President's Column



Life Master One (Movie) Star! I have a shirt that reads: "Cribbage,

I don't play all the time . . . Oh wait

... Yes I do!" I do play a lot of cribbage weekends, online, Grass Roots. This article is about the one time I did something else.

Four years ago, a Facebook notice said extras were needed for a movie being filmed just twenty miles from my house. My son Jackson and I went to the movie set, signed the waivers, and then spent the day being extras. Then Covid showed up and the movie wasn't released at the normal canned film festivals. In my opinion positional play on fourth street is the most difficult aspect of cribbage and one that no player will never truly perfect.

For instance, if you are dealing from 28 out and the pone is 23 out. Is that position better or worse than dealing from 20 out with your opponent 15 out? It's still a five-point deficit, but which would you prefer? I would rather be dealing from 28 out.

Obviously, many players like to pattern their play on the 26-theory, so in this particular case they would be two points short. On fourth street it's much easier to pick up pegs than prevent your opponent from amassing pegs. The 28-out scenario allows you to be much more aggressive in pegging and not be deathly afraid of the pone going out with one pegging blunder.

With the pone at 15, however, every play must be made with abundant caution, because even giving up a trip to a six-point hand could be fatal in the next hand.

So in weighing your discarding and pegging decisions nearing fourth street, remember it's easier to play offense than defense as needed late in the game.

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

It springs to life on a fairly regular basis in cribbage. In fact, probably at every tournament or club session, someone says: "I never should've gotten a skunk in game one. That is the kiss of death. No wonder I didn't qualify."

For the record, I don't believe this fairy tale, because it is based on anecdotal evidence and has no basis in facts. Can anyone tell me why you wouldn't want to write a 3 in the game points column of your scorecard? But before I get to the hard facts, let me regale you with my Omaha experience (scorecards on next page):

- (1) In the Cornhusker main, I started with a 36-point skunk and did not qualify.
- (2) In the Cornhusker consy, I started with a 35-point skunk and did not qualify.
- (3) In the GRTOC, I started with a 33-point skunk and did not cash.
- (4) In the Grand National main, I lost my first game, got skunked my second game—and qualified!

So this proves the adage-right? Well, maybe not. Keep reading.

Since many players were eager to point out that I didn't qualify in Omaha three times *because* I started with a skunk, I decided to check the scorecards from all four playoff tournaments in Omaha: Cornhusker main and consy, Grand National main and consy. And here's what I found:

Since 1-in-4 players qualify for playoffs that's 25% for my arithmetically challenged readers—a purely random distribution of skunks means that 1-in-4 players with a skunk in game one would qualify. As you can see from the table on the previous page, first-game



skunkers in the two mains were slightly below the mean (23.1% and 22.7%), while the same group of players in the two consolations were far above average: 82.4% and 41.2%. In total, 42.1% of players with a first-game skunk made the playoffs.

To provide truly scientifically evidence, we would need to check scorecards from, say, a hundred tournaments. But perhaps one conclusion we can draw from this small sample size is that a skunk is more important in consolations. All too often a 12/6 doesn't qualify in these shorter tourneys, so do players perhaps try harder to get a skunk in order to get to 13?

Here's one thing that we never hear: "I skunked so-and-so in the first game of the playoffs—and lost the match!" Perhaps this is because we don't record spread points in playoff matches, but maybe it is also seldom true.

Regardless, it just doesn't make sense to avoid handing out a skunk at *any* time during the qualifying round.

One more thing: I wonder what **David Bute** (Brush CO) thinks about beginning with a skunk. He started the Cornhusker main with a 35-point skunk, → so that can't be good—right? Wrong! David not only qualified #19, but he went on to win the 232-player tournament! He was also named "GN Player of the Week."

So you still wanna tell me that starting with a skunk is a bad thing? CW



While doing some newspaper research, my wife came across this item from a July 8, 1882, entry in a local newspaper (*LaCon*-



Pro Tip from Duane Toll

When you need a cut, count the number of "outs" (that is, unseen cards that help you) and multiply by two to figure the approximate odds of getting a cut.

For example, when holding 3-Q-Q-K with first count from eight out, twelve cuts give you the victory: 2-2-2-5-5-5-J-J-J-J. Since $12 \times 2 = 24$, you have a 24% chance of getting the cut and winning the game on this deal.

In addition, eight more cuts (3-3-3-Q-Q-K-K-K) give you *some* help but not enough to win. In all, you have a 40% chance of getting help on the cut.

Sometime in 1970, a gunnery sergeant in the Marine Corps was admitted to the hospital, and during his stay he taught David how to play cribbage. A mere fifty-two years later, David wins his first tournament! Cribbage World apologizes to David and to all US Navy and Marine Corps personnel everywhere for this mistake.



- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses and Grass Roots/ACC dues.

• We pledge to continue to make *all* players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

Another Grand National—the fortieth in a long line stretching back to 1982—is in the books. This year's Grand National in Omaha NE was frequently referred to as Grand National XL, and that "XL" stands for both #40 and extra-large! Grand National 40/extra-large was directed by Scott Kooistra (Omaha NE) and his extra-large team of indefatigable workers: Troy Thorson, Kathy Pacocha, Clay Collier, Don Thienel, Patrick Barrett, and Linda Barrett. Stretching over the past four years, Scott et al. labored to put together an extra-large event worthy of the ACC.

