The ACC lives on the strength of its volunteers. Yes, we have some paid positions (including the Cribbage World editor), but without dozens and hundreds of volunteers, our organization would flounder.

For decades, one of our most dedicated volunteers has been Dan Zeisler (Grass Valley CA). Dan began working with youth players in 1990 and was appointed director of the youth program a few years later. Now-after thirty-four years of ded-
icated work—Dan is retiring.
During his three-plus decades, Dan provided steady leadership in the youth program, directed thirty Sierra Youth Tournaments, created a teaching manual and sent it to over one thousand teachers, served on the Board of Directors for four years, and began writing the "Game On" column in the July 2008 Cribbage World.

# Scott's Peek at the Past <br> by Scott Kooistra (Spencer NE) 

The board of directors has been instrumental in most policies and facets of growing and maintaining the overall operations of the American Cribbage Congress. Here's a short overview on how the officers and board got the ACC off the ground.

After the congress was organized in August 1979, President Joseph Wergin appointed six people as officers and twenty-one more across the country as directors. The next major gathering of the organizers was in January 1980 in Cincinnati. The group ratified the ACC constitution and bylaws, approved the officers and directors, set the cribbage year and dues structure, organized committees, developed awards and a rating system, and so on.

The first election for the board of directors was in the spring of 1981. The names of sixty-two potential candidates were published in the March 1981 Cribbage World. A half-dozen of these people declined to run, leaving 56 hopefuls up for the first election of the BOD. Around 1,200 ballots were mailed out to the ACC membership, and 444 ballots were returned, an impressive $34 \%$ voter turnout. Members could vote for no more than twenty-five candidates. The top twelve vote-getters would receive a two-year term on the board, while the next thirteen in line earned a one-year board term. Joe Wergin (president and leading vote-getter) then appointed five directors to reach the total of thirty on the initial BOD.

Every year afterward in the early stages of the American Cribbage Congress there was a mail-in election for either twelve or thirteen directors. This election process was kept in place until 1989, when the board agreed that mailing and other expenses precluded annual elections. Starting in the spring of 1989, there would be election of twenty-five directors every other year, and the president would still appoint five directors to fill out the thirty-member board. I remember being part of a group on the board who voted to eliminate the appointed positions, which was done soon after. There also was a later movement to reduce the number of board members to nineteen, but that failed, and the number of BOD members has been consistent at 25 for the past three decades.

In closing, a big thank you to all those individuals who have served on the board of directors or run for those positions. Your service and dedication is greatly appreciated!

## Ruling Points by Keith Widener

## Don't cut the deck-yet!

When I started writing articles for Cribbage World, my editor, David Aiken, told me I would not always hit a home run. He was right. This article is probably just a single. But it covers something I frequently see done incorrectly, especially at clubs.

I am talking about cutting the starter card after tossing to the crib. Frequently you have tossed your cards to the crib and you are waiting for the dealer to toss theirs. They may have a dilemma and are taking their time, or maybe they just play slow. But the wait to cut for the starter card is driving you nuts! So you go ahead and cut and wait for them to toss, or you cut and place the cards on the bottom of the pack and tell them that the top card is the cut card. Either way you have broken a rule.

Rule 6.1.a deals with cutting the deck: Only after both players discard to the crib shall the pack be cut by the pone to determine the starter card. Further, rule 6.1.c states: The dealer shall turn
the top card of the lower pack and place it as the starter card, face up on top of the complete pack.

There are several reasons for this rule, but mainly we don't want someone fumbling with the deck while their opponent isn't paying attention. Players have been expelled for manipulating the cut card. (In fact, one of these expelled players did this to me twenty-some years ago.) There is no reason for anyone to cut before the crib is formed. Not only that, but what if you cut prematurely and the cut card is found to be face up? Rule 6.1.d deals with that, but you have interrupted the dealer's concentration on trying to figure out what they are going to toss and now you have to solve this new problem.

