The Post-Lunch Meltdown Have you ever had a great morning of

cribbage? The games are easy, you can do

no wrong, every cut is just what you need. After eleven games your scorecard looks like a high qualifier—17, 18, even 20. You are a sure qualifier; you can win five more games with your eyes closed.

In Baker City Oregon, Luke Palmer (ID), who had not played a sanctioned tournament in several years, was having a great morning: 20 points after eleven games. And then they said those three card-changing words: "Go to lunch." I don't know what it is about lunch breaks, but they have not been kind to me either. In three consecutive tournaments I had 17, 16, and 19 points at lunch and have not qualified in any of them. The last game of the day I played Luke, and after I won, Luke said: "What a terrible afternoon." I replied: "I feel your pain." Luke looked at me like what a jerk, but then looked at my card, with six losses in a row. He smiled and said: "Yeah, you do feel my pain!"

This bad afternoon can happen to anyone. I didn't have to look too hard to find these cards:

- Laurie Logan (ID) won the Jeanne Hofbauer Memorial. Her cards were still hot at the next tournament: 18 points after twelve games. "Go to Lunch." She finished with 22
- At the Dean Bauman Memorial, Pete Larsen (WA) was having a great run: 20 points after

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
twelve games. Lunch. Brick wall. He had 20 after twenty-two games. That's ten zeros in a row.

• Ever hear of **Duane Toll** (OR)? He had 22 points after eleven games. In the twenty-game event, his 22 means he finishes with a nine-game string of pearls.

I figured out how not to have an afternoon meltdown; win only four games in the morning. But that wasn't very fun either.

Keep playing. Maybe at the next tournament you will have a great morning *and* afternoon.

Play smart, play fair, play fast-but mostly play nice

I don't mean who is the GOAT (greatest of all time). I mean in this game, right here, right now. Who is the best player when Bob plays Bobbie, when Michael plays Michelle, when I play you?

Who is the best player? (aka sportsmanship)

A lot of times the winner of the game is determined by the cards. Often the so-called best player wins. Many times they do not.

But the intent of my question above is to prod us to think about this: how do we handle losing a game that the oddsmakers had squarely in the win column?

Sure, we all whine (this editor included) when our opponent has first count from twenty-four points out, holds 4-4-6-6, and cuts the perfect dagger-in-the-heart-oh-forcrying-out-loud-you've-got-to-be-kidding-me-not-again-again 5!

What do you say when you should've won—but lost anyway? Are you the best player? Here's one example of poor sportsmanship I heard about, by someone who clearly demonstrated that they are *not* the best player at the table: player A beat player B, but instead of saying "good game" or "good luck," player B says: "I outplayed you, but you got the cuts."

What a terribly *unclassy* thing to say.

No one likes to get beat, but it happens. To everyone. With great regularity. So figure out ahead of time what you're going to say when it happens.

Whenever someone beats one of the top players on the circuit (I won't name him, but his middle name rhymes with "Toyland"; see page 44), the winner might say: "I got lucky, I got better cards." How does Toyland respond? "No, you earned it."

Now that's *classy*. Those three little words—"You earned it"—show respect for the game and, just as importantly, respect for your opponent.

True sportsmanship doesn't hold a grudge. True sportsmanship acknowledges victory

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros •••••• ••••••

Kelly Holt, the excellent Central Region pegger, recently posted this hand to Facebook. He was nondealer from 83, and the dealer was at 92. Kelly's hand was 4-4-4-5-5-7. What's your hold?

There are some obvious some divergences in basic positional strategy here—such as playing your own position first, or not helping the dealer's crib at all on fourth street—so what axiom is your determinative factor?

Right or wrong, here is my way of thinking. Play the hand in your own mind with your two options and provide the most likely scenarios for both hands—no best- or worse-case scenarios—then decide what result makes you feel more comfortable for the next hand, which you are dealing.

