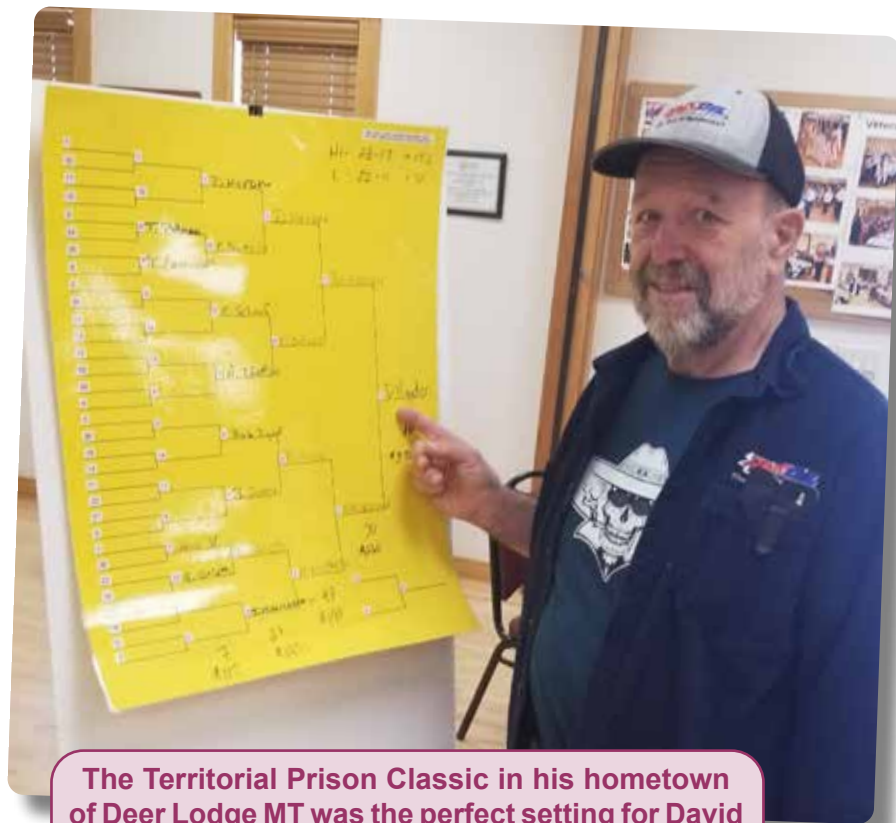

Thanks for the luck! One of my favorite parts of being ACC President is giving the President's Award at the Grand National awards banquet. This year's recipient is **Peggy Shea**.

Peggy has been directing or codirecting tournaments for many years. Along with her husband, **Rick**, she has directed the JPW/ACC Open in Reno NV since 2012. She codirected the 2017 Grand National in Lincoln City OR as well many other tournaments.

A few years back, I was playing Rick in the playoffs of the Reno Veterans Day Classic. In the fifth game, it looked like I had position and would be advancing to round two. Peggy walked up behind Rick to watch, and that's when he got a cut for a 20-point hand. I wanted to ask her to go away, but I still had position, and unless he hit another huge hand, I would be okay. He then hit a gut shot for 16. As I walked the walk of defeat up to collect the first-round money, Peggy smiled and said: "That was a rough one." I just told her what I was thinking: "I blame you! Because you brought him luck."

I was thinking about this idea, that tournament directors allow players to find their luck.

I know a lot of cribbage is skill, pegging, traps, and board position. But some luck is involved, and if tournaments weren't hosted and directed by volunteers who spend hours setting them up and making sure things run smoothly, just think of how many times you wouldn't have got that lucky cut to win the game that you were sure to lose.

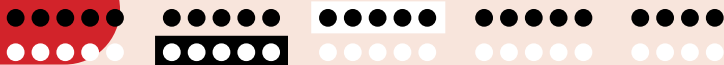
Thank you, Peggy Shea and all tournament directors, including Grass Roots and internet, for all that you contribute to the ACC.

The Inside Track

End-game pegging and decision making can be diametrically opposed to early and mid-game play. Paying close attention to these differences can be the key to winning that one extra game per tournament that could propel you into the playoffs.

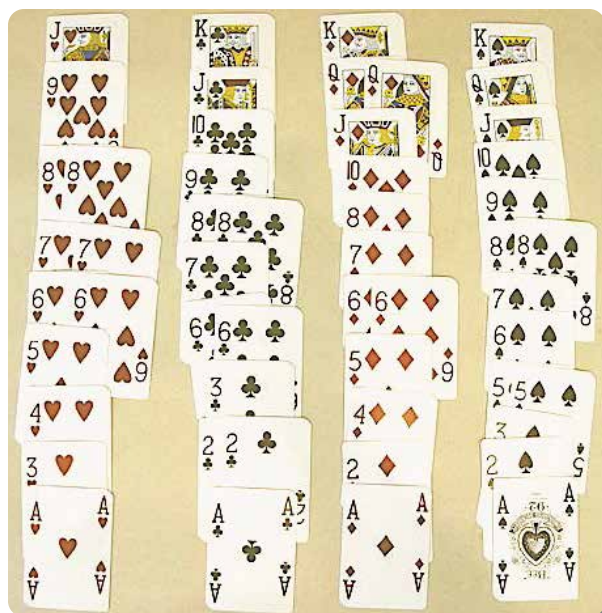
You are dealing from eleven out, and your opponent needs six points with first count. You keep 6-6-9-K and discard A-A. The cut is a King, and your opponent leads a 3. What do you play?