Even with all that extra-large advance planning, some last-minute snafus still sprang up. In July, the hotel informed Scott that due to staffing issues they could not (a) provide meals during the tournaments or (b) host the awards banquet. Gulp! A lesser director might've panicked, but Scott did some extra-large thinking outside the box.

First, Scott lined up food trucks for some of the meals, and he solicited donations for others (see below). And then he found the fabulous Omaha Firefighters Hall to serve as the venue for the awards banquet, which featured food by renowned BBQ specialist Mike Hogan.

As an extra-large cribbage promoter, Scott also solicited donations from local businesses and nearby ACC members. All GN players owe an extra-large thank you to these Nebraska members, who paid for lunch out of their own pockets.

Topping the list is **Joe Clarke** (Central City NE), who bought forty extra-large pizzas for the 232 players in the Cornhusker main on Wednesday. The following eight members also made extra-large donations (between \$100 and \$600 each) to purchase sandwiches, chips, cookies, and drinks for 326 GN players on Saturday:

As disruptive as the news was, in the end it proved serendipitous. The money not spent on meals was then funneled back into what became an extra-large prize pool. The cash payback alone was over 93% in all four sanctioned events, and this number doesn't even include two other major player benefits: ACC sanctioning fees and trophies.

Even the GN winner was extra-large: "Big Al" Stanek from Bismarck ND withstood

the challenges of eighty-one other playoff contenders and emerged victorious after a first-round bye and six tough matches. Big Al's six opponents averaged a seeding of 42.7 and nearly 2,570 lifetime MRPs:

By contrast, Al's last opponent, **James Seufert**, \Rightarrow had a tougher path to the finals. He played an extra match because of no bye; and his matches included the ACC Open reigning champion **Richard May** (Waukegan IL), the GN high qualifier **Gary Galetti** (Butte MT), who posted a personal best 38/17 +246 on Saturday, and three players rated Grand Master and above. Overall his seven opponents averaged a seeding of 32.1 (a lower number means tougher) and 5,002 MRPs (almost double that of Al's opponents):

the reigning Eastern Region champion Charlene Cohen (Saint Cloud FL) and Life Master (5*) Roland Hall (Napa CA), while Dan had to defeat Life Master (*) David Statz (Amherst MA) and Life Master (2*) Keith Widener (Clemmons NC) in his earlier rounds.



Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

Over the years of writing this column, I have featured many ivory boards. This board is a twenty-inch walrus tusk, given to me by my good friend, Janis McWilliams. We have no history on the board. However, from looking at the scrimshaw, it is obviously Alaskan and quite old.



When I first got the board, the scrimshaw was very faded and worn. It was difficult to even make out the scrimshaw on the sides. I googled "how to restore scrimshaw"; some options were fairly expensive, and others required special materials.

I thought about it for a while. Then one day I saw my wife writing on a white erase board with a black erasable marker. I immediately got my ivory board and tried a small area on the side. After covering an area about a half-inch square, I wiped off the smooth surface with. The black remained in the scrimshaw area. I was so excited that I finished the rest of the board in about half an hour.

It was amazing to see ships, animals, whales, hunters, houses, dog sleds, appear. I have never seen this much scrimshaw on an ivory board. Thank you, Janis!

Finally, a warning: if you try this process be sure to use

an erasable marker and work on only very smooth ivory.

Today's discussion deals with cross-checking scorecards after qualifying ends. The ACC rulebook (pages 58–59) has fairly explicit directions on how and when to cross-check, while section 12.2 of the rulebook gives detailed directions on how to handle nearly any permutation that may be discovered in the process of cross-checking. Continuing the mention on page 18 of the October Cribbage World, where wins were incorrectly posted in four consecutive games, I recently saw a card incorrectly posted as a win in three straight games. In all three cases, the opponents initialed the scorecard. Although these errors were later caught and corrected, if taken to the extreme, the player with the incorrect scorecard would have picked up six game points plus a slew of spread points. Cross-checking would have caught this, but strictly speaking the "real winner" would be docked two game points while the "wrong winner" would revert to the loss it actually was. The important thing to note is that the game would not be counted as a win for the actual winner. The point of all this is to urge you to carefully check the opposing scorecard prior to initialing it. We all-me, you, everybody-are lax in this regard. We make the entry on our scorecard, initial the opponent's, and move on.

At another fourteen-game tournament a player turned in a 19/8 scorecard when, in fact, it should have been 19/9. This one-point error cost the player a spot in the playoffs. While the onus is always on the player to ensure a correct card is turned in, the cross-checkers, per rule 5 on page 58 of the ACC rulebook, should have caught this in cross-checking. Once the playoffs start, it's too late to tell the director there was a scorecard error. So, check 'em and check 'em again.

At a recent Grass Roots meeting I had 11 points with three games to go, so I needed one win to qualify for GRPs. Unsurprisingly I lost all three games, but what was

quite surprising was that I lost each game by 14 points. In bowling three strikes are a "turkey"; in hockey three goals are a "hat trick." Anybody know what to call three cribbage losses in a row by the same spread points?


James Klinger