So the bottom line here is this: keep your hands off of the deck until both players have tossed to the crib, then cut for the starter card.

Next time I'll try for a double.

## The Inside Track <br> 

Does it seem like the best players get the most luck? Obviously, winning cribbage games requires a certain amount of good fortune, but the elite players prove the axiom that luck is often the product of design. Let's examine a recent "lucky win" by Erik Locke.

Erik has first count needing 9; his opponent is dealing from 8 out. Erik holds 6-Q-K-K and cuts an 8. It's a bleak situation but Erik has a plan (albeit one that needs a ton of things to go right): lead the Queen and hopefully trap a King at the end for 7 points.

So Erik leads the Queen, and the dealer plays a 5. The next play is the difference between Erik and most players. He knows if he plays the King for 25 the most he can possibly peg at that point is 4 (his 6 for 31-2 and his King to match on the next pegging series). That won't put him out, so he plays his 6 to make the count 21 . The dealer plays a Queen for 31. Erik leads a King and dealer has J-K left and matches the King! Erik takes his 7 points for the trip and the go and wins the game!

What do we learn from this? Well, the dealer could have kept a more flexible pegging hand for starters, and in retrospect, playing the Jack would give Erik a three-card run and not put him out. However you can also say Erik had poor luck to be dealt such a bad hand at that juncture of the game. But he devised a plan-and stuck to it, thus forcing his opponent to make a decision.

So you can say Erik was the recipient of good fortune, but ask yourself if you would have played the hand as he did. I don't think I would have, and I pride myself in endgame pegging.

## The ACC Youth Program - Yime for Yransition

In 1990, I met Joe Wergin at a cribbage tournament in
Reno. As you may or may not know, Joe was a huge advocate of youth cribbage, coining the phrase the family that plays together stays together [editor's note: see March 1994 Cribbage World, page 5]. As we spoke, Joe eyes lit up when he discovered I was teaching cribbage to middle school students. He told me that together we were going to make a big deal about the promotion of youth cribbage in the ACC.

Not long after, Joe suffered some significant health issues that limited his participation in tournaments. We had a few telephone conversations, and on our last call, he made me promise to continue the pursuit of strengthening our youth program, "to sustain long-term membership in the $A C C$," as he put it.

For the next thirty-four years, I faithfully served as the director of youth cribbage for the ACC. In that time, the youth program has become a viable part of our organization. In 1994, I wrote a manual for educators who want to teach cribbage to groups of youngsters in a single setting. Since then, over one thousand teaching manuals have been sent all over the world to aspiring instructors of the game we love so much. I fielded hundreds of calls and emails helping teachers get started, or assisting retirees to get into a classroom or an after-school program. Through membership donation outreach, we now offer grants through the ACC youth program, which include up to ten new long boards for instructors and up to $\$ 500$ to reimburse directors for conducting sanctioned youth tournaments. Lastly, with the help of Don "Grumpy" Howard, youth program bylaws have been adopted, including a youth master point program that allows youth members to transfer their hard-earned master points obtained in sanctioned junior events when they become adult members.

Thirty-four years after my meeting with Joe, with a bittersweet heart, it is time to pass the torch of youth directorship to new leadership. At the board meeting in February, I officially submitted my letter of resignation, effective June 1, 2024. As the BOD seeks the right individual for the position, Don Howard has agreed to serve as interim director for up to one year. I will work with him to maintain the integrity of the ACC youth program, as well as mentor the newly chosen director when he or she is selected.

I'd like to thank the many, many individuals who have supported my efforts in making the ACC youth program what it is today. I am also grateful to those that have acknowledged my hard work with kind words of appreciation and support over the years.

What's in a peg? While playing Gary Girard (Surprise AZ) in the penultimate game of qualifying in the Cactus Cribbage Classic in Scottsdale AZ on February 2, Bryan Gurden (Las Vegas NV) was the pone. After counting his hand Bryan was in the dead hole and Gary was eight holes out. Gary counted seven, turned over the crib, which was zip, zero, nada.