“Wow, Rob,” you say, “that’s a no brainer: you have two 6s and even if they play one for four points, you get it for six. And obviously I can’t play the King, because he’s likely to have a 2 with it.”

Well, as George Costanza would say: “Seemingly, seemingly to the untrained eye.” First of all, pegging six to the pone’s four is a losing proposition with the pone six out and you eleven out. You have enough points anyway with hand and crib, so there’s no need to peg. Second, if the pone has a 2 she is out anyway, and if she has a hand such as 3-J-Q-K, the cut pushed her over, so play the King and try to avoid giving up pegs to hands like 3-4-6-7 or 3-4-6-9 that are crying out to grab pegging points.

Always remember: an easy decision on first street sometimes morphs into a completely different one on fourth street.

My Deal

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

There were (at least) two errors in the September *Cribbage World*. Both of them were on page 15, and both were my fault.

First, in the pegging sequence in Rob Medeiros's column, the last card played is a 9, not a 6. Not only is it hard to get three of a kind with the sequence 9-9-6, but it is nearly impossible to find a deck with five 6s in it!

I say "nearly impossible" because at Grand National 28, which I codirected in Grand Rapids MI in 2009, we had a situation in game #13 in which a fifth 6 appeared in the pegging. Apparently the pegging sequence went this way. ↓

(For those who don't know: five of a kind is worth 20 points. Now you know!)




I got more emails, calls, and texts about the 9/6 mistake than almost anything I've printed in *Cribbage World* in sixteen years. Interestingly, only one person—**Rob Medeiros**—noticed the second mistake on this page.

In the recap of my bad beat by **John Syftestad** in Battle Creek, I inadvertently put John's 4 at the end, whereas he actually played it as his third card, like this. ↓

John did not renege, rather my memory reneged. John still dealt out from 55—I still lost—and my memory of it is still painful.

Cribbage Club Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four visits or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses and Grass Roots/ACC dues.

After the trial period is up . . .

- We pledge to continue to make *all* players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

Cribbage Board of the Month BY JAY FULWIDER

Over the years I have had a lot of questions from fellow ACC members about my cribbage board collection. Here are some answers.

My collection started in 1981 when I inherited my father's board. Boards were added slowly over the next twenty years. After becoming a member of the ACC and discovering the Cribbage Board Collectors Society (CBCS), I started collecting more seriously. My collection is up to 455+ boards. Of those, I have donated or given away around 100 boards. Most of the donated boards have gone to Dan Zeisler and the ACC's Youth Program.

I know some of our ACC members are also collectors, so I will go over the mechanics of how I track my collection. Some of this may apply to other collections too.

My boards are numbered 1–455 with a sticker as they are added to the collection. I photograph each board and number the photo. ➡ I use an album from Pioneer Photo Albums (#JPF-46). This album has foldout pages that hold six photos per side. With the pages folded out, there are twelve photos, so 120 photos per ten pages. The album expands to hold more pages, so all my photos are in one album.

I also use a Word file on my computer to document each board. I number the board and list the following: manufacturer (if known), model number, whether box and instructions are present, what material the board is made of, and size of the board.

In another Word file, I track board manufacturers alphabetically with corresponding board numbers. In addition, the following types of boards are also tracked: horn and antler, leather, ivory, souvenir, English inlays, CBCS Convention boards, and those from unknown manufacturers.

About 100 boards in my collection are on display in my den/office/bar/TV room. ➡ The other boards are in plastic boxes in our store room, and I track which boards are in which box. Because of the tracking system, I can find any board in my collection within a few minutes.

Tracking requires a little work, but it sure makes your collection more fun. One word of advice: don't procrastinate!

Teaching Tip

When teaching cribbage, three questions frequently arise from students: (1) Do I have to cut the deck after my opponent shuffles? (2) How many times do I need to shuffle to mix the deck? (3) Can I flip the top card when cutting for deal or to expose the starter card? Here are the correct responses:

1. Yes, you must cut the deck after the dealer is done mixing the deck before dealing.
2. The pack must be mixed or shuffled at least three times with the cards face down or otherwise hidden from both players.
3. No, you may not flip the top card when you cut the deck. When cutting for the first deal of a game, the first player must remove no less than four cards and not more than half the pack; the second player shall remove no less than four cards and must leave at least four cards. When cutting before each deal and for the starter card, no less than four cards must be taken from the top and no less than four left on the bottom.

DIDJA KNOW?

You must be a member in good standing in order to earn ACC points. This applies to all three of the ACC's divisions: weekend tournaments (MRPs), Grass Roots clubs (GRPs), and internet play (IRPs).

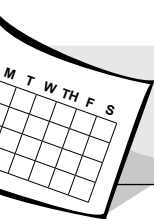
