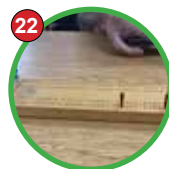

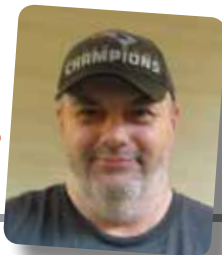
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President's Column

“Que Sera, Sera” — *Doris Day*

I want to share some information about a song written in 1956 at the request of Alfred Hitchcock for Doris Day to sing in his upcoming movie. When given the song, Day hated it and thought it was a children's song, but the song went on to win the Oscar for Best Song of the year. If I asked if you know any Doris Day songs, this quite possibly would be the only one you could name.

The song's title loosely translates to “whatever will be, will be”—meaning you cannot control everything that happens in life and to always hope for the best. Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

I would like to thank our Board of Directors for an outstanding job in working on our declining membership. Since the January 2018 issue of CW our membership has declined by only 41 members. This is a reversal of what we had been experiencing.

I truly believe that implementing the

In the same twenty months where our membership dropped by 41, we had 1,295 new players join the ACC. This means that in a twenty-month timeframe, 1,336 people are no longer ACC members.

play nice policy at many GR clubs is a key component to this reversal. It is at the Grass Roots level where people are first exposed to the ACC, not the Tournament Trail. I know we researched why people do not renew their membership and that rudeness was at the top of the list.

But I believe the number one reason is one that people will not discuss: they have a difficult time competing with seasoned players. This doesn't mean they are bad players—heck, the next Duane Toll or Erik Locke could be the next new member at any of our clubs—it just means that they have success at the kitchen table, but that success doesn't carry over when they play competitively.

had several members pass, but even if five died every month, that would account for only 100 fewer members. How do we retain more of these players?

My suggestion is that every club have two tables. One table is the same as we always have, and the second table is a six-game table comprised of new members and some of our slower playing players. Yes, this will make more work for club directors, but they can get help from other members in their club.

The six-game table needs a minimum of four players, and players earn Grass Roots points if they have an 8-point card or better. Each club will need a seasoned

player at this table. The new players will not get beat up too badly, the night will get over earlier so the grumpy old veteran club members will be nicer, and once the new players have some success, they can move up to the nine-game format.

Job Opening—TOC Director

The ACC is looking for a director for the Tournament of Champions, held in Reno each winter on the day before the ACC Open. The successful candidate will assist with the 2020 TOC and have full charge of the 2021 TOC.

Much of the work is done prior to arriving in Reno, but the job requires spending extra days in Reno before and after the TOC to prepare for the tourney and to wrap up the paperwork.

The successful candidate must have experience directing tournaments, be computer literate (especially fluent spreadsheets and email), and pay careful attention to details.

Responsibilities also include compiling the list of TOC qualifiers from multiple sources, emailing the invitations, maintaining the list of volunteers for both TOC and ACC Open, preparing scorecards and randomly assigning seats, and working closely with Barbara Woodward to create the tournament flyer, calculate payouts, double-check entries, and many other duties.

Cribbage Club Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses and Grass Roots/ACC dues.

After the trial period is up . . .

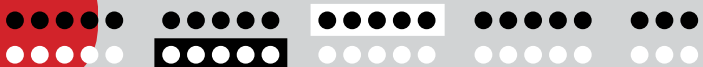
- We pledge to continue to make all players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

The Inside Track

Fourth street play often requires plays that fly in the face of how we play the rest of the game. Calculated decisions must be made that could possibly win you the game or—quite frankly—make you look foolish. We have to be prepared to make them, however, to steal games we would normally lose by standard play.

You are tied with the dealer at 101 and are dealt A-6-7-9-J-K; what to do? Well if this were first street I would keep 6-7-9-J and hope for something to help. However, let's look at the big picture here: the dealer has three counts to get twenty points, and we obviously aren't going very far with this hand. If dealer has 4-5-5-6 or 6-7-7-8, the game is history. So let's not even consider those.

The dealer will likely think we will try to kill the crib—which obviously we would love to do. So if he doesn't have a no-brainer hand, what are some of the best discards for the dealer? I think the top four throws to one's own crib are 2-3, 5-X, A-4, and 7-8.

So with our hand and the dealer's position, how can we counter that? If the dealer throws any of the first three discards, it's likely he has at least a few middle cards in his hand, so I suggest keeping the ugly A-6-J-K here and discard 7-9. That throw kills those three discards, as well as rids ourselves of two cards that the dealer has a great chance of pegging on. The 7-9 gives up an occasional 12-point or 16-point crib, but it also yields many 0-point and 2-point cribs as well—which we desperately need here.

I call this discard an All-or-Nothing. A 6-point or 8-point crib is probably just as fatal to us in this position, so take a deep breath, throw the dangerous cards, and hope to not look foolish!

Season Wrap

The 2018–19 season wrapped up on July 31, with tournaments in three corners(ish) of the United States—North Carolina, Washington, and California. The 2019 national champion is Life Master **Jeremy Krieger** (Salem OR), who trounced the field by finishing more than 1,000 points ahead of the competition. Jeremy’s 2,638 MRPs this season is the seventh best season ever recorded by any ACC player.

In addition to winning the championship by the largest margin ever, Jeremy also set a new record for most tournament wins: eleven (five mains, six consolations). The previous record was held by Life Master (3★) **Erik Locke** (Wood Village OR), who won nine tournaments in the 2013–14 season.

I have been Club 58 champion five times. I have won forty-eight sanctioned events, the first of which was Virginia Beach in February 1994. My favorite tournament is National Open in Raleigh. 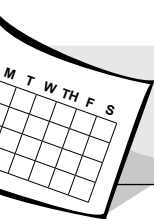


25 Years Ago in the ACC
