a special score board was also used. Traditionally cribbage is a cord game in which one gains points by forming certain card combinations while keeping score by moving pegs on a wooden cribboge board. Your CRIBBAGE TUBE" is unique in that you are provided with a large, easy to peg, cribbage mat and elegant brass and steel markers rather than a small board and plastic pegs.

The Canadian manufacturer, Cylinder Games (based in Guelph according to the instructions or in Mississauga according to the tube) helpfully included instructions in both English and French. One of the more interesting tidbits we learn is that Sir John Suckling lived seven years longer when he spoke French!

Kent was a fierce competitor who was gracious when he lost. He always reminded us of some of the biggest reasons we play cribbage—fun and comradery. Kent will surely be missed by all.

Rich Doyle

"Richie" Doyle (Fairfield CA) passed away last year. He made the game a pleasure, win or lose, but he won enough to earn his Silver Award. Rich always volunteered to do the heavy lifting when setting up tournaments. A game with Rich was what cribbage is all about. That he will be missed is an understatement.

Boyd R. McDonald

Boyd McDonald (Mountain View CA) passed away on December 28 at the age of 102. He was easily recognizable by his collection of string ties and his endless smile. Boyd was born and raised in Denver CO, graduated as an electrical engineer from the University of Colorado, served stateside

in the Army Signal Corps during WWII, and moved to California after his marriage in 1947. He first worked for Hughes Aircraft and Lockheed in Los Angeles, then moved with his family

to Silicon Valley in 1958, where he lived for the rest of his life. His father, Harry, taught him to play cribbage at a young age, but he played only sporadically for many years until he joined the "lunchtime cribbage" group at Lockheed, regularly playing the single game that could be squeezed in during lunch. In 1991, he discovered the ACC and Grass Roots cribbage and



began playing in the weekly club. Boyd became the director of San Jose Sharks Club 48 in 1992 and remained in that position for twenty-five years. After the pandemic, he transferred to Club 43 in Fremont and remained active there until age 101, when he had to stop driving. The week after his 100th birthday he scored a grand slam. In addition to traveling to weekend tournaments in all the West Coast states, after he retired from Lockheed he played ACC tournaments around the United States from Hawaii to Massachusetts, and even flew to Britain to play in a five-card crib tourney. In 2004 he was awarded Life Master status by the ACC and was ranked #140 with 9,705 MRPs at the time of his death; he had won fourteen sanctioned tournaments. He also achieved Gold status, being ranked #94 overall with 4,736 GRPs; he won his club championship six times. His family is grateful to all the members of the ACC, an organization that brought so many wonderful people and so much purpose and joy into Boyd's life.

Gary Overstreet (Vacaville CA) passed away in 2023. As time went by, he came earlier to the club to enjoy more practice. Gary kept track of his results in a phone app and was always working on his game. He was a good opponent and a good friend. We will miss the shine off his bald head,