For instance, here I would keep 4-4-5-5 and discard 4-7. Most cuts will get me to eight points at least, and a 4-7 discard with two 4s and two 5s in my hand should be relatively innocuous, so after this hand maybe I'm at 92.

What would you hold?

or defeat with the same equanimity. True sportsmanship moves on to the next game with the determination to win, but full knowledge that it may not happen.

So be prepared, you're going to lose some of them. How you respond will determine if you are the best player at the table. CW



This is a reprint of my March 2010 column. At that time, the photos were in black and white, so I think a color update is warranted. Also, the ACC has welcomed a lot of new members since 2010.

These boards were made by the Thermometer Corp. of America in Springfield OH. The company was reorganized in 1962 as Springfield Greene Industries Inc. They started a game division and began manufacturing "The Travelers Pal Game Box" (model no. 7704). The plastic boards are made



primarily for cribbage. However, as you can see, poker, dice, and other games are part of the set.

There were many identical game boxes made for other companies, and they carried that company's name on the box and instructions. The open game box in this photo was labeled "Victory Manufactur-

ing Corp. / Chicago 12, Illinois" (model no. 2008). Springfield Greene Industries ceased operations in 1988.

Teaching Tip

I was invited to watch an established cribbage class by a local fifth grade teacher. I was very impressed how he started the session. He passed out a deck of cards to each student and had them practice shuffling until a timer went off three minutes later. So often we adults take for granted that shuffling playing cards comes naturally, but that may not be the case for young players. Helping them master this skill not only makes the game more enjoyable for the child and their opponent, but it helps develop fine motor skills, which can be a critical developmental skill for some students. As the teacher collected the decks of cards, he reminded the kids to always count the cards before playing to make sure they have a full deck and to respect the deck and not needlessly bend the cards while holding them in their hands (something kids often do). What a great way to begin a lesson for the first few weeks of instruction!

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Is the game over?

Growing up in the 1960s I watched *Captain Kangaroo* almost daily and heard about Kellogg's of Battle Creek. I always wanted to visit Battle Creek, and a few years ago I attended a tournament there.

On Sunday I was hanging around during the consolation playoffs when an interesting event occurred.

A match in the best two-of-three event featured Joev vs. Behemoth. Behemoth was ahead 1-0. In game two, Behemoth was in the dead hole needing a single peg to win the match, and Joey was dealing about five pegs out. The cards were played out with Joey pegging only three, but Behemoth did not peg any and was still in the dead hole. Joey reached out and shook Behemoth's hand and said: "Congratulations you won." Behemoth did not move, did not peg out, and did not speak. A few seconds later a bystander—Jorge—blurted out: "But Behemoth doesn't have any points!" Joey looked at the cards spread on the table and verified this and called "Judge!"

So what do you think at this point?

Every judge in the room—five of them—huddled in the corner to discuss this situation. They deliberated for at least fifteen minutes. To recap: Joey held Behemoth to no pegs and congratulated Behemoth on winning the match; Behemoth has done nothing but sit there and smile and not touch their pegs or claim the win; and Jorge alerted Joey to the fact that Behemoth has zero points.

Ultimately it comes down to rule 8.10: "Failure to Place Peg in Game (Out) Hole," which reads in part: In all ACC events except match play, a player must peg out (emphasis added). And rule 8.10b reads: If a player concedes a game to an opponent (in match play only), that concession is equivalent to the player pegging out.

Behemoth's cards were on the table for all to see, yet Joey conceded the match. It is not the judge's responsibility to play Joey's game for them, nor is it any bystander's either. Therefore Behemoth wins the match. As far as Jorge interfering: Jorge could have been sanctioned by the ACC Ethics committee for interfering with a match, but nobody wrote them up.

Had I been Joey and realized what had happened, I wouldn't have called for a judge. I would have said: "Oh you don't have any points, so I'm not giving you the game" and played on and basically put the ball in Behemoth's court to call for a judge. Had I been Behemoth I would have told Joey that I had no points and played on.





Congratulations, Bob, on a job well done!


